Introduction to the Journal of the 78th General Convention

For thousands who gathered in Salt Lake City, the 78th General Convention was a remarkable experience, one permeated with excitement, joy and a sense that a new stirring of the Spirit had been born. We elected and confirmed the 27th Presiding Bishop of the church; we enacted historic legislation; we renewed our commitment to mission expansion in the church and in the world; and we celebrated the gifts that make us the Episcopal Church. This was the ninth General Convention I had attended in some capacity or another, and for me it was the most hopeful. I left Utah exhilarated to be an Episcopalian, and knowing that, with God's help, we can accomplish what God has given us to be and to do.

In addition to other information, this Journal of the 78th General Convention presents particulars of the legislative activity that was at the heart of General Convention. By adjournment sine die, 392 resolutions had been filed and acted upon.

Of course, all these resolutions were presented and debated within the particular contexts of the 78th General Convention. With that in mind, and by way of locating our legislative work within some of those contexts, I offer these observations:

Structural Reorganization

The Summary of Actions lists specific ways through which the 78th General Convention reimagined our governance, but much had already been restructured before we gathered in June: For the first time in years, the legislative committees had been examined, renamed and reorganized, creating better correlations between interim bodies and their legislative counterparts. In the House of Deputies, the first rewriting in generations of the Rules of Order was proposed and enacted, after more than two years of work and consultation. New committees to review and support the legislative

work had been created, and the legislative committees were organized and empowered to begin their work long before we arrived in Utah. More deputies and bishops were appointed to legislative committees than at previous conventions, and deputies and alternate deputies were encouraged to participate fully in legislative deliberations.

The basis for this pre-convention reorganization was a commitment to "leveling the playing field," so that all might understand and contribute to the decision-making, whether this was the first or ninth time a deputy or bishop had attended a General Convention. This was a priority of the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, as she prepared for her first General Convention as President of the House of Deputies. The result was a broad understanding and responsibility for the legislative process – an empowerment through knowledge and involvement so that spiritual discernment could be paramount. People who understand and can participate more fully in decision-making generally make better decisions, and are almost always happier about the experience, even if their point of view does not prevail.

These pre-convention decisions were supported and strengthened by the technological innovations of the 78th General Convention.

Technological Innovations

Perhaps the scariest moment of my professional life was the morning of June 24, 2015, when I stood before a thousand deputies, alternate deputies and visitors to demonstrate "The Virtual Binder." After two years of imagineering, software development, scenario planning, and simulations in the software "sandbox," the Moment of Truth had arrived.

Fortunately, the system didn't crash, and in fact performed (almost) flawlessly over the next ten days. In our post-convention survey, an amazing 99% of the 555 people who responded expressed their satisfaction with the "V-Binder," and many credited it and its ease of use with enhancing their involvement in and appreciation of General Convention. Others remarked favorably on the sight of thousands of Episcopalians sharing their iPads and other devices during the first "paperless" worship in General Convention history.

IPads and V-Binders weren't the only technological innovations, of course. A GC78 App, with updating calendars, maps, prayers, and Twitter feeds became the constant companion of many a convention-goer, while a new queuing system and voting devices (complete with Smartcards) in the House of Deputies continued the foundational principle of equalizing the participation of members. Both Houses enjoyed projection screens (a first for the Bishops), and legislative committees were provided broadband and hard-wired access to the convention software for the first time. Remarkably, of the 1350 iPads we had provided for the convention, all were returned and only two were broken.

Although one observer noted that General Convention technology had "gone 30 years in one triennium," perhaps the greatest sign of technological triumph was that for many, it was taken for granted. Our technological revolution could be likened to the best mission practice: it was of service to the church and the world, without bringing attention to itself.

I imagine that is why news media in Salt Lake City hardly noticed the epochal change in General Convention information technologies, even as its own information technologies met new challenges.

News Media

Although not completely paperless, the 78th General Convention was notable for the lack of photocopied commentaries and newsletters that characterized previous gatherings. Many Bishops, Deputies, Alternates, ECW Triennial delegates, and visitors were not getting their news from papers – nor, it would seem, from the various email and web presences of church-related media. 2015 was a convention for social media in general and Twitter in particular. Most people seemed to learn about what was happening from Tweets, or from people who were following Twitter feeds.

The democratic agora of Twitter may have taken some by surprise, even as they promoted their web-based reporting via hashtags. The real absence of "must-read" publications or by-lines that characterized General Conventions past is surely something that will be pondered by those who imagine that opinion-leaders in the Episcopal Church are created, not born.

While national and international secular media were largely absent, the strongest traditional media presence was found in the Salt Lake City newspapers. Both the Deseret News and the Salt Lake Tribune devoted considerable resources to covering the 78th General Convention, a tribute to both the excellent work of the communication department of the Episcopal Diocese of Utah and the strong local interest in religious news in the headquarters city of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Salt Lake City

The friendly hospitality of the Diocese of Utah and the people of Salt Lake City helped define a generosity of spirit that characterized the 78th General Convention. If "context is everything," then surely the physical and cultural setting of convention shaped our experience in ways that will continue to unfold. From "Utah Night" in the Salt Lake City Tabernacle; to the snow-topped mountains viewed from wide avenues in near 100 degree heat; to the sounds of Taiko drumming, smooth Jazz, and gospel preaching; and to the resounding "Go" from our Presiding Bishop Elect: the 78th General Convention felt as though it were a combination of spiritual retreat, strategic planning session, and revival meeting. It was a time liminal with promise.





Adopted Budget of the General Convention 2016 - 2018

Narrative

Details and Commentary Regarding the Budget

Introduction:

The Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance is pleased to present the Proposed Budget for The Episcopal Church for the 2016-2018 Triennium.

The Budget is balanced and it aims at 15% Asking/assessment by 2018 to leave more financial resources at the local level, where the bulk of the church's ministry is accomplished, thereby encouraging participation by all dioceses in the support of the ministry and mission of God through The Episcopal Church. The Budget also continues our church's ongoing support for youth and young adults, the planting of new churches and the creation of enterprise zones. It also includes new racial reconciliation and justice work, Prayer Book renewal, and enhanced funding for care of creation. And the Budget honors our historic commitments to Black Colleges, our development partnerships with ethnic ministries, and our church partners around the world.

On the Revenue side:

<u>Diocesan Asking/assessment:</u> Currently the Asking/assessment rate is 19%. The budget sets the Asking/assessment rate for dioceses at 15% by 2018, which represents 62% of total revenue. If all dioceses participate at 15%, we will actually experience a modest increase in resources.

In calculating the diocesan Asking/assessment, the income exempted has been increased from the first \$120,000 to the first \$150,000. This will result in an immediate savings to each diocese of \$14,850 over the triennium which should help ease the burden on all dioceses, especially those with smaller budgets, while still providing adequate support for the triennial budget.

The new 15% rate will be achieved by reducing the Asking/assessment in a step-wise fashion: 18% in 2016, 16.5% in 2017 and 15% in 2018. Dioceses currently giving below 19%, but above 15%, are asked to hold where they are and then to join in the step-wise reduction.

Dioceses currently paying below 15% are invited and encouraged, and many have already committed, to move upward toward 15% at a rate of 10% per year. See the recommendation below for a process by which a diocese for which 15% is too much of a burden might negotiate an appropriate level of Asking/assessment to ensure participation of all dioceses in the Asking/assessment.

<u>Investment income</u>: Revenue from the church's investment assets is anticipated at a 5% draw on unrestricted investment assets, based on 20 trailing quarters. This rate is well below the 8.3% annual return produced by the trust assets since 1993. We have confidence in this revenue stream

<u>Development Office Income</u>: PB&F believes strongly in the need for a robust Development Office and program for The Episcopal Church. We believe that the whole church will benefit as the Development Office builds relationships with potential donors. However, PB&F does not believe that the Development Office is currently in a place to provide an annual campaign of support for the operational budget of the church. Therefore, we have eliminated the expectation in the Executive

Council budget that the Development Office will provide \$2,000,000 for programs.

We have included in its place \$1,100,000 from the church's unrestricted investment assets previously authorized for the Development Office, but never drawn. We have also reduced expenditures for the Development Office relative to the Executive Council draft by \$750,000; and the budget remains \$1.3 million higher than spent during the previous triennium.

Rental income: The space at 815 Second Avenue is increasingly leased to other users. Rental income for the next triennium is anticipated to bring in nearly \$10,000,000. We expect this income to grow.

<u>Governmental contracts/fees:</u> Contracts with government entities related to the resettlement of refugees are designed to be breakeven. Because that activity is independent of the triennial budget, it is shown below the budget to be adopted.

On the Expense side:

The budget received from the Executive Council was balanced and internally consistent. Therefore, finding money in response to resolutions required either cutting other lines or seeking new sources of income. Program, Budget and Finance did a bit of both.

This budget continues the practice of providing flexibility to the Executive Council and the Presiding Officers to respond to changing needs which may occur during the triennium.

<u>Racial Justice</u> & <u>Reconciliation</u>: A bold new initiative of this budget is for racial justice and reconciliations. PB&F supports the call for a new era of work to address racism in our church and our communities. We have set aside \$2,000,000 for this work to be planned by the Presiding Officers. This is half of what was requested, but, in a tight budget, we believe it offers the possibility of a new start.

There are four kinds of grants in the proposed budget:

Long term development/sustainability grants are grants which facilitate partnerships with dioceses and the rest of the church. An example is the grant given to the Diocese of the Dominican Republic. We affirm and support the successful work done to date and fund continued work.

Block grants are grants whose use is decided by the recipient. Audits and progress reports are required. Examples are the grants given to the Diocese of Alaska, Navajoland, North Dakota, and South Dakota to enhance work with indigenous populations. We have increased the funding for these grants. We have created a new block grant for the historically Black Colleges.

New Initiatives grants are for experimental approaches to building up the body of Christ. Racial Justice and Reconciliation is such a grant.

Special purpose grants are grants for specific programs with a purpose and plan. Examples are the monies given to parishes and dioceses for starting new congregations and Mission Enterprise Zones – increased \$1 million over the prior triennium.

<u>Christian Formation:</u> Christian Formation and FORMA are funded at the level of the Executive Council draft budget.

<u>Youth and Young Adults:</u> Full funding continues for the Episcopal Youth Event. Funding is increased for the Young Adult Service Corps.

<u>Creation Care:</u> Mark 5 of the budget has received an increase of \$150,000 over the current triennium. Such money will be used for "green grants" and for the development of environment stewardship across the church.

Digital Evangelism: In response to the Presiding Bishop-elect's commitment to evangelism, PB&F has added \$750,000 to the Communication budget for digital evangelism.

Interim Bodies, formerly Committees, Commissions, Agencies and Boards: PB&F has renamed this budget line to signal the intent to change the way business is conducted between Conventions. The triennial budget assumes a reduction by one-third the number of interim bodies, and by one third the number of members but increases the funding available for face-to-face meetings. The Presiding Officers and the Executive Council are responsible for the implementation. We added \$100,000 with the suggestion that it go to the work of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music.

<u>Anglican Communion Office:</u> We restored funds for the ACO to the \$1,200,000 level of two triennia ago. This is an increase of \$500,000.

<u>United Thank Offering:</u> For the first time, the budget reflects the operating costs and income for the United Thank Offering board.

General Board of Examining Chaplains: Funds from fees are expected to sustain the ministry of the General Board of Examining Chaplains.

College for Bishops: The block grant to the College was modestly increased.

<u>Provincial Funding:</u> In keeping with the recommendations of the Executive Council, funding for Provinces is phased out over the triennium, except for Province IX where the budget has been increased to cover the costs of travel and other logistics. Dioceses that wish to do so may support their provincial organizations locally.


<u>Title IV Training:</u> \$300,000 has been set aside for training of Title IV to develop consistency across the church.


<u>Development Office</u>: During the current triennium the Development Office spent \$3,000,000 and produced \$7,000,000 for projects outside the budget, principally in Haiti and Navajoland. A new director of development will have a good base of major donors and an increased budget to build on.

<u>Translation and Interpretation Costs:</u> Equal approximately \$500,000 and are spread throughout the budget.

Recommendations:

We are grateful that PB&F members were involved in creating the vision budget process, in every Executive Council meeting, and in reviewing feedback solicited from the church at large. The collaborative approach taken by Executive Council produced a cogent and balanced budget. We suggest this collaboration continue. However, a budget so tightly balanced does not permit easy changes. Large allocations in response to legislation are even harder to come by. We think that an undesignated block of \$2 - 5 million included within the draft budget, would allow PB&F greater flexibility in responding to the needs and the priorities of the General Convention.

We believe in a strong Development Office. We encourage the church to put the money and expertise into developing and strengthening this office. We believe that effort needs to be put into determining a clear development vision and strategy, including a decision about the creation of an annual fund. The future of the Development Office, its success in raising capital funds, depends in part on its visibility to and service to the whole church.

If Convention has not created an Asking/assessment review process before it adjourns, PB&F recommends that Executive Council create and oversee such a process. Its goal would be to work with dioceses for which a 15% Asking/assessment is a financial hardship and to come to a common understanding of a realistic percentage that would represent each diocese's full participation in the Asking/assessment.

Criterion 1

Historicity: Christianity is a radically historical religion, so in almost every instance it is not theological realities or spiritual movements, but exemplary witness to the Gospel of Christ in lives actually lived that is remembered in our family story. Like all families, however, our family includes important matriarchs and patriarchs about whom little verifiable information is known, yet whose names and influence still exert influence on how we understand ourselves in relation to them.

Criterion 2

Christian Discipleship: The family story captured here is uniquely and identifiably a Christian story. This set of stories commemorates the ways particular Christians live out the promises of baptism. A worthy summary of these promises is captured in our Baptismal Covenant, including a commitment to the Triune God as captured in the Apostles' Creed; continuing in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers; resisting evil and repenting when necessary; proclaiming by word and example the Good News of God in Christ; seeking and serving Christ in all persons; and striving for justice and peace among all people. Rather than being an anachronistic checklist, these should be considered general guidelines for considering holistic Christian life and practice. There may be occasional exceptional cases where not all of these promises are successfully kept, or when the person in question is not a Christian, yet the person's life and work still significantly impacts the ongoing life of the Church and contributes to our fuller understanding of the Gospel.

Criterion 3

Significance: Those remembered should have been in their lifetime extraordinary, even heroic servants of God and God's people for the sake, and after the example, of Jesus Christ. They may also be people whose creative work or whose manner of life has glorified God, enriched the life of the Church, or led others to a deeper understanding of God. In their varied ways, those remembered have revealed Christ's presence in, and Lordship over, all of history; and continue to inspire us as we carry forward God's mission in the world.

Criterion 4

Range of Inclusion: Particular attention should be paid to Episcopalians and other members of the Anglican Communion. Attention should also be paid to the inclusion of people of different genders and races, of lay people (witnessing in this way to our baptismal understanding of the Church), and of ecumenical partners and people who have had their own distinctive influence upon us. In addition to the better-known, it is important also to include those "whose memory may have faded in the shifting fashions of public concern, but whose witness is deemed important to the life and mission of the Church" (Thomas Talley).

Criterion 5

Local Observance: Normally, significant remembrance of a particular person already exists within the Church at the local and regional levels before that person is included in the Church's larger story.

Criterion 6

Perspective: The introduction of new names should be done with a certain economy lest the balance of the whole be overwhelmed. In the cases of the recently departed — particularly in the case of controversial names — care should be given to seeing them from the perspective of history. Names

added should show a broad influence upon the Church and should result from a widespread desire expressed across the Church over a reasonable period of time.

Criterion 7

Combined Remembrances: Not all those included need to be remembered "in isolation." Where there are close and natural links between persons to be remembered, a joint commemoration would make excellent sense (e.g., the Reformation martyrs, Latimer and Ridley; and two bishops of Lincoln, Robert Grosseteste and Hugh); and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention authorize for trial use the liturgical resource entitled, "Weekday Eucharistic Propers 2015," as outlined in the Blue Book, replacing Holy Women, Holy Men; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention direct the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music to gather feedback from congregations, seminaries, religious orders, and other eucharistic communities on these two resources and to report to the next General Convention; and be it further Resolved, That the General Convention direct the Secretary of General Convention, in consultation with the outgoing Chair of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music and the Chairs of the Legislative Committees to whom this legislation is referred, to finalize and arrange for the publication of the material contained in "A Great Cloud of Witnesses" and in "Weekday Eucharistic Propers 2015" as approved by the 78th General Convention.

A Bishop performing the duties of the Bishop Diocesan under this Section has all the authority and powers of the Bishop Diocesan under this Title.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A063)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 78th General Convention adopt the following Criteria for Recommending New Biblical Translations for Use in Public Worship:

- I. Guiding assumptions:
 - 1. There is no perfect translation. It is impossible to render the full meaning of a text in its original language and context into another language and context.
 - 2. All translations make interpretive choices; there is no "neutral" translation. However, some translations conform more closely than others to the specific criteria listed below.
 - 3. The goal of these criteria is not to advance any particular interpretations; but, rather, to help ensure that amendments to Canon II.2 will be generally received as reasonable, responsible, and suitable.
 - 4. Ordinarily, for a translation to be considered, it must include the books of the Old and New Testament and the Apocrypha or Deuterocanonical Books as listed in the Articles of Religion.
 - 5. No translation will be universally received as fully meeting all of these criteria. To be recommended, a new translation should be widely received as meeting most of these specific criteria.
- II. To be recommended for use in public worship, a translation should meet the specific criteria of being:
 - 1. Based on academically or historically accepted editions of the Hebrew and Greek texts;
 - 2. Technically competent in approximating the meaning of the base text; Comprehensible to the target audience;
 - 3. Fluid when spoken aloud;
 - 4. Stylistically suitable to approved services.
- III. While some translations obviously fail to meet these standards, measuring a text by these criteria is far from an exact science. We can, however, look for certain kinds of positive reception to indicate whether or not a text meets most of these criteria:
 - 1. Academic reception. Do most biblical scholars recognize the translation as technically competent and comprehensible to the target audience? Do most liturgical scholars recognize the translation as fluid when spoken aloud and stylistically suitable to approved services?
 - 2. Pastoral reception. Does a significant number of clergy consider the translation comprehensible to their congregations, fluid when spoken aloud, and/or stylistically suitable for their services?

3. Anglican reception. Have most other Churches in the Anglican Communion made provision for the use of the translation in public worship?

- 4. Full Communion Partners' reception. Have most of The Episcopal Church's Full Communion Partners made provision for the use of the translation in public worship?
- 5. Ecumenical reception. Have other Churches made provisions for the use of the translation in public worship?; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon II.2 is hereby amended by adding two new sections:

Canon 2: Of Translations of the Bible

Sec. 1. The Lessons prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer shall be read from the translation of the Holy Scriptures commonly known as the King James or Authorized Version (which is the historic Bible of this Church) together with the Marginal Readings authorized for use by the General Convention of 1901; or from one of the three translations known as Revised Versions, including the English Revision of 1881, the American Revision of 1901, and the Revised Standard Version of 1952; from the Jerusalem Bible of 1966; from the New English Bible with the Apocrypha of 1970; or from The 1976 Good News Bible (Today's English Version); or from The New American Bible (1970); or from The Revised Standard Version, an Ecumenical Edition, commonly known as the "R.S.V. Common Bible" (1973); or from The New International Version (1978); or from The New Jerusalem Bible (1987); or from the Revised English Bible (1989); or from the New Revised Standard Version (1990); or from the Contemporary English Version Global (2005); or from the Common English Bible (2011); or from translations, authorized by the diocesan bishop, of those approved versions published in any other language; or from other versions of the Bible, including those in languages other than English, which shall be authorized by diocesan bishops for specific use in congregations or ministries within their dioceses.

Sec. 2. All translations proposed for inclusion in Canon II.2.1 must conform to the Criteria for Recommending New Biblical Translations for Use in Public Worship adopted by General Convention.

Sec. 3. All translations proposed for inclusion in Canon II.2.1 must first be referred to the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music for review according to the Criteria for Recommending New Biblical Translations for Use in Public Worship.

Supplemental Materials pp. 233-234:

Introduction

When we see the great abundance, diversity, and intricacy of God's creatures, we are awestruck by life on our planet. We are amazed by the God who has created all that is. and who is the engineer or crafter of the cosmos, designing and assembling all the details. But we also know from science that the details of organisms change through time according to their situations — that is, they evolve through adaptation and natural selection.

Some people take this to mean that there is no role for God in the evolution of life on our planet, but they miss the point that It is through God's love and humility that the processes of nature operate, bringing growth and adaptive change. God's love grants creation the freedom to make and remake. Scripture is clear that divine mercy is over all God's works. The material world is not something to be simply disregarded and destroyed as unimportant to God, whose love is unwavering.

Just as we do not read Scripture literally, so we must resist reading nature literally, but instead search for the big themes and the evolving stories, exploring a deeper and more sweeping narrative. It is in Jesus Christ that we see God's humility most particularly and gain insight into what theologian John Haught has called the "extravagant generosity" of God. In the ancient hymn of Philippians 2 we gaze at Christ, who did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself to take the form of a servant, not simply on behalf of humankind, but on behalf of the whole cosmos which is redeemed in him.

Just as we are called to consider the lost and the least among our human brothers and sisters, so we may say that we are called to consider the dignity of all God's creatures: Science currently is working on several fronts to discover more about kinship. There are both genetic/hereditary and ecological relationships among earth's creatures. We share much of our DNA with plants and animals we do not usually consider as having much in common with us, and the air we breathe requires the healthy function of organisms far less complex than we are. For many people honoring the dignity of every creature involves thinking about threatened species of birds and mammals and large fish,

environmentalism's poster children, but for those who study life on earth, whether professional biologists or backyard naturalists, it means considering the insects and the plankton, the mushrooms and molds, the plants that bring us joy and the ones we call weeds, the algae and the bacteria, and .-It means considering the dignity of even those species that which bring humans disease, such as mosquitoes and viruses. It means pondering the relationships among creatures which are not always pretty: predation, parasitism, scavenging.

Each creature's uniqueness is neither individual nor fixed. Living things develop their characteristics in their contexts in relationship to other creatures, other members of their population, and other species in their community. As the resources in their habitats change, and pressures from their fellow creatures shift, living things change. Death and even extinction of populations and species are a natural part of this process of change. But that reality does not mean that humans should accelerate extinction through our activities.

Our understanding of God as One, yet three persons, is a divine picture of diversity in community. Each person of the Trinity, Father, Son, and Spirit, gives to and receives from the others, in a community of exchange we call love. What is true of God may then be seen to be true of the community of life which God has loved into being and sustains through love. While each creature has its dignity, in life and in death, in struggle and in beauty, all creatures in their diversity, including human beings, are held in community with one another.

There is no doubt that human beings have changed the earth's cycles, surface, and creatures by our activities. We have managed and bred for our use and enjoyment some plants and animals, and destroyed the habitats of others. We have extracted minerals, fossil fuels, and soils; and have been careless with our use of extracted water. We have preserved some biomes for their scenic beauty, but ignored the ecological services provided by others. We have trawled the bottom of the seas and used them as a trash repository. A growing and increasingly urban population's hunger for food, clothing, shelter, and fuel is taking its toll, despite ongoing efforts to slow the loss of traditional rural wisdom about conservation and creation care. Human migration has fostered the spread of invasive species that displace native species, just as human migrants have often displaced indigenous peoples.

Scientists and activists—We may disagree about what is the greatest threat to human survival on the planet. Should the scarcity of water for drinking and sanitation be our biggest concern, or the challenge to feed a hungry world in an ecologically sustainable way? And which of our excesses put the whole planet in the greatest peril? Is it climate change or the loss of biodiversity that poses the greatest threat to the resilience of life on earth?

Ecologists understand that while entry points for concern and action vary, All these issues are interrelated. In agriculture, to take an example from our managed environment, resilience in the face of climate change will depend on better stewardship of water and increased preservation of the diversity of seed stock available for developing improved crops, while those engaged in agriculture continue to assess their contribution to greenhouse gases, polluted waste water, and soil erosion, and how all these negative impacts on the environment can be decreased.

There have been and will continue to be unintended consequences for our environment due to our choices and behaviors, but study and prayer can help us to become more conscious of the human impact on our planet. As we consider the risen and ascended Christ drawing all things to their perfection in himself, indeed drawing the cosmos into the heart of God in that process the Eastern Church calls "deification," we find reason for hope and an impetus for the renewing and reconciling of our relationships within the creation of which we are a part.

Supplemental Materials, p. 251:

The Rogation Days are traditionally observed on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. They may, however, be observed on other days, depending on local conditions and the convenience of the congregation. In ancient times, In the late medieval church, the observance consisted of an outdoor procession that culminated in a special celebration of the Eucharist. Prayers might be offered

for the city and the neighborhood, for all who labor, for the fruitfulness of the land and waters; and for deliverance in time of war, disaster, or epidemic disease. The Church of England and the colonial Anglican Church in North America retained the idea of rogation processions, but it was not until the 1928 Book of Common Prayer that American prayer books contained lessons and collects for these days. Church Attorney shall mean one or more attorneys selected pursuant to Diocesan Canons to represent the Church in proceedings as provided in this Title. The Diocesan Canons may provide a process for the removal of a Church Attorney for cause. A Church Attorney shall perform all functions on behalf of the Church necessary to advance proceedings under this Title and shall have the following powers, in addition to the powers and duties otherwise provided in this Title: (a) to receive and review the Intake Officer's report; (b) to conduct investigations and oversee the Investigator and, in connection with such investigations; to have access to the personnel, books and records of the Diocese and its constituent parts; and to receive and review the reports of the Investigator; (c) to determine, in the exercise of the Church Attorney's discretion, whether the reported information, if true, would be grounds for discipline; and (d) to exercise discretion

Community shall mean that part of the Church in which a Member of the Clergy performs his or her ministry, such as a Diocese, Parish, Mission, school, seminary, hospital, damp or any similar institution.

Complainant shall mean (a) any person or persons from whom the Intake Officer receives information concerning an alleged Offense and who, upon consent of that person(s), is designated a Complainant by the Intake Officer or (b) any Injured Person designated by the Bishop who, in the Bishop Diocesan's discretion, should be afforded the status of a Complainant, provided, however, that any Injured Person so designated may decline such designation.

Conciliator shall mean a person appointed to seek the resolution of a matter under Canon IV.10

Conduct Unbecoming a Member of the Clergy shall mean any disorder or neglect that prejudices the reputation, good order and discipline of the Church, or any conduct of a nature to bring material discredit upon the Church or the Holy Orders conferred by the Church.

Conference Panel shall mean a panel of one or more members of the Disciplinary Board selected by the president of the board, unless some other manner of selection is provided by Diocesan Canon, to serve as the body before which an informal conference is held as provided in Canon IV.12, provided, however that no such member of the Conference Panel may serve as a member of the Hearing Panel in the same case. The president of the Disciplinary Board shall be ineligible to serve on the Conference Panel. If the Conference Panel consists of more than one member, it shall include both clergy and lay members.

The Investigator acts under the direction of the Reference Panel until a referral is

made pursuant to Canon IV.11.3; after such referral, the Investigator shall be overseen by and report to the Church Attorney.

Member of the Clergy shall mean Bishops, Priests and Deacons of the Church.

Offense shall mean any act or omission for which a Member of the Clergy may be held accountable under Canons IV.3 or IV.4.

Order shall mean a written decision of a Conference Panel or a Hearing panel which is issued with or without the Respondent's consent. All orders shall meet the requirements of Canon IV.14.

Pastoral Direction shall mean a written direction given by a Bishop to a Member of the Clergy which meets the requirements of Canon IV.7.

Pastoral Relationship shall mean any relationship between a Member of the Clergy and any person to whom the Member of the Clergy provides or has provided counseling, pastoral care, spiritual direction or spiritual guidance, or from whom such Member of the Clergy has received information within the Rite of Reconciliation of a Penitent.

Privileged Communication shall mean any communication or disclosure made in confidence and with an expectation of privacy (a) within the Rite of Reconciliation of a Penitent; (b) between a client and the client's attorney; (c) between a Respondent and an Advisor or a Complainant and an Advisor; (d) between persons in a relationship in which communications are protected by secular law or Diocesan Canons; or (e) between and among a Conciliator and participants in a conciliation under Canon IV.10. Such programs, support, and all other provisions of this plan shall be available upon the request of the clergy person or lay employee affected for the purposes of temporary disability for any such causes as defined and allowed by the Church Pension Fund. The implementation of temporary disability shall be for not less than six (6) months nor more than eighteen (18) months. Participation in the temporary disability plan as defined by the Church Pension Fund shall be mandatory for any and all canonical constituents of The Episcopal Church/Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (e.g., Church Center, Dioceses, parishes and missions), and all institutions, agencies, organizations, or affiliates of The Episcopal Church/Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society that participate in the Church Pension Fund on behalf of all employees and clergy. The Church Pension Fund shall have the authority to amend, modify, or change the program and provisions for temporary disability as needed or appropriate.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, The General Convention instructs the Church Pension Fund to study the feasibility of a mandatory, short-term disability plan for all lay employees of The Episcopal Church.

Resolved, the General Convention instructs the Church Pension Fund to report its findings and recommendations in this matter to the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church no later than the final regularly scheduled meeting of the Executive Council in 2016.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 78th General Convention of the Episcopal Church call upon the Executive Council to create a task force to begin to create resources for parish and diocesan use that will equip faithful Christians to respond pastorally and materially in their local context.

The Task Force is asked to report back to the 79th General Convention on its progress and to share what is already happening at the local and diocesan levels in The Episcopal Church.

Each RCG shall be comprised of no fewer than five experts in areas of environmental sustainability appropriate to the demographic, ecological, cultural and geographic specifics of each region. These should include, but not be limited to, consultants in food and water security, property development, alternative energy, and engineering. Each RCG will also include theologians, educators and liturgists to provide resources in education and formation. These RCGs shall:

- 1. Compile and develop theological and formational material for teaching the theology of stewardship of creation;
- 2. Create networks designed to share ideas and information for practical application among the regions, such as sustainable development and green conversions of church- related properties, including without limitation, energy audits, solar conversions and other alternative energy, community gardens, and development of fallow property;
- 3. Be available for consultation to the Dioceses and Parishes.

The Task Force on the Stewardship of Creation shall create a structure for allocation of money to fund RCG initiatives at Parish and Diocesan levels within a year of the 78th General Convention, and serve as the granting body; and be it further

Resolved, that \$700,000 be allocated for this purpose, which includes the \$500,000 already allocated to the Fifth Mark of Mission, so that \$100,000 will be available for the support of the RCGs themselves, and \$600,000 be available to provide direct grants to Dioceses and Parishes in the implementation of these programs and support of measurable pilot projects. Of the \$100,000 funding the RCGs, \$40,500 is to be allocated for the Task Force meetings. Recognizing that this is new work, and a newly formed taskforce, they shall convene in person for their initial meeting, and thereafter determine their needs for future meetings, with funding available for them to meet once yearly. The remaining \$59,500 is to be used for regional meetings of the RCGs according to regional needs. The 78th General Convention requests the Presiding Bishop appoint a staff person from DFMS to support the Task Force, and the RCGs as necessary; and be it further

Resolved, that the Task Force shall report back to the 79th General Convention on the progress and ongoing results at the local and provincial levels.

Create networks designed to share ideas and information for practical application among the regions, such as sustainable development and green conversions of church- related properties, including without limitation, energy audits, solar conversions and other alternative energy, community gardens, and development of fallow property;
- 3. Be available for consultation to the Dioceses and Parishes.

The couple shall notify the Member of the Clergy of their intent to marry no less than thirty days prior to the solemnization; Provided, that if one of the parties is a member of the Congregation of the Member of the Clergy, or both parties can furnish satisfactory evidence of the need for shortening the time, this requirement can be waived for weighty cause; in which case the Member of the Clergy shall immediately report this action in writing to the Bishop.

 - (e) "We, A.B. and C.D., desiring to receive the blessing of Holy Matrimony in the Church, do solemnly declare that we hold marriage to be a lifelong union of husband and wife as it is set forth in the Book of Common Prayer.

- (vi) Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of The Hymnal 1982 and other musical publications regularly in use in this Church and encourage the composition of new musical materials.
- (vii) Cause to be prepared and present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the musical settings of liturgical texts and rubrics, and norms as to liturgical music and the manner of its rendition.
- (viii) At the direction of the General Convention, to serve the Church in matters pertaining to policies and strategies concerning Church music.
- (ix) Collaborate with the Secretary of General Convention to make final edits to the text of resolutions adopted by General Convention and that establish new or revised liturgical materials, and to arrange for their publication. For the sole purpose of this collaboration, members of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music are exempt from the terms of office set forth in I.1.2(b) and shall remain in office until their successors are appointed and take office.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Canon I.1.2(n)(6) is hereby amended to read as follows:

- (6) A Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music. The Custodian of the Book of Common Prayer shall be a member *ex officio* with voice, but without vote. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:

The Rt. Rev. Marc Andrus, Bishop of California, moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, that the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, shall appoint a Taskforce on the Stewardship of Creation composed of one person from each Province by April 1, 2016. Each Provincial member of the taskforce shall convene, in their respective Province Regional Consultative Groups (hereinafter, "RCGs") on the Stewardship of Creation. The RCGs shall the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society is directed to implement a program to develop parish and diocesan resources designed to support local ecologically responsible stewardship of church-related properties and buildings. The program shall be implemented in cooperation with an Advisory Council on the Stewardship of Creation composed of one person from each province by April 1, 2016. Each province member of the Advisory Council shall convene, in their respective provinces, Regional Consultive Groups ("RCG's") on the Stewardship of Creation. Each RCG shall be comprised of no fewer than five experts in areas of environmental sustainability appropriate to the demographic, ecological, cultural and geographic specifics of each region. These should include, but not be limited to, consultants in food and water security, property development, alternative energy, and engineering. Each RCG will also include theologians, educators and liturgists to provide resources in education and formation. These RCGs shall:

- 1. Compile and develop theological and formational material for teaching the theology of stewardship of creation;
- 2. Create networks designed to share ideas and information for practical application among the regions, such as sustainable development and green conversions of church-related properties,

including without limitation, energy audits, solar conversions and other alternative energy, community gardens, and development of fallow property;

3. Be available for consultation to the Dioceses and Parishes.

The Task Force Advisory Council on the Stewardship of Creation shall create a structure for allocation of money to fund RCG initiatives at Parish and Diocesan levels within a year of the 78th General Convention, and serve as the granting body; and be it further

Resolved, that \$700,000 be allocated for this purpose, which includes the \$500,000 already allocated to the Fifth Mark of Mission, so that \$100,000 will be available for the support of the RCGs themselves, and \$600,000 be available to provide direct grants to Dioceses and Parishes in the implementation of these programs and support of measurable pilot projects. Of the \$100,000 funding the RCGs, \$40,500 is to be allocated for the Task Force meetings. Recognizing that this is new work, and a newly formed taskforce, they shall convene in person for their initial meeting, and thereafter determine their needs for future meetings, with funding available for them to meet once yearly. The remaining \$59,500 is to be used for regional meetings of the RCGs according to regional needs. The 78th General Convention requests the Presiding Bishop appoint a staff person from DFMS to support the Task Force, and the RCGs as necessary; and be it further Resolved, that the <u>Task Force Advisory Council</u> shall report back to the 79th General Convention on

the progress and ongoing results at the local and provincial levels.

Constitution and Canons

The House of Bishops Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #6 on Resolution A129 (Amend Canons IV.6.5, IV.6.6 and IV.19.10(b) Notice of Dismissal and Appeal Matters) and moved adoption with amendment.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A129)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Canons IV.6.5 and IV.6.6 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 5. If the Intake Officer determines that the information, if true, would not constitute an Offense, the Intake Officer shall inform the Bishop Diocesan of an intention to dismiss the matter. If the Bishop Diocesan does not object, the Intake Officer shall dismiss the matter. The Intake Officer shall provide written notice to the Complainant, the subject Member of the Clergy, and the Bishop Diocesan of the decision of dismissal, the reasons therefor, and the Complainant's right to appeal the decision within thirty days of the date of the notice and shall send a copy of that notice and the written intake report to the president of the Disciplinary Board. If the Complainant wishes to appeal the dismissal, the intake Officer shall assist the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the acts complained of, which statement shall be sent by the Intake Officer to the president of the Disciplinary Board, along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the dismissal. the Bishop shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant within 15 days of the date of the notice of dismissal. The Advisor shall assist the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the acts complained of, which statement shall be sent by the Advisor to the president of the Disciplinary Board, along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the dismissal. The intake report and any related information, in the case of a dismissal, shall be retained by the Intake Officer and may be considered in connection with any additional information that may come to the Intake Officer thereafter concerning the subject Member of the Clergy.

Sec. 6. In the event of an appeal of a dismissal, the president of the Disciplinary Board shall, within thirty days of the receipt of the appeal, review the intake report and either affirm or overrule the dismissal. The president shall promptly notify the Complainant, the subject Member of the Clergy, the Intake Officer, and the Bishop Diocesan of the decision. If the decision is to overrule the dismissal, the president shall refer the intake report to the Reference Panel within 15 days.; and be it further Resolved, That Canon IV.19.10(b) be amended to read as follows:

(b) The Bishop Diocesan shall make an Advisor available to the Complainant not later than the earliest of (1) the forwarding of the intake report to the Reference Panel, (2) the Complainant's appeal of 15 days after the Complainant receiving word of a dismissal under Canon IV.6.5, (3) the Respondent or Bishop Diocesan proposing terms of discipline to the other under Canon IV.9, or (4) the Bishop's designation of an Injured Person as a Complainant.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Canons IV.6.5 and IV.6.6 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 5. If the Intake Officer determines that the information, if true, would not constitute an Offense, the Intake Officer shall inform the Bishop Diocesan of an intention to dismiss the matter. If the Bishop Diocesan does not object, the Intake Officer shall dismiss the matter. The Intake Officer shall provide written notice to the Complainant, the subject Member of the Clergy, and the Bishop Diocesan of the decision of dismissal, the reasons therefor, and the Complainant's right to appeal the decision within thirty days of the date of the notice and shall send a copy of that notice and the written intake report to the president of the Disciplinary Board. If the Complainant wishes to appeal the dismissal, the intake Officer shall assist the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the acts complained of, which statement shall be sent by the Intake Officer to the president of the Disciplinary Board, along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the dismissal, the Bishop shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant within 15 days of the date of the notice of dismissal. The Advisor shall assist the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the acts complained of, which statement shall be sent by the Advisor to the president of the Disciplinary Board, along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the dismissal. The intake report and any related information, in the case of a dismissal, shall be retained by the Intake Officer and may be considered in connection with any additional information that may come to the Intake Officer thereafter concerning the subject Member of the Clergy.

Sec. 6. In the event of an appeal of a dismissal, the president of the Disciplinary Board shall, within thirty days of the receipt of the appeal, review the intake report and either affirm or overrule the dismissal. Upon receipt of such notification, the Presiding Bishop may, with the advice and consent of the Advisory Council to the Presiding Bishop, place restrictions on the ministry of the Bishop in question for the period while the matter is under consideration by the Board. If, after consideration of the matter, the Board concludes, by a majority vote of all of its members, that the Bishop in question has abandoned The Episcopal Church, the Board it shall be the duty of the Disciplinary Board for Bishops, by a majority vote of all of its members, to certify the fact to the Presiding Bishop and with the certificate to send a statement of the acts or declarations which show such abandonment, which certificate and statement shall be recorded by the Presiding Bishop. The Presiding Bishop shall then place a restriction on the exercise of ministry of said Bishop until such time as the House of Bishops shall investigate the matter and act thereon. During the period of such restriction, the Bishop shall not perform any Episcopal, ministerial or canonical acts.

Sec. 2. The Presiding Bishop, or the presiding officer, shall forthwith give notice to the Bishop of the certification and restriction on ministry. Unless the restricted Bishop, within sixty days, makes declaration by a verified written statement to the Presiding Bishop, that the facts alleged in the certificate are false or utilizes the provisions of Canon III.12.7, the Bishops will be liable to Deposition or Release and Removal. If the Presiding Bishop is reasonably satisfied that the statement constitutes (i) a good faith retraction of the declarations or acts relied upon in the certification to the Presiding Bishop of (ii) a good faith denial that the Bishop made the declarations or committed the acts relied upon in the certificate, the Presiding Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Disciplinary Board for Bishops, shall terminate the restriction. Otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Presiding Bishop to present the matter to the House of Bishops at the next regular or special meeting of the House. - 6. Establishing mentoring and accompaniment programs for those leaving prison;
- 7. Advocating for the repeal of mandatory-minimum sentences for nonviolent offenses;
- 8. Calling for the abolition of the sentencing disparity between crack-cocaine and powder-cocaine offenses and, as an intermediate step, urging the U.S. Congress, in accordance with the recommendation of the U.S. Sentencing Commission, to make retroactive the 2010 Fair Sentencing Act, which reduces the disparity in sentencing from previous levels;
- 9. Advocating to eliminate "three strikes" sentencing protocols;
- 10. Joining local "Ban the Box" campaigns to remove questions about arrest records in on-line and written job application forms;
- 11. Opposing the creation of "for profit" prisons and immigration detention centers, and, where they exist, organizing against guaranteed nightly numbers of prisoners and detainees, and advocate for access to education and rehabilitation programs for those being incarcerated or detained;

of a vacancy the charge thereof shall devolve upon the Presiding Bishop, with the power of appointing some other Bishop as the substitute in charge until the vacancy is filled by the House of Bishops.

(3) Any Priest serving as a Chaplain on a military installation, or at a Veterans' Administration facility or Federal Correctional Institution Department of Veterans' Affairs Medical Center, or Federal Bureaus of Prisons Correctional Institution shall not be subject to Canons III.9.3.(e)(1) or III.9.4.(a). government – in coordination with global partners, including the Quartet for Middle East Peace – to offer a new, comprehensive, and time-bound framework to the Government of Israel and the Palestinian Authority, (based on dialogue and partnership with both parties), for the conclusive negotiation of a two-state peace agreement and the resolution of all final-status issues; and be it further

Resolved, That the comprehensive framework, should (1) recognize a sovereign and viable Palestinian State living alongside a secure and universally recognized State of Israel; (2) define borders; and (3) and resolve all cores issues such as status of Jerusalem, refugees, settlements, and security arrangements; and be it further

Resolved, That Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society: (1) convene a collaborative group of experts and interfaith partners to collect a wide range of resources designed to inform and enliven a conversation among those holding differing convictions; (2) encourage early travel of the 27th Presiding Bishop to the Holy Land, in the spirit of interfaith fellowship, to establish and build relationships with leaders of the communities of the Children of Abraham working for peace, justice, and reconciliation; and (3) continue its commendable efforts to assist Episcopalians to learn about and understand the traumas, hurt, suffering, fears, pain, aspirations, and hopes that shape the daily lives of all living in Israel and the Palestinian Territories; and be it further

Final Text of Resolution:

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention make available for publication and distribution by individuals and in congregations and other church groups for devotional or catechetical use, or use in public worship subject to the provision for optional commemorations on page 18 of the Book of Common Prayer, the liturgical resource entitled, "A Great Cloud of Witnesses: A Calendar of Commemorations" (GCW) as outlined in the Supplemental Materials: Appendices of the Report of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, pp. 174-219 revising and renaming Holy Women, Holy Men; and be it further

Resolved, That A Great Cloud of Witnesses be revised to conform to the commemorations in Holy Women, Holy Men and any changes to liturgical commemorations made at this Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention affirm the following criteria for further additions to this resource:

Criterion 1

Historicity: Christianity is a radically historical religion, so in almost every instance it is not theological realities or spiritual movements, but exemplary witness to the Gospel of Christ in lives actually lived that is remembered in our family story. Like all families, however, our family includes important matriarchs and patriarchs about whom little verifiable information is known, yet whose names and influence still exert influence on how we understand ourselves in relation to them.

Criterion 2

Christian Discipleship: The family story captured here is uniquely and identifiably a Christian story. This set of stories commemorates the ways particular Christians live out the promises of baptism. A worthy summary of these promises is captured in our Baptismal Covenant, including a commitment to the Triune God as captured in the Apostles' Creed; continuing in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers; resisting evil and repenting when necessary; proclaiming by word and example the Good News of God in Christ; seeking and serving Christ in all persons; and striving for justice and peace among all people. Rather than being an anachronistic checklist, these should be considered general guidelines for considering holistic Christian life and practice. There may be occasional exceptions where not all of these promises are successfully kept, or when the person in question is not a Christian, yet the person's life and work exemplify Christ, significantly impacting the ongoing life of the Church and contributing to our fuller understanding of the Gospel.

Criterion 3

Significance: Those remembered should have been in their lifetime extraordinary, even heroic servants of God and God's people for the sake, and after the example, of Jesus Christ. They may also be people whose creative work or whose manner of life has glorified God, enriched the life of the Church, or led others to a deeper understanding of God. In their varied ways, those remembered have revealed Christ's presence in, and Lordship over, all of history; and continue to inspire us as we carry forward God's mission in the world.

Criterion 4

Range of Inclusion: Particular attention should be paid to Episcopalians and other members of the Anglican Communion. Attention should also be paid to the inclusion of people of different genders and races, of lay people (witnessing in this way to our baptismal understanding of the Church), and of ecumenical partners and people who have had their own distinctive influence upon us. In addition to the better-known, it is important also to include those "whose memory may have faded in the shifting fashions of public concern, but whose witness is deemed important to the life and mission of the Church" (Thomas Talley).

Criterion 5

Local Observance: Normally, significant remembrance of a particular person already exists within the Church at the local and regional levels before that person is included in the Church's larger story.

Criterion 6

Perspective: The introduction of new names should be done with a certain economy lest the balance of the whole be overwhelmed. In the cases of those departed less than forty years ago — particularly in the case of controversial names — care should be given to seeing them from the perspective of history. Names added should show a broad influence upon the Church and should result from a widespread desire expressed across the Church over a reasonable period of time.

Criterion 7

Combined Remembrances: Not all those included need to be remembered "in isolation." Where there are close and natural links between persons to be remembered, a joint commemoration would make excellent sense (e.g., the Reformation martyrs, Latimer and Ridley; and two bishops of Lincoln, Robert Grosseteste and Hugh); and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention authorize for trial use the liturgical resource entitled, "Weekday Eucharistic Propers 2015," as outlined in the Blue Book, replacing Holy Women, Holy Men; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention direct the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music to review the list of names in "A Great Cloud of Witnesses" in light of these criteria and recommend revisions to the 79th General Convention, with a full explanation for any revisions; and be it further Resolved, That the General Convention direct the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music to gather feedback from congregations, seminaries, religious orders, and other eucharistic communities on "A Great Cloud of Witnesses" and "Weekday Eucharistic Propers 2015" and to report to the next General Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention direct the Secretary of General Convention, in consultation with the outgoing Chair of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music and the Chairs of the Legislative Committees to whom this legislation is referred, to finalize and arrange for the publication of the material contained in "A Great Cloud of Witnesses" and in "Weekday Eucharistic Propers 2015" as approved by the 78th General Convention.

(Ao66)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Article X of the Constitution is hereby amended to read as follows:

The Book of Common Prayer, as now established or hereafter amended by the authority of this Church, shall be in use in all the Dioceses of this Church. No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed in one regular meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent within six months to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Article I, Sec. 5, except that concurrence by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies.

But notwithstanding anything herein above contained, the General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders as previously set forth in this Article:

- (a) Amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms.
- (b) Authorize for trial use throughout this Church, as an alternative at any time or times to the established Book of Common Prayer or to any section or Office thereof, a proposed revision of the whole Book or of any portion thereof, duly undertaken by the General Convention.
- (c) Provide for use of other forms for the renewal and enrichment of the common worship of this Church for such periods of time and upon such terms and conditions as the General Convention may provide.

And Provided, that nothing in this Article shall be construed as restricting the authority of the Bishops of this Church to take such order as may be permitted by the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer or by the Canons of the General Convention for the use of special forms of worship.

Final Text of Resolution:

(Aoo6)

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 1, Section 2 be stricken in its entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 2 (a) The General Convention by Canon may establish Standing Commissions to study and draft policy proposals on major subjects considered to be of continuing concern to the mission of the Church. The Canon shall specify the duties of each Standing Commission. Standing Commissions shall be composed of five Bishops, five Priests and/or Deacons of this Church and ten Lay Persons, who shall be confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing. The Priests, Deacons, and Lay Persons are not required to be Deputies to General Convention.
- (b) The terms of all members of Standing Commissions shall be equal to the interval between the regular meeting of the General Convention preceding their appointment and the adjournment of the second succeeding regular meeting of the General Convention, and such terms shall be rotated so that, as near as may be, the term of one-half of the members shall expire at the conclusion of each regular meeting of the General Convention. The term of a member shall become vacant in the event of two absences from meetings of the Commission occurring in the interval between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the Commission for good cause.
- (c) The Presiding Bishop shall appoint the Episcopal members and the President of the House of Deputies shall appoint the Lay and other Clerical members of each Commission as soon as practicable after the adjournment of the General Convention, but not later than 90 days after adjournment. Episcopal members appointed after the adjournment of any General Convention at which a Presiding Bishop is elected shall be appointed by the Presiding Bishop-elect. Vacancies shall be filled in similar manner; provided, however, that vacancies occurring within one year after the next regular General Convention shall not be filled unless requested by the Commission.
- (d) The Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies shall jointly appoint members of the Executive Council as liaisons to facilitate communication between the Executive Council and each Standing Commission and the coordination of the work of each Standing Commission and the committees of Executive Council. Notice of such appointments shall be given to the Secretary of General Convention. These liaisons shall not be members of the Commission but shall have seat and voice. The reasonable expenses of these liaisons shall be provided for by the Executive Council. Each Commission shall have staff support from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society designated by the Presiding Bishop. Each Commission may constitute committees from among members or non-members of the Commission, and, subject to the Commission's budget, engage the services of consultants and coordinators necessary to complete its work.
- (e) The Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies shall be members ex officiis of every Commission, or may appoint personal representatives to attend any meeting in their stead, but without vote.
- (f) The Executive Officer of the General Convention shall, not later than 120 days following the meeting of the General Convention, notify the members of the General Convention of the Commission appointments and their duty to present reports to the next Convention and shall schedule an organizational meeting for each Commission. One year prior to the opening day of the Convention, the Executive Officer of the General Convention shall remind the Chairs and Secretaries of all Commissions of this duty.

- (g) Every Commission shall elect a chair, vice chair, and secretary.
- (h) The General Convention may refer a relevant matter to a Commission for its consideration; but may not direct the Commission to reach any particular conclusion.
- (i) A Commission shall give timely and appropriate notice to the Church of the time, place, and agendas of meetings; and instructions on how members of the Church may address their views to the Commission.
- (j) Every Commission shall prepare a report, which, together with any minority report, shall be sent, not later than 150 days prior to the opening day of each Convention, to the Executive Officer of the General Convention, who shall distribute the same to all members of the Convention.
- (k) The Report of every Commission presented at the General Convention shall:
 - Set forth the names of its original members, any changes in membership, the names of all those who concur in, and all those who dissent from, its recommendations.
 - Summarize the work of the Commission, including the various matters studied, the recommendations for action by the General Convention, and drafts of Resolutions proposed for adoption to implement the recommendations of the Commission.
 - Include a detailed report of all receipts and expenditures, including moneys received from any source whatsoever, and if it recommends that it be continued, the estimated requirements for the ensuing interval until the next regular meeting of the General Convention.
- (I) Every Commission, as a condition precedent to the presentation and reception of any report to General Convention in which such Commission proposes the adoption of any Resolution, shall, by vote, authorize a member or members of General Convention, who, if possible, shall be a member of the Commission, with such limitations as the Commission may impose, to accept or reject, on behalf of the Commission, any amendments proposed by General Convention to any such Resolution; provided, however, that no such amendment may change the substance of the proposal, but shall be primarily for the purpose of correcting errors. The name of the member or members of General Convention upon whom such authority has been conferred, and the limitations of authority, shall be communicated in writing to the Presiding Officers of General Convention not later than the presentation of such report to the General Convention.
- (m) Every Commission whose Report requests expenditure out of the funds of the General Convention (except for the printing of the Report) shall present to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance its written request, on or before the first business day of the session. Resolutions requiring additional expenditures shall be immediately referred to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance. No resolution involving such expenditures shall be considered unless so presented and until after report of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance.
- (n) There shall be the following Standing Commissions:
 - (1) A Standing Commission on Structure, Governance, Constitution and Canons. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:

Review such proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons as may be submitted to the Commission, placing each such proposed amendment in proper Constitutional or Canonical form, including all amendments necessary to effect the proposed change. The Commission shall express its views with respect to the substance of any such proposal only to the proponent thereof; provided, however, that no member of the Commission shall, by reason of membership, be deemed to be disabled from expressing, before a Legislative Committee or on the floor of the General Convention, personal views with respect to the substance of any such proposed amendment.

Conduct a continuing comprehensive review of the Constitution and Canons with respect to their internal consistency and clarity, and on the basis of such a review, propose to the General Convention such technical amendments to the Constitution and Canons as in the opinion of the

Commission are necessary or desirable in order to achieve such consistency and clarity without altering the substance of any Constitutional and Canonical provisions; provided, however, that the Commission shall propose, for the consideration of the appropriate Legislative Committees of the General Convention, such amendments to the Constitution and Canons as in the opinion of the Commission are technically desirable but involve a substantive alteration of a Constitutional or Canonical provision.

On the basis of such review, suggest to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society such amendments to its By-laws as in the opinion of the Commission are necessary or desirable in order to conform the same to the Constitution and Canons.

Conduct a continuing and comprehensive review and update of the authorized "Annotated Constitution and Canons for the Government of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America otherwise known as The Episcopal Church" to reflect actions of General Convention which amend the Constitution and Canons and, in the discretion of the Commission, develop other materials which are appropriate to the purpose of the "Annotated Constitution and Canons," and facilitate the publication of this document and related materials. The Commission may provide or support forums to promote commentary, discussion, and understanding of the Constitution and Canons.

Discharge such other duties as shall from time to time be assigned by the General Convention.

Study and make recommendations concerning the structure of the General Convention and of The Episcopal Church. It shall, from time to time, review the operation of the several Committees, Commissions, and Boards to determine the necessity for their continuance and the effectiveness of their functions and to bring about a coordination of their efforts. Whenever a proposal is made for the creation of a new Committee, Commission, Board or Agency, it shall, wherever feasible, be referred to this Standing Commission for its consideration and advice.

(2) A Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music. The Custodian of the Book of Common Prayer shall be a member ex officio with voice, but without vote. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:

Discharge such duties as shall be assigned to it by the General Convention as to policies and strategies concerning the common worship of this Church.

Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of the Book of Common Prayer.

Cause to be prepared and to present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the Lectionary, Psalter, and offices for special occasions as authorized or directed by the General Convention or Convocation of Bishops.

Recommend to the General Convention authorized translations of the Holy Scripture from which the Lessons prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer are to be read.

Receive and evaluate requests for consideration of individuals or groups to be included in the Calendar of the Church year and make recommendations thereon to the General Convention for acceptance or rejection.

Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of The Hymnal 1982 and other musical publications regularly in use in this Church, and encourage the composition of new musical materials.

Cause to be prepared and present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the musical settings of liturgical texts and rubrics, and norms as to liturgical music and the manner of its rendition.

At the direction of the General Convention, to serve the Church in matters pertaining to policies and strategies concerning Church music.

(o) At the first meeting of the Executive Council following the adjournment of a General Convention, and subject to budgeted funds available for the purpose, the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, having reviewed the resolutions adopted by the General Convention that provide

for any study or further action, shall thereupon recommend to Executive Council, the creation of such study committees and task forces as may be necessary to complete that work. Any Executive Council resolution creating a task force or study committee shall specify the size and composition, the clear and express duties assigned, the time for completion of the work assigned, to whom the body's report is to be made, and the amount and source of the funding for the body. The members of each such body shall be jointly appointed by the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, and the composition of such committees and task forces shall reflect the diverse voices of the Church and a balance of the Church's orders consistent with the historic polity of the Church. Those committees and task forces so appointed shall expire at the beginning of the next General Convention following, unless reappointed by the Presiding Bishop and President of the House of Deputies and reauthorized by the Executive Council.

The Presiding Bishop announced a recess for 15 minutes.

Governance and Structure

The House of Bishops Committee on Governance and Structure continued its Report #2 on HD Message #182 on Resolution A004 (Amend I.4.1-8 -- Restructure Executive Council) and moved adoption with amendment.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon 4, Sections 1-5, be stricken in their entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 1 (a) There shall be an Executive Council of the General Convention (which Council shall generally be called simply the Executive Council, or the Council) whose duty it shall be to oversee the execution of the program and policies adopted by the General Convention. The Executive Council shall have oversight of the work done by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society in its capacity as its Board of Directors. The Council shall have oversight responsibility for the disposition of the funds and other property of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society in accordance with the provisions of this Canon and the resolutions, orders, and budgets adopted or approved by the General Convention. The Executive Council shall also have oversight responsibility for the work of the Office of General Convention and the Executive Officer of General Convention who shall report directly to the Executive Council. It shall also have oversight responsibility for the disposition of the moneys of the Office of General Convention. The Council shall adopt procedures it deems appropriate for approval of expenditures by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Office of General Convention.
- (b) The Executive Council shall be accountable to the General Convention and shall render a full, published report concerning the work of the bodies for which it has oversight responsibility to each meeting of the General Convention. The report shall include information on the implementation of all resolutions adopted in the previous General Convention calling for action by the Executive Council, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the Office of General Convention.
- (c) The Council shall exercise the powers conferred upon it by Canon, and such further powers as may be designated by the General Convention, and between sessions of the General Convention may initiate and develop such new work as it may deem necessary. Subject to the provisions of these Canons, it may enact By-laws for its own government and enact procedures for its own committees.
- (d) The Executive Council shall be composed (a) of 20 members elected by the General Convention, of whom four shall be Bishops, four shall be Presbyters or Deacons, and 12 shall be Lay Persons who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing (two Bishops, two Presbyters or Deacons, and six Lay Persons to be elected by each subsequent regular meeting of the General Convention); (b) of 18 members elected by the Provincial Synods; (c) of the following ex officiis members: the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies; and (d) the Chief Operating Officer, the Secretary, the Treasurer of the General Convention, the Chief Financial Officer of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the Chief Legal Officer of the Executive Council, all of whom shall have seat and voice but no vote. Each Province shall be entitled to be represented by one Bishop or Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province and one Lay Person who is a confirmed adult communicant in good standing of a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province, and the terms of the representatives of each Province shall be so rotated that two persons shall not be simultaneously elected for equal terms.
- (e) The Executive Council shall appoint a committee from among its members to assist the Council to (i) advise the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations and the Provincial Councils on what skills, gifts and experience are needed on the Executive Council to enable it to function with maximum effectiveness, and whether those skills are at that time represented on the Executive Council, and (ii) create a description of the skills, gifts and experience requisite for service on the Executive Council, including the value of cultural and geographic diversity on the Council and the value of including historically underrepresented voices in the governance of the Church.
- (f) Of the Executive Council members elected by the General Convention, the Bishops shall be elected by the House of Bishops subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies, and the Presbyters or Deacons and Lay Persons shall be elected by the House of Deputies subject to confirmation by the House of Bishops.

(g) Except in the case of members initially elected for shorter terms in order to achieve rotation of terms, the terms of office of the members of the Council (other than ex officiis members) shall be equal to twice the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The terms of office of all members shall commence immediately upon the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were elected or, in the case of election by a Synod, upon the adjournment of the first regular meeting of General Convention following such election. The term of a member shall become vacant in the event of two absences from meetings of the Council in the interval between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the Chair or Vice Chair for good cause. Members shall remain in office until their successors are elected and qualified. No person who has served at least three consecutive years on the Executive Council shall be eligible for immediate re-election for a term of more than three years. After any person shall have served six consecutive years on the Executive Council, a period of three years shall elapse before such person shall be eligible for re-election to the Council.

- (h) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through death, resignation, disability, or other reason, with respect to a member elected by the General Convention, the Council shall fill such vacancy by the election of a suitable person to serve until a successor is elected by the General Convention.
- (i) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through the failure of any Provincial Synod to elect a member, or through the death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such member, the Provincial Council of the Province shall appoint a suitable person to serve until the Provincial Synod shall by election fill the vacancy.
- Sec. 2. (a) The Presiding Bishop shall, ex officio, be the Chair and chief executive officer of the Executive Council, and as such, shall have ultimate responsibility for the oversight of the work of the Executive Council in the implementation of the ministry and mission of the Church as may be committed to the Executive Council by the General Convention.
- (b) The President of the House of Deputies shall, ex officio, be the Vice- Chair of Executive Council.
- (c) The Secretary of the General Convention shall be ex officio the Secretary of the Executive Council.
- (d) The Treasurer of the General Convention shall be ex officio the Treasurer of the Executive Council.
- (e) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council, shall perform such other duties as are customary for such office, and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and the By-laws of the Council. In the absence of or at the request of the Chair, the Vice- Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and by the By-laws of the Council.
- (f) Upon <u>joint</u>-nomination by the Chair, <u>and in consultation with</u> the Vice-Chair, the Council shall appoint a Chief Operating Officer who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Chair. If a vacancy should occur in the office of the Chief Operating Officer, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (g) Upon joint nomination by the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Council shall appoint a Chief Financial Officer who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Chair. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (h) Upon <u>joint</u>nomination by the Chair, <u>and</u><u>in consultation with</u> the Vice-Chair, the Council shall appoint a Chief Legal Officer who shall function as general counsel and serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Chair. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (i) The Chief Operating Officer, the Chief Financial Officer, and the Chief Legal Officer of the Executive Council shall participate in an annual performance review conducted by the Chair, the results of which will be presented to the Executive Committee of the Executive Council.
- (j) The Executive Council, by a two-thirds vote, may direct the Chair to no longer retain one or more of the Officers reviewed by the Chair in section 2(i).
- (k) The Officers of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Officers of the Executive Council, and a committee of six members of Executive Council who are not officers, shall engage in a mutual

ministry review every eighteen months, facilitated by a consultant selected by the Chair and the Vice-Chair.

(I) The Council shall elect the Church's members of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) and of other Anglican and ecumenical bodies for which no other procedure is provided in the Canons. Members of the ACC representing The Episcopal Church shall report to each General Convention using the schedule and format required for Standing Commissions in these Canons, and shall provide comprehensive written reports to Executive Council at the Council's next meeting following each meeting of the ACC.

- Sec. 3. Upon joint nomination of the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Executive Council shall elect an Audit Committee of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. The Committee shall be composed of six members: one from the Executive Council committee with primary responsibility for financial matters; one from the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance; and the remaining four from members of the Church-at-large having experience in general business and financial practices. The members shall serve for a term of three years beginning on January 1 following a regular meeting of the General Convention or immediately following their appointment, whichever comes later, and continue until a successor is appointed, and may serve two consecutive terms, after which a full triennium must elapse before being eligible for re-election. Annually the Audit Committee shall elect a Chair of the Committee from among its members. The Audit Committee shall regularly review the financial statements relating to all funds under the management or control of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and shall report thereon at least annually to the Council. Upon recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Executive Council shall employ on behalf of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society an independent Certified Public Accountant firm to audit annually all accounts under the management or control of the Council and Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. After receipt of the annual audit, the Audit Committee shall recommend to the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society what action to take as to any matters identified in the annual audit and accompanying management letter. The responsibilities of the Audit Committee shall be set out in an Audit Committee Charter. The Audit Committee shall review, at least annually, the Committee's Charter and recommend any changes to the Executive Council for approval.
- Sec. 4. The Executive Council may establish by its By-laws Committees and ad hoc working groups or task forces, which may include or consist of non-members, to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice-Chair and appointed by the Council, as may be necessary to fulfill its fiduciary responsibility to the Church. All Committees and ad hoc working groups and task forces of Executive Council will cease to exist at the close of the next General Convention following their creation unless extended by Executive Council. Executive Council may revoke, rescind, or modify the mandate or charter of all Executive Council Committees, ad hoc working groups and task forces not otherwise created by Canon.
- Sec. 5. (a) The Council shall meet at such place, and at such stated times, at least three times each year, as it shall appoint and at such other times as it may be convened. The Council shall be convened at the request of the Chair, or on the written request of any five members of Council.
- (b) A majority of the elected members of the Council shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Council. No action shall be taken in the name of the Council except when a quorum, so defined, is present and voting. A member may participate in, and vote at, Council meetings by means of technology where all participants may hear one another simultaneously and according to procedures and guidelines set forth in the Council By-laws.
- (c) Members of Executive Council shall be entitled to reimbursement for their reasonable expenses of attending meetings, in accordance with procedures established and approved by Executive Council. Except as determined by General Convention, the salaries of all officers of the Council and of all agents and employees of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society shall be fixed by the Council.

- (j) The Officers of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Officers of the Executive Council, and a committee of six members of Executive Council who are not officers, shall engage in a mutual ministry review every eighteen months, facilitated by a consultant selected by the Chair and the Vice-Chair.
- (k) The Council shall elect the Church's members of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) and of other Anglican and ecumenical bodies for which no other procedure is provided in the Canons. Members of the ACC representing The Episcopal Church shall report to each General Convention using the schedule and format required for Standing Commissions in these Canons, and shall provide comprehensive written reports to Executive Council at the Council's next meeting following each meeting of the ACC.
- Sec. 3. Upon joint nomination of the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Executive Council shall elect an Audit Committee of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. The Committee shall be composed of six members: one from the Executive Council committee with primary responsibility for financial matters; one from the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance; and the remaining four from members of the Church-at-large having experience in general business and financial practices. The members shall serve for a term of three years beginning on January 1 following a regular meeting of the General Convention or immediately following their appointment, whichever comes later, and continue until a successor is appointed, and may serve two consecutive terms, after which a full triennium must elapse before being eligible for re-election. Annually the Audit Committee shall elect a Chair of the Committee from among its members. The Audit Committee shall regularly review the financial statements relating to all funds under the management or control of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and shall report thereon at least annually to the Council. Upon recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Executive Council shall employ on behalf of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society an independent Certified Public Accountant firm to audit annually all accounts under the management or control of the Council and Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. After receipt of

the annual audit, the Audit Committee shall recommend to the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society what action to take as to any matters identified in the annual audit and accompanying management letter. The responsibilities of the Audit Committee shall be set out in an Audit Committee Charter. The Audit Committee shall review, at least annually, the Committee's Charter and recommend any changes to the Executive Council for approval.

Sec. 4. The Executive Council may establish by its By-laws Committees and ad hoc working groups or task forces, which may include or consist of non-members, to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice-Chair and appointed by the Council, as may be necessary to fulfill its fiduciary responsibility to the Church. All Committees and ad hoc working groups and task forces of Executive Council will cease to exist at the close of the next General Convention following their creation unless extended by Executive Council. Executive Council may revoke, rescind, or modify the mandate or charter of all Executive Council Committees, ad hoc working groups and task forces not otherwise created by Canon.

- Sec. 5. (a) The Council shall meet at such place, and at such stated times, at least three times each year, as it shall appoint and at such other times as it may be convened. The Council shall be convened at the request of the Chair, or on the written request of any five members of Council.
- (b) A majority of the elected members of the Council shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Council. No action shall be taken in the name of the Council except when a quorum, so defined, is present and voting. A member may participate in, and vote at, Council meetings by means of technology where all participants may hear one another simultaneously and according to procedures and guidelines set forth in the Council By-laws.
- (c) Members of Executive Council shall be entitled to reimbursement for their reasonable expenses of attending meetings, in accordance with procedures established and approved by Executive Council. Except as determined by General Convention, the salaries of all officers of the Council and of all agents and employees of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society shall be fixed by the Council.

A new Diocese may be formed, with the consent of the General Convention and under such conditions as the General Convention shall prescribe by General Canon or Canons, (1) by the division of an existing Diocese; (2) by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses; or (3) by the erection into a Diocese of an unorganized area evangelized as provided in Article VI. The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and Laity of the unorganized area called by the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more existing Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses) by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. After consent of the General Convention, when a certified copy of the duly adopted Constitution of the new Diocese, including an unqualified accession to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, shall have been filed with the Secretary of the General Convention and approved by the Executive Council of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be in union with the General Convention.

The House of Bishops Committee on Governance and Structure presented its Report #6 on HD Message #184 on Resolution Do13 (Budget Process for The Episcopal Church) and moved concurrence.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 78th General Convention direct the Executive Council's committee on Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR), consistent with existing policy of corporate engagement adopted in October 2005, to develop a list of U.S. and foreign corporations that provide goods and services that support the infrastructure of Israel's Occupation, and maintain and update such a list annually, and to vigorously conduct an audit of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (DFMS) investment portfolio to determine which of these companies, if any, are in the portfolio, and report its findings to the Winter Meeting of Executive Council, 2016, to be made public through the Episcopal News Service; and be it further

Resolved, That, consistent with existing Episcopal Church policy, CSR communicate by letter, emails, meetings and otherwise with the companies identified in the DFMS investment portfolio as being involved in the maintenance of the Occupation, if any, requesting that said companies withdraw from their business operations in Occupied Palestine until it is ended, and report on such corporate engagement to the June, 2016, meeting of Executive Council to be made public through the Episcopal News service; and be it further

Resolved, That Executive Council, with the aid of its CSR committee, file shareholder resolutions with any companies earlier identified, at its Fall meeting, 2016, asking said companies who have not agreed to terminate their business operations in Occupied Palestine and with whom dialogue has not been fruitful, to begin a process of disinvestment; and be it further

Resolved, That upon receiving the position of said companies to these shareholder resolutions, Executive Council, by its June meeting of 2017, with the aid of the CSR committee, develop a process of divestment from those companies who have refused to disinvest or in which further engagement is deemed futile, and are considered by CSR to be the most egregious supporters of the infrastructure of the Occupation, and to develop a process for placing on its No Buy List those companies earlier identified as supporting the Occupation, whether currently held or not, and for Council to make known its process for divestment and adding to the No Buy List (and the companies involved) through the Episcopal News Service, and that Council provide a report to the 79th General Convention on its implementation of this resolution; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention directs the Executive Council to establish a work group to identify a list of products made or businesses present in West Bank settlements (including East Jerusalem) and publishing them within one year of adjournment of this Convention so that Church entities, including congregations and individual members can seek to boycott those products and/or businesses which are illegal under international law; and be it further

Resolved, That Executive Council identify \$15,000 for the work to be done in 2015, and that the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance provide \$30,000 in 2016 and \$30,000 in 2018 to fund the work of CSR on this and other issues.

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention direct the Executive Council to identify a list of products made and businesses present in illegal settlements for their Spring 2016 meeting to be communicated to the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That The 78th General Convention directs the Executive Council to continue to monitor its investments and apply its CSR policy to any possible future investments in companies identified on the above requested lists.

The failure of a Respondent to appear, or to fail to file a written response, as described in this Section shall not, in itself, provide the basis for a finding that any Offense has been committed, other than any Offense specifically arising from such failure to appear, or failure to file.

(A146)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Canon IV.19.14(b) and (c) be amended as follows: (b) The Church Attorney, Procedural Officer or A any member of any Panel provided for in this Title shall disqualify himself or herself in any proceeding in which the member's such person's impartiality may reasonably be questioned. The member person shall also disqualify himself or herself when the member person, the member's person's spouse, any person within the third degree of relationship to either of them, or the spouse of such person, (1) is the Respondent, Complainant or an Injured Person, (2) is likely to be a witness in the proceeding, (3) has a personal bias or prejudice concerning the Respondent, Complainant or any Injured Person, (4) has personal knowledge of disputed evidentiary facts concerning the proceeding, (5) has a personal financial interest in the outcome of the proceeding or in the Respondent, Complainant, any Injured Person or any other interest that could be substantially affected by the outcome or (6) is a member of the same congregation or otherwise has a close personal or professional relationship with the Respondent, the Complainant, any Injured Person or any witness in the matter.

(c) The Church Attorney, Procedural Officer or A any member of any Panel provided for in this Title who has not disqualified himself or herself as provided in this section may be subject to challenge by the Church Attorney or the Respondent on grounds described in this section. The Complainant or the Complainant's Advisor may inform the Church Attorney of any such grounds. The challenge shall be investigated by the remaining members of the Panel who shall determine whether the challenged member of the Panel person should be disqualified and replaced according to the procedures of this Title for filling vacancies.

The Complainant or the Complainant's Advisor may inform the Church Attorney of any such grounds. The challenge shall be investigated by the remaining members of the Panel who shall determine whether the challenged member of the Panel person should be disqualified and replaced according to the procedures of this Title for filling vacancies.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Do55)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That Canons V.1, V.2, V.3 and V.4 be amended to read as follows:

CANON 1: Of Enactment, Amendment, and Repeal

Sec. 1. No new Canon shall be enacted, or existing Canon be amended or repealed, except by concurrent Resolution of the two Houses of the General Convention. Such Resolution may be introduced first in either House, and shall be referred in each House to the Committee on Constitution and Canons thereof, for consideration, report, and recommendation, before adoption by the House; P provided, that in either House the foregoing requirement of reference may be dispensed with by a three-fourths vote of the members present.

Sec. 2. Whenever a Canon is amended, enacted, or repealed in different respects by two or more independent enactments at the same General Convention, including the enactment of an entire Title, the separate enactments shall be considered as one enactment containing all of the amendments or enactments, whether or not repealed, to the extent that the change made in separate amendments or enactments, are not in conflict with each other. The two members of the Committee on Constitution and Canons from each House of General Convention appointed pursuant to Canon V.1.5 (a) shall make the determination whether or not there is a conflict and certify the text of the single enactment to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Sec. 3. Whenever a Canon which repealed another Canon, or part thereof, shall itself be repealed, such previous Canon or part thereof shall not thereby be revived or reenacted, without express words to that effect.

Sec. 4. If a Canon or Section of a Canon or Clause of a Section of a Canon is to be amended or added, the enactment shall be in substantially one of the following forms: "That Canon . . .(Canon, Section or Clause designated as provided in Canon V.2.3 2) . . . is be hereby amended to read as follows: (here insert the new reading)"; or "That Canon . . . (Canon or Section designated as provided in Canon V.

2.3 2) . . . is be hereby amended by adding a Section (or Clause) reading as follows: (here insert the text of the new Section or Clause)." If amendments are to be made at one meeting of the General Convention to more than one-half of the Canons in a single Title of the Canons, the enactment may be in the following form: "That Title . . . of the Canons is be hereby amended to read as follows: (here insert the new reading of all Canons in the Title whether or not the individual Canon is amended)." In the event of insertion of a new Canon, or a new Section or Clause in a Canon, or of the repeal of an existing Canon, or of a Section or Clause, the numbering of the Canons, or of a division of a Canon, which follow shall be changed accordingly without the necessity of enacting an amendment or amendments to that effect.

Sec. 5 (a)-The Committee on Constitution and Canons of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint two of its members (a) to certify the changes, if any, made in the Canons, including a correction of the references made in any Canon to another, and to report the same, with the proper arrangement thereof, to the Secretary of the General Convention; and (b), who shall publish them in the Journal. (b) The Committee on Constitution of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint a similar committee of two of its members to certify in like manner the changes, if any, made in the Constitution, or proposed to be made therein under the provisions of Article XII of the Constitution, and to report the same to the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal. The committee shall also have and exercise the power of renumbering of, and correction of references to, Articles, Sections and Clauses of the Constitution required by the adoption of amendments to the Constitution at a meeting of the General Convention in the same manner as provided with respect to the Canons in the foregoing Sections 4 and 5(a) of this Canon.

Sec. 6. All Canons enacted during the General Convention of 1943, and thereafter, and all amendments and repeals of Canons then or thereafter made, unless otherwise expressly ordered, shall take effect on the first day of January following the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were enacted or made.

CANON 2: Of Terminology Used in These Canons

Sec. 1. Whenever the term "Diocese" is used without qualification in these Canons, it shall be understood to refer both to "Dioceses" and to "Missionary Dioceses," as these terms are used in the Constitution, and also, whenever applicable, to the "Convocation of the American Episcopal Churches in Europe."

Sec. 2. Whenever in these Canons a reference is made to a Canon or a Section of a Canon or a Clause of a Section of a Canon, the word "Canon" shall be set out, followed in order by the numerical or alphabetical designation of the Title, the Canon, the Section and the Clause, in each case separated by a period.

CANON 3: Of a Quorum

Sec. 1. Except where the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention provide to the contrary, a quorum of any body of the General Convention consisting of several members, the whole having been duly cited to meet, shall be a majority of said members; and a majority of the quorum so convened shall be competent to act.

CANON 4: Of Vacancies on Canonical Bodies

Sec. 1 (a) Except where the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention provide to the contrary, the term of a member in any body of the General Convention consisting of several members shall become vacant as follows:

(1) upon absence from two regularly scheduled meetings of the body between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the body;

(2) upon Inhibition, any restriction on exercise of ministry, placement on Administrative Leave, Admonition, Suspension, or Deposition of a Member of the Clergy then serving on the body;

- (3) upon the renunciation of the pronouncement of the release and removal from the ordained ministry of this Church by of a Member of the Clergy;
- (4) upon the certification to the Presiding Bishop by the Disciplinary Board for Bishops as to the abandonment of the this Church by a Bishop pursuant to Canon IV.16;

- (c) The term of any Member of the Clergy specified to be filled by virtue of a provincial or diocesan canonical residence shall become vacant upon the change of canonical residence to another diocese or to a diocese in a different province, as the case may be.
- (d) The term of any Lay Person specified to be filled by virtue of a provincial or diocesan residence shall become vacant upon the change of residence to another diocese or to a diocese in a different province, as the case may be.
- Sec. 2 (a) The position of a lay member becomes vacant upon loss of status as a communicant in good standing.
- (b) The position of any member specified to be filled by a $\frac{1}{2}$ Lay $\frac{1}{2}$ Person shall become vacant upon that member's ordination.

The only Black deaconess in the Episcopal Church, teacher and minister in southern Georgia. Anna Ellison Butler Alexander (1865-1947) was born to recently emancipated slaves on Butler Plantation in MacIntosh County, Georgia. She was the first African- American set aside as a deaconess in the Episcopal Church in 1907. She founded Good Shepherd Church in rural Glynn County's Pennick community where she taught children to read—by tradition, from the Book of Common Prayer and

the Bible—in a one-room schoolhouse. The school was later expanded to two rooms with a loft where Anna lived. She ministered in Pennick for 53 years, leaving a legacy of love and devotion still felt in Glynn County. Deaconess Alexander served in difficult times, however. The diocese segregated her congregations in 1907 and African-American congregations were not invited to another diocesan convention until 1947. Similarly, it was only in the 1950s that a woman set aside as a deaconess was recognized as being in deacon's orders. However, her witness— wearing the distinctive dress of a deaconess, traveling by foot from Brunswick through Darien to Pennick, showing care and love for all whom she met—represents the best in Christian witness.

O God, you called Anna Alexander as a deaconess in your Church, and sent her as teacher and evangelist to the people of Georgia: Grant us the humility to go wherever you send, and the wisdom to teach the word of Christ to whomever we meet, that all may come to the enlightenment which you intend for your people; through Jesus Christ, our Teacher and Savior. Amen.

We the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church wish to express our love and appreciation to our colleagues who identify as Communion Partners and those bishops who have affinity with the Communion Partners' position as stated in their "Communion Partners Salt Lake City Statement." Our time together in Salt Lake City, in conversation and in prayer, has demonstrated how profoundly the love of God in Jesus binds us together and empowers us for service to God's mission. As we have waited upon the leading of the Holy Spirit in our deliberations, we have been reminded that the House of Bishops is richly gifted with many voices and perspectives on matters of theological, liturgical, and pastoral significance. This has been shown in our discernment with respect to doctrinal matters relative to Christian marriage. We thank God for the rich variety of voices in our House, in our dioceses, in The Episcopal Church, and in the Anglican Communion, that reflect the wideness of God's mercy and presence in the Church and in the world.

We give particular thanks for the steadfast witness of our colleagues in the Communion Partners. We value and rely on their commitment to The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion. We recognize that theirs is a minority voice in the House of Bishops in our deliberations with respect to Christian marriage; and we affirm that they are an indispensible part of who we are as the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church. Our church needs their witness. Further, we appreciate that each

of us will return to dioceses where there will be a variety of responses to Resolutions Ao54 and Ao36. The equanimity, generosity, and graciousness with which the Communion Partners have shared their views on Christian marriage and remain in relationship is a model for us and for the lay and ordained leaders in our dioceses to follow. We thank God that in the fullness of the Holy Trinity we can and must remain together as the Body of Christ in our dioceses, in the Episcopal Church, and in our relationships with sisters and brothers in Christ in the Anglican Communion. The bonds created in baptism are indeed indissoluble and we pray that we have the confidence to rely upon the Holy Spirit who will continue to hold us all together as partners in communion through the love of God in Jesus.

Final Text of Resolution:

(A197)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention adopt the 2016-2018 Budget for the Episcopal Church as presented by the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance.

- 1.0 The Budget for the Episcopal Church for the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018, which shall be a unified budget including Canonical, Corporate, and Program (mission) portions, is adopted at a total of \$125,012,351.
 - 1.1 The Canonical portion, providing for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop and the expenses of that office, the expenses of the President of the House of Deputies, and Church Pension Fund assessments is adopted at a total of \$22,584,693.
 - 1.2 The Corporate portion, providing for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices, is adopted at a total of \$35,236,451.
 - 1.3 The Program (mission) portion, providing for support for the mission and ministry (restricted and unrestricted) of the Church, is adopted at a total of \$67,191,207.
 - 1.4 That \$150,000 be added to the Stewardship Development (TENS) line item (138) of the 2016-2018 Triennium budget; that \$150,000 be deducted from the Development Office line item (186b) of the 2016-2018 budget.
- 2.0 The funding policy for the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018 is adopted based on a single Asking of the dioceses. After a \$150,000 exemption from total income, a single Asking shall be applied at flat rates of 18%, 16.5% and 15%, respectively in years 2016, 2017 and 2018 of the balance of income to the diocese, reported in the diocesan financial statements for the year two years prior to the year to which the pledge is applied [e.g., 2016 Askings are to be based on 2014 actual income figures]. "Income" includes (1) all congregational giving to the diocese, (2) all unrestricted investment and endowment income to the diocese, (3) restricted investment and endowment income to the diocese which covers costs in the operating budget, and (4) other

earnings from investments or enterprises. It is intended that income shall include revenues that fund normal operating and program expenses of the dioceses. It is not intended to include pass-through income that is used for expenses for programming that are simply administered by the dioceses, or that would not be otherwise funded by contributions from parishes or out of investment income.

- 2.1 We rejoice with dioceses that have moved toward, and those that have given at and above 19% during 2013-2015. Such giving creates a strong financial basis for vital mission and witness of the Episcopal Church. We encourage all our dioceses to adopt the Asking to the mission priorities which we have embraced in this 78th General Convention.
- 2.2 For the budgetary period income from diocesan commitments, totaling \$46,653,753 is anticipated.
- 2.3 For the budgetary period 2016-2018, payment by the dioceses of the Askings shall be made in twelve equal monthly payments.
- 2.4 All additional income, other than from the Askings of the dioceses, totaling \$49,476,979, is projected.
- 2.5 A General Ordination fee is hereby authorized, which fees are expected to cover the expenses and administration of examinations for Holy Orders. A candidate for Holy Orders eligible for examination and so certified by the diocesan bishop shall not be disqualified for examination because the fee has not been paid.
- 2.6 General Convention registration and exhibitors fees are hereby authorized, which fees shall be added to the funding from dioceses and applied to the expenses of the 2018 General Convention, and for no other purpose.
- 3.0 In the exercise of their respective authorities, the Executive Council of the General Convention and the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance shall be subject to the following policies:
 - 3.1 Each year, the Executive Council, with the advice of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, shall adjust the budget to the assured income of the Executive Council so as to carry out the Budget for the Episcopal Church for that year on a balanced budget basis.
 - 3.2 The fiscal year shall begin January 1.
 - 3.3 If in any year the total anticipated income for budget support is less than the amount required to support the budget approved by the General Convention, the Canonical portion of the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas.
 - 3.4 Undesignated bequests and legacies received during the budgetary period shall be set aside in the general endowment fund of which only the income shall be used for the general purposes of the Society.
 - 3.5 Designated bequests and legacies received during the budgetary period shall be set aside in specific funds of which only the income shall be used for the purposes so designated.
 - 3.6 Each interim body, Committee, Commission, Agency and Board (CCAB), or Task Force proposing to the General Convention any resolution with funding implications shall present to the Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance a detailed budget in support of its plan(s), including cost estimates from contractors and suppliers for all goods and services, by no later than six months before the opening day of the General Convention.
 - 3.7 An annual report of the actual income and expenditures of the DFMS, relating the expenditures to the Church's priorities, shall be posted on the DFMS website when it is released.
 - 3.8 An annual report of the trust fund balances with accompanying narratives shall be posted on the DFMS website when it is released.

Communion Partners Salt Lake City Statement

The 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church, in passing Resolutions Ao36 and Ao54, has made a significant change in the Church's understanding of Christian marriage. As bishops of the Church, we must dissent from these actions.

We affirm Minority Report #1, which was appended to the text of Resolution A036:

The nature, purpose, and meaning of marriage, as traditionally understood by Christians, are summed up in the words of the Book of Common Prayer:

"The bond and covenant of marriage was established by God in creation, and our Lord Jesus Christ adorned this manner of life by his presence and first miracle at a wedding in Cana of Galilee. It signifies to us the mystery of the union between Christ and his Church, and Holy Scripture commends it to be honored by all people.

The union of husband and wife in heart, body, and mind is intended by God for their mutual joy; for the help and comfort given one another in prosperity and adversity; and, when it is God's will, for the procreation of children and their nurture in the knowledge and love of the Lord" (BCP, p. 423)

The nature, purpose, and meaning of marriage are linked to the relationship of man and woman. The promises and vows of marriage presuppose husband and wife as the partners who are made one flesh in marriage. This understanding is a reasonable one, as well as in accord with Holy Scripture and Christian tradition in their teaching about marriage.

When we were ordained as bishops in the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church, we vowed to "guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the Church of God" (BCP, p. 518). We renew that promise; and in light of the actions of General Convention, and of our own deep pastoral and theological convictions, we pledge ourselves to

- "Maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:3). The bonds created in baptism are indissoluble, and we share one bread and one cup in the Eucharist. We are committed to the Church and its people, even in the midst of painful disagreement.
- "Speak the truth in love" (Eph. 4:15). When we disagree with the Church's actions, we will do so openly and transparently and with the Spirit's help charitably. We are grateful that Resolution Ao54 includes provision for bishops and priests to exercise their conscience; but we realize at the same time that we have entered a season in which the tensions over these difficult matters may grow. We pray for the grace to be clear about our convictions and, at the same time, to love brothers and sisters with whom we disagree.
- "Welcome one another . . . just as Christ has welcomed [us]" (Rom. 15:7). Our commitment to the Church includes a commitment to our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters. We will walk with them, pray with and for them, and seek ways to engage in pastoral conversation. We rejoice that Jesus' embrace includes all of us.

We are mindful that the decisions of the 78th General Convention do not take place in isolation. The Episcopal Church is part of a larger whole, the Anglican Communion. We remain committed to that Communion and to the historic See of Canterbury, and we will continue to honor the three moratoria requested in the Windsor Report and affirmed by the Instruments of Communion.

We invite bishops and any Episcopalians who share these commitments to join us in this statement, and to affirm with us our love for our Lord Jesus Christ, our commitment to The Episcopal Church, and the Anglican Communion, and our dissent from these actions.

A Memorial to the Church

To the Deputies and Bishops of The Episcopal Church assembled at the 78th General Convention:

Now those who were scattered went from place to place, proclaiming the word. Philip went down to the city of Samaria and proclaimed the Messiah to them. The crowds with one accord listened eagerly to what was said by Philip, hearing and seeing the signs that he did. So there was great joy in that city. Acts 8:4-6,8

In the eighth chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, the newly formed church of disciples of the risen Savior found itself in a new situation. No longer could Christians depend on traditional ways of following Jesus and traditional places in which to do it. Driven out of their comfortable existence praying in the Temple in Jerusalem and waiting for the kingdom to come, they found themselves in new and unexpected neighborhoods, developing new ways of proclaiming the Word. Yet they found that the crowds were eager to hear the Good News of Christ and welcomed it with joy. The very loss of the old ways of being the church gave them opportunities to expand and multiply the reach of Christ's loving embrace.

Our beloved Episcopal Church is in a similar situation. We must find new ways of proclaiming the gospel in varied and ever changing neighborhoods. Old ways of being the church no longer apply. We can no longer settle for complacency and comfort. We can no longer claim to dominate the political and social landscape. We can no longer wait inside our sanctuaries to welcome those who want to become Episcopalian.

We have a choice before us. We can continue, valiantly and tragically, to try to save all the rights and privileges we have previously enjoyed. We can continue to watch our church dwindle until it someday becomes an endowed museum to the faith of our forebears. We can continue business as usual until we lose our common life entirely.

Or we can lose our life for Jesus' sake so that we might save it.

We, the undersigned, hold dear the Episcopal Church and believe passionately in the gift this church offers. Washed in the waters of Baptism and nourished from the deep springs of word and sacrament, we experience the power of God's presence as we open the Scriptures and celebrate the Eucharist. We stand in awe of the mystery of the Holy Trinity and the power of the triune God to love, to forgive, to make whole. We know the joy of serving God through serving others. We long for a world with every unjust structure toppled. We love this church enough to yearn for it to be transformed.

We recognize the importance of this present moment. We join the Task Force for Reimagining the Church in calling for the church to follow Jesus into the neighborhood, traveling lightly. Our deepest hopes and aspirations are not dependent upon any particular act of this Convention. Many essential steps are found in the daily walk of discipleship undertaken by congregations and individuals throughout the church, and we commend the work of many who are helping the church adopt these discipleship practices. This Convention, however, has the opportunity to act on a number of matters

that can support God's faithful people, our parishes and missions, and our dioceses in living out the Great Commission and the Great Commandment.

Specifically, we call upon the people of the Episcopal Church to:

Recommit to reading scripture, praying daily, gathering weekly for corporate worship, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom, knowing that engaging in these practices brings personal and corporate transformation;

Share the Good News of Jesus Christ in word and deed, including learning how to tell the story of how Jesus makes a difference in our lives, even and especially to those who have not experienced true transformation;

Pray and fast for the Holy Spirit to add day by day to those who come within the reach of Christ's saving embrace;

Encounter Jesus Christ through loving service to those in need and through seeking justice and peace among all people.

And we call upon those bishops and deputies gathered for Convention to the following actions as specific ways we may enter this time of transition in a spirit of exploration, discovering the gifts that the Holy Spirit has for us in this moment:

Engage creatively, openly, and prayerfully in reading the signs of the times and discerning the particular ways God is speaking to the Episcopal Church now;

Pray, read the scriptures, and listen deeply for the Holy Spirit's guidance in electing a new Presiding Bishop and other leaders, in entering into creative initiatives for the spread of the kingdom, and in restructuring the church for mission;

Fund evangelism initiatives extravagantly: training laborers to go into the harvest to revitalize existing congregations and plant new ones; forming networks and educational offerings to train and deploy church planters and revitalizers who will follow Jesus into all kinds of neighborhoods; and creating training opportunities for bilingual and bi-cultural ministry;

Release our hold on buildings, structures, comfortable habits, egos, and conflicts that do not serve the church well;

Remove obstacles embedded in current structures, however formerly useful or well-meaning, that hinder new and creative mission and evangelism initiatives;

Refocus our energies from building up a large, centralized, expensive, hierarchical church-wide structure, to networking and supporting mission at the local level, where we all may learn how to follow Jesus into all of our neighborhoods.

Like those early followers of Christ, we find ourselves being scattered out of familiar and comfortable places and ways of being the church. Rather than be ruled by memory and consumed by fear, we can embrace this crisis, trusting that the Lord of Life will give us everything we need to

spread the Gospel, proclaim the kingdom, and share the love of God. May God grant great joy in every city and neighborhood into which we go.

- (a) Each Committee member shall serve one triennium beginning January 1 in the year following each General Convention until the December 31 following the next General Convention. Members may be named to serve consecutive terms by their provinces.
- (b) In the event that a province fails to name a person to serve on the Committee by the [sic] January 1, when each term begins, the Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council shall appoint a qualified person from that province to serve on the Committee.
- (c) The Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council shall appoint the member from the Joint Standing Committee on Advocacy and Networking, and the Chair shall appoint the Bishop member.
- (d) Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original members were named. Vacancies in excess of 30 days shall be filled by the Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council, and in the case of a Bishop vacancy, by the Chair of Executive Council.
- (e) To ensure representation of diverse racial and ethnic voices on this Committee, if there are no members named who are from the racial or ethnic groups of black, Latino/a, Asian, Native American/Indigenous, and non-Hispanic white, then the Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council shall appoint a member at large from each unrepresented racial or ethnic group.

The parties to the disagreement, following the recommendations of the Presiding Bishop, shall labor in good faith toward that reconciliation. If such proceedings lead to reconciliation, said reconciliation shall contain definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Bishop and the Diocese.

Sec. 10. Reconciliation of Disagreements Affecting the Collegial Relation between Bishops in the Same Diocese

When the collegial relationship between a Bishop Diocesan, Bishop Coadjutor, or Bishop Suffragan is imperiled by disagreement or dissension, and the issues are deemed serious by a Bishop of that Diocese or a two-thirds majority vote of all of the members of the Standing Committee or a two-thirds majority vote of the Diocesan Convention, any party may petition the Presiding Bishop, in writing, to intervene and assist the parties in their efforts to resolve the disagreement or dissension. The written petition shall include sufficient information to inform the Presiding Bishop and the parties involved of the nature, causes, and specifics of the disagreements or dissension imperiling the collegial relationship. The Presiding Bishop shall initiate such proceedings as are deemed appropriate under the circumstances to attempt to reconcile the parties, which may include the appointment of a consultant or licensed mediator. The parties to the disagreement, following the recommendations of the Presiding Bishop, shall labor in good faith toward that reconciliation. If such proceedings lead to reconciliation, said reconciliation shall contain definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Bishops and the Diocese.

Sec. 12. Except where the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention provide to the contrary, a quorum of any body of the General Convention consisting of several members, the whole having been duly cited to meet, shall be a majority of said members; and a majority of the quorum so convened shall be competent to act.

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request that the Office of General Convention, along with leaders from the Episcopal Disability Network and the Episcopal Conference of the Deaf, compile a continually-reviewed and -revised Best Practices Guide for accommodations at all official and ancillary Church events that will include resources and policies that would otherwise comply with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act and UN CRPD; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request that the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance consider a budget of \$40,000 to support the provision of any and all requested disability accommodations for each General Convention to ensure that all persons who attend, regardless of their role at the Convention, have access to reasonable accommodation that meets their needs, so that all who desire to participate in the governance and decision-making of The Episcopal Church have a full and fair opportunity to participate and are welcomed with open arms into the Church as Christ himself welcomes all into his Body.

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church recognize that much work has yet to be done to wholly achieve the goal of 2003 Do51, including but not limited to: an understanding of all accommodations used to accommodate people with disabilities in work, education, events, appointments, and all life activities, including more develop and make readily available information on how individuals may request—the process for requesting disability accommodations of the needed to fully participate in meetings, conventions, and other activities of the Church, and having information on accommodations readily available in the Church's event materials or on the Church's website including placing this information in event materials, on the Church website and relevant social media platforms; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church recognize it has efforts to undertake in the area of reconciliation to people with disabilities who, as recently as June 2015, have been denied access to Church events, including the 78th General Convention recognize the need for reconciliation with persons with disabilities who have been denied accommodations needed to participate in Church events or who have been otherwise excluded from the activities of the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request that the Office of General Convention Office, along with leaders from the Episcopal Disability Network and the Episcopal Conference of the Deaf, compile a continually reviewed and revised—Best Practices Guide for providing disability accommodations at all official and ancillary Church events that will include resources and policies that would otherwise comply with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act and UN CRPD, to be reviewed and updated at least once every triennium; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request that the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance consider a budget of \$40,000 to support the provision of any and all requested disability accommodations for each General Convention to ensure that all persons who attend, regardless of their role at the Convention, have access to reasonable accommodation that meets their needs, so that all who desire to participate in the governance and decision making of The Episcopal Church have a full and fair opportunity to participate and are welcomed with open arms into the Church as Christ himself welcomes all into his Body. Resolved, That the 78th General Convention urge the Church at every level to increase the number of dialogues about systemic racial injustice it has with local, state and national bodies within the public and private spheres and that these dialogues be used to identify, examine, and offer correctives to policies and practices within and among these bodies that result in systemic racial disparities and injustices; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention urge dioceses and congregations to create vehicles for listening to diverse neighbors and developing reconciling relationships; such options might include (a) listening campaigns in local communities, (b) partnerships with churches and organizations comprised predominately of a different race or culture (especially those targeted by oppression), (c) neighborhood prayer walks, (d) storytelling and speak-out events designed to facilitate truth-

Bishop. The Suffragan Bishop Suffragan so elected shall be ordained and consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. The Suffragan Bishop shall be eligible for election as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop of a Diocese.

The House of Bishops Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #37 on Resolution Do31 (Amend Title IV) and moved to concurrence to refer the resolution to a CCAB.

Hearing Panel shall mean a panel of three or more not less than five members of the Disciplinary Board and shall include both clergy and lay members, a majority of whom shall be Members of the Clergy, selected by the president of the Board, unless some other manner of selection is provided by Diocesan Canon by lot or by other random means, to serve as the body before which a hearing is held as provided in Canon IV.13, provided, however, that no such member of the Hearing Panel may serve as a member of the Conference Panel in the same case. The president of the Disciplinary Board shall be ineligible to serve on the Hearing Panel; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.3.1 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. A Member of the Clergy shall be subject to proceedings under this Title for:

- (a) knowingly violating or attempting to violate, directly or through the acts of another person, the Constitution or Canons of the Church or of any Diocese; or
- (b) failing without good cause to cooperate with any investigation or proceeding conducted under authority of this Title; or (c)intentionally and maliciously bringing a false accusation or knowingly providing false testimony or false evidence in any investigation or proceeding under this Title.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.3.3 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. In order for any conduct or condition to be the subject of the provisions of this Title, the Offense complained of must violate applicable provisions of Canon IV.3 or IV.4 and must be material and substantial or—and of clear and weighty importance to the ministry of the Church.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.5.1 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. Each Diocese shall, by Canon, create a court to be known as the Disciplinary Board as described in this Canon. Each such Board shall consist of not fewer than seven nine persons to be selected by the convention of the Diocese as determined by Diocesan Canon. The membership of each such Board shall include lay persons and Priests or Deacons, and the majority of the Board members shall be Priests or Deacons, but by no more than one. Within sixty days following each Diocesan convention, the Board shall convene to elect a president for the following year, unless another method for selection of the president is provided by Diocesan Canon.; and be it further Resolved, That Canon IV.6.3 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Information concerning Offenses may shall be submitted to the Intake Officer in any manner and in any form writing, with a certification signed by the Informant that the Informant believes that the reported information is true.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.7.7 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. Any Pastoral Direction, restriction on ministry or Administrative Leave under this Canon shall be effective upon service of the writing setting it forth on the subject Member of the Clergy as provided in Canon IV.19.20. No Rector or other tenured Member of the Clergy shall be denied his or

her compensation and benefits by virtue of the imposition of a restriction on ministry or placement on **Administrative Leave.**; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.12.6 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6. The Complainant may shall attend the conference but may not be required to do so. The Complainant's Advisor may also attend the conference regardless of whether the Complainant attends.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.13.4 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. All proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be public, provided, however, that the Hearing Panel may close any part of the proceedings at its discretion to protect the privacy of any person. No proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be closed to the Respondent, Respondent's Advisor, Respondent's Counsel, or to the Church Attorney. A record of the hearing shall be made by such means as to enable the creation of a verbatim written transcript of the hearing; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.13.6 be amended as follows:

Sec. 6. In all proceedings of the Hearing Panel the testimony of witnesses shall be taken orally and personally or by such other means as provided by order of the Hearing Panel. All testimony shall be given under oath or solemn affirmation and be subject to cross- examination. The Hearing Panel shall determine the credibility, reliability and weight to be given to all testimony and other evidence. The proceedings shall be conducted as follows:

- (a) The president shall regulate the course of the hearing so as to promote full disclosure of relevant facts.
- (b) The president:
 - (1) may exclude evidence that is irrelevant, immaterial or unduly repetitious;
 - (2) shall exclude privileged evidence;
 - (3) may receive documentary evidence in the form of a copy or excerpt if the copy or excerpt contains all pertinent portions of the original document;
 - (4) may take official notice of any facts that could be judicially noticed, including records of other proceedings and of technical or scientific facts within the Hearing Panel's specialized knowledge;
 - (5) may not exclude evidence solely because it is hearsay; and
 - (6) shall afford to the Church Attorney and to the Respondent reasonable opportunity to present evidence, argue and respond to argument, conduct cross-examination and submit rebuttal evidence; and
 - (7) may, at the discretion of the Hearing Panel, give persons other than the Church Attorney and the Respondent opportunity to present oral or written statements at the hearing.
- (c) Nothing in this section shall preclude the exercise of discretion by the president in taking measures appropriate to preserve the integrity of the hearing.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.14.7 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. Prior to the issuance of an Order by a Conference Panel or a Hearing Panel, the issuing Panel shall afford the Bishop Diocesan, the Respondent and the Complainant each with an opportunity to be heard on the proposed terms of the Order; and be it further

Within thirty days after receiving a copy of the record on appeal, the party opposing the appeal Church Attorney shall serve the brief in opposition, if any, upon the appealing party Respondent, with five copies to the president of the Provincial Court of Review. Any reply brief of the appealing party Respondent shall be served likewise within fifteen days following service of the brief in opposition.; and be it further

- (a) No person proceeding under the authority of this Title may interrogate, or request a statement from, a Respondent or a person suspected of an Offense without first informing that person of the nature of the accusation and advising that person that no statement need be made regarding the Offense of which the Respondent is accused or suspected and that any statement so made may be used in evidence against that person in a proceeding under this Title.
- (b) No Respondent or person suspected of an Offense may be compelled to make any statement or admission or to testify against himself or herself in any proceedings under this Title.
- (c) No statement obtained from any person in violation of this Canon, or through the use of coercion, undue influence or improper inducement may be received in evidence against that person in a Trial under this Title.

- 5. Culture of safety We will promote a culture of safety in parishes and church organizations by education and training to help clergy, other church personnel, and participants prevent the occurrence of abuse;" and be it further

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Board of Examining Chaplains, consisting of four Bishops, six Priests with pastoral cures or in specialized ministries, six members of accredited Seminary faculties or of other educational institutions, and six Lay Persons. and eight other members. The members of the Board shall be elected to six-year terms by the House of Bishops and confirmed by the House of Deputies from nominees presented by the existing Board and the Presiding Bishop, onehalf of the members in each of the foregoing categories being elected and confirmed at each regular meeting of the General Convention for a term of two Convention periods not to exceed two General Conventions, except that for the first election following the approval of this canon, one half of the members shall be elected for a three-year term and one half for a six-year term. They shall take office at the adjournment of the meeting of the General Convention at which their elections are confirmed of their election, and shall serve until the earlier of the end of their term or the adjournment of the second regular meeting of General Convention thereafter. No member shall serve more than 12 years consecutively. Additionally, the Presiding Bishop, in consultation with the Chair of the Board, may appoint up to four other members for a term. The House of Bishops, at any special meeting that may be held prior to the next meeting of the General Convention, shall fill for the unexpired portion of the term any vacancy that may have arisen in the interim. The Board shall elect its own Chair and Secretary, and shall have the power to constitute committees necessary for the carrying on of to carry out its work.

- Sec. 2. (a) The General Board of Examining Chaplains, with professional assistance, shall prepare at least annually a General Ordination Examination covering the subject matter set forth in Canon III. 8.5 (g); and shall conduct, administer, and evaluate it in respect to those Candidates for Holy Orders who have been identified to the Board by their several Bishops.
- (b) Whenever a Candidate has not demonstrated proficiency in any one or more of the canonical areas covered by the General Ordination Examination, The General Board of Examining Chaplains shall recommend to the Commission on Ministry, and through the Commission to the Board of Examining Chaplains, if one exists, of the Diocese to which the Candidate belongs, how the proficiencies might be attained. promptly report to each Candidate, to the Candidate's Bishop, and to the dean or other official of the educational program at which the Candidate is studying, the results of the General Ordination Examination, the examinations themselves, and the proficiency or lack of proficiency noted, along with the reasons for any lack of proficiency. The Bishop shall transmit these reports to the Standing Committee and to the Commission on Ministry.

Sec. 3. The General Board of Examining Chaplains may prepare, in each Convention period, guidelines based upon the subjects contained in Canon III.8.4(e), which guidelines shall be available to all persons concerned. shall make a report concerning its work to each regular meeting of the General Convention.

Sec. 4. The General Board of Examining Chaplains shall promptly report, in writing, to the Candidate, to the Candidate's Bishop and to the Dean of the Seminary the Candidate is attending, the results of all examinations held by them, together with the examinations themselves, whether satisfactory or unsatisfactory, making separate reports upon each person examined. The Bishop shall transmit these reports to the Standing Committee and to the Commission. Notwithstanding the results of the examinations, in no case shall the Standing Committee recommend a Candidate for Ordination under Canon III.8 until the Standing Committee has received from the Commission on Ministry a certificate to the effect that the Candidate has demonstrated a proficiency in all subjects required by Canon III.8.5(g) and (h).

Sec. 7(a). The Hearing Panel shall have the authority, upon reasonable notice, to impose sanctions on the Respondent, the Respondent's counsel, or the Church Attorney, for conduct that the Hearing Panel deems to be disruptive, dilatory, or otherwise contrary to the integrity of the proceedings. If the conduct in question is that of the Respondent's counsel, notice shall be given to the following: the Respondent, Respondent's counsel, and Respondent's Advisor. If the conduct in question is that of the Church Attorney, notice shall be given to each of the Church Attorney, the Bishop Diocesan, and the person or Diocesan body with authority to remove or replace the Church Attorney. If the conduct is that of the Respondent, notice shall be given to each of the Church Attorney, the Bishop Diocesan, Respondent's counsel, Respondent's Advisor, and Respondent.

- (b). Any sanction must be proportionate to the underlying misconduct. Sanctions that may be imposed pursuant to Canon IV.13.7 (a) include, but are not limited to
 - (i) amending a scheduling order:
 - (ii) limiting discovery;
 - (iii) refusing to allow the disobedient party to support or oppose claims or defenses;

- (iv) refusing to allow the disobedient party to introduce certain matters into evidence;
- (v) striking claims or defenses or responses; or
- (vi) disqualification of counsel.
- (c) Within 10 days of the imposition of sanctions under this section, the sanctioned party may appeal the sanction to the Disciplinary Board (excluding the members of the Hearing Panel). The standard of review for such appeal shall be de novo. The President of the Disciplinary Board shall establish a hearing date and convene the Disciplinary Board members, within 20 days, either personally or telephonically, to consider the appeal. The Disciplinary Board shall issue its ruling within three days of conclusion of the hearing. The ruling of the Disciplinary Board cannot be the subject of an interlocutory appeal.

Sec. 1. If When the Conference Panel decides to refer a matter is referred to the Hearing Panel, the president of the Conference Panel shall within three days of that decision promptly notify the president of the Disciplinary Board and the Church Attorney of the referral.

- Sec. 2. Upon Within 10 days of receipt of a referral for Hearing Panel proceedings, the Church Attorney shall review all information acquired as of the time of such referral and, if necessary, shall revise or update the statement of the alleged Offense and shall provide the same to the Hearing Panel. provide to the Hearing Panel the statement of the alleged Offense(s), updated as needed. No other material from any prior proceedings under Title IV shall be provided to the Hearing Panel. Upon receipt of the Church Attorney's communication, ∓ the Hearing Panel shall within seven days issue a notice to the Respondent, to the Respondent's Advisor, to Respondent's counsel, if any, and to the Church Attorney.
 - (a) The notice shall describe the nature and purpose of the proceeding, contain a copy of the written statement prepared by the Church Attorney, disclose the names of all persons to whom the notice is sent, advise the Respondent that a written response to the notice must be filed by the Respondent with the Hearing Panel within thirty days of the mailing date of the notice and advise the Respondent that failure to attend or participate in a scheduled or noticed hearing may result in a finding of default of the provisions of Canon IV.19.6.
 - (b) A copy of the notice shall be sent to the Complainant and to the Complainant's Advisor.
 - (c) Unless additional time is approved for good cause by the Hearing Panel, the Respondent shall within 30 days of the mailing date of the notice file with the Hearing Panel and deliver to the Church Attorney a written response signed by the Respondent-within thirty days of the mailing date of the notice. The president of the Hearing Panel shall forward a copy of the response to the Church Attorney.

Sec. 3. In all proceedings before the Hearing Panel, the Church Attorney shall appear on behalf of the Diocese, which shall then be considered the party on one side and the Respondent the party on the other. Each Complainant shall be entitled to be present throughout and observe the Hearing and each may be accompanied by another person of his or her own choosing in addition to his or her Advisor.

Sec. 4. All proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be public, provided, however, that the Hearing Panel may close any part of the proceedings at its discretion to protect the privacy of any person. A record of the hearing shall be made by such means as to enable the creation of a written transcript of the hearing.

- Sec. 5 3. The Church Attorney and the Respondent shall each be afforded reasonable time and opportunity toprepare evidence discover evidence in preparation for the hearing as follows:
 - (a) Within thirty sixty days after the filing and delivery of the response by the Respondent, the Church Attorney and the Respondent's counsel shall meet and confer regarding the nature and basis of the allegations against the Respondent and the defenses thereto and to make or arrange for initial disclosures as described in Canon IV.13.5(b), and to develop a proposed plan of discovery forms and schedule for approval by the Hearing Panel. A report of the proposed plan shall be filed with the president of the Hearing Panel within fifteen days after the conference. (b) Within fifteen days after the conference described in Canon IV.13.5(a), the Church Attorney and the Respondent's counsel shall each provide to the other initial a mandatory disclosure of all evidence known to them that would tend to prove or disprove the allegations against the Respondent, including but not limited to (1) the name and, if known, the address and telephone number of each individual likely to have direct knowledge of information which may be used to support the allegations against the Respondent or the defenses thereto, together with a detailed summary of the expected testimony of the person, if called to testify; and (2) a copy of, or a description by category and location of, all documents and tangible things that may be used to support the allegations against the Respondent or the defenses thereto, except as such disclosure would involve Privileged Communications. The parties must supplement mandatory disclosures made under this section as additional information becomes known. Documents and tangible items identified in the mandatory disclosures that are in the possession of a party shall be produced upon request, and copies of all documents provided to the requesting party. The Hearing Panel may, upon request of a party or Injured Person, enter an order limiting production of documents or tangible items of a sensitive nature.
 - (b) If any party withholds from disclosure any relevant document on the ground of privilege, the party must provide a log containing the date of the communication, a list of all persons party to the communication, and a short description of the nature of the communication. The scope of the privilege shall be determined by the Hearing Panel, pursuant to Canon IV.19.27.
 - (c) If the discovery plan has been mutually agreed upon by the Church Attorney and counsel for the Respondent, the president of the Hearing Panel may approve the plan and incorporate it in a discovery order and scheduling order governing all discovery procedures and establishing a date for hearing of the matter. If the Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel do not agree on all elements of the discovery plan, the president of the Hearing Panel shall allow each to be heard with respect to the elements in dispute, make a determination of appropriate discovery procedures and issue a discovery order and scheduling order within thirty days of the receipt of the discovery planning report. Within fifteen days after the delivery of the mandatory disclosures, the President of the Hearing Panel shall convene a scheduling conference with the Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel. During the scheduling conference, after the Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel have been heard, the president of the Hearing Panel shall issue a scheduling order to provide for (1) a calendar for discovery, including depositions and written interrogatories, as provided in this section; (2) filing deadlines and hearing dates for preliminary motions and for dispositive motions; and (3) the date of hearing before the Hearing Panel.
 - (d) Discovery procedures as approved in the discovery plan filed pursuant to Canon IV.13.5(a) may include written interrogatories, oral or written deposition testimony of any person having knowledge pertaining to the alleged Offense or any defenses, requests for production of documents or tangible objections, and requests for admissions of fact. The Scheduling Order shall

provide t he Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel authorization to take up to two depositions and propound up to twenty written interrogatories regarding each Complainant.

- (e) In addition to the disclosures required by this section and the discovery obtained pursuant to the discovery plan, the Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel shall each provide to the other and to the Hearing Panel at least thirty days before the hearing final pre-hearing disclosures including (1) the name, address and telephone number of each witness expected to be called to testify at the hearing; (2) identification of each document or other tangible object expected to be used as an exhibit in the hearing; and (3) requests, if any, to have all or portions of the hearing closed to the public. No other discovery shall be allowed at any point during the pendency of a matter under this Title except with permission of the Hearing Panel upon a showing of good cause.
- (f) Notwithstanding any provision of this section, in approving or determining the discovery plan, the president of the Hearing Panel shall take reasonable steps to assure that the discovery process will not unduly burden any person from whom information is sought or unduly adversely affect any pastoral response being offered to any such person. The Hearing Panel may impose, after reasonable notice and opportunity to be heard, reasonable sanctions on any party for failure to comply with any discovery or scheduling order pursuant to the provisions of Canon IV.13.7.
- Sec. 4. In all proceedings before the Hearing Panel, the Church Attorney shall appear on behalf of the Diocese, which shall then be considered the party on one side and the Respondent the party on the other.
- Sec. 5. All pre-hearing motions and challenges shall be filed with the Hearing Panel within the time limits prescribed in the scheduling order. All responses shall be filed by the non-moving party within 15 days of receipt of the motion or challenge. Upon receipt of a motion or challenge, the Hearing Panel will promptly set the matter for hearing. The hearing may be conducted by conference call. After consideration of the argument of the parties, the Hearing Panel shall render a decision within three days of the hearing. The decision shall be final as to all procedural matters. Decisions on evidentiary matters are preliminary and may be reconsidered by the Hearing Panel during the course of the hearing if warranted by the evidence. The decision shall be provided to the parties and placed on the record of proceedings.
- Sec. 6. All proceedings before the Hearing Panel except its private deliberations shall be open to the Respondent and to each Complainant, to any Injured Person, and to persons from the public. Each Complainant shall be entitled to be present throughout and observe the Hearing and each may be accompanied at the proceedings by another person of his or her own choosing in addition to his or her Advisor. Notwithstanding the above, the Hearing Panel, at its discretion and for good cause, including to protect the privacy of any person, may close any part of the proceedings to any person or group of persons, after consultation with the Church Attorney, the Respondent's counsel and, where appropriate, the Bishop Diocesan. A record of the hearing shall be made by such means as to enable the creation of a written transcript of the hearing.
- Sec. 7. At least 15 days before the hearing, the Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel shall each provide to the other and to the Hearing Panel final pre-hearing disclosures including (1) the name, address, and telephone number of each witness expected to be called to testify at the hearing; (2) identification of each document or other tangible object expected to be used as an exhibit in the hearing; and (3) requests, if any, to have all or portions of the hearing closed to the public.

 Sec. 6 8. In all proceedings of the Hearing Panel, the testimony of witnesses shall be taken orally and personally or by such other means as provided by order of the Hearing Panel. All testimony shall be given under oath or solemn affirmation and be subject to cross-examination. The Hearing Panel shall determine the credibility, reliability and weight to be given to all testimony and other evidence. The proceedings shall be conducted as follows:

(a) The president shall regulate the course of the hearing so as to promote full disclosure of relevant facts.

- (b) The president:
 - (1) may exclude evidence that is irrelevant, immaterial or unduly repetitious;
 - (2) shall exclude privileged evidence;
 - (3) may receive documentary evidence in the form of a copy or excerpt if the copy or excerpt contains all pertinent portions of the original document;
 - (4) may take official notice of any facts that could be judicially noticed, including records of other proceedings and of technical or scientific facts within the Hearing Panel's specialized knowledge;
 - (5) may not exclude evidence solely because it is hearsay;
 - (6) shall afford to the Church Attorney and to the Respondent reasonable opportunity to present evidence, argue and respond to argument, conduct cross-examination and submit rebuttal evidence; and
 - (7) may, at the discretion of the Hearing Panel, give persons other than the Church Attorney and the Respondent opportunity to present oral or written statements at the hearing.
- (c) Nothing in this section shall preclude the exercise of discretion by the president in taking measures appropriate to preserve the integrity of the hearing.

Sec. 7 9. Following the conclusion of the hearing, the Hearing Panel shall confer privately to reach a determination of the matter by (a) dismissal of the matter or (b) issuance of an Order. Sec. 8 10. If the determination is to dismiss the matter, the Hearing Panel shall issue an Order which shall include the reasons for dismissal and which may contain findings exonerating the Respondent. A copy of the Order shall be provided to the Bishop Diocesan, the Respondent, the Respondent's Advisor, the Complainant, the Complainant's Advisor, and the Church Attorney. Sec. 9 11. Either House may originate and propose legislation, and all acts of the Convention shall be adopted and be authenticated by both Houses.

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the life and work of The Episcopal Church is in a time of substantial transition and that the structures of the Church continue to evolve; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize there are increased demands on the time and energy of the President of the House of Deputies; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the President of the House of Deputies, among other current responsibilities, serves as the Vice-President of the Domestic and Foreign

Missionary Society, as the Vice-Chair of the Executive Council, and makes and participates in numerous appointments to positions in The Episcopal Church; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that at the present time, the House of Deputies is of the view that only persons who are retired or who have substantial economic resources are financially able to serve as President of the House of Deputies; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the House of Deputies considers it important that the House of Deputies be able to choose a President without regard to the financial circumstances of the candidates for the President of the House of Deputies; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the House of Deputies has affirmed that the desirability of compensation for the President of the House of Deputies is a fairness issue; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention determine that it is important for The Episcopal Church to explore fully and openly the issues of leadership, including compensation for the President of the House of Deputies; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the House of Bishops understands and appreciates the cogency of, and fairness issues inherent in, the position of the House of Deputies; and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention direct that the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies jointly appoint a task force to consider these issues of leadership and compensation and that this task force report its recommendations to the 79th General Convention, including such canonical or other steps needed to implement the recommendations of the task force.

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 4, Sections 6-8, be stricken in their entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 6. (a) The Executive Council shall submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance the proposed Budget for The Episcopal Church for the ensuing budgetary period, which budgetary period shall be equal to the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The proposed Budget shall be submitted not less than four months before the ensuing General Convention is convened.
- (b) Revenue to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church shall be generated primarily by a single assessment of the Dioceses of the Church based on a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of its Budget process. If in any year the total anticipated income for Budget support is less than the amount required to support the Budget approved by the General Convention, the canonical portion of the Budget for The Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas subject to any decreases necessary to maintain a balanced Budget.
- (c) After the preparation of the Budget, the Treasurer shall, at least four months before the sessions of the General Convention, transmit to the Bishop of each Diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed assessment necessary to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church. The Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance shall also submit to the General Convention, with the Budget, a plan for the assessments of the respective Dioceses of the sum needed to execute the Budget.
- (d) There shall be joint sessions of the two Houses for the presentation of the Budget for The Episcopal Church; and thereafter consideration shall be given and appropriate action taken thereon by the General Convention.
- (e) Upon the adoption by the General Convention of a Budget for The Episcopal Church and the planned assessments for the budgetary period, the Council shall formally advise each Diocese of its share of the total assessments to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church.
- (f) Full payment of the diocesan assessment shall be required of all Dioceses, effective January 1, 2019.

(g) Effective January 1, 2016 Council shall have the power to grant waivers from the full annual assessments of Dioceses within the limit established by the General Convention. Any diocese may appeal to Executive Council for a waiver of the assessment, in full or in part, on the basis of financial hardship, a stated plan for working toward full payment, or other reasons as agreed with the Executive Council. Effective January 1, 2019, failure to make full payment or to receive a waiver shall render the diocese ineligible to receive grants or loans from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society unless approved by Executive Council.

- (h) The Council shall have the power to expend all sums of money covered by the Budget and estimated Budgets approved by the General Convention, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention, including but not limited to the priority declaration set forth in Section 6(c) of this Canon. It shall also have power to undertake such other work provided for in the Budget approved by the General Convention, or other work under the jurisdiction of the Council, the need for which may have arisen after the action of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council its income will warrant.
- (i) In respect of the Budget for The Episcopal Church, the Executive Council shall have the power to consider and vote to make such adjustments therein, or additions thereto, as it shall deem to be necessary or expedient, and which, in its judgment, available funds and anticipated income will warrant subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention. It shall also have power to approve other initiatives proposed by the Chair or otherwise considered by Council, in consultation with the Chair of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, between meetings of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council are prudent and which the Church revenues will be adequate to support.
- (j) Each Diocese shall annually report to the Executive Council such financial and other information pertaining to the state of the Church in the Diocese as may be required in a form authorized by Executive Council.
- (k) Each Diocese shall report annually to the Executive Council the name and address of each new congregation, and of each congregation closed or removed by reason of any of the following: dissolution of the congregation;
 - 1. removal of the congregation to another Diocese due to cession or retrocession of geographic territory in which the congregation is located, pursuant to Articles V.6 or VI.2 of the Constitution;
 - 2. removal of the congregation to a new physical location or address, identifying both the location or address from which the congregation has removed, and the successor location or address; and
 - 3. merger of the congregation into one or more other congregations, in which case, the Diocese shall include in its report the names of all congregations involved in the merger, and the physical location and address at which the merged congregations shall be located.
- Sec. 7 (a) Every Missionary Bishop or, in case of a vacancy, the Bishop in charge of the jurisdiction, receiving aid from the General Convention Budget, shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of work performed, of money received from all sources and disbursed for all purposes, and of the state of the Church in the jurisdiction at the date of such report, all in such form as the Council may prescribe.
- (b) The Ecclesiastical Authority of every Diocese receiving aid from the General Convention Budget shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of the work in the diocese supported in whole or in part by that aid.
- Sec. 8. The Council, as soon as practicable after the close of each fiscal year, shall cause to be prepared and publish a full report of the work of the Executive Council, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the General Convention Office to the Church. Such report shall contain an itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements and a statement of all trust funds and other property of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and of all other trust funds and property in its possession or under its oversight responsibility. The report shall include a detailed schedule of the

salaries paid to all officers and principal employees of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Executive Council.

form or in the form specified by the receiving Diocese or equivalent jurisdiction:
I hereby certify that A.B., who has signified to me the desire to be transferred to the Ecclesiastical
Authority of, is a Priest of the Diocese of of the Episcopal Church in good standing, and
has not, so far as I know or believe, been justly liable to evil report, for error in religion or for
viciousness of life, for the last three years.
(Date) (Signed)
(b) If the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or equivalent jurisdiction of the Church in Full
Communion or Church in Communion with This Church accepts the testimonial, the canonical
residence of the Priest transferred shall date from such acceptance, and notice of acceptance shall be
promptly forwarded by the Priest to the Ecclesiastical Authority in the sending Diocese. Such
notification from the receiving Ecclesiastical Authority may be in the following form:
I hereby certify that A.B. has been canonically transferred to my jurisdiction and is a Priest in good
standing.
(Date) (Signed)
Upon receipt of said acceptance, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the sending Diocese shall notify the
Church Pension Fund and the Recorder of Ordinations of the priest's departure from the Episcopal
Church.
(c) This provision shall not be used for Priests who seek to enter Churches Not in Communion with This
Church or for those who seek transfer to another Province of the Anglican Communion while
remaining geographically within the boundaries of the Episcopal Church. In such cases the provisions
of Canon III.6.8 shall be followed.

Caring for all the Churches

A Response of the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church to an expressed need of the Church

The church is the Body of Christ. Our life in this Body is a continuing action of God's grace among us. In Christ's power alone the church is "joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord" (Eph. 2:21). Through the church's common life in Christ, God intends to signify to the world the beginning of a new and reconciled creation.

We know that the unity with God that Christ has won for humanity, he won through the victory of his passion. We are mindful of the suffering Jesus who, on the cross and through his resurrection, reaches into every corner of alienated human life, reconciling and restoring to the household of God all who come to him in faith. By God's grace the church is continually called, in repentance and hope, to be a trustworthy sign to the world of this costly reconciling power of God. As we trust in Christ and follow him, we share in his unity with the Father through the Holy Spirit. Communion in the Trinity is the salvation of the world. The church, thus, exists for the sake of the world. Therefore, for the sake of the world, bishops have been called "[to] serve before God day and night in the ministry of reconciliation" (BCP, p. 521) – a ministry which is to be carried out "with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:2-3).

We as bishops are not of a common mind about issues concerning human sexuality. Different points of view on these matters also exist within our dioceses and congregations. In some instances there are significant differences between congregation(s) and the bishop, and few of our congregations are themselves of one mind. As we exercise pastoral leadership in our dioceses, we pledge ourselves to work always towards the fullest relationship, seeking, as the Archbishop of Canterbury has said, "the highest degree of communion." We have committed ourselves to living through this time of disagreement in love and charity and with sensitivity to the pastoral needs of all members of our church.

In the circumstances of disagreement regarding the actions of the 74th and subsequent General Conventions on issues of human sexuality, we commit ourselves to providing and to making provision for pastoral care for dissenting congregations, and we recognize that there may be a need for a bishop to delegate some pastoral oversight. Oversight means the episcopal acts performed as part of a diocesan bishop's ministry either by the Bishop Diocesan or by another bishop to whom such responsibility has been delegated by the Diocesan. In other Anglican Provinces, the term "pastoral oversight" signifies what we mean by "pastoral care." In our Episcopal Church polity,

"oversight" does not confer "jurisdiction." We are aware of current examples of the delegation of pastoral oversight in the gracious accommodations which have occurred in some dioceses. As we commit ourselves to a process for Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight, we also recognize the constitutional and canonical authority of bishops and the integrity of diocesan boundaries. We are in accord with the statement of the Primates: "Whilst we affirm the teaching of successive Lambeth Conferences that bishops must respect the autonomy and territorial integrity of dioceses and provinces other than their own, we call on the provinces concerned to make adequate provision for episcopal oversight of dissenting minorities within their own area of pastoral care in consultation with the Archbishop of Canterbury on behalf of the Primates."

We recognize that we face a complex set of needs. Some Christians of a traditional perspective on matters of human sexuality find themselves in dioceses where the actions of the 74th and subsequent General Conventions are overwhelmingly affirmed and where diocesan policies and practices are in line with those General Convention actions (for example, in the ordination of persons living in same-sex partnerships and in episcopal permission for the blessing of same-sex unions). At the same time, some Christians who affirm the actions of the 74th and subsequent General Conventions find themselves in dioceses where the actions of those conventions are overwhelmingly opposed, and where diocesan policies do not permit the ordination of persons living in same-sex partnerships or the blessings of same-sex unions. In both cases, it is essential to provide a "safe space" for the exercise of conscience. A particular issue surrounds the ordination of persons from a "minority" perspective within a diocese. Often persons whose perspective runs contrary to that of the majority in a diocese feel that they cannot test their vocation to the diaconate or the priesthood; that their vocations will be dismissed out of hand, without a fair hearing. Thus Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight needs to include the possibility that persons from a parish receiving episcopal ministry under the provisions of this document may test their vocation in that bishop's diocese.

Sensitive pastoral care does not presuppose like-mindedness. Bishops and congregations have frequently disagreed about particular articulations and interpretations of scripture and the Creeds while being able to transcend their differences through common prayer and celebration of the sacraments of the new covenant. Bishops promise to "support all baptized people in their gifts and ministries" (BCP, p. 518), and that pledge must not be limited to the like-minded. Our theology and practice hold that ordination and consecration provide the gifts and grace necessary for the sacramental acts of a bishop to be effectual. (See article XXVI of the Articles of Religion: Of the Unworthiness of the Ministers, which hinders not the effect of the Sacraments.) Yet the conflict over human sexuality reminds us that our support and pastoral care may need to take unusual and extraordinary forms for the sake of the unity of the church.

As bishops we are "servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries" (1 Cor. 4:1), a ministry that none of us possesses alone. Together we must be signs of unity. We seek unity for the sake of the

world and in fidelity to our Lord, who gave his life to restore all to unity with God. We acknowledge our failures of charity toward one another in our shared ministry, we repent and ask forgiveness of God and of our brother and sister bishops, and we pledge ourselves to a sacrificial ministry with one another. We will value in each the presence of the Crucified and Risen Christ. While our unity may be strained, we continue to strive for godly union and concord. Our task requires humility, charity, mutual respect and a willingness to make every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

In March of 2002 the House of Bishops adopted the following covenant:

"We believe that the present Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church are sufficient for dealing with questions of episcopal oversight, supplemental episcopal pastoral care, and disputes that may arise between the bishop and a congregation. We encourage that their provisions be used wisely and in the spirit of charity.

"The provision of supplemental episcopal pastoral care shall be under the direction of the bishop of the diocese, who shall invite the visitor and remain in pastoral contact with the congregation. This is to be understood as a temporary arrangement, the ultimate goal of which is the full restoration of the relationship between the congregation and their bishop."

We are profoundly grateful that the faith that binds us together – grounded in Jesus Christ, rooted in the historic Creeds and in the Holy Scriptures – is deep, and that the bond created in baptism is indissoluble. Our disagreements are nonetheless real, and touch on issues that cannot be easily or quickly resolved. Convictions are passionately held across the spectrum on matters of human sexuality. We must honor conscience in such a way that persons who find themselves in a theological minority know that they have a permanent place in the Church. Thus the "temporary arrangement" called for in the 2002 covenant must also be seen as being "as long as necessary." Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight is a way of assuring theological minorities that they are beloved and not merely tolerated, and that their presence is a gift rather than a problem.

Expanding on the agreement of 2002, and working always towards "the highest degree of communion," we offer the following recommendations in order to provide Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight. We expect that the first priority in a relationship between a Bishop Diocesan and a congregation is a striving for unity. As such, it is incumbent upon both the bishop and the rector/congregation to meet together, with a consultant, if needed, to find ways to work together. If for serious cause in the light of our current disagreements on issues of human sexuality, the bishop and rector/congregation cannot work together, we propose the following process for Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight.

Appendix B

1) In the spirit of openness, the rector and vestry, or the canonically designated lay leadership shall meet with the bishop to seek reconciliation. After such a meeting, it is our hope that in most instances a mutually agreeable way forward will be found.

- 2) If reconciliation does not occur, then the rector and two-thirds of the vestry, or in the absence of a rector, two-thirds of the canonically designated lay leadership, after fully engaging the congregation, may seek from their Bishop Diocesan, (or the bishop may suggest) a conference regarding the appropriateness and conditions for Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight.
- 3) After such a conference the Bishop Diocesan may appoint another bishop to provide pastoral oversight.
- 4) The ministry of a bishop serving under the provisions of Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight may include the following elements:
 - a. Episcopal visitations
 - b. Administration of confirmation and other initiatory rites
 - c. Providing counsel to the rector, vestry, or canonically designated lay leadership
 - d. In cooperation with the Bishop Diocesan, collaborating in search processes when the parish seeks a new rector
- 5) The bishop providing delegated pastoral oversight may also, with the consent of the Bishop Diocesan and his or her own commission on ministry and standing committee, care for persons from the parish receiving delegated oversight in the ordination process. In that case the canonical provision in Canon III.6.2(a) and III.8.2(a) regarding "other community of faith" shall apply to the parish receiving delegated oversight. Thus the person testing his or her vocation seeks ordination through the discernment process of the diocese of the bishop providing delegated oversight, and his or her formation is under the direction of that diocese. In situations in which the bishop providing delegated pastoral oversight is not a Bishop Diocesan, he or she may ask a bishop with jurisdiction to assume this task.
- 6) If no reconciliation is achieved, there may then be an appeal to the bishop who is president or vice-president of the Episcopal Church province in which the congregation is geographically located, for help in seeking such a resolution. Those making such an appeal must inform the other party of their decision to appeal.
- 7) When such an appeal is made, the provincial bishop may request two other bishops, representative of the divergent views in this church, to join with the provincial bishop to review the situation, to consider the appeal, and to make recommendations to all parties. If a bishop is invited to provide Delegated Episcopal Pastoral Oversight, that bishop shall be a member in good standing in the House of Bishops.
- 8) When an agreement is reached with respect to a plan, it shall be for the purpose of reconciliation. The plan shall include expectations of all parties, especially mutual accountability. The plan shall be for a stated period of time with regular reviews and an opportunity for re-negotiation and renewal.

Appendix B

The provincial bishop shall periodically inform the Presiding Bishop, the Presiding Bishop's Council of Advice, and the House of Bishops at its regular meetings of the progress and results of this process.

This difficult season in the Church's life provides, paradoxically, an opportunity to exercise loving pastoral leadership. We commit ourselves wholeheartedly to the provisions of this document, and to the ministry of reconciliation to which it points. Our Lord's prayer for the unity of the Church includes a promise: "so that the world may believe that you have sent me" (John 17:23). In other words, Jesus invites those beyond the Christian community to look at the Church and make a decision about him on the basis of our relationships with one another. This moment in our lives has eternal significance, not merely for ourselves, but for the world for which Jesus died.

As bishops of this church, we pledge ourselves to pray and work for patience and the generosity of spirit that can enable a pastoral resolution as we live with our differences. As well, we will strive for Godly union and concord as together we seek to be led by the Spirit of truth who, as Jesus tells us, "will guide us into all the truth." (John 16:13)

at

HOUSE OF BISHOPS MEETINGS and GATHERINGS

Once adopted by the House of Bishops, these policies are to be distributed to all in attendance at House meetings and gatherings in English, Spanish, French, Creole and other languages necessary. Copies of these policies are to be distributed to all bishops' tables, and prominently displayed at the entrance and within the meeting space for visitors, guests, staff, chaplains, and translators.

- The terms social media and electronic communications include but are not limited to: photographs, email, blogs, Twitter, Facebook, LinkedIn, videotaping, live streaming, audio taping and other multimedia, including electronic listening devices.
- 2. The House will be informed at the beginning of any session when reporters, journalists and/or photographers are present.
- 3. Each session will begin with a declaration of the status of meeting or gathering by the chair or leader as either an "Open Session" or an "Executive Session".
 It is also desirable that the status of each session be displayed prominently at the entrance of the room where House is gathered
- 4. The status of meetings or gatherings of the House of Bishops are as follows:

Open Session: Members of the House, invited guests, chaplains, translators, visitors, members of media, and staff designated by the Presiding Bishop are present.

In open sessions:

Photographs may be taken only with the permission of those in the photograph; an exception is given to designated staff taking pictures; pictures taken by the staff will be reviewed. Photos may only be released after permission is given at the end of that session, not during the session. Photos by designated staff may only be released at the close of day.

(Open Sessions, continued)

It is assumed that speakers will be quoted at open sessions, but the agenda, topics, events and spoken words at the open session may not be communicated in any form until the close of that session.

Executive Session:

Members of the House, guests invited by the Presiding Bishop, chaplains, and translators are present

Note: Executive Sessions are intended:

To strengthen relationship and communication among members

To allow members to speak freely and explore all aspects and directions of issues and concerns presented

To discuss sensitive issues in private until the House is ready to speak publically (edited from boardsource.org)

In Executive Sessions: Confidentially in discussions is assumed and is to be respected in Executive Sessions.

The use of social media and electronic communications and preparing drafts for them are prohibited during Executive Sessions

Photographs are not permitted

Videotaping, or audio taping are not permitted

Specific members of the House of Bishops may not be quoted or referred to in any communication or posting of messages

Any communications concerning Executive Sessions must wait until after an official report/statement of the House has been publically distributed

Members of the House sending any messages or communications concerning the content of an Executive Session after the official report has been released are to refer only to their thoughts and reflections and avoid stating another's comments.

5. Robert's Rules of Order allows both discussion and voting during either an Open Session or an Executive

Resolved: The House of Bishops urgently requests the Committee on Constitution and Canons to prepare a canon which prohibits Diocesan staff from serving or representing the Diocese in which they are employed: as Deputies to General Convention or on the Diocesan Standing Committee or Executive Board and to bring this canonical revision to the 78th General Convention.

Explanation: It is a contradiction of role and responsibility, and accountability for a Diocesan staff person to also serve, without prejudice, on such committees or boards or to represent the Diocese in Convention.

Resolution House of Bishops Meeting September 19-24, 2013

Sponsor: The Rt. Rev. Chester L Talton, Bishop of San Joaquin Re: Approval of the Rt. Rev. David Rice as Assistant Bishop

Resolved, that the House of Bishops pursuant to Canon III.12.5(b)(4) herby consents to the appointment of the Rt. Rev. David Rice as the assistant bishop of the Diocese of San Joaquin provided that the Diocesan Convention approves the creation of the position of Assistant Bishop at its upcoming annual meeting and each of the canonical requirements are satisfied, including but not limited to the Canon III.12.5(b)(3) (collectively, the "Canonical Requirements" prior to his appointment by the Bishop of the Diocese:

Explanation [or Whereas Clauses]: The Standing Committee in consultation with the Presiding Bishop's Office has nominated the Rt. Rev. David Rice as the next provisional bishop of the Diocese. Bishop Rice is currently serving as the Bishop of the Diocese of Waiapu of the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia.

To be eligible to serve as a Provisional Bishop he or she must be either resigned or serving in a diocese of the *Episcopal* Church. Canon III.13.1. Currently neither of these criteria is applicable to Bishop Rice, so an interim step is required prior to his consideration for election as the provisional bishop.

This interim step would have Bishop Rice serve as Assistant Bishop in the Diocese pursuant to the canons of The Episcopal Church, which expressly permit a bishop form another part of the communion to serve as an Assistant Bishop in The Episcopal Church. (See Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church, Canons III.12.5(a) and (b)(3)). Accordingly, Bishop Talton as the current Provisional Bishop of the Diocese with the consent of the Standing Committee will ask the Diocesan Convention at its upcoming meeting in October to create the position of Assistant Bishop.

Provided that the Diocesan Convention concurs and other conditions are met as discussed below, Bishop Talton would appoint (with the Standing Committee's consent which has been sought and received) Bishop Rice as the Assistant Bishop of the Diocese upon Bishop Rice's arrival in February.

Prior to Bishop Rice's appointment as the Assistant Bishop, a number of important conditions need to be satisfied, including the consent of the Hose of Bishops, completion of psychological and medical tests, his resignation as the Bishop of the Diocese of Waiapu, received approval from the

Anglican Church of Aotearoa, New Zealand, and Polynesia, and submit to the Doctrine, Discipline and Worship of the Episcopal Church in writing.

Once thee conditions are met and certified to the Presiding Bishop through the House of Bishops Committee on Ordinations and Resignations and Bishop Rice is appointed as the Assistant Bishop in early February, he will become a member of the House of Bishops and a Bishop of The Episcopal Church. (See Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church Article I, Sec. 2).

As the Assistant Bishop he will be under the direction of Bishop Talton and will use his time in that capacity to become familiar with the Diocese, meet and engage the Diocese, conduct visitations, attend deanery meetings, and other episcopal duties. The Standing Committee and Bishop Talton envision that Bishop Rice would act in this capacity between his arrival in February and special meeting of the Diocesan Convention to be held on March 29th. This will give the Diocese an opportunity to meet and learn more about Bishop Rice prior to considering his election as the provisional bishop of the Diocese at a Special Meeting of the Diocesan Convention.

At the Special Meeting of the Convention, Bishop Rice would resign as the Assistant Bishop of the Diocese making him eligible to stand for election as the provisional bishop of the Diocese.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE PRESIDING BISHOP

- A. The Presiding Bishop announced that Title IV charges were presented against her a few days ago. A Bishop outside of the Episcopal Headquarters in New York has been assigned to work on this. Comments were made by a member of the House.
- B. The Presiding Bishop addressed the upcoming Presiding Bishop Election scheduled for General Convention 2015, noting that it is too soon to talk about who may or may not be running for election.
- C. The Presiding Bishop shared that no efforts have been made toward fund raising or announcing the holding of the Lambeth Conference 2018. Therefore the Presiding Bishop feels that there will not be a Lambeth Conference in 2018, and if there is it may be scheduled for 2019 or 2020.
- D. The Presiding Bishop noted that, outside of the unhappiness of those who have resigned from the board, the United Thank Offering (UTO) board is functioning well. The Presiding Bishop believes the recent difficulties are past. There is a memorandum of understanding that is working. The presenting issue was about lines of authority and oversight.
- E. Speaking about the Board for Transition Ministry, the Presiding Bishop noted that she and the Rt. Rev. Stacy Sauls met with the Chair of the Board and had a fruitful meeting. Work is underway on the development of a job description.
- F. The Presiding Bishop stated that in terms of the Diocese of South Carolina, legal efforts are continuing.

- G. After noting the current legal situation with the Diocese of South Carolina, the Presiding Bishop stated that the Continuing Episcopal Church in South Carolina is doing good work and is invigorated.
- H. The Presiding Bishop reminded the House that there are a number of investment vehicles around the church, including DFMS which charges no fee.

Informal Reports and Announcements

The Rt. Rev. Julio Holguin asked for a point of personal privilege, thanking the House for their support of the resolution regarding the Resolution for the Dominican Republic.

The Rt. Rev. Lawrence Provenzano asked for a point of personal privilege, reiterating the appeal of the Rt. Rev. Andrew Waldo that more time be allotted for a theological conversation regarding the work of the Task for on the Study of Marriage at either Taiwan in the Fall of 2014 or in our Spring meeting 2015.

The Presiding Bishops gave thanks for those Bishops who offered meditation during our time together. The Bishops were: The Rt. Rev. Lloyd Allen, the Rt. Rev. Mary D. Glasspool, The Rt. Rev.

Bishop Tobias addressed the House, grateful for his time with us and acknowledging the similarities between The Episcopal Church and the Iglesia Filipina Independiente. Bishop Tobias thanked the House on behalf of the Filipina people.

The Rt. Rev. James Tengatenga addressed the House, thanking the House and the Presiding Bishop's Office as well as the Diocese of Connecticut for the invitation to attend this meeting. He also thanked the House as well as The Episcopal Church for their support to the Bishop and his wife during this time of transition in their lives.

The Rt. Rev. Jonathan Hart addressed the House, noting the fun, joy and companionship he experienced during this time together. He went on to thank members of the House for their support of the work in the Diocese of Liberia. He noted the recent loss of the Primate of West Africa, and announced the election of a new Primate.

The Rt. Rev. David Rice, now Bishop of San Joaquin, addressed the House, noting that in the diocese he came from, one could not address the House without a self-introduction or a prayer. He stated his gratitude to the House.

The Presiding Bishop then thanked our chaplains the Rev. Cn. Stephanie Spellers, the Rev. Simon Bautista Betances, and Mr. Dent Davidson and for those who presided at worship. She also thanked our translators Dinorah Padro and Gabriela de Castro. The Rev. Canon Chuck Robertson and Ms. Ednice Baerga from the Presiding Bishop's staff as well as Ms. Neva Rae Fox from the Public Affairs Office were also thanked for their work. Applause followed by members of the House.

Whereas, Barbara C. Harris was born in the Diocese of Pennsylvania on June 12, 1930 and received her early Christian formation at St. Barnabas Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, and

Whereas, throughout her ministry as a lay leader, deacon, priest and bishop of the Church she has been a champion for racial justice and the rights of women and gay, lesbian and transgendered persons, an advocate for the poor, and an activist in environmental and anti-nuclear concerns, and

Whereas, she was elected Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Massachusetts on September 24, 1988 and was consecrated February 11, 1989 at Hynes Auditorium in Boston before a congregation of 8000 persons, thus making her the first woman bishop of the Episcopal Church and in the Anglican Communion, and

Whereas., she served admirably and faithfully in that ministry until she retired in 2003 exercising her special prophetic gifts as an African American woman "to guard the faith, unity and discipline of the Church; to ordain priests and deacons and to join in ordaining bishops; and to be in all things a faithful pastor and wholesome example for the entire flock of Christ and to share in the leadership of the Church throughout the world," and served as co-chair of the House of Bishops Committee on Racism which composed the House of Bishops Pastoral Letter on the Sin of Racism, and

Whereas, she "stood in the breach so others could pass over" thus paving the way for 19 more women to be consecrated bishops in The Episcopal Church and 15 others to be consecrated across the world-wide Anglican Communion, and

Whereas, upon her retirement the Diocese of Massachusetts established in her honor the Barbara C. Harris Camp and Conference Center, and

Whereas, she served four years as Assisting Bishop in the Diocese of Washington, DC, and

Whereas, over the years she has been a companion along the way and is considered a cherished colleague and dear friend to many in this House,

Bishop Waggoner MOVED that we accept the document, which was seconded. Discussion followed. The Rt. Rev. Dan Martins MOVED that we postpone action on this resolution to a time certain. That Motion and seconded, but FAILED. The original resolution was then APPROVED.

Pastoral Development Committee

APPOINTMENT OF INDEPENDENT COMMISSION

The Rt. Rev. Jim Waggoner then offered a resolution (Appendix C) on the appointment of an independent commission to explore the canonical, environmental, behavioral and procedural dimensions of matters involving the serious impairment of individuals serving as leaders in the Church. Bishop Waggoner MOVED the resolution, which was seconded. Discussion followed. The Rt. Rev. Tom Ely offered the following amendment to the resolution (line 5 after the phase SERVING AS LEADERS IN THE CHURCH): with special attention to issues including alcohol and substance abuse, which was MOVED and seconded. Discussion followed. The Rt. Rev. Mark Hollingsworth MOVED an amendment to this amendment, changing including alcohol to addiction which was seconded. Discussion followed. The amendment was APPROVED. With that amendment, the amended resolution continued to be discussed.

The Rt. Rev. Marian Budde moved that the House go into Executive Session, which seconded and was APPROVED.

The House came out of Executive Session and resumed discussion of the resolution. The Rt. Rev. Mark Andrus MOVED an amendment to the Resolution: Be it further resolved, that the commission make a report to the House of Bishops at the end of the commission's work. The amendment was seconded and discussion ensued.

The Rt. Rev. Gayle Harris MOVED an amendment to the amendment to bring the report to the whole church. This amendment was seconded. Discussion ensued, and the amendment FAILED. The original amendment was taken up again, and it FAILED.

The original resolution, with the amendment of Tom Ely and subsequent amendment by Mark Hollingsworth, was APPROVED.

Motion carried Resolution adopted with amendment

Special Commission

The Presiding Bishop then spoke to the House regarding, given the content of our meeting, whether or not the House would be willing to have a special commission appointment to author a special Pastoral Letter from the House on the Sin of Racism. Discussion ensued and the House supported this work with applause. Bishops interested in serving on this commission will contact the Presiding Bishop directly.

Ecclesiology Committee

The Rt. Rev. Pierre Whalon offered and MOVED a resolution (Appendix D) on behalf of the Ecclesiology Committee. After being seconded, discussion ensued. The Rt. Rev. Wayne Smith moved to postpone this resolution until a time certain. That motion was seconded and discussion ensued. The motion FAILED. Discussion of the original resolution resumed.

The Rt. Rev. Dan Martins MOVED an amendment to the resolution, which was seconded, to remove the last section: in order that it may be released to the wider church for study and further development.

The Rt. Rev. Allen Shin then moved to amend the amendment to read to receive the report for further study. This motion was APPROVED.

Discussion of the amended amendment ensued. The Amendment was APPROVED.

The Rt. Rev. Nick Knisley MOVED an amendment, so that the word DRAFT be inserted: the HOB receive a DRAFT report. This motion was seconded and APPROVED.

The Rt. Rev. Mark Hollingsworth MOVED an amendment, to remove by the House of Bishops. The motion was APPROVED.

The amended resolution, as amended, was again taken up. Discussion ensued. The resolution, as amended, was APPROVED.

Motion carried Resolution adopted with amendment

Support of the Church in Pakistan

The Rt. Rev. Andrew Waldo MOVED a statement in support of the Church in Pakistan (Appendix E). The resolution was seconded and APPROVED.

Motion carried Resolution adopted

It was MOVED and APPROVED that the reading of the minutes of the last meeting be dispensed with. The meeting was adjourned at 11:08 am.

General Convention 2015

Preamble for Commitment and Core Values

We, the Bishops of the Episcopal Church gathered in our March 2015 meeting, call ourselves to the leadership and agreements expressed below as we move forward in the mission of the Church.

We seek to be a mission-minded Church as an expression of our core values encompassed in the Great Commandment, calling us to be a community of love in which all can find their place.

The Experience of General Convention

We, as bishops in community, will designate a time each day in which to share our faith in meaningful conversation with each other. We desire to pause for prayer, spiritual reflection, and discernment during the work of Convention, especially when we are engaged in more difficult and challenging conversations and decisions.

We recognize the usefulness of a variety of action tools, including legislation, continuing conversation, and consensus. We ask that the convention determine the most timely and appropriate means of proceeding, recognizing the variety of tools available and the potential gain and consequence of each tool used. On sensitive issues, we will be willing to suspend the Rules of Order and go into discussion in smaller groups before proceeding.

We will be diligent in identifying those questions best served by technical response and those requiring adaptive work.

<u>Commitments in Preparation for Convention</u>

We will operate and speak from an experience of Communion within which we seek to discover the way forward in areas of disagreement.

We will encourage our deputations to be fully and broadly informed, to increase our capacity for deep listening (especially when engaged in difficult and discomforting debate and conversation), so that we, as a convention and people of faith, can make the best decisions available to us at this time in our life.

We recognize our unique responsibility to guard the faith, unity and discipline of the Church while at the same time reaffirming that the House of Deputies and House of Bishops share a mutuality of governance, representing the whole of our Church.

Appendix B

We commit to be in dialogue with bishops and deputies who speak from a perspective different from our own, and to pray for the whole of the conversation at convention. We encourage our deputies to seek such conversation and prayers.

We will follow the Policies for Social Media & Electronic Communications at House of Bishops Meetings and Gatherings.

Appendix C

APPENDIX C

Be it resolved, that the House of Bishops requests the Presiding Bishop appoint, in consultation with the President of the House of Deputies, an independent commission to explore the canonical, environmental, behavioral and procedural dimensions of matters involving the serious impairment of individuals serving as leaders in the Church, with special attention to issues of addiction and substance abuse. We request that appointments to this commission include individuals with professional or personal experience with varieties of impairment, members of Full-Communion partner churches, and members of this Church. We further request that a report of the commission's work include recommendations for both action and further review, as appropriate, in order to clarify lines of authority, to ensure mutual accountability, and to promote justice, well-being and safety within both the Church and the world; and

Be it further resolved, that the House of Bishops request the Executive Council Joint Standing Committee on Finances for Mission allocate sufficient funding from the 2015 budget for the work of the commission.

The House of Deputies Committee on Rules of Order presented its Report #1 on Resolution A152 (Adopt House of Deputies Proposed Rules of Order) and moved adoption with amendment.

[Ed. Note: The proposed texts have not been italicized for ease of reading.]

Original Text of Resolution:

(A152)

Resolved, That pursuant to Canon I.1.2, the House of Deputies hereby repeals its existing Rules of Order and adopts the attached Rules of Order, which are to remain in force until amended or repealed by the House.

PROPOSED RULES OF ORDER OF THE HOUSE OF DEPUTIES

I. Holy Scripture and Prayers

A. Placement of Holy Scripture 1. The President and Secretary will ensure that a copy of the Holy Scriptures is reverently displayed at all meetings of the House of Deputies.

B. Daily Prayers 1. The daily session of the House will begin with prayers. 2. The President may call for prayers at other times. 3. Any Deputy may ask the President to call for prayer at other times.

II. General Rules

- A. Duty of Deputies 1. Deputies will prepare for and give their attention to the business of the House.
- 2. Deputies will attend all sessions of the House unless excused by the President.
- B. Communication Devices 1. The President may allow Deputies to bring cell phones, computers, and other communication devices to the House, except as provided in these rules during closed sessions.
- 2. No talking on communications devices is allowed while the House is in session. 3. All communications devices will be set to the silent mode. 4. Deputies will respect those around them as they use such devices.

C. Distribution of Printed, Digital, and Other Materials 1. Only official reports, papers, and documents necessary for the business of the House may be distributed to the House, except with the approval of: I. the President; or ii. the House by a majority vote. 2. These rules apply to physical materials on the floor and digital materials distributed through official legislative software or devices.

D. Quorum 1. To transact business the Constitution, Article I Sec. 4, requires that: I. A majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in this House must have at least one clerical Deputy present; and ii. A majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in this House must have at least one lay Deputy present.

E. Minutes 1. The Minutes of the House will be kept by the Secretary or Assistant Secretaries and reviewed by the Committee on the Certification of Minutes. 2. The Committee on the Certification of Minutes will review, approve, and publish the final minutes for each day before the start of the next day's session. 3. The Committee on the Certification of Minutes will report its action at the next scheduled session. 4. The House may require that the Minutes for any session be approved by the House.

III. Deputations

A. Chair of Deputation 1. At least one year before the first legislative session of the General Convention, each Deputation will: I. designate a Chair; and ii. notify the Secretary of the House of Deputies the name of the Chair. 2. The Deputation Chair will: I. serve as the primary contact for House of Deputies communications; ii. certify the Deputation's vote by orders; iii. certify changes in the Deputation during General Convention; iv. perform other duties as directed by the President.

B. Certification of Alternate Deputies as Deputies 1. Alternate Deputies may not sit or vote with their Deputations, unless and until certified by the Committee on Credentials as a substitute for a Deputy.

2. The Committee on Credentials will certify Alternate Deputies as Deputies before each session. 3. The procedures for certification will be those determined by the Secretary of the House of Deputies.

4. An Alternate Deputy will serve as Deputy only until the Deputy they replace is able to resume their seats. 5. The Committee on Credentials will hear any disputes on certification of Deputies and will report their decision to the House.

IV. Floor Privileges and Arrangements

A. Floor Privileges. No one will be admitted to the floor except members, officers of the House, and:
1. the Secretary of the House of Deputies; 2. the Treasurer of the General Convention; 3. other persons authorized by the President or Secretary, to assist in the conduct of the business of the House; 4. other persons invited or authorized by the President.

- B. Seat and Voice. The following will have seat and voice on the floor of the House: 1. two ordained persons and two lay persons who are duly authorized representatives of the Episcopal Church in Liberia; 2. members of the Official Youth Presence; 3. other persons authorized by the Joint Rules, the Constitution, or Canons.
- C. Platform. Only officers of the House of Deputies, designated members of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, and other persons authorized or invited by the President may be on the platform of the House.
- D. Placement of Deputations and Others. Deputations will be seated together on the floor of the House in random order, except that: 1. Deputations with members serving on the platform may be seated near the platform; 2. Deputations requiring language interpretation or with other needs may be seated in proximity to one another; and 3. The President may seat deputations and others as necessary to assist in the business of the House.

E. Seating Adjacent to the Floor 1. The President and the Secretary will designate a visitor's gallery. 2. The President and Secretary may designate areas adjacent to the floor of the House of Deputies as seating for Alternate Deputies, members of Executive Council, and others.

F. Revocation of Floor Privileges 1. Any person, including members and officers, may be excluded for good cause from the floor of the House by a two-thirds vote. 2. Any motion to exclude must specify the length of time, up to the final adjournment, that the member is excluded from the Floor. 3. The motion may provide that the person discontinues serving as a member of a committee during the person's exclusion from the Floor.

V. Officers

A. President. The President of the House of Deputies will be elected in accordance with the Canons.

1. The President will preside over all meetings of the House, unless the President relinquishes the Chair for a temporary period.

2. If the President relinquishes the Chair: I. The Vice-President will preside; or ii. If the Vice-President is unable or unwilling to Preside, the President may appoint any Deputy to preside.

3. If the President has relinquished the Chair, the President may resume the Chair at any time.

B. Vice-President. The Vice-President of the House of Deputies will be elected in accordance with the Canons. 1. The Vice-President will preside over all meetings of the House in the absence of the President. 2. If the Vice-President is presiding and wishes to relinquish the Chair, the Vice-President may appoint any deputy to preside.

- C. Secretary and Assistant Secretaries. 1. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will be elected in accordance with the Canons. 2. The Secretary may appoint Assistant Secretaries.
- D. Parliamentarian 1. The President may appoint one or more Parliamentarians and Vice-Parliamentarians to advise the President or presiding officer on parliamentary procedure. 2. A Parliamentarian may be a member of the House or another person at the discretion of the President. 3. The Parliamentarian may address the House or any committee of the House at the direction of the President or presiding officer to facilitate the business of the House.
- E. Chaplain 1. The President may appoint one or more Chaplains to the House, who may, but need not be, members of the House. The President will specify the duties of the Chaplain.
- F. Sergeant-at-Arms 1. The President may appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms and necessary assistants. 2. The Sergeant-at-Arms and assistants may be members of the House or other persons at the discretion of the President. 3. The President will specify the duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms. Duties may include: I. locating chairs of legislative committees and escorting them to the platform; ii. escorting distinguished visitors and performing ceremonial duties; iii. maintaining order and decorum in the House; iv. ensuring that only authorized persons are seated on the floor during sessions of the House except when there is a Joint Session of both Houses; and v. ensuring that only authorized persons are present during Closed Sessions.

VI. Regular Session Schedule

A. Regular Order of Business 1. The Order of Business of each session of the House will be as follows, unless modified by the House in the schedule adopted by the House: I. Opening Prayer ii. Report of the Certification of the Minutes iii. Communications from the President iv. Report of Dispatch of Business v. Report on Elections vi. Committee Reports and Legislation 2. Order of Committee Reports. The Order of Legislation and Committee Reports will be determined as follows: I. The Committee on Dispatch will adopt and publish a daily legislative calendar the day before each legislative session; ii. During the time allotted for daily Committee Reports and Legislation, resolutions will be considered in the order on the published calendar. iii. Following the adjournment for the day, the Committee on Dispatch will update the calendar for the subsequent day and will modify the order of Committee Reports as necessary to consider high-priority legislation. iv. Once legislation is added to the Legislative Calendar, the legislation will remain on the Calendar unless removed or acted upon by the House.

B. Special Order of Business 1. Priority over regular business. If the House adopts a Special Order of Business, it will have priority over any other item of business, including any pending motions, reports, or resolutions. 2. Vote. A Special Order of Business requires a two-thirds vote to be adopted or amended. 3. Special Consideration of Business. The President, at any time no other Matter is being considered, may present any Matter to the House for its immediate consideration and action.

C. Consent Calendar 1. Business placed upon the Consent Calendar. A Consent Calendar will be maintained by the Secretary and voted upon once a day as the first legislative order of the day. 2. Publishing the Consent Calendar. I. The Consent Calendar must be published at least 24 hours before the beginning of the session at which the calendar is to be voted upon. ii. The Consent Calendar must be posted by the Secretary either: a) online; or b) at a preannounced place and distributed to the Deputies. 3. Placing items on the Consent Calendar. Every Committee Reports on Resolutions or Memorials will be placed on the Consent Calendar automatically unless: I. it is removed in accordance with these Rules; ii. the Rules of Order, the Joint Rules of Order, the Canons, or the Constitution require a different procedure for considering the item; iii. the item has been set by a Special Order of Business; or iv. the item is one of the following: a) a report from the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance; b) an election; c) a resolution of privilege or courtesy; d) the confirmation of the election of the Presiding Bishop. 4. Removing items from the Consent Calendar. An item may be removed from the Consent Calendar any time before the final vote on the Calendar by: I. the Legislative Committee proposing the action; ii. the Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business; iii. the proposer of the Resolution or Memorial; iv. any three deputies; v. the President of the House of Deputies. 5. Voting on the Consent Calendar. When voting on the Consent Calendar, the House will vote on all items at once. A majority vote is required to adopt the calendar. I. Affirmative Vote. A vote to adopt the Consent Calendar is a vote to take the action of the Committee recommendation for all items on the Consent Calendar. ii. A negative vote. If the House rejects the Consent Calendar, all items on the Consent Calendar will be placed on the Calendar of Business by the Committee on Dispatch.

VII. Resolutions and Memorials

A. Resolutions. Resolutions are matters by which the House or the General Convention speaks to a particular subject or matter, amends the Constitution or Canons, or expresses the mind of the House. B. Memorials 1. Memorials are statements about matters of great importance that urge General Convention to take action on a particular topic. 2. Memorials are referred to a legislative committee to inform the committee's work and deliberation. 3. A committee may propose a resolution in response to a memorial.

C. Form. A Resolution or Memorial will take the form prescribed by the Secretary.

D. Proposing. A Resolution or Memorial may be proposed by: 1. a Deputy, if: I. three other Deputies endorse the resolution; and ii. the Deputy proposes no more than three resolutions. 2. the President of the House of Deputies; 3. a House of Deputies Committee; 4. a Message from the House of Bishops; 5. a Diocese; 6. a Province; 7. a Standing Commission, Task Force, or body required to report to the General Convention; or 8. the Executive Council.

E. Submission Deadline. No Resolution or Memorial may be submitted to the House after the end of the second legislative day, unless it is: 1. a resolution of privilege or courtesy; 2. proposed by a House of Deputies Committee; 3. proposed by the President of the House of Deputies; 4. a Message from the House of Bishops; or 5. voted on by the House to consider it.

VIII. Legislative Committees

A. General Rules on Legislative Committees 1. Appointment and Creation I. No later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention, the President will appoint Legislative Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at General Convention. ii. The Legislative

Committees may include the following and any others that the President designates: a) Rules of Order. Reviews and proposes Resolutions to revise the rules that govern the House. b) Constitution & Canons. Receives and proposes Resolutions that propose amendments to the Constitution or Canons. c) Governance & Structure. Receives and proposes Resolutions that address the governance and structure of this Church including General Convention, Executive Council, and the Anglican Communion. d) World Mission. Receives and proposes Resolutions on mission personnel, world mission strategy, and covenant relationships with other Anglican Provinces or bodies. e) Social Justice & International Policy. Receives and proposes Resolutions on social justice issues in The Episcopal Church's extra-U.S. dioceses and the international peace and justice work of this Church, including engagement with the Anglican Communion. f) Social Justice & United States Policy. Receives and proposes Resolutions on social justice issues facing the United States, including its international engagement. g) Congregational Vitality. Receives and proposes Resolutions on the health, development, and redevelopment of congregations and faith communities, including church planting, college and university communities, and new and non-traditional contexts. h) Evangelism & Communications. Receives and proposes Resolutions on evangelism within this Church's jurisdictions; receives and proposes resolutions on communication strategies and technologies to strengthen the Church's communication of the Gospel and opportunities for information management and exchange within the Church. I) Prayer Book, Liturgy & Music. Receives and proposes Resolutions on the Book of Common Prayer, liturgy, and music of this Church. j) Formation & Education for Ministry. Receives and proposes Resolutions on Christian formation and education for all the baptized, and all matters related to ordained ministry. k) Church Pension Fund. Receives and proposes Resolutions on the purpose, scope, structure, and work of the Church Pension Fund including, but not limited to, pensions, disability, health insurance, other insurance and products for lay and ordained employees of the Church, insurance for Church institutions, and publishing. I) Stewardship & Development. Receives and proposes Resolutions on stewardship, stewardship education, development, and planned giving. m) Ecumenical & Interreligious Relations. Receives and proposes Resolutions on relations between this Church and other Churches, this Church and other religions, interchurch cooperation and unity, and interreligious dialogue and action. n) Environmental Stewardship & Care of Creation. Receives and proposes Resolutions on environmental stewardship and the care of creation. o) Confirmation of the Presiding Bishop. Receives the Report from the House of Bishops regarding the election of a Presiding Bishop, and recommends action regarding confirmation. iii. Special Legislative Committees. The President will appoint the following committees for the work of the House of Deputies at General Convention no later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention. These committees are not required to hold hearings under these Rules before taking any action. a) Dispatch of Business. Proposes the agenda for the House, determines the Calendar of the Day, proposes Special Orders of Business, and schedules elections. b) Certification of Minutes. Reviews the minutes of the previous legislative day, corrects the minutes, and reports on their completion to the House. c) Privilege & Courtesy. Receives and proposes Resolutions that commend individuals or organizations, and proposes Resolutions that express the House's appreciation for groups or persons. d) Credentials. Registers Deputies and reports on the number of voting members in the House of Deputies at each session and acts as tellers for elections. 2. Membership and Composition I. The President will determine the size of each Legislative Committee and appoint the members. ii. All members of Legislative Committees must be Deputies. iii. The President will be a member of all Legislative Committees, ex officio. iv. The President will seek to balance the committee members across the provinces of the Church, where feasible. 3. Committee Officers I. The President will appoint the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary of each Legislative Committee. ii. The President must appoint the officers of Legislative Committees no later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention. 4. Publication of Committee Appointments I. The designation of Legislative Committees,

the membership, and officers will be publicly available. ii. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will make the information about Legislative Committees known to the Church. 5. Role and Authority of Legislative Committees. Each Legislative Committee will have the following roles and responsibilities: I. Consider Resolutions, Memorials, and other matters referred to it for action or information. ii. Propose Resolutions and Memorials on subjects that have not been referred to it for action but which are within the scope of the description of their responsibilities in Rule VIII.A.1.ii or as assigned by the President. iii. Hold hearings. iv. Prepare reports and recommend actions on Resolutions, Memorials, and other matters referred to it. 6. Committee Meetings I. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will arrange a meeting space for each Legislative Committee. ii. The meeting location for each Legislative Committee will be made available to the House of Deputies and the public by the Secretary of the House of Deputies. iii. The President may direct any Legislative Committee to convene and consider matters referred to it prior to the time set for Legislative Committee meetings at the General Convention site by the Joint Standing Committee on Planning and Arrangements. Such meetings will be held electronically in a way that all members can hear all other members. iv. A meeting may be called by the Chair or by a majority of the members. v. In accordance with Canon V. 3.1, a quorum will be a majority of all the members. vi. Legislative Committees may, but are not required to, meet in cognate session with a House of Bishops Legislative Committee assigned to consider the same matter or matters. The House of Deputies Legislative Committee must always vote separately on the final action on any matter referred to it. vii. Only members of the Legislative Committee may speak during meetings, unless the Chair invites other persons to speak. viii. All meetings of Legislative Committees will be open to the public, unless the Committee votes to hold a closed meeting. ix. A Legislative Committee may hold a closed meeting upon a two-thirds vote of the members present. No final action on a matter referred to the Committee may be taken during a closed meeting. 7. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will keep (or cause) a record of: I. time and place of each meeting; ii. attendance of Committee members at each meeting; iii. resolutions and matters considered at each meeting and all actions taken on them; and iv. all other motions and actions of the Committee. 8. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will file the record of each Legislative Committee meeting with the Secretary of the House of Deputies at the conclusion of each meeting.

B. Legislative Committee Hearings 1. Hearings Required I. Legislative Committees must hold a hearing on every Resolution, Memorial, or other matter referred to it for action or prepared by it before taking final action. ii. Legislative Committees should try to schedule all Resolutions, Memorials, or other matters on the same subject for hearing at the same time. iii. Hearings may be held by Legislative Committees as early as two (2) days before the first legislative day of General Convention. 2. Notice of Hearings I. Before General Convention. A Legislative Committee may deliver a Notice of Hearing to the Secretary of the House of Deputies at any time more than seven (7) days before the first legislative day of General Convention. Upon receipt, the Notice of Hearing will be posted by the Secretary on the General Convention website. All hearings to be held two days before the first legislative day of General Convention must comply with this Rule. ii. During General Convention. For hearings to be held one day before the first legislative day of General Convention or thereafter during General Convention, a Legislative Committee will deliver the Notice of Hearing to the Secretary of the House of Deputies so that it can be posted by the Secretary on the General Convention website at least eight (8) hours before the hearing. For hearings scheduled before 10:00 a.m., the Notice of Hearing must be posted by the Secretary by 6:00 p.m. of the day before the hearing. iii. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will specify the form for the Notice of Hearing. 3. Testimony at Hearings I. Any person may testify before the Legislative Committee. ii. All persons who wish to testify before the Legislative Committee must register by signing a witness sheet. iii. A person testifying must identify himself or herself by name, status (Deputy, Bishop, or Visitor), Diocese, organization represented, if any, and the Resolution or matter on which they wish to testify.

iv. The Chair may limit the number of persons who may testify, set time limits, alternate pro and con, give preference to Deputies or other groups of persons, and otherwise regulate the hearing. 4. Record of Hearings I. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will keep (or cause) a record of: a) time and place of each hearing; b) attendance of Committee members at each hearing; c) Resolutions and matters considered at each hearing; and d) name and identifying information of each person testifying before the Legislative Committee and the Resolution or matter upon which each spoke. ii. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will file the record of each Legislative Committee hearing with the Secretary of the House of Deputies at the conclusion of each hearing. C. Legislative Committee Reports 1. Each Legislative Committee must take final action on every Resolution and other matter referred to it for action to recommend to the House that the House takes one of the following acts: I. adopt as proposed; ii. adopt as amended by the Legislative Committee; iii. adopt a substitute a) A substitute Resolution must be on the same subject as the Resolution referred to the Legislative Committee for action. b) A substitute Resolution may only cover one Resolution referred to the Legislative Committee for action. c) If the House declines to adopt a substitute, the original resolution will be automatically referred back to the Committee for additional consideration. iv. adopt a consolidated substitute a) A consolidated substitute Resolution must be on the same subject as the Resolutions referred to the Legislative Committee for action. b) Its report on the final action on that Resolution must identify all the other Resolutions the substitute is intended to cover. c) A vote by the Legislative Committee to recommend adoption of a consolidated substitute will be an automatic recommendation to take no action on all other Resolutions the consolidated substitute is intended to cover. d) If the House declines to adopt a consolidated substitute, the original resolutions will be automatically referred back to the Committee for additional consideration. v. reject vi. refer to a specified Standing Commission, General Convention Task Force, Executive Council or other body of the Church for study, action, or to make recommendations on the subject to the next General Convention vii. take no further action because a) the matter has already been dealt with by action of the House of Deputies at this meeting of General Convention; b) the matter is covered by a Resolution of a prior General Convention; c) for other reasons; viii. If the Resolution or matter has been acted on by the House of Bishops: a) concur with the action of the House of Bishops; b) concur as amended by the House of Deputies Legislative Committee; c) concur with substitute by the House of Deputies Legislative Committee; d) not concur and take a different action; e) not concur; ix. A House of Bishops Message to discharge will be treated as take no action. 2. Minority Report I. If there is a minority position on a final action on a Resolution or other matter and the minority requests to make a minority report to the House, the Chair will include the minority report in the Legislative Committee's report on the final action on the Resolution or other matter. ii. A minority position consists of at least one-quarter (1/4) of the members of the Legislative Committee present and voting on the Resolution, Memorial, or other matter.

IX. Other Committees

A. General Rules on Other Committees 1. Appointment and Creation I. The President may designate other Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at General Convention no later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention, except that Conference Committees will be appointed as needed. ii. The Committees may include the following and any others that the President designates: a) Resolution Review 1. The Resolution Review Committee will review all Resolutions submitted prior to General Convention to ensure that they are consistent with the polity of this Church, that they are in the form required by the canons, and to assess whether they have funding implications. 2. The Committee will prepare a report on each Resolution or Memorial and provide it to the chair of the Legislative Committee to which the Resolution or Memorial is referred for action. The Committee will continue the review process while General Convention is in session.

3. The Committee may draft or redraft any matter in the proper language upon referral by the President, Legislative Committee, Deputy, or the House. b) Legislative Aides 1. The President may appoint Legislative Aides to assist Legislative Committees in the conduct of business prior to and during General Convention. 2. Membership and Composition I. The President will determine the size of each other Committee and appoint the members. ii. Members of other Committees need not be Deputies. iii. The President will be a member of all other Committees, ex officio. 3. Committee Officers I. The President will appoint the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary of each other Committee. ii. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will make the information about other Committees known to the Church.

B. Committee Meetings 1. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will arrange a meeting space for each Committee. C. Conference Committees 1. Creation. A Conference Committee will be created by:

I. A vote by the House to refer legislation passed by the House of Bishops to a Conference Committee; or ii. When the House has concurred, with amendments, in action taken by the House of Bishops to concur with amendments on legislation passed by the House. 2. Appointment. The President will appoint all members of a Conference Committee from the House of Deputies. 3. Final Action. When a Committee of Conference has been formed, the final action upon the matter under consideration will be deferred until the Conference Committee has reported to this House.

X. Special Committees

A. The President may designate Special Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at or between sessions of the General Convention.

B. Membership and Composition 1. The President will determine the size of each Special Committee and appoint the members. 2. Members of Special Committees need not be Deputies. 3. The President will be a member of all Special Committees, *ex officio*.

C. Committee Officers 1. The President will appoint the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary of each Special Committee. 2. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will make the information about Special Committees known to the Church.

XI. Sessions of the House

A. Legislative Sessions 1. Purpose. A Legislative Session is a regular session of the House of Deputies where the House considers resolutions, hears reports from committees, and provides Deputies an opportunity to debate.

B. Special Order Sessions 1. Purpose. A Special Order Session is a session set by the House to consider a particular legislation, topic, or other matter under special rules for deliberation and debate. Sessions can be used to consider important or strategic matters in an informal manner for conversation and connection. 2. How Brought. A Special Order Session may be scheduled by a two-thirds vote of the House.

C. Closed Sessions 1. Purpose. A Closed Session has limited attendance and is used to discuss sensitive or pastoral matters. 2. How brought. The Deputies may vote to enter a Closed Session by a majority vote. 3. Who may attend. Only the following may attend a closed session: I. Deputies; ii. Officers of the House of Deputies; iii. persons given seat on the floor of the House; iv. other people authorized by the House; v. other people authorized by the President. 4. Special Rules regarding Closed Sessions I. Minutes will be kept by the Secretary for all Closed Sessions. Minutes taken during a Closed Session may only be reviewed and revealed in a Closed Session. ii. Personal Electronic Devices may not be used to communicate during the Closed Session. iii. Members are honor bound to keep the proceedings of a Closed Session confidential.

XII. Debate

A. Deputies may debate. 1. Any Deputy or person given seat and voice on the floor of the House may participate in debate, unless a rule of the House specifies otherwise.

B. Definitions 1. Debate. Debates are an opportunity for Deputies to engage in discussion on any matter. 2. Matter. A matter includes any Resolution, Memorial, motion, message from the House of Bishops, or Committee report that is presented to the House to consider and act upon.

C. Deputies may engage in debate on any matter except when: 1. debate has been ended by a vote of the House; 2. debate is not allowed due to a Rule of the House, a Joint Rule, a Canon, or the Constitution.

D. Time Limits 1. A total of 30 minutes is the maximum time allowed to debate on: I. any matter; and ii. all motions related to that matter. 2. If a person rises to speak during the first six minutes, no member may move the following unless no person seeks to debate on the matter: I. amend the motion or resolution; ii. move a substitute; iii. end debate. 3. During a Debate on any motion or matter, a member may: I. speak up to 2 minutes, or up to 4 minutes if translation is required, after being recognized by the Chair; ii. speak twice. 4. Debate will end following: I. a successful vote to end debate; ii. the end of the time allowed for debate by a Rule or Special Order; or iii. by the President if a) at least three people have spoken in favor of the matter and no one rises to speak against; or b) at least three people have spoken against the matter and no one rises to speak in favor; or c) no one rises to speak on the matter.

XIII. Motions

A. How Made 1. Motions may be made by any Deputy or other person authorized to make a motion by the Rules of the House; 2. A Deputy wishing to make a motion must: I. acknowledge their intent to make a motion in any queuing system; and ii. be recognized by the President or presiding officer.

B. Types of Motion. Any Deputy may make one of the following motions and no other motions may be made on the floor of the House: 1. Motions that affect the general business of the House: 1. Adjourn or Recess: a) Is used to end a session (adjourn) or take a short recess. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. No debate is allowed. 2. No amendments may be made. 3. A majority vote is required. ii. Adjourn and reconvene at a specific time: a) Is used to end a session and set a time to reconvene. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Debate is only allowed on the time. 2. Amendments are only allowed on the time. iii. Appeal the ruling of the President or presiding officer: a) Is used to appeal any decision of the President or presiding officer on any question of procedure; b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Debate is allowed. 2. Amendments are allowed. 3. A majority vote is required. iv. To Create a Special Order of Business or Change the Order of Business a) Is used to create a Special Order of Business that is not included in the Convention schedule or change an existing Order of Business. It may also include special rules to govern how the order is to be carried out. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Amendments are allowed. 2. Debate is allowed. 3. A twothirds vote is required. v. To Suspend the Rules a) Is used to suspend or modify the Rules of the House that interfere with a particular goal of the House. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Amendments are allowed. 2. Debate is allowed. 3. A two-thirds vote is required. 2. Motions that affect debate on a resolution or matter: I. End Debate and Vote Immediately: a) Is used to end the debate on a motion, resolution, report, or other action item and to force a vote on the motion. It is also sometimes known as "moving the previous question." b) Has the following characteristics: 1. May not be made on a Resolution and an amendment at the same time; 2. No debate is allowed; 3. A two-thirds majority vote is required. ii. Postpone Debating a Motion or Resolution Until a Specific Time a) Is used to postpone debating and considering a motion or Resolution until a certain time, after a certain time has elapsed, or after an event has occurred. It cannot be used to kill a motion. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Debate is allowed. 2. Amendments are allowed. 3. A majority vote is required. iii. To Recall from a Committee a) Is used to bring something out of a committee and

immediately to the floor of the House. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. May not be brought until the fourth legislative day. 2. Debate is allowed. 3. No amendments are allowed. 4. A two-thirds vote is required. 3. Motions that affect what is done with a matter: I. To refer back to the originating committee, a different committee, a Standing Commission, or other body a) Is used to refer a matter to a committee or group to study the Matter and report back suggested amendments or actions. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. May be debated. 2. May be amended as to the body referred. 3. A majority vote is required. ii. Take No Action a) Is used to stop considering a particular Resolution or Memorial and remove it from further consideration at the current meeting of the House. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Debate is allowed. 2. No amendments are allowed. 3. A majority vote is required. iii. To Amend or Substitute a) Is used to modify or change a Resolution or motion. This would include a technical change or a substantive change that would alter the meaning or the intent of a Resolution or motion. Amendments must be related to the item in the resolution or motion that they are trying to change. b) Secondary Amendments are: 1. proposed changes to an amendment. Secondary amendments must relate to the specific subject of an amendment and may not be used to alter other parts of a Resolution or parts not affected by an amendment. c) Has the following characteristics: 1. Debate is allowed. 2. Secondary amendments are allowed. 3. A majority vote is required. iv. To Divide the Matter a) Is used to divide a motion, Resolution, or Memorial into separate parts and vote separately. If the motion is easily divisible into separate subjects, it may be divided by the Chair at a request of a member. b) Process to use this motion: 1. First make the motion to divide the question and explain where the motion should be divided. 2. The Chair then rules on the motion and whether it is divisible or not. 3. If the Chair rules it is not divisible, any Deputy may appeal the ruling of the presiding officer. v. To Reconsider Something Previously Acted Upon a) Is used to reconsider a Matter which was previously voted upon by the House at the current meeting of the General Convention. b) Has the following characteristics: 1. Any deputy may move to reconsider a resolution. 2. No amendments are allowed. 3. Debate is allowed if the item being reconsidered is debatable. 4. A majority vote is required. 5. If the motion for reconsideration is adopted, the Resolution is restored to where it was immediately before the previous action being reconsidered was taken by the House.

XIV. Voting

A. Every member must vote when a matter is put to a vote.

B. The President may excuse a member from voting on a matter, if: 1. the member has a conflict of interest; or 2. for other good cause.

C. Vote necessary to adopt a matter. The amount of votes necessary to pass a measure is: 1. A majority vote consists of more than half of the votes. 2. A two-thirds vote consists of more than two-thirds of the votes. 3. A majority Vote by Orders consists of a more than half of the lay deputations and more than half of the clergy deputations.

D. Counting the votes. The amount necessary to pass a matter will be determined by those present and voting.

E. Procedure on a Vote by Orders. 1. Art. 1 Sec. 5 of the Constitution states that: I. the vote of each order, Clerical and Lay, will be counted separately and each order in each Diocese will have one vote; ii. to carry in the affirmative any question being voted on by orders requires concurrence in the affirmative by both orders; iii. concurrence in the affirmative by an order requires the affirmative vote in that order by a majority of the Dioceses present in that order unless a greater vote is required by the Constitution or by the Canons; iv. an affirmative vote of a Clerical or Lay order requires a majority of the Deputies present in that order in that Diocese. 2. No Vote. A no vote (i.e., not in the affirmative) occurs when the majority of a Clerical or a Lay deputation's vote is against a matter or is tied. 3. Two-Thirds Vote. If a motion under the Rules requires a two-thirds vote, and a Vote by Orders is called, the motion will pass if there is concurrence in the affirmative by both orders. 4. Counting.

The count on a Vote by Orders will be by either electronic or written means as required by the President or presiding officer. 5. Publishing the results. The results of all Votes by Orders will be posted promptly in a manner readily accessible to the House and the public and will include how each order in each diocese voted. 6. Polling. The vote of the individual Deputies of a Diocese must be stated and recorded when requested by a member of the Deputation.

XV. Elections

- A. Nominations 1. Nominations by any two Deputies are permitted before any election by the House. 2. Each nomination is submitted in writing, in a form adopted by the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations, to the Secretary, no later than the third legislative day. 3. There are no nominating speeches for any office or position, except for the President and Vice-President of the House.
- B. Voting Requirements 1. All elections will be by individual secret ballot, paper or electronic, except where there are no more nominees than open seats, in which case the vote may be by voice. 2. A majority vote is required to elect.
- C. Balloting Procedures 1. In all elections in which there are eight or fewer nominees, after the third ballot there will be only two more nominees than the number of vacancies to be filled on the ballot. After the fifth ballot, only one more nominee than the number of vacancies to be filled will be on the ballot. 2. In all elections in which there are more than eight nominees, after the third ballot there will be only four more nominees than the number of vacancies to be filled on the ballot. 3. After the fifth ballot, there will be only one more nominee than the number of vacancies to be filled on the ballot.

XVI. Confirmation of the Election of a Presiding Bishop

- A. When the President receives the name of the bishop elected by the House of Bishops, the President will refer the name to the Legislative Committee on the Confirmation of the Presiding Bishop.
- B. The Legislative Committee on the Confirmation of the Presiding Bishop will make a recommendation to the House on whether to confirm or not to confirm the choice of the House of Bishops.
- C. The House may choose to receive the Committee's report to the House in Closed Session.
- D. If the House chooses to receive the report in Closed Session, the House may continue in Closed Session for the purpose of debate.
- E. Following the end of debate, the House will move out of Closed Session. The Committee will repeat its recommendation, and the House will immediately vote on the recommendation.
- F. The House will vote by individual secret ballot, paper or electronic, unless a Vote by Orders is requested.

XVII. Parliamentary Authority

- A. The latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised will govern the interpretation of these Rules and Procedures to the extent that Robert's is not inconsistent with these rules.
- B. The Constitution, Canons, Joint Rules, and Rules of this House take precedence when there is a conflict with Robert's Rules of Order.

XVIII. Supremacy and In-Force Clause

- A. These Rules are subordinate to the Constitution, Canons, and Joint Rules of Order of the General Convention.
- B. These Rules remain in force at each meeting until amended, revoked, or replaced by the House.

XIX. Amendments to the Rules of Order

A. The House may amend these Rules at any time by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present.

B. The Legislative Committee on Rules of Order will consider all proposed amendments to the Rules and make recommendations to the House.

C. All amendments to these Rules take effect immediately unless expressly provided otherwise.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, That pursuant to Canon I.1.2, the House of Deputies hereby repeals its existing Rules of Order and adopts the attached Rules of Order, which are to remain in force until amended or repealed by the House.

[Ed. Note: The amended text has been treated as a substitute for the original proposal as the Committee's amendments did not follow standard form for showing changes.]

Proposed Rules of Order

- I. Holy Scripture and Prayers
 - A. Placement of Holy Scriptures
 - 1. The President and Secretary will ensure that a copy of the Holy Scriptures is reverently displayed at all meetings of the House of Deputies.
 - B. Daily Prayers
 - 1. The daily session of the House will begin with prayers.
 - 2. The President may call for prayers at other times.
 - 3. Any Deputy may ask the President to call for prayer at other times.
- II. General Rules
 - A. Duty of Deputies
 - 1. Deputies will prepare for and give their attention to the business of the House.
 - 2. Deputies will attend all sessions of the House unless excused by the President.
 - B. Communications Devices
 - 1. The President may allow Deputies to bring cell phones, computers, and other communication devices to the House, except as provided in these rules during closed sessions.
 - 2. No talking on communications devices is allowed while the House is in session.
 - 3. All communications devices will be set to the silent mode.
 - 4. Deputies will respect those around them as they use such devices.
 - C. Distribution of Printed, Digital, and Other Materials
 - Only official reports, papers, and documents necessary for the business of the House may be distributed to the House, except with the approval of:
 - i. the President; or
 - ii. the House by a majority vote.
 - 2. These rules apply to physical materials on the floor and digital materials distributed through official legislative software or devices.
 - D. Quorum
 - 1. To transact business the Constitution, Article I Sec. 4, requires:
 - i. A majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in this House must have at least one clerical Deputy present; and
 - ii. A majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in this House must have at least one lay Deputy present.
 - E. Minutes
 - 1. The Minutes of the House will be kept by the Secretary or Assistant Secretaries and reviewed by the Committee on the Certification of Minutes.

2. The Committee on the Certification of Minutes will review, approve, and publish the final Minutes for each day before the start of the next day's session.

- 3. The Committee on the Certification of Minutes will report its action at the next scheduled session.
- 4. The House may require that the Minutes for any session be approved by the House.

III. Deputations

A. Chair of Deputation

- 1. At least one year before the first legislative session of the General Convention, each Deputation will:
 - i. designate a Chair; and
 - ii. notify the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the name of the Chair.
- 2. The Deputation Chair will:
 - i. serve as the primary contact for House of Deputies communications;
 - ii. certify the Deputation's votes by orders;
 - iii. certify changes in the Deputation during General Convention;
 - iv. perform other duties as directed by the President.

B. Certification of Alternate Deputies as Deputies

- 1. Alternate Deputies may not sit or vote with their Deputations, unless and until certified by the Committee on Credentials as a substitute for a Deputy.
- 2. The Committee on Credentials will certify Alternate Deputies as Deputies before each session.
- 3. The procedures for certification will be those determined by the Secretary of the House of Deputies.
- 4. An Alternate Deputy will serve for one or more legislative sessions as Deputy but only until the Deputy for whom he or she substituted is able to resume their seats.
- 5. The Committee on Credentials will hear and decide any disputes on certification of Deputies and will report their decision to the House.

IV. Floor Privileges and Arrangements

- A. Floor Privileges. No one will be admitted to the floor except Deputies, officers of the House, and:
 - 1. the Treasurer of the General Convention;
 - 2. other persons authorized by the President or Secretary, to assist in the conduct of the business of the House;
 - 3. other persons invited or authorized by the President.
- B. Seat and Voice. The following will have seat and voice on the floor of the House:
 - two ordained persons and two lay persons who are duly authorized representatives of the Episcopal Church in Liberia;
 - 2. members of the Official Youth Presence;
 - 3. other persons authorized by the Joint Rules, the Constitution, or Canons.
- C. Platform. Only officers of the House of Deputies, designated members of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, and other persons authorized or invited by the President may be on the platform of the House.
- D. Placement of Deputations and Others. Deputations will be seated together on the floor of the House in random order, except that:
 - 1. Deputations with members serving on the platform may be seated near the platform;
 - 2. Deputations requiring language interpretation or with other needs may be seated in proximity to one another; and
 - 3. The President may seat deputations and others as necessary to assist in the business of the House.

- E. Seating Adjacent to the Floor
 - 1. The President and the Secretary will designate a visitor's gallery.
 - 2. The President and Secretary may designate areas adjacent to the floor of the House of Deputies as seating for Alternate Deputies, members of Executive Council, and others.
- F. Revocation of Floor Privileges
 - 1. Any person, including Deputies and officers, may be excluded for good cause from the floor of the House by a two-thirds vote.
 - 2. Any motion to exclude must specify the length of time, up to the final adjournment, that the person is excluded from the floor.
 - 3. The motion may provide that the person discontinues serving as a member of a committee during the person's exclusion from the floor.

V. Officers

- A. President. The President of the House of Deputies will be elected in accordance with the Canons.
 - 1. The President will preside over all meetings of the House, unless the President relinquishes the Chair for a temporary period.
 - 2. If the President relinquishes the Chair:
 - i. The Vice-President will preside; or
 - ii. If the Vice-President is unable or unwilling to Preside, the President may appoint any Deputy to preside.
 - 3. If the President has relinquished the Chair, the President may resume the Chair at any time.
- B. Vice-President. The Vice-President of the House of Deputies will be elected in accordance with the Canons.
 - 1. The Vice-President will preside over all meetings of the House in the absence of the President.
 - 2. If the Vice-President is presiding and wishes to relinquish the Chair, the Vice-President may appoint any Deputy to preside.
 - 3. If the Vice-President has relinquished the chair to a Deputy, the Vice-President may resume the chair at any time.
- C. Secretary and Assistant Secretaries.
 - 1. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will be elected in accordance with the Canons.
 - 2. The Secretary may appoint Assistant Secretaries with the confirmation of the House.
- D. Parliamentarian
 - 1. The President may appoint one or more Parliamentarians and Vice-Parliamentarians to advise the President or presiding officer on parliamentary procedure.
 - 2. A Parliamentarian may be a member of the House or another person at the discretion of the President.
 - 3. The Parliamentarian may address the House or any committee of the House at the direction of the President or presiding officer to facilitate the business of the House.
- E. Chaplain
 - 1. The President may appoint one or more Chaplains to the House, who may, but need not be, members of the House. The President will specify the duties of the Chaplain.
- F. Sergeant-at-Arms
 - 1. The President may appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms and necessary assistants.
 - 2. The Sergeant-at-Arms and assistants may be members of the House or other persons at the discretion of the President.
 - 3. The President will specify the duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms. Duties may include:
 - i. locating Chairs of legislative committees and escorting them to the platform;
 - ii. escorting distinguished visitors and performing ceremonial duties;
 - iii. maintaining order and decorum in the House;

iv. ensuring only authorized persons are seated on the floor during sessions of the House except when there is a Joint Session of both Houses; and

ensuring that only authorized persons are present during Closed Sessions.

VI. Regular Session Schedule

A. Regular Order of Business

- 1. The regular Order of Business of each session of the House will be as follows, unless modified by the House in the schedule adopted by the House:
 - i. Opening Prayer
 - ii. Report of the Certification of the Minutes
 - iii. Report from the Committee on Credentials
 - iv. Communications from the President
 - v. Messages from the House of Bishops
 - vi. Report of the Committee on the Dispatch of Business
 - vii. Report on Elections
 - viii. Committee Reports and Legislation
- Order of Committee Reports. The order of legislation and Committee Reports will be determined as follows:
 - i. The Committee on Dispatch will adopt and publish a daily legislative calendar the day before each legislative session;
 - ii. During the time allotted for daily Committee Reports and legislation, resolutions will be considered in the order on the published calendar.
 - iii. Following the adjournment for the day, the Committee on Dispatch will update the calendar for the subsequent day and modify the order of Committee Reports and legislation as necessary to consider high priority legislation.
 - iv. Once legislation is added to the Calendar, the legislation will remain on the Calendar unless removed or acted upon by the House.

B. Special Order of Business

- 1. Priority over regular business. If the House adopts a Special Order of Business, it will have priority over any other item of business, including any pending motions, reports, or resolutions.
- 2. Vote. A Special Order of Business requires a two-thirds vote to be adopted or amended.
- 3. Special Consideration of Business. The President at any time no other Matter is being considered, may present any Matter to the House for its immediate consideration and action.

C. Consent Calendar

- 1. Business placed upon the Consent Calendar. A Consent Calendar will be maintained by the Secretary and voted upon once a day as the first legislative order of the day.
- 2. Publishing the Consent Calendar.
 - i. The Consent Calendar must be published at least twenty-four hours before the beginning of the session at which the Consent Calendar is to be voted upon.
 - ii. The Consent Calendar must be posted by the Secretary either:
 - a. Online, to the General Convention web site; or
 - in hard copy, at a preannounced place and distributed to the Deputies.
- 3. Placing items on the Consent Calendar. Every Committee Reports on Resolutions or other matters will be placed on the Consent Calendar automatically unless:
 - i. the committee votes to exclude it from the Consent Calendar;
 - ii. it is removed in accordance with these Rules;
 - iii. the Rules of Order, the Joint Rules of Order, the Canons, or the Constitution require a different procedure for considering the item;
 - iv. the item has been set by a Special Order of Business; or

- v. the item is one of the following:
 - a. a report from the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance;
 - b. an election;
 - c. a resolution of privilege or courtesy;
 - d. the confirmation of the election of the Presiding Bishop.
- 4. Who may remove items from the Consent Calendar. An item may be removed from the Consent Calendar any time before the final vote on the Calendar by:
 - i. the Legislative Committee proposing the action;
 - ii. the Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business;
 - iii. the proposer of the Resolution or Memorial;
 - iv. any three Deputies;
 - v. the President of the House.
- 5. Procedure to remove items from the Consent Calendar: An item may be removed by:
 - i. providing notice to the Secretary; or
 - ii. announcement on the floor of the House.
- 6. Voting on the Consent Calendar. When voting on the Consent Calendar, the House will vote on all items at once. A majority vote is required to adopt the calendar.
 - i. Affirmative Vote. A vote to adopt the Consent Calendar is a vote to take the action recommended by the respective Legislative Committees for all items on the Consent Calendar
 - ii. A Negative Vote. If the House rejects the Consent Calendar, all items on the Consent Calendar will be placed on the Calendar by the Committee on Dispatch.

VII. Resolutions and Memorials

- A. Resolutions. Resolutions are matters by which the House or the General Convention speaks to a particular subject or concern, amends the Constitution or Canons, or expresses the mind of the House.
- B. Memorials
 - 1. Memorials are statements about matters of great importance that urge General Convention to take action on a particular topic.
 - 2. Memorials are referred to a legislative committee to inform the committee's work and deliberation.
 - 3. A committee may propose a resolution in response to a memorial.
- C. Form. A Resolution or Memorial will take the form prescribed by the Secretary.
- D. Proposing. A Resolution or Memorial may be proposed by:
 - 1. a Deputy, if:
 - i. two other Deputies endorse the Resolution or Memorial; and
 - ii. the Deputy proposes no more than a total of three Resolutions and three Memorials.
 - 2. the President of the House of Deputies;
 - 3. a House of Deputies Legislative Committee;
 - 4. a Message from the House of Bishops;
 - 5. a Diocese;
 - 6. a Province;
 - 7. a Standing Commission, Task Force, or body required to report to the General Convention; or
 - 8. the Executive Council.
- E. Submission Deadline. No Resolution or Memorial may be first submitted to the House after the end of the second legislative day, unless it is:
 - 1. a Resolution of privilege or courtesy;
 - 2. proposed by a House of Deputies Legislative Committee;

- 3. proposed by the President of the House of Deputies;
- 4. a Message from the House of Bishops; or
- voted on by the House to consider it.

VIII. Legislative Committees

- A. General Rules on Legislative Committees
 - 1. Appointment and Creation
 - i. No later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention, the President will appoint Legislative Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at General Convention.
 - ii. The Legislative Committees may include the following and any others that the President designates:
 - a. Rules of Order. Reviews and proposes Resolutions to revise the rules that govern the House.
 - b. Constitution & Canons. Receives and proposes Resolutions that propose amendments to the Constitution or Canons.
 - c. Governance & Structure. Receives and proposes Resolutions that address the governance and structure of the Church including General Convention, Executive Council, and the Anglican Communion.
 - d. World Mission. Receives and proposes Resolutions on mission personnel, world mission strategy, and covenant relationships with other Anglican Provinces or bodies.
 - e. Social Justice & International Policy. Receives and proposes Resolutions on social justice issues in the Church's extra-US dioceses and the international peace and justice work of the Church, including engagement with the Anglican Communion.
 - f. Social Justice & United States Policy. Receives and proposes Resolutions on social justice issues facing the United States, including its international engagement.
 - g. Congregational Vitality. Receives and proposes Resolutions on the health, development, and redevelopment of congregations and faith communities including church planting, college and university communities, and new and non-traditional contexts.
 - h. Evangelism & Communications. Receives and proposes Resolutions on evangelism within the Church's jurisdictions; receives and proposes Resolutions on communication strategies and technologies to strengthen the Church's communication of the Gospel and opportunities for information management and exchange within the Church.
 - i. Prayer Book, Liturgy & Music. Receives and proposes Resolutions on the Book of Common Prayer, liturgy, and music of this Church.
 - j. Formation & Education for Ministry. Receives and proposes Resolutions on Christian formation and education for all the baptized, and all matters related to ordained ministry.
 - k. Church Pension Fund. Receives and proposes Resolutions on the purpose, scope, structure, and work of the Church Pension Fund including, but not limited to, pensions, disability, health insurance, other insurance and products for lay and ordained employees of the Church, insurance for Church institutions, and publishing.
 - I. Stewardship & Development. Receives and proposes Resolutions on stewardship, stewardship education, development, and planned giving.

m. Ecumenical & Interreligious Relations. Receives and proposes Resolutions on relations between the Church and other Churches, the Church and other religions, interchurch cooperation and unity, and interreligious dialogue and action.

- n. Environmental Stewardship & Care of Creation. Receives and proposes Resolutions on environmental stewardship and the care of creation.
- o. Confirmation of the Presiding Bishop. Receives the Report from the House of Bishops regarding the election of a Presiding Bishop, and recommends action regarding confirmation.
- iii. Special Legislative Committees. The President will appoint the following Special Legislative Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at General Convention no later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention. These committees are not required to hold hearings under these Rules before taking any action.
 - a. Dispatch of Business. Proposes the agenda for the House, determines the Calendar of the Day, proposes Special Orders of Business, and schedules elections.
 - b. Certification of Minutes. Reviews the Minutes of the previous legislative day, corrects the Minutes and reports on their completion to the House.
 - c. Privilege & Courtesy. Receives and proposes Resolutions that commend individuals or organizations and proposes Resolutions that express the House's appreciation for groups or persons.
 - d. Credentials. Registers Deputies and reports on the number of voting members in the House of Deputies at each session and acts as tellers for elections.
- 2. Membership and Composition
 - i. The President will determine the size of each Legislative Committee and appoint the members.
 - ii. All members of Legislative Committees must be Deputies.
 - iii. The President is a member of all Legislative Committees, ex officio.
 - iv. The President will seek to balance the committee members across the provinces of the Church, where feasible.
- 3. Committee Officers and Assistants
 - i. The President will appoint the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary, of each Legislative Committee.
 - ii. The President must appoint the officers of Legislative Committees no later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention.
 - iii. The President may appoint Legislative Aides to assist Legislative Committees in the conduct of business prior to and during General Convention.
- 4. Publication of Committee Appointments
 - i. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will make the information about Legislative Committees known to the Church.
- 5. Role and Authority of Legislative Committees. Each Legislative Committee will have the following roles and responsibilities:
 - i. Consider Resolutions, Memorials, and other matters referred to it for action or information.
 - ii. Propose Resolutions on subjects that have not been referred to it for action but which are within the scope of the description of their responsibilities in Rule VIII.A.1.ii or as assigned by the President.
 - iii. Hold hearings.

iv. Prepare reports and recommend actions on Resolutions, Memorials, and other matters referred to it.

6. Committee Meetings

- i. The Secretary of the House will arrange a meeting space for each Legislative Committee.
- ii. The meeting location for each Legislative Committee will be made available to the House and the public by the Secretary of the House.
- iii. The President may direct any Legislative Committee to convene and consider matters referred to it prior to the time set for legislative committee meetings at the General Convention site by the Joint Standing Committee on Planning and Arrangements. Such meetings may be held electronically in a way that all members can hear all other members.
- iv. A meeting may be called by the Chair or by a majority of the members.
- v. In accordance with Canon V.3.1 a quorum will be a majority of all the members.
- vi. Legislative Committees may, but are not required to, meet with a parallel House of Bishops Legislative Committee assigned to consider the same matter or matters. The House of Deputies Legislative Committee must always vote separately on the final action on any matter referred to it.
- vii. Only members of the Legislative Committee may speak during meetings, unless the Chair invites other persons to speak.
- viii. All meetings of Legislative Committees will be open to the public unless the Committee votes to hold a closed meeting.
- ix. A Legislative Committee may hold a closed meeting upon a two-thirds vote of the members present. Any motion to enter a closed session must specify the topic to be discussed. No final action on a matter referred to the Committee may be taken during a closed meeting.
- x. Before entering a closed session to discuss a resolution, the Committee must first hold a public hearing on the resolution.
- 7. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will keep (or cause to be kept) a record of:
 - i. time and place of each meeting;
 - ii. attendance of Committee members at each meeting;
 - iii. Resolutions and other matters considered at each meeting and all actions taken on them: and
 - iv. all other motions and actions of the Committee.
- 8. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will file the record of each Legislative Committee meeting with the Secretary of the House. The record will be delivered by the deadline set by the Secretary of the House.

B. Legislative Committee Hearings

- 1. Hearings Required
 - i. Legislative Committees must hold a hearing on every Resolution, Memorial, and other matter referred to them for action or proposed by them before taking final action.
 - ii. Legislative Committees should try to schedule all Resolutions, Memorials, or other matters on the same subject for hearing at the same time.
 - iii. Hearings may be held by Legislative Committees as early as two (2) days before the first legislative day of General Convention.
- 2. Notice of Hearings
 - i. Two Days before the First Legislative Day. For hearings to be held two days prior to the first legislative day of General Convention, a Legislative Committee will deliver a Notice of Hearing to the Secretary of the House of Deputies at least

- seven (7) days before the hearing. Upon receipt the Notice of Hearing will be posted by the Secretary on the General Convention website.
- ii. During General Convention and One Day before the First Legislative Day. For hearings to be during or not more than one day before the first legislative day of General Convention, a Legislative Committee will deliver the Notice of Hearing to the Secretary of the House of Deputies so that it can be posted by the Secretary on the General Convention website at least eight (8) hours before the hearing. For hearings scheduled before 10:00 a.m., the Notice of Hearing must be posted by the Secretary by 6:00 p.m. of the day before the hearing.
- iii. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will specify the form for the Notice of Hearing.

3. Testimony at Hearings

- i. Any person may testify at a hearing before the Legislative Committee.
- ii. All persons who wish to testify at a hearing before the Legislative Committee must register by signing a witness sheet.
- iii. Persons testifying must identify themselves by name, status (Deputy, Bishop, Alternate, or Visitor), Diocese, organization represented, if any, and the Resolution or matter on which they wish to testify.
- iv. The Chair may limit the number of persons who may testify, set time limits, alternate pro and con, give preference to Deputies or other groups of persons and otherwise regulate the hearing.

4. Record of Hearings.

- i. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will keep (or cause to be kept) a record of the:
 - a. time and place of each hearing;
 - b. attendance of Committee members at each hearing;
 - c. Resolutions and other matters considered at each hearing; and
 - d. name and identifying information of each person testifying before the Legislative Committee and the Resolution or matter upon which each spoke.
- ii. The Secretary of the Legislative Committee will file the record of each Legislative Committee hearing with the Secretary of the House at the conclusion of each hearing.

C. Legislative Committee Reports

- 1. Each Legislative Committee must take final action on every Resolution and other matter referred to it for action to recommend that the House takes one of the following actions:
 - i. adopt as proposed;
 - ii. adopt as amended by the Committee. All amendments made by a Committee will apply automatically to the Resolution and the matter before the House when the resolution is considered will be the Resolution as amended by the Committee;
 - iii. adopt a substitute Resolution.
 - a. A substitute Resolution must be on the same subject as the Resolution referred to the Legislative Committee for action.
 - b. A substitute Resolution may only cover one Resolution referred to the Legislative Committee for action.
 - c. If the House declines to adopt a substitute, the original resolution will be automatically referred back to the Committee for additional consideration.
 - iv. adopt a consolidated substitute Resolution.
 - a. A consolidated substitute Resolution must be on the same subject as the Resolutions referred to the Legislative Committee for action.

- b. Its report on the final action on that Resolution must identify all the other Resolutions the substitute is intended to cover.
- c. A vote by the Legislative Committee to recommend adoption of a consolidated substitute Resolution will be an automatic recommendation to take no further action on all other Resolutions the consolidated substitute Resolution is intended to cover.
- d. If the House declines to adopt a consolidated substitute Resolution, the original Resolutions will be automatically referred back to the Committee for additional consideration.
- v. reject
- vi. refer to a specified Standing Commission, General Convention Task Force, Executive Council or other body of the Church for study, action, or to make recommendations on the subject to the next General Convention
- vii. take no further action because
 - a. the matter has already been dealt with by action of the House of Deputies at this meeting of General Convention;
 - b. the matter is covered by a Resolution of a prior General Convention;
 - c. for other reasons;
- viii. If the Resolution or matter has been acted on by the House of Bishops:
 - a. concur with the action of the House of Bishops;
 - b. concur as proposed to be amended by the House of Deputies Legislative Committee;
 - c. concur with substitute as proposed by the House of Deputies Legislative Committee;
 - d. not concur and take a different action;
 - e. not concur;
- ix. A House of Bishops Message to discharge will be treated as take no further action.
- 2. Minority Report
 - i. If there is a minority position on a final action on a Resolution or other matter and the minority requests to make a minority report to the House, the Chair will include the minority report in the Legislative Committee's report on the final action on the Resolution or other matter.
 - ii. A minority position consists of at least one-quarter (1/4) of the members of the Legislative Committee present and voting on the Resolution, Memorial, or other matter.

IX. Other Committees

- A. General Rules on Other Committees
 - . Appointment and Creation
 - i. The President may designate other Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at General Convention no later than 90 days before the first legislative day of General Convention except that Conference Committees will be appointed during General Convention as needed.
 - ii. The Committees may include the following and any others that the President designates:
 - a. Resolution Review
 - The Resolution Review Committee will review all Resolutions submitted prior to General Convention to review that they are consistent with the polity of this Church, that they are in the form required by the canons, and to assess whether they have funding implications.

- 2. The Committee will prepare an advisory report on each Resolution and provide it to the chair of the Legislative Committee to which the Resolution is referred for action. The Committee will continue the review process while General Convention is in session.
- 3. The Committee may draft or redraft any matter in the proper language upon request by the President, a Legislative Committee, a Deputy, or the House.

2. Membership and Composition

- i. The President will determine the size of each other Committee and appoint the members.
- ii. Members of other Committees need not be Deputies.
- iii. The President is a member of all other Committees, ex officio.

3. Committee Officers

- i. The President will appoint the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary, of each other Committee.
- ii. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will make the information about other Committees known to the Church.

B. Committee Meetings

1. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will arrange a meeting space for each Committee.

C. Conference Committees

- 1. Creation. A Conference Committee will be created:
 - a. By a vote by the House to refer legislation passed by the House of Bishops to a Conference Committee; or
 - b. When the House of Bishops has concurred, with amendment, on the legislation already acted on by the House, and the House does not concur with the House of Bishops' amendment.
- 2. Appointment. The President will appoint a Chair and all members of a Conference Committee from the House of Deputies.
- 3. Final Action. When a Committee of Conference has been formed, the final action upon the matter under consideration will be deferred until the Conference Committee has reported to this House.

X. Special Committees

- A. The President may designate Special Committees for the work of the House of Deputies at or between sessions of the General Convention.
- B. Membership and Composition
 - 1. The President will determine the size of each Special Committee and appoint the members.
 - 2. Members of Special Committees need not be Deputies.
 - 3. The President will be a member of all Special Committees, ex officio.

C. Committee Officers

- 1. The President will appoint the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary, of each Special Committee.
- 2. The Secretary of the House of Deputies will make the information about Special Committees known to the Church.

XI. Sessions of the House

A. Legislative Sessions

1. Purpose. A Legislative Session is a regular session of the House of Deputies where the House considers Resolutions, hears reports from committees, and provides Deputies an opportunity to debate.

B. Special Order Sessions

- Purpose. A Special Order Session is a session set by the House to consider a particular Resolution or other matter under special rules for deliberation and debate. Sessions can be used to consider important or strategic matters in an informal manner for conversation and connection.
- 2. How Brought. A Special Order Session may be scheduled by a two-thirds vote of the House.

C. Closed Sessions

- 1. Purpose. A closed session of the House has limited attendance and is used to discuss sensitive or pastoral matters. No action may be taken by the House in a closed session.
- 2. How brought. The Deputies may vote to enter a closed session by a majority vote.
- 3. Who may attend. Only the following may attend a closed session:
 - i. Deputies;
 - ii. Officers of the House of Deputies;
 - iii. persons given seat on the floor of the House;
 - iv. other persons authorized by the House;
 - v. other persons authorized by the President.
- 4. Special Rules regarding Closed Sessions
 - . Minutes will be kept by the Secretary for all Closed Sessions. Minutes taken during an closed session may only be reviewed and revealed in a closed session.
 - ii. Personal electronic devices may not be used to communicate or record during a closed session.
 - iii. Members are honor bound to keep the proceedings of a closed session confidential

XII. Debate

- A. Deputies may debate.
 - 1. Any Deputy or person given seat and voice on the floor of the House may participate in debate, unless a Rule of the House specifies otherwise.
 - 2. Any Deputy or person participating in debate will provide their name and the Diocese they represent.

B. Definitions

- 1. Debate. Debates are an opportunity for Deputies to engage in discussion on any matter.
- 2. Matter. A matter includes any Resolution, Memorial, motion, message from the House of Bishops, or Committee report, that is presented to the House to consider and act upon.
- C. Deputies may engage in debate on any matter except when:
 - 1. debate has been ended by a vote of the House;
 - 2. debate is not allowed due to a Rule of the House, a Joint Rule, a Canon, or the Constitution.

D. Time Limits

- 1. A total of 30 minutes is the maximum time allowed to debate on:
 - i. any matter; and
 - ii. all motions related to that matter.
- 2. If a person rises to speak during the first six minutes of debate on a matter, no member may move the following unless no person seeks to debate on the matter:
 - i. amend the motion or resolution;
 - ii. move a substitute;
 - iii. end debate.

- 3. During a Debate on any motion or other matter, a member may:
 - i. speak up to two (2) minutes, or up to four (4) minutes if translation is required, after being recognized by the Chair;
 - ii. speak twice.
- 4. Debate will end following:
 - i. a successful vote to end debate;
 - ii. the end of the time allowed for debate by a Rule or Special Order; or
 - iii. by ruling of the President if
 - a. at least three Deputies have spoken in favor of the matter and no one rises to speak against it; or
 - b. at least three Deputies have spoken against the matter and no one rises to speak in favor of it; or
 - c. no one rises to speak on the matter.

XIII. Motions

- A. How Made
 - 1. Motions may be made by any Deputy or other person authorized to make a motion by the Rules of the House;
 - 2. A Deputy wishing to make a motion must:
 - i. provide their name and the Diocese they represent.
 - ii. acknowledge his or her intent to make a motion in any queuing system; and
 - iii. be recognized by the President or presiding officer.
- B. Types of Motion. Any Deputy may make one of the following motions and no other motions may be made on the floor of the House, except as otherwise provided by these Rules:
 - 1. Motions that affect the general business of the House:
 - i. Adjourn or Recess:
 - a. Is used to end (adjourn) a session or take a short recess.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. No debate is allowed.
 - 2. No amendments may be made.
 - 3. A majority vote is required.
 - ii. Adjourn and reconvene at a specific time:
 - a. Is used to end a session and set a time to reconvene.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - Debate is only allowed on the time.
 - 2. Amendments are only allowed on the time.
 - iii. Appeal the ruling of the President or presiding officer:
 - a. Is used to appeal any decision of the President or presiding officer on any question of procedure;
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. Debate is allowed.
 - 2. Amendments are not allowed.
 - 3. A majority vote is required.
 - 4. Must be made immediately after the Presiding Officer's ruling.
 - iv. To Create a Special Order of Business or Change the Order of Business
 - a. Is used to create a Special Order of Business that is not included in the Convention schedule or change an existing Order of Business. It may also include special rules to govern how the order is to be carried out.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. Amendments are allowed.
 - 2. Debate is allowed.
 - 3. A two-thirds vote is required.

- v. To Suspend the Rules
 - a. Is used to suspend or modify the Rules of the House that interfere with a particular goal of the House.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. Amendments are allowed.
 - 2. Debate is allowed.
 - 3. A two-thirds vote is required.
- 2. Motions that affect debate on a Resolution or other matter:
 - i. End Debate and Vote Immediately:
 - a. Is used to end the debate on a motion, Resolution, report, or other action item and force a vote. It is also sometimes known as "moving the previous question."
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. Affects only the matter being debated.
 - 2. No debate is allowed;
 - 3. A two-thirds majority vote is required.
 - ii. Postpone Debating a Motion or Resolution until a Specific Time
 - a. Is used to postpone debating and considering a motion or Resolution until a certain time, after a certain time has elapsed, or after an event has occurred. It cannot be used to postpone action until after General Convention has adjourned.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - Debate is allowed.
 - 2. Amendments are allowed.
 - 3. A majority vote is required.
 - iii. To Recall from a Committee
 - a. Is used to bring something out of a legislative committee and immediately to the floor of the House.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. May not be brought until the fourth legislative day.
 - 2. Debate is allowed.
 - 3. No amendments are allowed.
 - A two-thirds vote is required.
- 3. Motions that affect what is done with a matter.
 - To Refer to Back to the Originating Committee, a Different Committee, a Standing Commission, or Other Body
 - a. Is used to refer a matter to a legislative committee or group to study the matter and report back suggested amendments or actions.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. May be debated.
 - 2. May be amended as to the body referred.
 - 3. A majority vote is required.
 - ii. Take No Further Action
 - a. Is used to stop considering a particular Resolution or Memorial and remove it from further consideration at the current meeting of the House.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. Debate is allowed.
 - 2. No amendments are allowed.
 - 3. A majority vote is required.

iii. To Amend or Substitute

- a. Is used to modify or change a Resolution or motion. This would include a technical change or a substantive change that would alter the meaning or the intent of a Resolution or motion. Amendments must be related to the item in the resolution or motion that they are trying to change.
- b. Secondary Amendments are:
 - 1. proposed changes to an amendment. Secondary Amendments must relate to the specific subject of an amendment and may not be used to alter other parts of a Resolution or parts not affected by an amendment.
- c. Has the following characteristics:
 - Debate is allowed.
 - 2. Only Secondary Amendments are allowed.
 - 3. A majority vote is required.
- iv. To Divide the Matter
 - a. Is used to divide a matter, Resolution into separate parts and vote separately. If the matter is easily divisible into separate subjects, it may be divided by the Chair at a request of a member.
 - b. Process to use this matter:
 - 1. First make the request to divide the question and explain where the question should be divided.
 - 2. The President then rules on whether the question is divisible or not.
 - 3. If the question is divisible, the House proceeds to debate and act on the divided parts of the question.
 - 4. If the President rules the question is not divisible, any Deputy may appeal the ruling.
- v. To Reconsider Something Previously Acted Upon
 - Is used to reconsider a Matter which was previously voted upon by the House at the current meeting of the General Convention.
 - b. Has the following characteristics:
 - 1. Any Deputy may move to reconsider a Matter.
 - 2. No amendments are allowed.
 - 3. Debate is allowed if the Matter being reconsidered is debatable.
 - 4. A majority vote is required.
 - 5. A Matter may only be reconsidered once.
 - 6. If the motion for reconsideration is adopted, the Resolution is restored to where it was immediately before the previous action being reconsidered was taken by the House.

XIV. Voting

- A. Every Deputy must vote when a matter is put to a vote.
- B. The President may excuse a Deputy from voting on a matter, if:
 - 1. the Deputy has a conflict of interest; or
 - 2. for other good cause.
- C. Vote necessary to adopt a matter. The amount of votes necessary to pass a Resolution or other matter is;
 - 1. A majority vote consists of more than half of the votes.
 - 2. A two-thirds vote consists of at least two-thirds of the votes.
 - 3. A majority Vote by Orders consists of a more than half of the lay deputations and more than half of the clergy deputations.
- D. Counting the votes. The amount necessary to pass a matter will be determined by those present and voting.

E. Vote by Orders under Art. 1 Sec 5 of the Constitution.

Procedure:

- i. A vote by Orders will be taken on any matter at the request of the clerical or lay deputations of at least three separate dioceses or as required by the Constitution or Canons;
- ii. the vote of each order, Clerical and Lay, will be counted separately and each order in each Diocese will have one vote;
- iii. to carry in the affirmative any question being voted on by orders requires concurrence in the affirmative by both orders;
- iv. concurrence in the affirmative by an order requires the affirmative vote in that order by a majority of the Dioceses present in that order unless a greater vote is required by the Constitution or by the Canons;
- v. an affirmative vote of a Clerical or Lay order requires a majority of the Deputies present in that order in that Diocese.
- 2. No Vote. A no vote (i.e., not in the affirmative) occurs when the majority of a Clerical or a Lay deputation's vote is against a matter or is tied.
- 3. Two-Thirds Vote. If a motion under the Rules requires a two-thirds vote, and a Vote by Orders is duly called, the motion will pass if there is concurrence in the affirmative by a two-thirds vote in both orders.
- 4. Counting. The count on a Vote by Orders will be by either electronic and/or written means as required by the President or presiding officer.
- 5. Publishing the results. The results of all Votes by Orders will be posted promptly in a manner that is readily accessible to the House and the public and includes how each order in each diocese voted.
- 6. Polling. The vote of the individual Deputies of a Diocese must be stated and recorded when requested by a member of the Deputation.

XV. Elections

A. Nominations

- 1. Nominations by any two Deputies are permitted before any election by the House.
- 2. Each nomination is submitted in writing, in a form adopted by the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations, to the Secretary, no later than the third legislative day.
- 3. There are no nominating speeches for any office or position, except for the President and Vice-President of the House.

B. Voting Requirements

- 1. All elections will be by individual secret ballot, paper or electronic, except where there are no more nominees than open seats, in which case the vote may be by voice.
- 2. A majority vote is required to elect.

C. Balloting Procedures

- In all elections in which there are eight or fewer nominees, after the third ballot there will be only two more nominees than the number of vacancies to be filled on the ballot. After the fifth ballot only one more nominee than the number of vacancies to be filled will be on the ballot.
- 2. In all elections in which there are more than eight nominees, after the third ballot there will be only four more nominees than the number of vacancies to be filled on the ballot.
- 3. After the fifth ballot there will be only one more nominee than the number of vacancies to be filled on the ballot.

XVI. Confirmation of the Election of a Presiding Bishop

A. When the President receives the name of the bishop elected by the House of Bishops to serve as Presiding Bishop, the President will refer the name to the Legislative Committee on the Confirmation of the Presiding Bishop.

B. The Legislative Committee on the Confirmation of the Presiding Bishop will make a recommendation to the House on whether to confirm or not to confirm the choice of the House of Bishops.

- C. The House may choose to receive the Committee's report to the House in a closed session.
- D. If the House chooses to receive the report in a closed session, the House may continue in a closed session for the purpose of debate.
- E. Following the end of debate, the House will move out of a closed session. The Committee will repeat its recommendation and the House will immediately vote on the recommendation.
- F. The House will vote by individual secret ballot, paper or electronic, unless a Vote by Orders is requested.
- G. A majority vote is required to confirm.

XVII. Parliamentary Authority

- A. The latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised will govern the interpretation of these Rules and Procedures to the extent that Roberts is not inconsistent with these Rules.
- B. The Constitution, Canons, Joint Rules, and Rules of this House take precedence when there is a conflict with Robert's Rules of Order.

XVIII Supremacy and In Force Clause

- A. These Rules are subordinate to the Constitution, Canons, and Joint Rules of Order of the General Convention.
 - B. These Rules remain in force at each meeting until amended, revoked, or replaced by the House.

XIX. Amendments to the Rules of Order

- A. The House may amend these Rules at any time by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- B. The Legislative Committee on Rules of Order will consider all proposed amendments to the Rules and make recommendations to the House.
- C. All amendments to these Rules take effect immediately unless expressly provided otherwise.

Following the committee's report, the House entered the 20-minute session of inquiry directed to the Committee on Rules of Order.

Following the expiration of the 20-minute session, Deputy Ambos of New Jersey moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

Insert the following at XII.D.3:

Following a vote on any amendment to a motion or resolution, if a person rises to move a further amendment, they shall be heard prior to a resumption of debate or to a motion to end debate.

A vote was taken on the amendment.

Motion defeated Amendment defeated

Deputy Snow of Oregon moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

Amend VI.C.6 to read:

6. Voting on the Consent Calendar. When voting on the Consent Calendar, the House will vote on <u>all items at once. each resolution.</u> A majority vote is required to adopt <u>the calendar the resolution.</u>

A vote was taken on the amendment.

Motion defeated Amendment defeated

Deputy Parker of Oregon moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

Insert the following into XII.D:

5. No applause shall be permitted during any session of the House, unless authorized by the Presiding Officer.

A vote was taken on the amendment.

Motion defeated Amendment defeated

Deputy Garner of Alabama moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

Amend VIII.B.2.ii to read:

For hearings scheduled before 10:00 a.m., the Notice of Hearing must be posted by the Secretary by 6:00 10:00 p.m. of the day before the hearing.

A vote was taken on the amendment.

Motion defeated Amendment defeated

A vote was taken on Resolution A152. The President noted that this resolution takes a two-thirds majority to adopt and called upon the Voting Secretary to take the ballot by electronic vote.

Motion carried Resolution adopted with amendment

Sharonda Coleman-Singleton, Tywanza Sanders, Susie Jackson, and Ethel Lance, who were slain in a racist act of violence. As our hearts go out to them, The Episcopal Church stands in solidarity with the people of Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church, our brothers and sisters of the wider African Methodist Episcopal Church, and the people of Charleston, South Carolina as they respond with acts of forgiveness, reconciliation, and justice.

Joint Session for the Election of the Presiding Bishop

The Presiding Bishop called on the Co-Chairs of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop, the Bishop of Oklahoma and Deputy Johnson of Minnesota, for the report of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop.

The Committee placed in nomination the following names: the Rt. Rev. Thomas E. Breidenthal, Bishop of Southern Ohio; the Rt. Rev. Michael B. Curry, Bishop of North Carolina; the Rt. Rev. Ian T. Douglas, Bishop of Connecticut; and the Rt. Rev. Dabney T. Smith, Bishop of Southwest Florida.

The Presiding Bishop declared the nominations closed.

Joint Session on Governance and Structure

The Presiding Bishop called on the Co-Chairs of the Committee on Governance and Structure, the Rt. Rev. Clifton Daniel and Deputy Johnson of Minnesota, to make their report.

Following the report, Deputy Johnson announced that the Joint Session would break into small groups to discuss questions provided by the Committee. Deputy Johnson requested that each small group to report back via Twitter or email.

- III. To have access to the Church's most recent financial statements.
- IV. To be assured that their gifts will be used for the purposes for which they were given.

Donor Bill of Rights

Stewardship merits the respect and trust of the faithful, and so that donors and prospective donors can have full confidence in the Church and in causes they are asked to support, we declare that all donors to The Episcopal Church have these rights:

I. To be informed of the Church's mission of the way the Church intends to use donated gifted resources, and of its capacity to use donations gifts effectively for their intended purposes.

II. To be informed of the identity of those serving on the Church's governing body, and to expect the body to exercise prudent judgment in its stewardship responsibilities.

III. To have access to the Church's most recent financial statements.

IV. To be assured that their gifts will be used for the purposes for which they were given.

V. To receive appropriate acknowledgment and recognition.

VI. To be assured that information about their donation gift is handled with respect and confidentiality to the extent provided by civil and canon law, specifically Canon III.9.5(a)(2), as amended.

VII. To expect that all relationships with individuals representing church ministries of interest to the donor will be professional in nature.

VIII. To be informed whether those seeking donations gifts are volunteers, employees of the Church, or hired solicitors.

IX. To have the opportunity for their names to be deleted from lists that a Church may intend to share.

X. To feel free to ask questions when making a donation gift and to receive prompt, truthful, and forthright answers.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention of the Episcopal Church recognize that from racial profiling, search and seizure laws and prosecution, to federal mandatory sentencing guidelines, there is a disproportionate application and enforcement of the legal system for people of color in this country, some with long-term or permanent ramifications, including loss of civil rights and eligibility for various federal benefits post-incarceration; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention take steps to establish and coordinate efforts to educate and assist congregations across the country to study, pray, and act for justice; and be it further Resolved, That the General Convention take steps to establish dialogues with local, regional and national law enforcement agencies to understand, re-examine and change perceptions, behaviors, policies and sentencing guidelines so they are all applied fairly to all people; and be it further Resolved, That the General Convention urge the Executive Council and the Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church to advocate publicly for change in national policies, legal systems and law enforcement; and distribute this Resolution to the Congress of the United States.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church confesses that, despite repeated efforts at anti-racism training as well as racial justice and racial reconciliation initiatives including the passage of more than 30 General Convention resolutions dating back to 1952, the abomination and sin of racism continue to plague our society and our Church at great cost to human life and human dignity; we formally acknowledge our historic and contemporary participation in this evil and repent of it; and be it further

The House of Deputies Committee on Social Justice and United States Policy presented its Report #11 on Resolution A011 (Criminal Justice Reform Study and Advocacy) and moved adoption of a substitute.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A011)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention reaffirm and renew the Church's longstanding commitment to the evaluation and reform of the federal, state, and local criminal and juvenile justice systems in the United States, as previously called for by General Convention resolutions 1985-Co43 (Create a Task Force on Reform of the Criminal Justice System), 2000-Bo55 (Reaffirm Criminal Justice System Reform), 2003-Bo26 (Establish the Joint Committee on Criminal Justice), 2006-A111 (Investigate Criminal Justice Issues), and 2012-Do26 (Urge Support for Bipartisan U.S. Commission on Criminal Justice); and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention declare support and advocate for the expansion of funding for treatment, alternatives to incarceration, and reintegration services to people leaving

prison; and call on Episcopalians to support and participate in mentoring and accompaniment programs for those leaving prison; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention declare opposition to mass incarceration, which perpetuates a cycle of systemic poverty in the United States through its impact on defendants, inmates, parolees, and their families; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention reaffirm and renew the call of The Episcopal Church for a moratorium on the use of for-profit private prisons, including immigration detention centers, which often set occupancy or "bed" quotas, capitalizing on the criminal, civil, and immigration incarceration of individuals; are a leading factor in the "New Jim Crow," the disproportionate mass incarceration of youth and men and women who are black and brown; and feed the "School to Prison Pipeline," which depends on the use of school policing and mandatory sentencing for nonviolent crimes; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention reaffirm and renew support for the repeal of mandatory-minimum sentences for nonviolent offenses; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention call for the abolition of the sentencing disparity between crack-cocaine and powder-cocaine offenses; and, as an intermediate step, urge the U.S. Congress, in accordance with the recommendation of the U.S. Sentencing Commission, to make retroactive the 2010 Fair Sentencing Act, which reduces the disparity in sentencing from previous levels; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention urge states with monetary bail bond systems to reform those systems, which rely upon often-unlicensed and unregulated bail bond agents and on conditioning release from pre-trial incarceration solely on the ability to pay, discriminating against defendants who are poor; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention, acknowledging the importance of employment for reintegration into society by formerly incarcerated persons, urge policymakers to pursue legal reforms to enhance the employability of people leaving prisons; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention condemn offender-funded law enforcement practices, such as requiring newly released inmates to pay for their own court-required drug testing when they often are unemployed or underemployed, and urge policymakers to create equitable post-sentencing parole systems that remove undue financial burden on the parolee as a condition for maintaining parole; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention condemn the practice by many states of felon disenfranchisement, which removes the right of formerly incarcerated (or "returning citizens") to regain the right to vote once they complete their sentence and leave prison; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention call for exploration and creation of restorative justice programs to transform juvenile justice systems; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention direct the Executive Council to convene a Criminal Justice Reform Coordinating Committee, comprised of church members, ecumenical partners, and outside experts, for the purpose of developing educational information, advocacy tools, and church policy to assist the dioceses and church members in their ministry to prisoners, people returning home from prisons, and their families; and in their advocacy for comprehensive criminal justice reform at all levels of government; and to direct the Coordinating Committee to report to the 79th General Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to consider a budget to support the work of such Criminal Justice Reform Coordinating Committee.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention acknowledges that implicit racial bias and racial profiling result in a criminal justice system that disproportionately incarcerates people of color damaging individuals, families, and communities; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention challenges The Episcopal Church at every level to commit mindfully and intentionally to dismantling our current mass incarceration system; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention urges the Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church, the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church and the Office of Governmental Relations of The Episcopal Church to advocate publicly for changes in Federal policies that perpetuate the mass incarceration system; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention encourage each congregation and Diocese to undertake at least one specific initiative aimed at addressing the destructive consequences of the mass incarceration system. These initiatives include such possibilities as:

- 1. Advocating for alternatives to incarceration for those who are addicted, and increased funding for treatment programs;
- 2. Advocating for alternatives to incarceration for those who are mentally ill, and increased funding for treatment programs;
- 3. Advocating for protection of the civil rights and provision of appropriate support and accommodation for people with disabilities who are arrested and incarcerated;
- 4. Advocating for funding for job training and apprentice programs for those who are at risk of incarceration and those who are formerly released from prison;
- 5. Working with local businesses to create pathways to living wage jobs for formerly incarcerated people;
- 6. Establishing mentoring and accompaniment programs for those leaving prison;
- 7. Advocating for the repeal of mandatory-minimum sentences for nonviolent offenses;
- 8. Calling for the abolition of the sentencing disparity between crack-cocaine and powder-cocaine offenses and, as an intermediate step, urging the U.S. Congress, in accordance with the recommendation of the U.S. Sentencing Commission, to make retroactive the 2010 Fair Sentencing Act, which reduces the disparity in sentencing from previous levels;
- 9. Advocating to eliminate "three strikes" sentencing protocols;
- 10. Joining local "Ban the Box" campaigns to remove questions about arrest records in online and written job application forms;
- 11. Opposing the creation of "for profit" prisons and immigration detention centers, and, where they exist, organize against guaranteed nightly numbers of prisoners and detainees, and for access to education and rehabilitation programs for those being incarcerated or detained;
- 12. Reforming monetary bail bond systems, which rely upon often-unlicensed and unregulated bail bond agents and on conditioning release from pre-trial incarceration solely on the ability to pay;
- 13. Advocating for immediate return of the right to vote for those who have served their sentences and left prison; and
- 14. Calling for the exploration and creation of restorative justice programs to transform juvenile justice systems; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request that each Diocese report back to the 79th General Convention on the initiatives engaged at congregational and Diocesan levels.

The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and Laity of the unorganized area called by the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more existing Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses) by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. After consent of the General Convention, when a certified copy of the duly adopted Constitution of the new Diocese, including an unqualified accession to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, shall have been filed with the Secretary of the General Convention and approved by the Executive Council of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be in union with the General Convention.

Resolved, That the Communications Office be directed to make a priority of reporting on the stories of church plants on an ongoing basis, through news stories, video, and other means, and through developing a website that provides detailed information about the various church plant initiatives happening throughout the church; and be it further

Resolved, That the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance consider a budget allocation of \$6,433,800 for the implementation of this resolution.

- -promote funding for research into the causes and prevention of gun violence

Resolved, That the Task Force study and monitor, in consultation with the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, the impact of same-sex marriage and rites of blessing on our Church; the continuing debate about clergy acting as agents of the state in officiating at marriages; and any other matters related to marriage by action of or referral by this Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That the Task Force report and make recommendations to the 79th General Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That the Task Force provide educational and pastoral resources for congregational use on these matters that represents the spectrum of understandings on these matters in our Church; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to consider a budget allocation of \$90,000 for the implementation of this resolution.

Tuesday June 30, 2015

MORNING SESSION

Reconvene

The Presiding Bishop called the Joint Session to order at 11:16 a.m.

Prayers

The Presiding Bishop led the Joint Session in prayer.

Introduction

The Presiding Bishop introduced the Honorable Gary Herbert, Governor of Utah. Governor Herbert addressed the Joint Session and welcomed the General Convention to the state of Utah. Governor Herbert recognized the Presiding Bishop; Presiding Bishop-elect Curry; the Bishop of Utah; and the Rt. Rev. Carolyn Tanner Irish, former bishop of Utah; and thanked them for their leadership. He then recognized contributions that the Episcopal Diocese of Utah had made to the state of Utah. Governor Herbert also commended the ecumenical work of The Episcopal Church.

Joint Session on Mission

The Presiding Bishop gave commentary on the Five Marks of Mission: to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom; to teach, baptize, and nurture new believers; to respond to human need by loving service; to seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind, and to pursue peace and reconciliation; and to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

The Presiding Bishop then explained the format of the Joint Session, which entailed small group discussion within each deputation on questions provided for each of the Five Marks of Mission.

Following the time allotted for small group discussion, the Presiding Bishop exhorted the Joint Session to continue the conversations at home.

Prayers

The President called on the Chaplain of the House of Deputies to lead the Joint Session in song.

Recognition of the Presiding Bishop

Mr. Ray Suarez of St. Columba's in Washington, D.C. introduced a retrospective video of the Presiding Bishop's tenure and a video of members of The Episcopal Church, the Anglican Communion, and ecumenical partners thanking Presiding Bishop Schori for her service. The Joint Session expressed their appreciation of the Presiding Bishop and her ministry with applause. Mr. Suarez introduced the Most Rev. Frank Griswold, who addressed the Joint Session and made remarks on the role of a presiding bishop and on Presiding Bishop Schori's tenure. He then invited the Joint Session to once again express appreciation for Presiding Bishop Schori. Mr. Suarez then invited the 25th Presiding Bishop, the 26th Presiding Bishop, and the Presiding Bishop-elect to the platform for the purpose of the Joint Session's recording of the moment. Former Presiding Bishop Griswold then led the Joint Session in prayer.

Adjournment

The President announced that the Joint Session was adjourned.

Referral options are (a) no action required other than appropriate pastoral response pursuant to Canon IV.8; (b) conciliation pursuant to Canon IV.10; (c) investigation pursuant to Canon IV.11; (d) to the Conference Panel pursuant to Canon IV.12; or (e) referral for possible agreement with the Bishop Diocesan regarding terms of discipline pursuant to Canon IV.9. Referral decisions shall require the approval of a majority of the Reference Panel. The Reference Panel shall monitor the progress of each referral on a monthly basis to ensure that the matter is progressing in a timely fashion. Until such time as the matter is referred to a Hearing Panel, if the Reference Panel determines that the matter has reached an impasse or is not progressing in a timely fashion, it may re-refer the matter. Once a matter is referred to a Hearing Panel, Canon IV.15.1 shall govern any issue regarding the progress of the matter.

1. There is no perfect translation. It is impossible to render the full meaning of a text in its original language and context into another language and context.

2. All translations make interpretive choices; there is no "neutral" translation. However, some translations conform more closely than others to the specific criteria listed below.

- 3. The goal of these criteria is not to advance any particular interpretations; but, rather, to help ensure that amendments to Canon II.2 will be generally received as reasonable, responsible, and suitable.
- 4. Ordinarily, for a translation to be considered, it must include the books of the Old and New Testament and the Apocrypha or Deuterocanonical Books as listed in the Articles of Religion.
- 5. No translation will be universally received as fully meeting all of these criteria. To be recommended, a new translation should be widely received as meeting most of these specific criteria.
- II. To be recommended for use in public worship, a translation should meet the specific criteria of being:
 - 1. Based on academically or historically accepted editions of the Hebrew and Greek texts;
 - 2. Technically competent in approximating the meaning of the base text; Comprehensible to the target audience;
 - 3. Fluid when spoken aloud;
 - 4. Stylistically suitable to approved services.
- III. While some translations obviously fail to meet these standards, measuring a text by these criteria is far from an exact science. We can, however, look for certain kinds of positive reception to indicate whether or not a text meets most of these criteria:
 - 1. Academic reception. Do most biblical scholars recognize the translation as technically competent and comprehensible to the target audience? Do most liturgical scholars recognize the translation as fluid when spoken aloud and stylistically suitable to approved services?
 - 2. Pastoral reception. Does a significant number of clergy consider the translation comprehensible to their congregations, fluid when spoken aloud, and/or stylistically suitable for their services?
 - 3. Anglican reception. Have most other Churches in the Anglican Communion made provision for the use of the translation in public worship?
 - 4. Full Communion Partners' reception. Have most of The Episcopal Church's Full Communion Partners made provision for the use of the translation in public worship?
 - 5. Ecumenical reception. Have other Churches made provisions for the use of the translation in public worship?; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon II.2 is hereby amended by adding two new sections:

Canon 2: Of Translations of the Bible

Sec. 1. The Lessons prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer shall be read from the translation of the Holy Scriptures commonly known as the King James or Authorized Version (which is the historic Bible of this Church) together with the Marginal Readings authorized for use by the General Convention of 1901; or from one of the three translations known as Revised Versions, including the English Revision of 1881, the American Revision of 1901, and the Revised Standard Version of 1952; from the Jerusalem Bible of 1966; from the New English Bible with the Apocrypha of 1970; or from The 1976 Good News Bible (Today's English Version); or from The New American Bible (1970); or from The Revised Standard Version, an Ecumenical Edition, commonly known as the "R.S.V. Common Bible" (1973); or from The New International Version (1978); or from The New Jerusalem Bible (1987); or from the Revised English Bible (1989); or from the New Revised Standard Version (1990); or from the Contemporary English Version (1995); or from translations, English Version Global (2005); or from the Common English Bible (2011); or from translations,

authorized by the diocesan bishop, of those approved versions published in any other language; or from other versions of the Bible, including those in languages other than English, which shall be authorized by diocesan bishops for specific use in congregations or ministries within their dioceses. Sec. 2. All translations proposed for inclusion in Canon II.2.1 must conform to the Criteria for Recommending New Biblical Translations for Use in Public Worship adopted by General Convention. Sec. 3. All translations proposed for inclusion in Canon II.2.1 must first be referred to the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music for review according to the Criteria for Recommending New Biblical Translations for Use in Public Worship.

Supplemental Materials pp. 233-234:

Introduction

When we see the great abundance, diversity, and intricacy of God's creatures, we are awestruck by life on our planet. We are amazed by the God who has created all that is. and who is the engineer or crafter of the cosmos, designing and assembling all the details. But we also know from science that the details of organisms change through time according to their situations – that is, they evolve through adaptation and natural selection.

Some people take this to mean that there is no role for God in the evolution of life on our planet, but they miss the point that It is through God's love and humility that the processes of nature operate, bringing growth and adaptive change. God's love grants creation the freedom to make and remake. Scripture is clear that divine mercy is over all God's works. The material world is not something to be simply disregarded and destroyed as unimportant to God, whose love is unwavering.

Just as we do not read Scripture literally, so we must resist reading nature literally, but instead search for the big themes and the evolving stories, exploring a deeper and more sweeping narrative. It is in Jesus Christ that we see God's humility most particularly and gain insight into what theologian John Haught has called the "extravagant generosity" of God. In the ancient hymn of Philippians 2 we gaze at Christ, who did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself to take the form of a servant, not simply on behalf of humankind, but on behalf of the whole cosmos which is redeemed in him.

Just as we are called to consider the lost and the least among our human brothers and sisters, so we may say that we are called to consider the dignity of all God's creatures: Science currently is working on several fronts to discover more about kinship. There are both genetic/hereditary and ecological relationships among earth's creatures. We share much of our DNA with plants and animals we do not usually consider as having much in common with us, and the air we breathe requires the healthy function of organisms far less complex than we are. For many people honoring the dignity of every creature involves thinking about threatened species of birds and

mammals and large fish, environmentalism's poster children, but for those who study life on earth, whether professional biologists or backyard naturalists, it means considering the insects and the plankton, the mushrooms and molds, the plants that bring us joy and the ones we call weeds, the algae and the bacteria, and . It means considering the dignity of even those species that which bring humans disease, such as mosquitoes and viruses. It means pondering the relationships among creatures which are not always pretty: predation, parasitism, scavenging.

Each creature's uniqueness is neither individual nor fixed. Living things develop their characteristics in their contexts in relationship to other creatures, other members of their population, and other species in their community. As the resources in their habitats change, and pressures from their fellow creatures shift, living things change. Death and even extinction of populations and species are a natural part of this process of change. But that reality does not mean that humans should accelerate extinction through our activities.

Our understanding of God as One, yet three persons, is a divine picture of diversity in community. Each person of the Trinity, Father, Son, and Spirit, gives to and receives from the others, in a community of exchange we call love. What is true of God may then be seen to be true of the community of life which God has loved into being and sustains through love. While each creature has its dignity, in life and in death, in struggle and in beauty, all creatures in their diversity, including human beings, are held in community with one another.

There is no doubt that human beings have changed the earth's cycles, surface, and creatures by our activities. We have managed and bred for our use and enjoyment some plants and animals, and destroyed the habitats of others. We have extracted minerals, fossil fuels, and soils; and have been careless with our use of extracted water. We have preserved some biomes for their scenic beauty, but ignored the ecological services provided by others. We have trawled the bottom of the seas and used them as a trash repository. A growing and increasingly urban population's hunger for food, clothing, shelter, and fuel is taking its toll, despite ongoing efforts to slow the loss of traditional rural wisdom about conservation and creation care. Human migration has fostered the spread of invasive species that displace native species, just as human migrants have often displaced indigenous peoples.

Scientists and activists We may disagree about what is the greatest threat to human survival on the planet. Should the scarcity of water for drinking and sanitation be our biggest concern, or the challenge to feed a hungry world in an ecologically sustainable way? And which of our excesses put the whole planet in the greatest peril? Is it climate change or the loss of biodiversity that poses the greatest threat to the resilience of life on earth?

Ecologists understand that while entry points for concern and action vary, All these issues are interrelated. In agriculture, to take an example from our managed environment, resilience in the face of climate change will depend on better stewardship of water and increased preservation of the diversity of seed stock available for developing improved crops, while those engaged in agriculture continue to assess their contribution to greenhouse gases, polluted waste water, and soil erosion, and how all these negative impacts on the environment can be decreased.

There have been and will continue to be unintended consequences for our environment due to our choices and behaviors, but study and prayer can help us to become more conscious of the human impact on our planet. As we consider the risen and ascended Christ drawing all things to their perfection in himself, indeed drawing the cosmos into the heart of God in that process the Eastern Church calls "deification," we find reason for hope and an impetus for the renewing and reconciling of our relationships within the creation of which we are a part.

Supplemental Materials, p. 251:

The Rogation Days are traditionally observed on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. They may, however, be observed on other days, depending on local conditions and the convenience of the congregation. In ancient times, In the late medieval church, the observance

consisted of an outdoor procession that culminated in a special celebration of the Eucharist. Prayers might be offered for the city and the neighborhood, for all who labor, for the fruitfulness of the land and waters; and for deliverance in time of war, disaster, or epidemic disease. The Church of England and the colonial Anglican Church in North America retained the idea of rogation processions, but it was not until the 1928 Book of Common Prayer that American prayer books contained lessons and collects for these days. The term from which this observance is drawn is the Latin rogare, meaning "to ask."

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention establish a Task Force to review and revise policy on substance abuse, addiction and recovery in order that The Episcopal Church will take a proactive stance regarding addiction prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery; and be it further

Resolved, That the Task Force will collaborate with recovery ministries of The Episcopal Church to create model policies for dioceses, congregations, worshiping communities and other Episcopal Church organizations, suggest best practices for policy implementation and education using culturally-competent curriculum offered in multiple languages. - 6. the Church's role in providing lifelong formation & resources for clergy and laity;
- 7. the Church benefits from partnerships with community-based organizations;
- 8. The use of alcoholic beverages and other controlled substances in the local context must be addressed; and be it further

Resolved, That all dioceses, congregations, worshiping communities and other Episcopal Church organizations will immediately review and update existing policies utilizing the resources of Recovery Ministries of The Episcopal Church as needed while this task force is conducting its work.

- 4. When alcohol is served, it must be monitored and those showing signs of intoxication must not be served. Whenever alcohol is served, the rector, vicar, or priest-in-charge must appoint an adult to oversee its serving. That adult must not drink alcoholic beverages during the time of his or her execution of his or her responsibilities. If hard liquor is served, a certified server is required.

5. Serving alcoholic beverages at congregational events where minors are present is strongly discouraged. If minors are present, alcohol must be served at a separate station that is monitored at all times to prevent underage drinking.

Food prepared with alcohol does not need to be labeled provided the alcohol is completely evaporated by the cooking process; however, it is recommended that even in this case the use of alcohol in cooking be noted on a label.
- 7. Whenever alcohol is served, appealing non-alcoholic alternatives must always be offered with equal prominence and accessibility.
- 8. The serving of alcoholic beverages at church events should not be publicized as an attraction of the event, e.g. "wine and cheese reception," "cocktail party," "theology on tap," and "beer and wine tasting."
- 9. Food must be served when alcohol is present.
- 10. The groups or organizations sponsoring the activity or event at which alcoholic beverages are served must have permission from the clergy and the vestry. - 13. We encourage clergy to acknowledge the efficacy of receiving the sacrament in one kind and consider providing a non-alcoholic alternative.; and be it further

Special Order of Business

The Secretary announced that it was time to take up the Special Order of Business as passed in Resolution X012. The Parliamentarian reminded the House of the content of the Special Order.

The House entered the time for clarifying questions directed to the House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure.

At the end of the time set aside for clarifying questions, the President asked the House if they wished to permit the time for questions to be extended in order to accommodate those who had already signed into the queue.

Motion carried

Reconvene

The President called the House to Order at 6:06 p.m.

Governance and Structure

The House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure presented its Report #13 on Resolution Aoo4 (Amend I.4.1-8 Restructure Executive Council) and moved adoption of a substitute.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A004)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon 4, Sections 1-8, be stricken in their entirety and replaced to read as follows:

Sec. 1 (a) There shall be an Executive Council of the General Convention (which Council shall generally be called simply the Executive Council) whose duty it shall be to carry out the program and policies adopted by the General Convention. The Executive Council shall have charge of the coordination, development, and implementation of the ministry and mission of the Church.

- (b) [Ed. note: original text of (b) not included in original text.]

Sec. 2 (a) Of the members to be elected by the General Convention, the Bishops shall be elected by the House of Bishops subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies, and the Presbyters or Deacons and Lay Persons shall be elected by the House of Deputies subject to confirmation by the House of Bishops.

- (b) Except in the case of members initially elected for shorter terms in order to achieve rotation of terms, the terms of office of the members of the Council (other than ex officiis members) shall be equal to twice the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The terms of office of all members shall commence immediately upon the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were elected or, in the case of election by a Synod, upon the adjournment of the first regular meeting of General Convention following such election. The term of a member shall become vacant in the event of two absences from meetings of the Council in the interval between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the Chair for good cause. Members shall remain in office until their successors are elected and qualified. No person who has served at least three consecutive years on the Executive Council shall be eligible for immediate re election for a term of more than three years. After any person shall have served six consecutive years on the Executive Council, a period of three years shall elapse before such person shall be eligible for reelection to the Council.
- (c) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through the death or resignation of a member elected by the General Convention or through the change in status of any such member by consecration or ordination, the Council shall fill such vacancy by the election of a suitable person to serve until a successor is elected by the General Convention. The General Convention shall elect a suitable person to serve the portion of any term which will remain unexpired.
- (d) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through the failure of any Provincial Synod to elect a member, or through the death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such member, the President and Provincial Council of the Province shall appoint a suitable person, canonically resident in such Province, to serve until the Provincial Synod shall by election fill the vacancy.
- (e) The Council shall exercise the powers conferred upon it by Canon, and such further powers as may be designated by the General Convention, and between sessions of the General Convention may initiate and develop such new work as it may deem necessary. It may, subject to the provision of this Canon, enact By-laws for its own government and the government of its several departments.
- (f) In its capacity as the Board of Directors of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, the Council shall have the power to direct the disposition of the moneys and other property of said Society in accordance with the provisions of this Canon and the orders and budgets adopted or approved by the General Convention.

(g) The Council shall elect the Church's members of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) and of other Anglican and ecumenical bodies for which no other procedure is provided. Members of the ACC representing The Episcopal Church shall report to each General Convention using the schedule and format required for Standing Commissions in Canon I.1.2 (j) and (k), and shall provide comprehensive written or oral reports to Executive Council at Council's next meeting following each meeting of the ACC.

Sec. 3 (a) The Presiding Bishop shall be ex officio the Chair and President. The Chair and President shall be the chief executive officer of the Executive Council and as such the Chair and President shall have ultimate responsibility for the oversight of the work of the Executive Council in the implementation of the ministry and mission of the Church as may be committed to the Executive Council by the General Convention.

- (b) The President of the House of Deputies shall be ex officio Vice Chair.
- (c) The Secretary of the General Convention shall be the Secretary of the Executive Council ex officio.
- (d) The Presiding Bishop shall appoint, with the advice and consent of a majority of the Executive Council, an executive director, who shall be an adult confirmed communicant in good standing or a member of the clergy of this Church in good standing who shall be the chief operating officer and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Presiding Bishop and be accountable to the Presiding Bishop. If a vacancy should occur in the office of the executive director, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (e) Upon joint nomination of the Chair and Vice Chair, the Executive Council shall appoint a Chief Financial Officer of the Executive Council, who may, but need not, be the same person as the Treasurer of the General Convention and who shall report and be accountable to the Chair of Executive Council and shall serve at the pleasure of the Chair of the Executive Council. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (f) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council, shall perform such other duties as are customary for such office and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and the By laws of the Council. In the absence or at the request of the Chair, the Vice Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and by the By laws of the Council.
- (g) Upon joint nomination of the Chair and Vice Chair, the Executive Council shall elect a Joint Audit Committee of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. The Committee shall be composed of 6 members, one of whom shall be a member of the Executive Council Standing Committee with primary responsibility for financial matters, one from the membership of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance, and the remaining four shall be members of the Church-at-large, having experience in general business practices. The members shall serve for a term of three years beginning on January 1 following a regular meeting of the General Convention or immediately following their appointment, whichever comes later, and continue until a successor is appointed, and may serve two consecutive terms, after which a full triennium must elapse before being eligible for re-election. The Chair and Vice Chair of Council shall designate the Chair of the Committee from among its members. The Audit Committee shall regularly review the financial statements relating to all funds under the management or control of the Council and the Society and shall report thereon at least annually to the Council and the Society.

Upon recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Executive Council shall employ on behalf of the Council and the Society an independent Certified Public Accountant firm to audit annually all accounts under the management or control of the Council and Society. After receipt of the annual audit, the Audit Committee shall recommend to the Council and Society what action to take as to any matters identified in the annual audit and accompanying management letter. The operations of the Audit Committee shall be set out in an Audit Committee Charter. The Audit Committee shall review,

at least annually, the Committee's Charter and recommend any changes to the Executive Council for approval.

- (h) The Executive Council shall establish by its By laws such Standing Committees of the Executive Council, consisting of its own members, as shall be deemed appropriate and necessary by the Executive Council for the discharge of its duties, the members of which are to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice Chair and appointed by the Council. Any other Committee of Executive Council will cease to exist at the close of the next General Convention following its creation unless otherwise extended. The Council may also establish such other Committees, which may include or consist of non-members, to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice Chair and appointed by the Council, as may be necessary to fulfill its fiduciary responsibility to The Episcopal Church. Executive Council may revoke, rescind, or modify the mandate or charter of any Executive Council Committee not otherwise created by Canon.
- (i) The additional officers, agents and employees of the Council shall be such and shall perform such duties as the Council, upon the recommendation and under the authority and direction of the Chair and President, may from time to time designate.
- Sec. 4 (a) The Council shall meet at such place, and at such stated times, at least three times each year, as it shall appoint and at such other times as it may be convened. The Council shall be convened at the request of the President, or on the written request of any nine members thereof.
- (b) A majority of the elected members of the Council shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Council. No action shall be taken in the name of the Council except when a quorum, so defined, is present and voting.
- Sec. 5. With the exception of the salary of the President, the salaries of all officers of the Council and of all agents and employees of the Council shall be fixed by the Council and paid by the Treasurer.
- Sec. 6 (a) The Executive Council shall submit to the General Convention at each regular session thereof the Budget for the Episcopal Church for the ensuing budgetary period, which budgetary period shall be equal to the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention.
- (b) The budget proposed for adoption by General Convention shall include a Canonical and corporate portion which shall provide for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop together with the necessary expenses of that office, the necessary expenses of the President of the House of Deputies, including the staff and Advisory Council required to assist in the performance of the duties and matters related to the President's office, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments, and also the corporate requirements for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices.
- (c) The budget proposed for adoption by the General Convention shall include provision for support for the Program of the Episcopal Church. The program so submitted shall include a detailed budget of that part of the program for which it proposes to make appropriations for the ensuing year, and estimated budgets for the succeeding portion of the budgetary period.
- (d) Revenue to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall be generated primarily by a single asking of the Dioceses of the church based on a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of its Program, Budget, and Finance process. If in any year the total anticipated income for budget support is less than the amount required to support the budget approved by the General Convention, the canonical portion of the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas subject to any decreases necessary to maintain a balanced budget.
- (e) After the preparation of the budget the Executive Council shall, at least four months before the sessions of the General Convention, transmit to the Bishop of each Diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed askings necessary to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church. The Executive Council shall also submit to the General Convention, with the budget, a plan for the askings of the respective Dioceses of the sum needed to execute the budget.

(f) There shall be joint sessions of the two Houses for the presentation of the Budget for the Episcopal Church; and thereafter consideration shall be given and appropriate action taken thereon by the General Convention. The Council shall have the power to expend all sums of money covered by the budget and estimated budgets approved by the Convention, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention, including but not limited to the priority declaration set forth in Section 6 (d) of this Canon. It shall also have power to undertake such other work provided for in the budget approved by the General Convention, or other work under the jurisdiction of the Council, the need for which may have arisen after the action of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council its income will warrant.

- (g) Upon the adoption by the General Convention of a Budget for the Episcopal Church and the planned askings for the budgetary period, the Council shall formally advise each Diocese of its share of the total askings to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church.
- (h) Each Diocese shall thereupon notify each Parish and Mission of the amount of the askings of such Diocese. Each Diocese shall present to each Parish and Mission a total objective which shall include both its share of the proposed Diocesan Budget and its share of the asking of the Diocese by the Executive Council in accordance with the plan adopted by the General Convention.
- (i) Each diocese shall annually report to the Executive Council such financial information as may be required in a form authorized by Executive Council.
- (j) Each Diocese shall report annually to the Executive Council the name and address of each new congregation, and of each congregation closed or removed by reason of any of the following:
 - (1) dissolution of the congregation;
 - (2) removal of the congregation to an other Diocese due to cession or retrocession of geographic territory in which the congregation is located, pursuant to Articles V.6 or VI.2 of the Constitution;
 - (3) removal of the congregation to a new physical location or address, identifying both the location or address from which the congregation has removed, and the successor location or address; and
 - (4) merger of the congregation into one or more other congregations, in which case the Diocese shall include in its report the names of all congregations involved in the merger, and the physical location and address at which the merged congregations shall be located.
- Sec. 7 (a) Every Missionary Bishop or, in case of a vacancy, the Bishop in charge of the jurisdiction, receiving aid from the Council, shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of work performed, of money received from all sources and disbursed for all purposes, and of the state of the Church in the jurisdiction at the date of such report, all in such form as the Council may prescribe.
- (b) Every Bishop of a Diocese receiving aid from the Council shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of the work in the Diocese supported in whole or in part by the Council.
- Sec. 8. The Council, as soon as practicable after the close of each fiscal year, shall make and publish a full report of its work to the Church. Such report shall contain an itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements and a statement of all trust funds and other property of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and of all other trust funds and property in its possession or under its control. The Council shall make a like report, including a detailed schedule of the salaries paid to all officers, agents, and principal employees, to each General Convention.
- Sec. 1 (a) There shall be an Executive Council of the General Convention (which Council shall generally be called simply the Executive Council, or the Council) whose duty it shall be to oversee the execution of the program and policies adopted by the General Convention. As Executive Council, and also in its capacity as Board of Directors of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, the Executive Council shall have oversight of the work done by the Presiding Bishop and the Society. The Executive Council

shall also have oversight responsibility for the work of the Office of General Convention, and the Executive Officer of General Convention shall report directly to the Executive Council. In such capacities, the Council shall have oversight responsibility for the disposition of the moneys and other property of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society in accordance with the provisions of this Canon and the resolutions, orders, and budgets adopted or approved by the General Convention. It shall also have oversight responsibility for the disposition of the moneys of the Office of General Convention. The Council shall adopt procedures it deems appropriate for approval of expenditures by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Office of General Convention.

- (b) The Executive Council shall be accountable to the General Convention and shall render a full, published report concerning the work of the bodies for which it has oversight responsibility to each meeting of the General Convention. The report shall include information on the implementation of all resolutions adopted in the previous General Convention calling for action by the Executive Council, the Presiding Bishop, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the Office of General Convention.
- (c) The Executive Council shall be composed of 19 members elected by the General Convention, of whom 10 shall be elected at General Convention in even-numbered years, and nine shall be elected at General Convention in odd-numbered years. The Executive Council shall include one elected member from each of the nine Provinces; at least three Bishops, five presbyters or deacons, and eleven lay persons; and the rules of order of the General Convention shall structure the voting for Council members so as to assure that this minimum distribution of Provinces and Orders is achieved. The Presiding Bishop and the Presiding Deputy shall be ex officiis members on the Executive Council, with seat, voice, and vote.
- (d) The Executive Council shall appoint a Governance Committee from among its members to assist the Council to (i) advise the Standing Committee on Search and Nominations annually in November on what skills are needed on the Executive Council to enable it to function with maximum effectiveness, and whether those skills are at that time represented on the Executive Council, and (ii) create a charter that describes the skills requisite for service on the Executive Council.
- (e) The Executive Council members elected by General Convention shall be elected from among candidates nominated by the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations established by the Rules of Order. The Synod of each Province shall, within six months before General Convention, submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations the names of up to six persons from its Province, including at least one from each of the three Orders, to be considered as a nominee for Executive Council. In considering candidates for nomination, the Standing Committee shall consider the skills, gifts, and experience needed by the Executive Council in discharging its responsibilities under this Canon; the value of cultural and geographic diversity on the Council; the input received from the Executive Council; and the value of including historically underrepresented voices in the governance of the Church. The Standing Committee shall present a slate of nominees that includes at least six Bishops, ten presbyters or deacons, and twenty-two lay persons. Nominees for Executive Council are not required to be Deputies. There shall not be nominations for Executive Council positions from the floor of General Convention.
- (f) The Presiding Bishop shall be the Chair of Executive Council, and the Presiding Deputy shall be the Vice Chair of Executive Council.
- (g) The Church General Manager, the Church Treasurer, the Church Legal Officer, the General Convention Executive Officer, and the Church Secretary shall be ex officiis members with seat and voice but no vote on the Executive Council.
- (h) Except in the case of members initially elected for shorter terms in order to achieve rotation of terms, the terms of office of the members of the Council (other than ex officiis members) shall be equal to twice the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The terms of office of all members shall commence immediately upon the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were elected. The term of a member shall become vacant in the event of two absences from meetings of the Council in the interval between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless

excused by the Chair and Vice Chair for good cause. Members shall remain in office until their successors are elected and qualified. No person who has served at least three consecutive years on the Executive Council shall be eligible for immediate re-election for a term of more than three years. After any person shall have served six consecutive years on the Executive Council, a period of three years shall elapse before such person shall be eligible for re-election to the Council.

- (i) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through death, resignation, disability, or other reason, the Council shall fill such vacancy by the election of a suitable person to serve until a successor is elected by the General Convention. If the vacancy results in no member of Executive Council from a Province, the Council shall elect a person from that Province to fill the vacancy until the next General Convention. The General Convention shall elect a suitable person to serve the portion of any term that will remain unexpired from among nominees selected in the manner provided in this Canon.
- (j) The Council shall exercise the powers conferred upon it by Canon, and such further powers as may be designated by the General Convention. It may, subject to the provisions of this Canon, enact procedures for its own committees.
- (k) The Council shall elect the Church's members of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) and of other Anglican and ecumenical bodies for which no other procedure is provided. Members of the ACC representing The Episcopal Church shall report to each General Convention using the schedule and format required for Standing Commissions in Canon I.1.2 (j) and (k), and shall provide comprehensive written reports to Executive Council at Council's next meeting following each meeting of the ACC.
- (I) The Presiding Deputy shall serve as a Vice President of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. The Presiding Deputy shall be ex officio Vice Chair of Council.
- (m) The Secretary of the General Convention shall be ex officio the Secretary of Council.
- (n) Upon joint nomination of the Presiding Officers, the Council shall appoint a Church General Manager for the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, who shall be an adult confirmed communicant in good standing or a member of the clergy of this Church in good standing who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Presiding Bishop. If a vacancy should occur in the office of the Church General Manager, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (o) Upon joint nomination of the Presiding Officers, the Council shall appoint a Treasurer for the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, who may, but need not, be the same person as the Treasurer of the General Convention and who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Presiding Bishop. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner. The Treasurer shall function as both treasurer and the chief financial officer of DFMS.
- (p) Upon joint nomination of the Presiding Officers, the Council shall appoint a Church Legal Officer for the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Presiding Bishop. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (q) The officers and staff of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society shall assist the Presiding Bishop in carrying out the work of the Church.
- (r) Upon joint nomination of the Presiding Officers, the Council shall appoint a General Convention Executive Officer, who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Executive Council. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner. Unless otherwise directed by Executive Council, the supporting staff of the General Convention Executive Officer shall include the functions of a Secretary and a Treasurer of the General Convention and those of a Manager of the General Convention. The General Convention Executive Officer shall be responsible for coordinating the work of the Standing Committees specifically funded by the General Convention Expense Budget.
- (s) The Executive Council, by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of its entire membership, may elect to terminate the employment of the Church General Manager, Church Treasurer, Church Legal Officer, or

General Convention Executive Officer. In that event, a successor shall be appointed in the manner set out in this Canon for appointments to those positions.

- (t) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council, shall perform such other duties as are customary for such office, and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and the bylaws of the Council. In the absence or at the request of the Chair, the Vice Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and by the bylaws of the Council.
- (u) Upon joint nomination of the Chair and Vice Chair, the Executive Council shall elect an Audit Committee of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. The Committee shall be composed of six members: one from the Executive Council committee with primary responsibility for financial matters; one from the Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance; and the remaining four from members of the Church-at-large having experience in general business and financial practices. The members shall serve for a term of three years beginning on January 1 following a regular meeting of the General Convention or immediately following their appointment, whichever comes later, and continue until a successor is appointed, and may serve two consecutive terms, after which a full triennium must elapse before being eligible for re-election. Annually the Audit Committee shall elect a Chair of the Committee from among its members. The Audit Committee shall regularly review the financial statements relating to all funds under the management or control of the Council and the Society and shall report thereon at least annually to the Council. Upon recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Executive Council shall employ on behalf of the Council and the Society an independent Certified Public Accountant firm to audit annually all accounts under the management or control of the Council and Society. After receipt of the annual audit, the Audit Committee shall recommend to the Council and Society what action to take as to any matters identified in the annual audit and accompanying management letter. The responsibilities of the Audit Committee shall be set out in an Audit Committee Charter. The Audit Committee shall review, at least annually, the Committee's Charter and recommend any changes to the Executive Council for approval.
- (v) The Executive Council may establish by its bylaws such Standing Committees, consisting of its own members, as shall be appropriate and necessary for the discharge of its duties, the members of which are to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice Chair and appointed by the Council. The Council may also establish such other Committees and ad hoc working groups or task forces, which may include or consist of non-members, to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice-Chair and appointed by the Council, as may be necessary to fulfill its fiduciary responsibility to the Church. Unless otherwise provided in the procedures adopted by Executive Council, each Committee of Executive Council will cease to exist at the close of the next General Convention following its creation unless extended by Executive Council. Executive Council may revoke, rescind, or modify the mandate or charter of any Executive Council Committee not otherwise created by Canon.
- (w) The Executive Council shall have a budget approved by General Convention for its work and the necessary expenses of its members and Committees. The Executive Council shall establish policies and procedures for managing and handling disbursements of funds from this budget.
- Sec. 4 (a) [sic] The Council shall meet at such place, and at such stated times, at least three times each year, as it shall appoint and at such other times as it may be convened. The Council shall be convened at the request of the Chair, or on the written request of any five members thereof.
- (b) A majority of the elected members of the Council shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Council. No action shall be taken in the name of the Council except when a quorum, so defined, is present and voting. A member may participate in, and vote at, Council meeting by means of technology where all participants may hear one another simultaneously and according to procedures and guidelines set forth in the Council bylaws.
- Sec. 5. Members of Executive Council shall be entitled to reimbursement for their reasonable expenses of attending meetings, in accordance with procedures established and approved by Executive Council.

Except as determined by General Convention, the salaries of all officers of the Council and of all agents and employees of the Council and the Society shall be fixed by the Council.

- Sec. 6 (a) The Executive Council shall submit to the General Convention at each regular session thereof a proposed budget for the Episcopal Church for the ensuing budgetary period, which budgetary period shall be equal to the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The Church Treasurer, supported by his or her staff, shall be responsible for preparing drafts of the proposed budget for review and approval of Executive Council.
- (b) The budget proposed for adoption by General Convention shall provide for the expenses of the General Convention, the expenses of the mission and ministry programs of the Church and of its administration, the stipends and expenses of the Presiding Bishop and the Presiding Deputy, together with the necessary expenses of those offices, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments.
- (c) Revenue to support the budget for The Episcopal Church shall be generated primarily by a single assessment of the Dioceses of the Church based on a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of its Program, Budget, and Finance process. If in any year the total anticipated income for budget support is less than the amount required to support the budget approved by the General Convention, the Executive Council shall make appropriate spending adjustments as faithful as possible to the budget adopted by General Convention.
- (d) After the preparation of the proposed budget the Executive Council shall, at least four months before the General Convention convenes, transmit to the Bishop of each diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed assessments necessary to support the proposed budget. The Executive Council shall also submit to the General Convention, with the proposed budget, a plan for the assessments of the respective dioceses of the sum needed to fund a balanced budget.
- (e) A diocese that neglects or fails to pay its assessment according to the budget adopted by General Convention shall be subject to such reduction of any Church program funds designated for the diocese as the Executive Council may approve, taking into account the diocese's particular circumstances.
- (f) The General Convention shall consider and take appropriate action on the proposed budget presented to it.
- (g) The Council shall have the power to approve, in accordance with such written procedures as it may deem prudent, expenditures of all sums of money covered by the budget and estimated budgets approved by the Convention, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention. It shall also have power to approve other initiatives proposed by the Presiding Bishop or otherwise considered by Council between meetings of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council are prudent and which the Church revenues will be adequate to support.
- (h) Upon the adoption by the General Convention of a budget and the diocesan assessments for the budgetary period, the Council shall formally advise each diocese of its share of the total assessments to support the budget for the Episcopal Church.
- (i) Each diocese shall thereupon notify each Parish and Mission of the amount of the assessments of such diocese. Each diocese shall present to each Parish and Mission a total objective which shall include both its share of the proposed Diocesan Budget and its share of the assessment of the diocese by the Executive Council in accordance with the plan adopted by the General Convention.
- (j) Each diocese shall annually report to the Executive Council such financial and other information pertaining to the state of the Church in the diocese as may be required in a form authorized by Executive Council.
- (k) Each diocese shall report annually to the Executive Council the name and address of each new congregation, and of each congregation closed or removed by reason of any of the following:
 - (1) dissolution of the congregation;
 - (2) removal of the congregation to another diocese due to cession or retrocession of geographic territory in which the congregation is located, pursuant to Articles V.6 or VI.2 of the Constitution;

(3) removal of the congregation to a new physical location or address, identifying both the location or address from which the congregation has removed, and the successor location or address; and

- (4) merger of the congregation into one or more other congregations, in which case the diocese shall include in its report the names of all congregations involved in the merger, and the physical location and address at which the merged congregations shall be located.
- Sec. 7 (a) Every Missionary Bishop or, in case of a vacancy, the Bishop in charge of the jurisdiction, receiving aid from the General Convention budget, shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of work performed, of money received from all sources and disbursed for all purposes, and of the state of the Church in the jurisdiction at the date of such report, all in such form as the Council may prescribe.
- (b) Every Bishop of a diocese receiving aid from the General Convention budget shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of the work in the diocese supported in whole or in part by that aid.

Sec. 8. The Council, as soon as practicable after the close of each fiscal year, shall cause to be prepared and publish a full report of the work of the Executive Council, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the General Convention Office to the Church. Such report shall contain an itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements and a statement of all trust funds and other property of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and of all other trust funds and property in its possession or under its oversight responsibility. The report shall include a schedule of the salaries paid to all officers of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon 4, Sections 1-5, be stricken in their entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 1 (a) There shall be an Executive Council of the General Convention (which Council shall generally be called simply the Executive Council, or the Council) whose duty it shall be to oversee the execution of the program and policies adopted by the General Convention. The Executive Council shall have oversight of the work done by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society in its capacity as its Board of Directors. The Council shall have oversight responsibility for the disposition of the funds and other property of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society in accordance with the provisions of this Canon and the resolutions, orders, and budgets adopted or approved by the General Convention. The Executive Council shall also have oversight responsibility for the work of the Office of General Convention and the Executive Officer of General Convention who shall report directly to the Executive Council. It shall also have oversight responsibility for the disposition of the moneys of the Office of General Convention. The Council shall adopt procedures it deems appropriate for approval of expenditures by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Office of General Convention.
- (b) The Executive Council shall be accountable to the General Convention and shall render a full, published report concerning the work of the bodies for which it has oversight responsibility to each meeting of the General Convention. The report shall include information on the implementation of all resolutions adopted in the previous General Convention calling for action by the Executive Council, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the Office of General Convention.
- (c) The Council shall exercise the powers conferred upon it by Canon, and such further powers as may be designated by the General Convention, and between sessions of the General Convention may initiate and develop such new work as it may deem necessary. Subject to the provisions of these Canons, it may enact By-laws for its own government and enact procedures for its own committees.
- (d) The Executive Council shall be composed (a) of 20 members elected by the General Convention, of whom four shall be Bishops, four shall be Presbyters or Deacons, and 12 shall be Lay Persons who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing (two Bishops, two Presbyters or Deacons, and six Lay Persons to be elected by each subsequent regular meeting of the General Convention); (b) of 18

members elected by the Provincial Synods; (c) of the following ex officiis members: the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies; and (d) the Chief Operating Officer, the Secretary, the Treasurer of the General Convention, the Chief Financial Officer of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the Chief Legal Officer of the Executive Council, all of whom shall have seat and voice but no vote. Each Province shall be entitled to be represented by one Bishop or Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province and one Lay Person who is a confirmed adult communicant in good standing of a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province, and the terms of the representatives of each Province shall be so rotated that two persons shall not be simultaneously elected for equal terms.

- (e) The Executive Council shall appoint a committee from among its members to assist the Council to (i) advise the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations and the Provincial Councils on what skills, gifts and experience are needed on the Executive Council to enable it to function with maximum effectiveness, and whether those skills are at that time represented on the Executive Council, and (ii) create a description of the skills, gifts and experience requisite for service on the Executive Council, including the value of cultural and geographic diversity on the Council and the value of including historically underrepresented voices in the governance of the Church.
- (f) Of the Executive Council members elected by the General Convention, the Bishops shall be elected by the House of Bishops subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies, and the Presbyters or Deacons and Lay Persons shall be elected by the House of Deputies subject to confirmation by the House of Bishops.
- (g) Except in the case of members initially elected for shorter terms in order to achieve rotation of terms, the terms of office of the members of the Council (other than ex officiis members) shall be equal to twice the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The terms of office of all members shall commence immediately upon the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were elected or, in the case of election by a Synod, upon the adjournment of the first regular meeting of General Convention following such election. The term of a member shall become vacant in the event of two absences from meetings of the Council in the interval between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the Chair or Vice Chair for good cause. Members shall remain in office until their successors are elected and qualified. No person who has served at least three consecutive years on the Executive Council shall be eligible for immediate re-election for a term of more than three years. After any person shall have served six consecutive years on the Executive Council, a period of three years shall elapse before such person shall be eligible for re-election to the Council.
- (h) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through death, resignation, disability, or other reason, with respect to a member elected by the General Convention, the Council shall fill such vacancy by the election of a suitable person to serve until a successor is elected by the General Convention.
- (i) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through the failure of any Provincial Synod to elect a member, or through the death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such member, the Provincial Council of the Province shall appoint a suitable person to serve until the Provincial Synod shall by election fill the vacancy.
- Sec. 2. (a) The Presiding Bishop shall, ex officio, be the Chair and chief executive officer of the Executive Council, and as such, shall have ultimate responsibility for the oversight of the work of the Executive Council in the implementation of the ministry and mission of the Church as may be committed to the Executive Council by the General Convention.
- (b) The President of the House of Deputies shall, ex officio, be the Vice- Chair of Executive Council.
- (c) The Secretary of the General Convention shall be ex officio the Secretary of the Executive Council.
- (d) The Treasurer of the General Convention shall be ex officio the Treasurer of the Executive Council.
- (e) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Council, shall perform such other duties as are customary for such office, and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and the By-laws of the Council. In the absence of or at the request of the Chair, the Vice- Chair shall preside at meetings of the

Council and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred by Canon and by the By-laws of the Council.

- (f) Upon joint nomination by the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Council shall appoint a Chief Operating Officer who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Chair. If a vacancy should occur in the office of the Chief Operating Officer, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (g) Upon joint nomination by the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Council shall appoint a Chief Financial Officer who shall serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Chair. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (h) Upon joint nomination by the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Council shall appoint a Chief Legal Officer who shall function as general counsel and serve at the pleasure of, and report and be accountable to, the Chair. If a vacancy should occur in that office, a successor shall be appointed in like manner.
- (i) The Chief Operating Officer, the Chief Financial Officer, and the Chief Legal Officer of the Executive Council shall participate in an annual performance review conducted by the Chair, the results of which will be presented to the Executive Committee of the Executive Council.
- (j) The Executive Council, by a two-thirds vote, may direct the Chair to no longer retain one or more of the Officers reviewed by the Chair in section 2(i).
- (k) The Officers of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Officers of the Executive Council, and a committee of six members of Executive Council who are not officers, shall engage in a mutual ministry review every eighteen months, facilitated by a consultant selected by the Chair and the Vice-Chair.
- (I)The Council shall elect the Church's members of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) and of other Anglican and ecumenical bodies for which no other procedure is provided in the Canons. Members of the ACC representing The Episcopal Church shall report to each General Convention using the schedule and format required for Standing Commissions in these Canons, and shall provide comprehensive written reports to Executive Council at the Council's next meeting following each meeting of the ACC.
- Sec. 3. Upon joint nomination of the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Executive Council shall elect an Audit Committee of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. The Committee shall be composed of six members: one from the Executive Council committee with primary responsibility for financial matters; one from the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance; and the remaining four from members of the Church-at-large having experience in general business and financial practices. The members shall serve for a term of three years beginning on January 1 following a regular meeting of the General Convention or immediately following their appointment, whichever comes later, and continue until a successor is appointed, and may serve two consecutive terms, after which a full triennium must elapse before being eligible for re-election. Annually the Audit Committee shall elect a Chair of the Committee from among its members. The Audit Committee shall regularly review the financial statements relating to all funds under the management or control of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and shall report thereon at least annually to the Council. Upon recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Executive Council shall employ on behalf of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society an independent Certified Public Accountant firm to audit annually all accounts under the management or control of the Council and Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. After receipt of the annual audit, the Audit Committee shall recommend to the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society what action to take as to any matters identified in the annual audit and accompanying management letter. The responsibilities of the Audit Committee shall be set out in an Audit Committee Charter. The Audit Committee shall review, at least annually, the Committee's Charter and recommend any changes to the Executive Council for approval. Sec. 4. The Executive Council may establish by its By-laws Committees and ad hoc working groups or

Sec. 4. The Executive Council may establish by its By-laws Committees and ad hoc working groups or task forces, which may include or consist of non-members, to be nominated jointly by the Chair and Vice-Chair and appointed by the Council, as may be necessary to fulfill its fiduciary responsibility to the Church. All Committees and ad hoc working groups and task forces of Executive Council will cease to

exist at the close of the next General Convention following their creation unless extended by Executive Council. Executive Council may revoke, rescind, or modify the mandate or charter of all Executive Council Committees, ad hoc working groups and task forces not otherwise created by Canon.

- Sec. 5. (a) The Council shall meet at such place, and at such stated times, at least three times each year, as it shall appoint and at such other times as it may be convened. The Council shall be convened at the request of the Chair, or on the written request of any five members of Council.
- (b) A majority of the elected members of the Council shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Council. No action shall be taken in the name of the Council except when a quorum, so defined, is present and voting. A member may participate in, and vote at, Council meetings by means of technology where all participants may hear one another simultaneously and according to procedures and guidelines set forth in the Council By-laws.
- (c) Members of Executive Council shall be entitled to reimbursement for their reasonable expenses of attending meetings, in accordance with procedures established and approved by Executive Council. Except as determined by General Convention, the salaries of all officers of the Council and of all agents and employees of the Council and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society shall be fixed by the Council.

Clergy; and (fg) advise the Member of the Clergy of his or her right to be heard in the matter as provided in this Canon. A copy of such writing shall be promptly provided to the Church Attorney.

Each Province shall be entitled to be represented by one Bishop or Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province and one Lay Person who is a confirmed adult communicant in good standing of a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province, and the terms of the representatives of each Province shall be so rotated that two persons shall not be simultaneously elected for equal terms.

Governance and Structure

The House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure presented its Report #14 on Resolution Aoo6 (Amend I.1.2 — Restructure Standing Commissions and Interim Bodies of General Convention) and moved adoption of a substitute.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Aoo6)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon 1, Section 2 be stricken in its entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 2 (a) The General Convention by Canon may establish Standing Commissions to study and draft policy proposals on major subjects considered to be of continuing concern to the mission of the Church. The Canon shall specify the duties of each Standing Commission. Standing Commissions shall be composed of three (3) Bishops, three (3) Priests and/or Deacons of this Church and six (6) Lay Persons, who shall be confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing. The Priests, Deacons, and Lay Persons are not required to be Deputies to General Convention.
- (b) The terms of all members of Standing Commissions shall be equal to the interval between the regular meeting of the General Convention preceding their appointment and the adjournment of the second succeeding regular meeting of the General Convention, and such terms shall be rotated so that, as near as may be, the term of one half of the members shall expire at the conclusion of each regular meeting of the General Convention. The term of a member shall become vacant in the event of two absences from meetings of the Commission occurring in the interval between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the Commission for good cause.
- (c) The Presiding Bishop shall appoint the Episcopal members and the Presiding Deputy the Lay and other Clerical members, of each Commission as soon as practicable after the adjournment of the General Convention, but not later than ninety (90) days after adjournment. Episcopal members appointed after the adjournment of any General Convention at which a Presiding Bishop is elected shall be appointed by the Presiding Bishop-elect. Vacancies shall be filled in similar manner; provided, however, that vacancies occurring within one year of the next regular General Convention shall not be filled unless requested by the Commission.
- (d) The Presiding Bishop and the Presiding Deputy may jointly appoint members of the Executive Council as liaisons to facilitate communication between the Executive Council and each Commission and the coordination of the work of each Commission and the committees of Executive Council. Notice of such appointments shall be given to the Secretary of General Convention. These liaisons shall not be members of the Commission but shall have seat and voice. The reasonable expenses of these liaisons shall be provided for by the Executive Council. Each Commission shall have staff support from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society designated by the Executive Officer of General Convention. Each Commission may constitute committees from among members or non-members of the Commission, and, subject to the Commission's budget, engage the services of consultants and coordinators necessary to complete its work.

(e) The Presiding Bishop and the Presiding Deputy shall be members ex officiis of every Commission, or may appoint personal representatives to attend any meeting in their stead, but without vote.

- (f) The Executive Officer of the General Convention shall, not later than one hundred and twenty (120) days following the meeting of the General Convention, notify the members of the General Convention of the Commission appointments and their duty to present reports to the next Convention and shall schedule an organizational meeting for each Commission. One year prior to the opening day of the Convention, the Executive Officer of the General Convention shall remind the Chairs and Secretaries of all Commissions of this duty.
- (g) Every Commission shall elect a chair, vice chair, and secretary.
- (h) The General Convention may refer a relevant matter to a Commission for its consideration; but may not direct the Commission to reach any particular conclusion.
- (i) A Commission shall give timely and appropriate notice to the Church of the time, place, and agendas of meetings; and instructions on how members of the Church may address their views to the Commission.
- (j) Every Commission shall prepare a report, which, together with any minority report, shall be sent, not later than 150 days prior to the opening day of each Convention, to the Executive Officer of the General Convention, who shall distribute the same to all members of the Convention.
- (k) The Report of every Commission presented at the General Convention shall:
 - (1) Set forth the names of its original members, any changes in membership, the names of all those who concur in, and all those who dissent from, its recommendations.
 - (2) Summarize the work of the Commission, including the various matters studied, the recommendations for action by the General Convention, and drafts of Resolutions proposed for adoption to implement the recommendations of the Commission.
 - (3) Include a detailed report of all receipts and expenditures, including moneys received from any source whatsoever, and if it recommends that it be continued, the estimated requirements for the ensuing interval until the next regular meeting of the General Convention.
- (I) Every Commission, as a condition precedent to the presentation and reception of any report to General Convention, in which such Commission proposes the adoption of any Resolution, shall, by vote, authorize a member or members of General Convention, who, if possible, shall be a member of the Commission, with such limitations as the Commission may impose, to accept or reject, on behalf of the Commission, any amendments proposed by General Convention to any such Resolution; provided, however, that no such amendment may change the substance of the proposal, but shall be primarily for the purpose of correcting errors. The name of the member or members of General Convention upon whom such authority has been conferred, and the limitations of authority, shall be communicated in writing to the Presiding Officers of General Convention not later than the presentation of such report to the General Convention.
- (m) There shall be the following Standing Commissions:
 - (1) A Standing Commission on Governance, Constitution and Canons. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:
 - (i) Review such proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons as may be submitted to the Commission, placing each such proposed amendment in proper Constitutional or Canonical form, including all amendments necessary to effect the proposed change. The Commission shall express its views with respect to the substance of any such proposal only to the proponent thereof; Provided, however, that no member of the Commission shall, by reason of membership, be deemed to be disabled from expressing, before a Legislative Committee or on the floor of the General Convention, personal views with respect to the substance of any such proposed amendment.
 - (ii) Conduct a continuing comprehensive review of the Constitution and Canons with respect to their internal consistency and clarity, and on the basis of such a review, propose to the General Convention such technical amendments to the Constitution and Canons as in the opinion of the

Commission are necessary or desirable in order to achieve such consistency and clarity without altering the substance of any Constitutional and Canonical provisions; Provided, however, that the Commission shall propose, for the consideration of the appropriate Legislative Committees of the General Convention, such amendments to the Constitution and Canons as in the opinion of the Commission are technically desirable but involve a substantive alteration of a Constitutional or Canonical provision.

- (iii) On the basis of such review suggest to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society such amendments to its by-laws as in the opinion of the Commission are necessary or desirable in order to conform the same to the Constitution and Canons.
- (iv) Conduct a continuing and comprehensive review and update of the authorized "Annotated Constitution and Canons for the Government of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America otherwise known as The Episcopal Church" to reflect actions of General Convention which amend the Constitution and Canons and, in the discretion of the Commission, develop other materials which are appropriate to the purpose of the "Annotated Constitution and Canons," and facilitate the publication of this document and related materials. The Commission may provide or support forums to promote commentary, discussion, and understanding of the Constitution and Canons.
- (v) Discharge such other duties as shall from time to time be assigned by the General Convention.
- (2) A Standing Commission on Theology, Liturgy and Music. The Custodian of the Book of Common Prayer shall be a member ex officio with voice, but without vote. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:
 - (i) Discharge such duties as shall be assigned to it by the General Convention as to policies and strategies concerning the common worship of this Church.
 - (ii) Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of the Book of Common Prayer.
 - (iii) Cause to be prepared and to present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the Lectionary, Psalter, and offices for special occasions as authorized or directed by the General Convention or Convocation of Bishops.
 - (iv) Recommend to the General Convention authorized translations of the Holy Scripture from which the Lessons prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer are to be read.
 - (v) Receive and evaluate requests for consideration of individuals or groups to be included in the Calendar of the Church year and make recommendations thereon to the General Convention for acceptance or rejection.
 - (vi) Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of The Hymnal 1982 and other musical publications regularly in use in this Church, and encourage the composition of new musical materials.
 - (vii) Cause to be prepared and present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the musical settings of liturgical texts and rubrics, and norms as to liturgical music and the manner of its rendition.
 - (viii) At the direction of the General Convention, to serve the Church in matters pertaining to policies and strategies concerning Church music.
- (n) Within 90 days of the adjournment of a General Convention and subject to budgeted funds available for the purpose, the Presiding Bishop and the Presiding Deputy shall review the resolutions adopted by the General Convention that provide for any study or further action, and shall thereupon, in consultation with Executive Council, jointly appoint such study committees and task forces as are necessary to complete that work. The composition of such committees and task forces shall reflect the diverse voices of the Church and a balance of the Church's orders consistent with the historic polity of the Church. Those committees and task forces so appointed shall expire at the beginning of the next General Convention following, unless re-appointed by the Presiding Bishop and Presiding Deputy.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon 1, Section 2 be stricken in its entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 2 (a) The General Convention by Canon may establish Standing Commissions to study and draft policy proposals on major subjects considered to be of continuing concern to the mission of the Church. The Canon shall specify the duties of each Standing Commission. - (i) A Commission shall give timely and appropriate notice to the Church of the time, place, and agendas of meetings; and instructions on how members of the Church may address their views to the Commission.

Resolutions requiring additional expenditures shall be immediately referred to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance. No resolution involving such expenditures shall be considered unless so presented and until after report of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance.
- (n) There shall be the following Standing Commissions:
 - (1) A Standing Commission on Structure, Governance, Constitution and Canons. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:

Review such proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons as may be submitted to the Commission, placing each such proposed amendment in proper Constitutional or Canonical form, including all amendments necessary to effect the proposed change. The Commission shall express its views with respect to the substance of any such proposal only to the proponent thereof; provided, however, that no member of the Commission shall, by reason of membership, be deemed to be disabled from expressing, before a Legislative Committee or on the floor of the General Convention, personal views with respect to the substance of any such proposed amendment.

Whenever a proposal is made for the creation of a new Committee, Commission, Board or Agency, it shall, wherever feasible, be referred to this Standing Commission for its consideration and advice.

(2) A Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music. The Custodian of the Book of Common Prayer shall be a member ex officio with voice, but without vote. It shall be the duty of the Commission to:

Discharge such duties as shall be assigned to it by the General Convention as to policies and strategies concerning the common worship of this Church.

Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of the Book of Common Prayer.

Cause to be prepared and to present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the Lectionary, Psalter, and offices for special occasions as authorized or directed by the General Convention or Convocation of Bishops.

Recommend to the General Convention authorized translations of the Holy Scripture from which the Lessons prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer are to be read.

(o) At the first meeting of the Executive Council following the adjournment of a General Convention, and subject to budgeted funds available for the purpose, the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, having reviewed the resolutions adopted by the General Convention that provide for any study or further action, shall thereupon recommend to Executive Council, the creation of such study committees and task forces as may be necessary to complete that work. Any Executive Council resolution creating a task force or study committee shall specify the size and composition, the clear and express duties assigned, the time for completion of the work assigned, to whom the body's report is to be made, and the amount and source of the funding for the body. The members of each such body shall be jointly appointed by the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, and the

composition of such committees and task forces shall reflect the diverse voices of the Church and a balance of the Church's orders consistent with the historic polity of the Church. Those committees and task forces so appointed shall expire at the beginning of the next General Convention following, unless reappointed by the Presiding Bishop and President of the House of Deputies and reauthorized by the Executive Council.

Following the time set aside for questions, the Presiding Bishop asked the Joint Session to acknowledge the work of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance with applause.

Certification of Deputies

The House of Deputies Committee on Credentials presented its Report #11 for the afternoon session of the Seventh Legislative Day. There were 422 clerical deputies and 422 lay deputies certified and seated, bringing the total count of the House to 844, representing 110 dioceses in the clerical order and 109 in the lay order. The number of votes for a motion to prevail by a simple majority was 423. The number of votes for a motion to prevail by a two-thirds majority was 563. The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail was 55 in the lay order and 56 in the clerical order. The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail by a two-thirds majority was 73 in the lay order and 74 in the clerical order. There were no new deputies certified and 47 changes in deputation on this day, as follows:

Episcopal Church Women

The House welcomed Mrs. Lisa Towle, President-elect of the Episcopal Church Women. Mrs. Towle addressed the House.

Governance and Structure

The House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure presented its Report #15 on Resolution Do13 (Budget Process for The Episcopal Church) and moved adoption of a substitute.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Do13)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention amend the Canons in order to conform the canonical budget process to the current practice of the Church, and be it further.

Resolved, That full payment of the assessments asked of dioceses be made mandatory of each diocese, with an appeal process that allows Executive Council to grant waivers; and be it further Resolved, That the Canon 1.1.8, Canon I.1.11, Canon I.1.13(b), Canon I.2.6, Canon I.4.6, and Joint Rules of Order of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies 10(c) be amended as follows:

Sec. 8. The General Convention shall adopt, at each regular meeting, a budget to provide for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop together with the necessary expenses of that office, the necessary expenses stipend of the President of the House of Deputies together with the necessary expenses of that office, including the staff and Advisory Council required to assist in the performance of the duties and matters related to the President's office, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments. To defray the expense of this budget, an assessment shall be levied upon the Dioceses of the Church in accordance with a formula which the Convention shall adopt as part of this Expense Budget. It shall be the duty of each Diocesan Convention to forward to the Treasurer of the General Convention annually, on the first Monday of January, the amount of the assessment levied upon that Diocese.

Canon I.1.11

Sec. 11. The Treasurer Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance shall submit to the General Convention at each regular meeting thereof a detailed budget in which the Treasurer proposes to request appropriations for the ensuing budgetary period and. The Chief Financial Officer of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, under the direction of the Treasurer and Executive Council, shall have power to expend all sums of money covered by this budget, subject to such provisions of the Canons as shall be applicable.

Canon I.1.13(b)

(b) The Executive Office of the General Convention shall include the functions of the Secretary and the Treasurer of the General Convention and those of the Manager of the General Convention and, if the several positions are filled by different persons, such officers shall serve under the general supervision of the General Convention Executive Officer, who shall also coordinate the work of the Committees, Commissions, Boards and Agencies funded by the General Convention Expense-Budget. Canon I.2.6

Sec. 6. The stipends of the Presiding Bishop and such personal assistants as may be necessary during the Presiding Bishop's term of office for the effective performance of the duties, and the necessary expenses of that office, shall be fixed by the General Convention and shall be provided for in the budget to be submitted by the Treasurer Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, as provided in the Canon entitled, "Of the General Convention."

Canon I.4.6

Sec. 6 (a) The Executive Council shall submit to the General Convention at each regular session thereof the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance the proposed Budget for the Episcopal Church for the ensuing budgetary period, which budgetary period shall be equal to the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The proposed budget shall be submitted not less than four months before the ensuing General Convention is convened.

(b) The budget proposed for adoption by General Convention shall include a Canonical and corporate portion which shall provide for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop together with the necessary expenses of that office, the necessary expenses of

the President of the House of Deputies, including the staff and Advisory Council required to assist in the performance of the duties and matters related to the President's office, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments, and also the corporate requirements for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices.

- (c) (b) The budget proposed for adoption by the General Convention shall include provision for support for the Program all expenditures of the Episcopal Church. The program so submitted shall include a detailed budget of that part of the program for which it proposes to make appropriations for the ensuing year, and estimated budgets for the succeeding portion of the budgetary period.
- (d) (c) Revenue to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall be generated primarily by a single asking assessment of the Dioceses of the church based on a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of its Program, Budget, and Finance process. If in any year the total anticipated income for budget support is less than the amount required to support the budget approved by the General Convention, the canonical portion of the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas subject to any decreases necessary to maintain a balanced budget.
- (d) Full payment of the diocesan assessment shall be expected of all dioceses. Any diocese may appeal to Executive Council for a Waiver of the required assessment, in full or in part, on the basis of financial hardship, a stated plan for working toward full payment, or other reasons as agreed with Executive Council. Failure to make full payment or to receive a Waiver shall render bishops, clergy, and lay persons from the diocese ineligible for appointment or election to an office in the church-wide structure, and shall render the diocese ineligible to receive grants or loans from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. This provision shall take effect with the 79th General Convention.
- (e) After the preparation of the budget the Executive Council Chief Financial Officer shall, at least four months before the sessions of the General Convention, transmit to the Bishop of each Diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed askings assessment necessary to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church. The Executive Council Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance shall also submit to the General Convention, with the budget, a plan for the askings assessments of the respective Dioceses of the sum needed to execute the budget.
- (f) There shall be joint sessions of the two Houses for the presentation of the Budget for the Episcopal Church; and thereafter consideration shall be given and appropriate action taken thereon by the General Convention. The Council shall have the power to expend all sums of money covered by the budget and estimated budgets approved by the Convention, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention, including but not limited to the priority declaration set forth in Section 6(d) (c) of this Canon. It shall also have power to undertake such other work provided for in the budget approved by the General Convention, or other work under the jurisdiction of the Council, the need for which may have arisen after the action of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council its income will warrant.
- (g) Upon the adoption by the General Convention of a Budget for the Episcopal Church and the planned askings assessments for the budgetary period, the Council shall formally advise each Diocese of its share of the total askings assessments to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church.
- (h) Each Diocese shall thereupon notify each Parish and Mission of the amount of the askings assessments of such Diocese. Each Diocese shall present to each Parish and Mission a total objective which shall include both its share of the proposed Diocesan Budget and its share of the asking assessments of the Diocese by the Executive Council Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance in accordance with the plan adopted by the General Convention.
- (k) In respect of the Budget for the Episcopal Church, the Executive Council shall have the power to consider and vote to make such adjustments therein, or additions thereto, as it shall deem to be necessary or expedient, and which, in its judgment, available funds and anticipated income will warrant;

and it shall likewise have the power to grant waivers from the full required annual assessments of Dioceses within the limit established by the General Convention.

Joint Rules of Order of the House of Bishops and House of Deputies II Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance

10. (c) During the interim between regular Meetings of the General Convention, the Joint Standing Committee shall act in an advisory capacity to the officers of the General Convention and to the Executive Council, holding such meetings as may be deemed necessary for the purpose.

Meetings of the Joint Standing Committee shall be called by the Chair, or upon the request of any five members thereof.

In respect of the Budget for the Episcopal Church, the Joint Standing Committee shall have the power to consider, and either by vote by mail, or in meeting assembled, to make such adjustments therein, or additions thereto, as it shall deem to be necessary or expedient, and which, in its judgment, available funds and anticipated income will warrant; and it shall likewise have the power to adjust the annual askings of Dioceses within the limit established by the General Convention.

- With regard to the General Church Program, the Joint Standing Committee shall:
 - (i) Meet and consult with the Executive Council, or its Administration and Finance Committee, on adjustments to the program priorities, and on alternate income generating resources;
 - (ii) Receive from the Executive Council, not less than four months prior to the meeting of General Convention, the proposed General Church Program budget for the upcoming triennium, including a proposed detailed Budget for the year next following that of such Convention;
 - (iii) Meet in such places as it shall determine, sufficiently in advance of the next General Convention to expedite its work;
 - (iv) Conduct hearings upon such proposed Program and Budget; and
 - (v) Consider such proposed Program and Budget and report thereon to the next succeeding General Convention.

[Ed. Note: Section (b) was incorrectly presented as an amendment to Canon I.4.6(b). It is a proposed amendment to Canon I.1.8. See the House of Bishops' minutes for clarification.]

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon 4, Sections 6-8, be stricken in their entirety and replaced to read as follows:

Sec. 6. (a) The Executive Council shall submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance the proposed Budget for The Episcopal Church for the ensuing budgetary period, which budgetary period shall be equal to the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The proposed Budget shall be submitted not less than four months before the ensuing General Convention is convened.

- (b) The budget proposed for adoption by General Convention shall include a canonical portion which shall provide for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop together with the necessary expenses of that office, the stipend of the President of the House of Deputies together with the necessary expenses of that office, the staff and Advisory Councils required to assist in the performance of the duties and matters related to the Presiding Bishop's office and the President of the House of Deputies office, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments, and also the corporate requirements for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices.
- (c) Revenue to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church shall be generated primarily by a single assessment of the Dioceses of the Church based on a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of its Budget process. If in any year the total anticipated income for Budget support is less than the amount required to support the Budget approved by the General Convention, the canonical portion

of the Budget for The Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas subject to any decreases necessary to maintain a balanced Budget.

- (d) After the preparation of the Budget, the Treasurer shall, at least four months before the sessions of the General Convention, transmit to the Bishop of each Diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed assessment necessary to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church. The Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance shall also submit to the General Convention, with the Budget, a plan for the assessments of the respective Dioceses of the sum needed to execute the Budget.
- (e) There shall be joint sessions of the two Houses for the presentation of the Budget for The Episcopal Church; and thereafter consideration shall be given and appropriate action taken thereon by the General Convention.
- (f) Upon the adoption by the General Convention of a Budget for The Episcopal Church and the planned assessments for the budgetary period, the Council shall formally advise each Diocese of its share of the total assessments to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church.
- (g) Full payment of the diocesan assessment shall be required of all Dioceses.
- (h) Council shall have the power to grant waivers from the full required annual assessments of Dioceses within the limit established by the General Convention. Any diocese may appeal to Executive Council for a waiver of the required assessment, in full or in part, on the basis of financial hardship, a stated plan for working toward full payment, or other reasons as agreed with the Executive Council. Failure to make full payment or to receive a waiver shall render the diocese ineligible to receive grants or loans from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society unless approved by Executive Council. This provision shall take effect on January 1, 2019.
- (i) The Council shall have the power to expend all sums of money covered by the Budget and estimated Budgets approved by the General Convention, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention, including but not limited to the priority declaration set forth in Section 6(c) of this Canon. It shall also have power to undertake such other work provided for in the Budget approved by the General Convention, or other work under the jurisdiction of the Council, the need for which may have arisen after the action of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council its income will warrant.
- (j) In respect of the Budget for The Episcopal Church, the Executive Council shall have the power to consider and vote to make such adjustments therein, or additions thereto, as it shall deem to be necessary or expedient, and which, in its judgment, available funds and anticipated income will warrant subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention. It shall also have power to approve other initiatives proposed by the Chair or otherwise considered by Council, in consultation with the Chair of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, between meetings of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council are prudent and which the Church revenues will be adequate to support.
- (k) Each Diocese shall annually report to the Executive Council such financial and other information pertaining to the state of the Church in the Diocese as may be required in a form authorized by Executive Council.
- (I) Each Diocese shall report annually to the Executive Council the name and address of each new congregation, and of each congregation closed or removed by reason of any of the following: dissolution of the congregation;
 - 1. removal of the congregation to another Diocese due to cession or retrocession of geographic territory in which the congregation is located, pursuant to Articles V.6 or VI.2 of the Constitution;
 - 2. removal of the congregation to a new physical location or address, identifying both the location or address from which the congregation has removed, and the successor location or address; and

3. merger of the congregation into one or more other congregations, in which case, the Diocese shall include in its report the names of all congregations involved in the merger, and the physical location and address at which the merged congregations shall be located.

- Sec. 7 (a) Every Missionary Bishop or, in case of a vacancy, the Bishop in charge of the jurisdiction, receiving aid from the General Convention Budget, shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of work performed, of money received from all sources and disbursed for all purposes, and of the state of the Church in the jurisdiction at the date of such report, all in such form as the Council may prescribe.
- (b) Every Bishop of a Diocese receiving aid from the General Convention Budget shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of the work in the diocese supported in whole or in part by that aid.

Sec. 8. The Council, as soon as practicable after the close of each fiscal year, shall cause to be prepared and publish a full report of the work of the Executive Council, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the General Convention Office to the Church. Such report shall contain an itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements and a statement of all trust funds and other property of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and of all other trust funds and property in its possession or under its oversight responsibility. The report shall include a detailed schedule of the salaries paid to all officers and principal employees of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Executive Council.

Deputy Salter of Florida moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

To amend section 6(h) to read:

(h) Council shall have the power to grant waivers from the full required annual assessments of Dioceses within the limit established by the General Convention. Any diocese may appeal to Executive Council for a waiver of the required assessment, in full or in part, on the basis of financial hardship, a stated plan for working toward full payment, or other reasons as agreed with the Executive Council. **Effective January 1, 2019, F-f**ailure to make full payment or to receive a waiver shall render the diocese ineligible to receive grants or loans from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society unless approved by Executive Council. **This provision shall take effect on January 1, 2019.**

An electronic vote was taken on the amendment.

BBLSM p. 84: In The Commitment, change the rubric to read "Each member of the couple, in turn, takes the right hand of the other and says"

BBLSM p.84: After "I N., give myself to you, N." add ", and take you to myself."

BBLSM p. 85: At the Pronouncement, change the rubric to read "The Presider joins the right hands and says"

CANON 18: Of the Solemnization of Holy Matrimony

Canon 18: Of the Celebration and Blessing of Marriage

Sec. 1. Every Member of the Clergy of this Church shall conform to the laws of the State governing the creation of the civil status of marriage, and also to the laws of this Church governing these canons concerning the solemnization of marriage Holy Matrimony. Members of the Clergy may solemnize a marriage using any of the liturgical forms authorized by this Church.

Sec. 2. Before solemnizing a marriage the Member of the Clergy shall have ascertained:

- (a) That both parties have the right to contract a marriage according to the laws of the State.
- (b) That both parties understand that Holy Matrimony is a physical and spiritual union of a man and a woman, entered into within the community of faith, by mutual consent of heart, mind, and will, and with intent that it be lifelong.
- (c) That both parties freely and knowingly consent to such marriage, without fraud, coercion, mistake as to identity of a partner, or mental reservation.
- (d) That at least one of the parties has received Holy Baptism.
- (e) That both parties have been instructed as to the nature, meaning, and purpose of Holy Matrimony by the Member of the Clergy, or that they have both received such instruction from persons known by the Member of the Clergy to be competent and responsible.
- Sec. 2. The couple shall notify the Member of the Clergy of their intent to marry at least thirty days prior to the solemnization; Provided, that if one of the parties is a member of the Congregation of the Member of the Clergy, or both parties can furnish satisfactory evidence of the need for shortening the time, this requirement can be waived for weighty cause; in which case the Member of the Clergy shall immediately report this action in writing to the Bishop.

Sec. 3. No Member of the Clergy of this Church shall solemnize any marriage unless the following procedures are complied with:

(a) The intention of the parties to contract marriage shall have been signified to the Member of the Clergy at least thirty days before the service of solemnization; Provided, that for weighty cause, this requirement may be dispensed with if one of the parties is a member of the Congregation of the Member of the Clergy, or can furnish satisfactory evidence of responsibility. In case the thirty days' notice is waived, the Member of the Clergy shall report such action in writing to the Bishop immediately.

- (b) There shall be present at least two witnesses to the solemnization of marriage.
- (c) The Member of the Clergy shall record in the proper register the date and place of the marriage, the names of the parties and their parents, the age of the parties, their residences, and their Church status; the witnesses and the Member of the Clergy shall sign the record.
- (d) The Member of the Clergy shall have required that the parties sign the following declaration:
- (e) "We, A.B. and C.D., desiring to receive the blessing of Holy Matrimony in the Church, do solemnly declare that we hold marriage to be a lifelong union of husband and wife as it is set forth in the Book of Common Prayer.
- (f) "We believe that the union of husband and wife, in heart, body, and mind, is intended by God for their mutual joy; for the help and comfort given one another in prosperity and adversity; and, when it is God's will, for the procreation of children and their nurture in the knowledge and love of the Lord.
- (g) "And we do engage ourselves, so far as in us lies, to make our utmost effort to establish this relationship and to seek God's help thereto."
- Sec. 3. Prior to the solemnization, the Member of the Clergy shall determine:
 - (a) that both parties have the right to marry according to the laws of the State and consent to do so freely, without fraud, coercion, mistake as to the identity of either, or mental reservation; and
 - (b) that at least one of the parties is baptized; and
 - (c) that both parties have been instructed by the Member of the Clergy, or a person known by the Member of the Clergy to be competent and responsible, in the nature, purpose, and meaning, as well as the rights, duties and responsibilities of marriage.
- Sec. 4. Prior to the solemnization, the parties shall sign the following Declaration of Intention:
 - We understand the teaching of the church that God's purpose for our marriage is for our mutual joy, for the help and comfort we will give to each other in prosperity and adversity, and, when it is God's will, for the gift and heritage of children and their nurture in the knowledge and love of God. We also understand that our marriage is to be unconditional, mutual, exclusive, faithful, and lifelong; and we engage to make the utmost effort to accept these gifts and fulfill these duties, with the help of God and the support of our community.
- Sec. 5. At least two witnesses shall be present at the solemnization, and together with the Member of the Clergy and the parties, sign the record of the solemnization in the proper register; which record shall include the date and place of the solemnization, the names of the witnesses, the parties and their parents, the age of the parties, Church status, and residence(s).
- Sec. 6. A bishop or priest may pronounce a blessing upon a civil marriage using any of the liturgical forms authorized by this Church.
- Sec. 4 Sec. 7. It shall be within the discretion of any Member of the Clergy of this Church to decline to solemnize or bless any marriage.; and be it further

Resolved, That this canon shall become effective on the First Sunday of Advent, 2015.

- (i) Discharge such duties as shall be assigned to it by the General Convention as to policies and strategies concerning the common worship of this Church.

- (iv) Recommend to the General Convention authorized translations of the Holy Scripture from which the Lessons prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer are to be read.
- (v) Receive and evaluate requests for consideration of individuals or groups to be included in the Calendar of the Church year and make recommendations thereon to the General Convention for acceptance or rejection.
- (vi) Collect, collate, and catalogue material bearing upon possible future revisions of The Hymnal 1982 and other musical publications regularly in use in this Church and encourage the composition of new musical materials.
- (vii) Cause to be prepared and present to the General Convention recommendations concerning the musical settings of liturgical texts and rubrics, and norms as to liturgical music and the manner of its rendition.
- (viii) At the direction of the General Convention, to serve the Church in matters pertaining to policies and strategies concerning Church music.
- (ix) Collaborate with the Secretary of General Convention to make final edits to the text of resolutions adopted by General Convention that establish new or revised liturgical materials, and to arrange for their publication. For the sole purpose of this collaboration, members of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music are exempt from the terms of office set forth in I.1.2(b) and shall remain in office until their successors are appointed and take office.

In such an event, the Ecclesiastical Authority will provide forms or Certificates to be used, and may, at its discretion, require that copies of such licenses be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority. Requirements and guidelines for the selection, training, continuing education, and deployment of such persons, and the duration of licenses shall be established by the Bishop in consultation with the Commission on Ministry.

- (b) The Presiding Bishop or the Bishop Suffragan for the Armed Forces may authorize a member of the Armed Forces to exercise one or more of these ministries in the Armed Forces in accordance with the provisions of this Canon. Requirements and guidelines for the selection, training, continuing education, and deployment of such persons shall be established by the Bishop granting the license. Sec. 2 (a) If the Ecclesiastical Authority has not delegated authority to issue such licenses as set forth in Section 1(a) above, ∓ the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith may request the Ecclesiastical Authority with jurisdiction to license persons within that congregation or other community of faith to exercise such ministries. Regardless of who issues the license, it The license—shall be issued for a period of time to be determined under Canon III.4.1(a) and may be renewed. The Any such license may be revoked by the Ecclesiastical Authority upon request of or upon notice to the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith.
- (b) In renewing the license, the Ecclesiastical Authority issuing authority shall consider the performance of the ministry by the person licensed, continuing education in the licensed area, and the endorsement of the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith in which the person is serving.

- (a) tenure in the position shall be for a term of not more than twelve months, which term may be renewed from time to time, and
- (b) service in the position shall have the express approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which the service is to be performed, acting in consultation with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which the Priest is canonically resident.
- (c) Anything in this Canon to the contrary notwithstanding, a Priest who has served in a nonstipendiary capacity in a position before resignation may, at the Bishop's request, serve in the same position for a term not to exceed twelve months thereafter, and this term may be renewed.

The written petition shall include sufficient information to inform the Presiding Bishop and the parties involved of the nature, causes, and specifics of the disagreements or dissension imperiling the pastoral relationship. The Presiding Bishop shall initiate such proceedings as are deemed appropriate under the circumstances to attempt to reconcile the parties, which may include the appointment of a consultant or licensed mediator. The parties to the disagreement, following the recommendations of the Presiding Bishop, shall labor in good faith toward that reconciliation. If such proceedings lead to reconciliation, said reconciliation shall contain definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Bishop and the Diocese.

Sec. 10. Reconciliation of Disagreements Affecting the Collegial Relation between Bishops in the Same Diocese

When the collegial relationship between a Bishop Diocesan, Bishop Coadjutor, or Bishop Suffragan is imperiled by disagreement or dissension, and the issues are deemed serious by a Bishop of that Diocese or a two-thirds majority vote of all of the members of the Standing Committee or a two-thirds majority vote of the Diocesan Convention, any party may petition the Presiding Bishop, in writing, to intervene and assist the parties in their efforts to resolve the disagreement or dissension. The written petition shall include sufficient information to inform the Presiding Bishop and the parties involved of the nature, causes, and specifics of the disagreements or dissension imperiling the collegial relationship. The Presiding Bishop shall initiate such proceedings as are deemed appropriate under the circumstances to attempt to reconcile the parties, which may include the appointment of a consultant or licensed mediator. The parties to the disagreement, following the recommendations of the Presiding Bishop, shall labor in good faith toward that reconciliation. If such proceedings lead to reconciliation, said reconciliation shall contain definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Bishops and the Diocese.

Sec. 10 11. Dissolution of the Pastoral Relation between a Bishop and Diocese

Membership of the Executive Council Committee on Anti-Racism shall be composed of one person trained in anti-racism, named by the governing body of each province of this Church, plus one member of the Executive Council Joint Standing Committee on Local Mission and Ministry. The term of each member shall expire at the close of General Convention in 2015. Advocacy and Networking for Mission and one Bishop.

- (a) Each Committee member shall serve one triennium beginning January 1 in the year following each General Convention until the December 31 following the next General Convention. Members may be named to serve consecutive terms by their provinces.
- (b) In the event that a province fails to name a person to serve on the Committee by the January 1, when each term begins, the Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council shall appoint a qualified person from that province to serve on the Committee.
- (c) The Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council shall appoint the member from the Joint Standing Committee on Advocacy and Networking, and the Chair shall appoint the Bishop member.
- (d) Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original members were named. Vacancies in excess of 30 days shall be filled by the Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council, and in the case of a Bishop vacancy, by the Chair of Executive Council.
- (e) To ensure representation of diverse racial and ethnic voices on this Committee, if there are no members named who are from the racial or ethnic groups of black, Latino/a, Asian, Native American/

Indigenous, and non-Hispanic white, then the Chair and Vice Chair of Executive Council shall appoint a member at large from each unrepresented racial or ethnic group.

The clerk, or an assistant clerk who may be appointed at the discretion of the Board, may be any person otherwise qualified who has no conflict of interest in the matter before the Board and who is not barred from serving on the Disciplinary Board under the provisions of IV.5.3(c) or serving on the staff of persons so barred.

(A143)

Resolved, That Canon IV.16 be amended as follows:

A. By a Bishop

Sec. 1. If the Disciplinary Board for Bishops receives information suggesting that a Bishop abandons may have abandoned The Episcopal Church (i) by an open renunciation of the Doctrine, Discipline or Worship of the Church; or (ii) by formal admission into any religious body not in communion with the same this Church; or (iii) by exercising Episcopal acts in and for a religious body other than the Church or another church in communion with the Church, so as to extend to such body Holy Orders as the Church holds them, or to administer on behalf of such religious body Confirmation without the express consent and commission of the proper authority in the Church, the Board shall promptly notify the Presiding Bishop and the Bishop in question that it is considering the matter. Upon receipt of such notification, the Presiding Bishop may, with the advice and consent of the Advisory Council to the Presiding Bishop, place restrictions on the ministry of the Bishop in question for the period while the matter is under consideration by the Board. If, after consideration of the matter, the Board concludes, by a majority vote of all of its members, that the Bishop in question has abandoned The Episcopal Church, the Board it shall be the duty of the Disciplinary Board for Bishops, by a majority vote of all of its members, to certify the fact to the Presiding Bishop and with the certificate to send a statement of the acts or declarations which show such abandonment, which certificate and statement shall be recorded by the Presiding Bishop. The Presiding Bishop shall then place a restriction on the exercise of ministry of said Bishop until such time as the House of Bishops shall investigate the matter and act thereon. During the period of such restriction, the Bishop shall not perform any Episcopal, ministerial or canonical acts.

Sec. 2. The Presiding Bishop, or the presiding officer Presiding Officer of the House of Bishops, shall forthwith give notice to the Bishop of the certification and restriction on ministry. Unless the restricted Bishop, within sixty days, makes declaration by a verified written statement to the Presiding Bishop, that the facts alleged in the certificate are false or utilizes the provisions of Canon III.12.7, the Bishop will be liable to Deposition or Release and Removal. If the Presiding Bishop is reasonably satisfied that the statement constitutes (i) a good faith retraction of the declarations or acts relied upon in the certification to the Presiding Bishop or (ii) a good faith denial that the Bishop made the declarations or committed the acts relied upon in the certificate, the Presiding Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Disciplinary Board for Bishops, shall terminate the restriction. Otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Presiding Bishop to present the matter to the House of Bishops at the next regular or special meeting of the House. The House may, by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote, (1) consent to the deposition of the subject Bishop, in which case the Presiding Bishop shall depose the Bishop from the ordained ministry of The Episcopal Church, and pronounce and record in the presence of two or more Bishops that the Bishop has been so deposed, or (2) consent to the release and removal of the subject Bishop from the ordained ministry of The Episcopal Church, in which case the Presiding Bishop shall declare such release and removal in the presence of two or more Bishops.

(B) By a Priest or Deacon

Sec. 3. If it is reported to the Standing Committee of the Diocese in which a Priest or Deacon is canonically resident that the Priest or Deacon, without using the provisions of Canon III.7.8-10 or III. 9.8-11, has may have abandoned The Episcopal Church, the Standing Committee shall promptly notify the Bishop Diocesan and the Priest or Deacon in question that it is considering the matter. Upon receipt of such notification, the Bishop Diocesan may, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, place restrictions on the ministry of the Priest or Deacon in question for the period while the matter is under consideration by the Standing Committee. then the The Standing Committee shall ascertain and consider the facts, and if it shall determine by a vote of three-fourths of all the members that the Priest or Deacon has abandoned The Episcopal Church by an open renunciation of the Doctrine, Discipline or worship of the Church, or by the formal admission into any religious body not in communion with the Church, or in any other way, it shall be the duty of the Standing Committee of the Diocese to transmit in writing to the Bishop Diocesan, or if there be no such Bishop, to the Bishop Diocesan of an adjacent Diocese, its determination, together with a statement setting out in a reasonable detail the acts or declarations relied upon in making its determination. If the Bishop Diocesan affirms the determination, the Bishop Diocesan shall place a restriction on the exercise of ministry by that Priest or Deacon for sixty days and shall send to the Priest or Deacon a copy of the determination and statement, together with a notice that the Priest or Deacon has the rights specified in Section 2 4of this Canon and at the end of the sixty day period the Bishop Diocesan will consider deposing the Priest or Deacon in accordance with the provisions of Section 4.

Sec. 4. Prior to the expiration of the sixty-day period of restriction, the Priest or Deacon may utilize the provisions of Canon III.7.8-10 or III.9.8-11, as applicable. If within such sixty day period the Priest or Deacon shall transmit to the Bishop Diocesan a statement in writing signed by the Priest or Deacon, which the Bishop Diocesan is reasonably satisfied constitutes a good faith retraction of such declarations or acts relied upon in the determination or good faith denial that the Priest or Deacon committed the acts or made the declarations relied upon in the determination, the Bishop Diocesan shall withdraw the notice and the restriction on ministry shall expire. If, however, within the sixty day period, the Bishop Diocesan does not declare the release and removal of the Priest or Deacon in accordance with Canon III.7.8-10 or III.9.8-11, as applicable, or the Priest or Deacon does not make retraction or denial as provided above, then it shall be the duty of the Bishop Diocesan either (i) to depose of the Priest or Deacon or (ii) if the Bishop Diocesan is satisfied that no previous

irregularity or misconduct is involved, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, to pronounce and record in the presence of two or more Priests that the Priest or Deacon is released and removed from the ordained Ministry of this Church and from the obligations attendant thereto, and (for causes which do not affect the person's moral character) is deprived of the right to exercise in The Episcopal Church the gifts and spiritual authority conferred in Ordination.

Sec. 5. For the purposes of Section 3 and 4 of this Canon, if there is no Bishop Diocesan, the Standing Committee shall submit the matter to the Bishop Diocesan of an adjacent Diocese, who shall have the authority of a Bishop Diocesan in the matter.

(A129)

Resolved, That Canons IV.6.5 and IV.6.6 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 5. If the Intake Officer determines that the information, if true, would not constitute an Offense, the Intake Officer shall inform the Bishop Diocesan of an intention to dismiss the matter. If the Bishop Diocesan does not object, the Intake Officer shall dismiss the matter. The Intake Officer shall provide written notice to the Complainant, the subject Member of the Clergy, and the Bishop Diocesan of the decision of dismissal, the reasons therefor, and the Complainant's right to appeal the decision within thirty days of the date of the notice and shall send a copy of that notice and the written intake report to the president of the Disciplinary Board. If the Complainant wishes to appeal the dismissal, the Intake Officer shall assist the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the acts complained of, which statement shall be sent by the Intake Officer to the president of the Disciplinary Board, along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the dismissal. the Bishop shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant within 15 days of the date of the notice of dismissal. The Advisor shall assist the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the acts complained of, which statement shall be sent by the Advisor to the president of the Disciplinary Board, along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the dismissal. The intake report and any related information, in the case of a dismissal, shall be retained by the Intake Officer and may be considered in connection with any additional information that may come to the Intake Officer thereafter concerning the subject Member of the Clergy.

Sec. 6. In the event of an appeal of a dismissal, the president of the Disciplinary Board shall, within thirty days of the receipt of the appeal, review the intake report and either affirm or overrule the dismissal. The president shall promptly notify the Complainant and the Complainant's Advisor, the subject Member of the Clergy and the subject Member's Advisor, if any, the Intake Officer, and the Bishop Diocesan of the decision. If the decision is to overrule the dismissal, the president shall refer the intake report to the Reference Panel within 15 days.; and be it further Resolved, That Canon IV.19.10(b) be amended to read as follows:

(b) The Bishop Diocesan shall make an Advisor available to the Complainant not later than the earliest of (1) the forwarding of the intake report to the Reference Panel, (2) the Complainant's appeal of 15 days after the Complainant receiving word of a dismissal under Canon IV.6.5, (3) the Respondent or Bishop Diocesan proposing terms of discipline to the other under Canon IV.9, or (4) the Bishop's designation of an Injured Person as a Complainant.

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #22 on HB Message #126 on Resolution A138 (Amend Canon IV.14.8 Shorten Times) and moved concurrence.

Final Text of Resolution:

(A138)

Resolved, That Canon IV.14.8 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 8 (a) Except for an Order from a Conference Panel to which the Respondent or Church Attorney has timely filed a notice of objection, \mp the Bishop Diocesan shall have thirty-twenty days from the date of the issuance of the Order in which to advise in writing the Respondent, the Respondent's Advisor, the Complainant, the Complainant's Advisor, the Church Attorney, and the president of the Conference Panel or Hearing Panel (whichever Panel issued the Order) whether the Bishop Diocesan will pronounce the Sentence or accept the other terms of the Order as recommended. The Bishop Diocesan shall advise that he or she will (a) pronounce the Sentence as recommended or (b) pronounce a lesser Sentence than that recommended and/or (c) reduce the burden on the Respondent of any of the other terms of the Order.

(b) The Bishop Diocesan shall pronounce Sentence not sooner than forty twenty days following the issuance of the Order and not later than sixty forty days following the issuance of the Order. Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, no Sentence shall be pronounced while an appeal of the matter is pending. However, the Bishop Diocesan may, while an appeal is pending, place restrictions upon the exercise of the Respondent's ministry, or place the Respondent on Administrative Leave, or continue any such restriction or Administrative Leave as was in effect at the time of the issuance of the Order. The Bishop Diocesan's pronouncement of a lesser Sentence than that recommended or other modification shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remainder of the Order.

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #23 on HB Message #125 on Resolution A134 (Amend Canon IV.12.12 Move to 14.8) and moved concurrence.

Upon receipt of the notice of objection, the president of the Conference Panel shall notify the president of the Disciplinary Board of the objection and the matter will proceed as provided in Canon IV.14.11. is is issued. Upon receipt of the notice of objection, the president of the Conference Panel shall notify and provide copies of the notice of objection to the Bishop, President of the Disciplinary Board and the non-objecting party. The President of the Disciplinary Board shall promptly notify members of the Hearing Panel and refer the matter to the Hearing Panel.

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #24 on Resolution A127 (Amend Canon IV.5 Add Canon IV.5.4) and moved adoption with amendment.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon IV.5 is hereby amended by adding Canon IV. 5.4 to read as follows:

Sec. 4(a). The President of the Hearing Panel shall have the authority, upon reasonable notice, to impose sanctions on the Respondent, the Respondent's counsel, or the Church Attorney, for conduct that the President deems to be disruptive, dilatory, or otherwise contrary to the integrity of the proceedings. If the conduct in question is that of the Respondent's counsel, notice shall be given to the following: the Respondent, Respondent's counsel, and Respondent's Advisor. If the conduct in question is that of the Church Attorney, notice shall be given to each of the Church Attorney, the Bishop Diocesan, and the person or Diocesan body with authority to remove or replace the Church Attorney.

Sec. 4(b). Sanctions which may be imposed pursuant to Section 5(a) above include but may not be limited to

- (i) refusing to allow the disobedient party to support or oppose claims or defenses;
- (ii) refusing to allow the disobedient party from introducing certain matters into evidence;
- (iii) striking claims or defenses or responses; or
- (iv) disqualification of counsel.

Sec. 4(c). Within 10 days of the imposition of sanctions under this section, the sanctioned party may appeal the sanction to the Disciplinary Board (excluding the members of the Hearing Panel). The President of the Disciplinary Board shall establish a hearing date and convene the Disciplinary Board members, within 20 days, either personally or telephonically, to consider the appeal. The Disciplinary Board shall issue its ruling within three days of conclusion of the hearing. The ruling of the Disciplinary Board cannot be the subject of an interlocutory appeal.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon <u>IV.5 is hereby amended by adding Canon IV.</u> <u>5.4-IV.13 is hereby amended by adding a new section 7,</u> to read as follows:

Sec. 4–7(a). The President of the Hearing Panel shall have the authority, upon reasonable notice, to impose sanctions on the Respondent, the Respondent's counsel, or the Church Attorney, for conduct that the President Hearing Panel deems to be disruptive, dilatory, or otherwise contrary to the integrity of the proceedings. If the conduct in question is that of the Respondent's counsel, notice shall be given to the following: the Respondent, Respondent's counsel, and Respondent's Advisor. If the conduct in question is that of the Church Attorney, notice shall be given to each of the Church Attorney, the Bishop Diocesan, and the person or Diocesan body with authority to remove or replace the Church Attorney. - (i) amending a scheduling order:
- (ii) limiting discovery;
- (iii) refusing to allow the disobedient party to support or oppose claims or defenses;
- (<u>-ii-iv</u>) refusing to allow the disobedient party <u>from introducing to introduce</u> certain matters into evidence;
- (<u>iii-v</u>) striking claims or defenses or responses; or
- (<u>iv</u>vi) disqualification of counsel.

<u>Sec. 4</u>(c) Within 10 days of the imposition of sanctions under this section, the sanctioned party may appeal the sanction to the Disciplinary Board (excluding the members of the Hearing Panel). <u>The standard of review for such appeal shall be de novo.</u> The President of the Disciplinary Board shall

establish a hearing date and convene the Disciplinary Board members, within 20 days, either personally or telephonically, to consider the appeal. The Disciplinary Board shall issue its ruling within three days of conclusion of the hearing. The ruling of the Disciplinary Board cannot be the subject of an interlocutory appeal.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A009)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon 1.3 be amended to read as follows:

The Constitution of the said Society, which was incorporated by an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, as-and from time to time amended, is hereby amended and established so as to read as follows: Constitution of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America as established in 1821, and since amended at various times.

ARTICLE I This organization shall be called The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and shall be considered as comprehending all persons who are members of the Church. (DFMS).

ARTICLE II The Executive Council, as constituted by Canon, shall be its Board of Directors, and shall adopt By-laws for its government not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons.

ARTICLE III The officers of the Society shall be a President, Vice Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as may be appointed in accordance with the Canons or By-laws. The Presiding Bishop of the Church shall be the President of the Society DFMS; one Vice President shall be the person who is the President of the House of Deputies Presiding Deputy; and one Vice President shall be the person who is the Chief Operating Officer Church General Manager; the Treasurer shall be the person who is also serve as the Chief Financial Officer of the Executive Council; and the Secretary shall be the person who is the Secretary of the Executive Council, and shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be assigned by the By-laws. The other officers of the Society shall be such as are provided for by the By-laws of the Society DFMS. The tenure of office, compensation, powers, and duties of the officers of the Society DFMS shall be such as are prescribed by the Canons and by the By-laws of the Society DFMS not inconsistent therewith. with the Canons.

ARTICLE IV This Constitution of the Society maybe altered or amended at any time by the General Convention of the Church.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Do11)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention eliminate provincial structures in the Episcopal Church; and be it further,

Resolved, That the good work of the Province IX Sustainability Project be continued; and be it further Resolved, That all dioceses outside the United States continue to receive churchwide budgetary resources and staff support as needed; and be it further

Resolved, That the Canon I.1.14(c), Canon 1.2.1(a), Canon 1.2.1(b), Canon 1.2.1(c), Canon 1.4.1(c), Canon 1.4.2(a), Canon 1.4.3(c), Canon 1.4.3(d), Canon 1.4.6(e), Canon 1.7.1, Canon1.9, Canon 1.11.2(f), Canon 1.11.3(c), Canon 1.15.10(a), Canon III.5.1(c), Canon III.11.1(b), Canon III.11.5, Canon III.11.8(a), Canon III.11.9(c)(2), Canon III.11.9(c)(3)(i), Canon IV.5.4, Canon IV.15.1(d), Canon IV.15.2, Canon IV.15.3, Canon IV.15.4, Canon IV.19.5(c)(1), Canon IV.19.19, Canon IV.19.23(b), Canon V.4.1(c), Canon V.4.1(d), House of Bishops Rule of Order XXVII, House of Deputies Rule of Order 9, House of Deputies Rule of Order 22(b), House of Deputies II be amended as follows:

Canon I.1.14(c)

(c) From the sites approved by the General Convention, the Joint Committee, with the advice and consent of a majority vote of the following: The Presidents and the Vice-Presidents of both Houses of Convention, the Presidents of the Provinces and the Executive Council, shall determine the site for such General Convention and proceed to make all reasonable and necessary arrangements and commitments for that meeting of the General Convention. The site and date thus selected shall be deemed to have been appointed by the General Convention, as provided in the Constitution. Canon 1.2.1(a)

At each General Convention the House of Deputies shall elect one Clerical and one Lay Deputy from each Province as members of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop. A Deputy from a particular Province may be nominated only by another Deputy from the same Province, but the election of each member of the Committee shall be by the entire membership of the House of Deputies, with a majority of those voting necessary for election. Prior to the election, the Clerical and Lay Deputies from each Province shall hold a caucus, at which two

Clerical Deputies and two Lay Deputies as nominees shall be selected by the caucus, and these shall be the only nominees upon which the House of Deputies shall vote inelecting the members of the Joint Nominating Committee. At each General Convention the House of Deputies shall elect six Clerical and six Lay Deputies as members of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop. The President of the House of Deputies, after consultation with representatives of youth, shall appoint two persons, age 16-21, as members of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop.

Canon 1.2.1(b)

At each General Convention the House of Bishops shall elect one Bishop from each Province as a member of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop. A Bishop from a particular Province may be nominated only by another Bishop from the same Province, but the election of each member of the Committee shall be by the entire membership of the House of Bishops, with a majority of those voting necessary for election. Prior to the election, the Bishops from each Province shall hold a caucus, at which two Bishops as nominees shall be selected by the caucus, and these shall be the only nominees upon which the House of Bishops shall vote in electing the members of the Joint Nominating Committee. At each General Convention the House of Bishops shall elect six Bishops as members of the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop.

Canon 1.2.1(c)

In the event vacancies shall occur in the Joint Nominating Committee after the election of its members due to death, disability, resignation, or other cause within one year of the next General Convention, the vacancies shall not be filled and the remaining members shall constitute the Joint Nominating Committee. In the event such vacancies shall occur more than one year prior to the next General Convention, the Presiding Officer of the House of Bishops shall appoint Bishops and the President of the House of Deputies shall appoint Clerical and Lay Deputies , in all cases from the same Provinces as those Bishops or Deputies whose positions are being filled. An elected or appointed member who shall not be a Deputy to the next General Convention shall continue as a member of the Joint Nominating Committee until the adjournment of such next General Convention. A member of the Committee who transfers from one Province to another or a Lay Deputy who is ordained Presbyter or Deacon, or a Presbyter or Deacon who is consecrated a Bishop, shall not thereby become ineligible to continue to serve on the Joint Nominating Committee through the next succeeding General Convention.

Canon 1.4.1(c)

(c) The Executive Council shall be composed (a) of twenty thirty members elected by the General Convention, of whom four six shall be Bishops, four six shall be Presbyters or Deacons, and twelve eighteen shall be Lay Persons who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing (two three Bishops, two three Presbyters or Deacons, and six nine Lay Persons to be elected by each subsequent regular meeting of the General Convention); (b) of eighteen members elected by the Provincial Synods; (e b) of the following ex officiis members: the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies; and (d c) the Chief Operating Officer, the Secretary, the Treasurer of the General Convention and the Chief Financial Officer, who shall have seat and voice but no vote. Each Province shall be entitled to be represented by one Bishop or Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province and by one Lay Person who is a confirmed adult communicant in good standing of a Diocese which is a constituent member of the Province, and the terms of the representatives of each Province shall be so rotated that two persons shall not be simultaneously elected for equal terms.

Canon 1.4.2(a)

Sec. 2 (a) Of the members to be elected by the General Convention, t The Bishops shall be elected by the House of Bishops subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies, and the Presbyters or

Deacons and Lay Persons shall be elected by the House of Deputies subject to confirmation by the House of Bishops.

Canon 1.4.2(c)

(c) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through the death or resignation of a member elected by the General Convention—or through the change in status of any such member by consecration or ordination, the Council shall fill such vacancy by the election of a suitable person to serve until a successor is elected by the General Convention. The General Convention shall elect a suitable person to serve the portion of any term which will remain unexpired.

Canon 1.4.2(d)

(d) Should any vacancy occur in the Council through the failure of any Provincial Synod to elect a member, or through the death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such member, the President and Provincial Council of the Province shall appoint a suitable person, canonically resident in such Province, to serve until the Provincial Synod shall by election fill the vacancy.

Canon 1.4.6(e)

(e) After the preparation of the budget the Executive Council shall, at least four months before the sessions of the General Convention, transmit to the Bishop of each Diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed askings necessary to support the Budget for the Episcopal Church. The Executive Council shall also submit to the General Convention, with the budget, a plan for the askings of the respective Dioceses of the sum needed to execute the budget. Canon 1.7.1(a)

Sec. 1. In every Province, Diocese, Parish, Mission and Institution connected with this Church, the following standard business methods shall be observed:

(a) All accounts of Provinces shall be audited annually by an independent certified public accountant, or independent licensed accountant, or such audit committee as shall be authorized by the Provincial Council. The Audit Report shall be filed with the Provincial Council not later than September 1 of each year, covering the preceding calendar year.

Canon 1.9

CANON 9: Of Provinces [Ed Note: Delete the entire Canon sections 1-12.]

Canon 1.11.2(f)

- (f) An Area Mission which shall have been undertaken under the sole auspices of this Church, with a Bishop of this Church assigned to give episcopal oversight, shall be entitled to representation in the Provincial House of Bishops and the Provincial House of Deputies in the Province of which it is a part. Canon 1.11.3(c)
- (c) In every Missionary Diocese there shall be an annual Convention, composed of the Bishop or Bishops, the other Clergy of the Diocese, and Lay Delegates from the organized Congregations. Such Convention shall elect a Standing Committee, in accordance with the diocesan Canons, which shall have the powers and duties set forth for Standing Committees in Canon I.12 and in other Canons of the General Convention. It shall also elect Clerical and Lay Deputies and alternate Deputies to the General Convention, in accordance with its diocesan Canons, and the provisions of Article I.4 of the Constitution. If the Missionary Diocese is a member of a Province of this Church, it shall also provide for Clerical and Lay Deputies and alternate Deputies to the Synod, in accordance with the diocesan Canons and the provisions of the Ordinances of the Province.

Canon 1.15.10(a)

(a) With the permission of the Presiding Bishop, the Bishop in Charge and the Council of Advice may (i) engage a Diocese of this Church to provide the needed Disciplinary Structures to fulfill the requirements of the Canons of this Church, or (ii) establish among the Congregations of the Convocation the needed Disciplinary Structures to fulfill the requirements of the Canons of this Church. In either case, the Provincial Court of Review shall either be that of the Diocese providing the needed Disciplinary Structures or that of the Province of the Convocation; and, for the purposes of

implementing the provisions for Ecclesiastical Discipline (Title IV) of a member of the Clergy, the Bishop in Charge shall serve the function reserved for the Bishop Diocesan, except that the Presiding Bishop must approve any Accord, any Agreement for Discipline and the terms of any Order, and pronounce the Sentence.

Canon III.5.1(c)

(c) In case of a vacancy in the episcopate in a Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority may authorize and request the President of the House of Bishops of the Province Bishop of another diocese to take order for an ordination.

Canon III.11.1(b)

(b) In lieu of electing a Bishop, the Convention of a Diocese may request that an election be made on its behalf by the House of Bishops of the Province of which the Diocese is a part, subject to confirmation by the Provincial Synod, or it may request that an election be made on its behalf by the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church.

Canon III.11.5

Sec. 5. Upon receipt of the consents and assurance of the acceptance of the election by the Bishop-elect, the Presiding Bishop shall take order for the ordination of the Bishop-elect either—by the Presiding Bishop or the President of the House of Bishops of the Province of which the Diocese for which the Bishop was elected is part, and two other Bishops of this Church, or by any three Bishops to whom the Presiding Bishop may communicate the testimonials.

Canon III.11.8(a)

(a) Within ten days after the election of a Bishop Diocesan, a Bishop Coadjutor, or a Bishop Suffragan by a Diocesan Convention, delegates constituting no less than ten percent of the number of delegates casting votes on the final ballot may file with the Secretary of the Convention written objections to the election process, setting forth in detail all alleged irregularities. Within ten days after receipt thereof, the Secretary of the Convention shall forward copies of the same to the Bishop Diocesan, the Chancellor and Standing Committee of the Diocese, and to the Presiding Bishop, who shall request the Court of Review of the Province in which the Diocese is located to investigate the complaint. The Court of Review may invite response by the Bishop Diocesan, the Chancellor, the Standing Committee and any other persons within the Diocese for which the Bishop was elected. Within thirty days after receipt of the request, the Court of Review shall send a written report of its findings to the Presiding Bishop, a copy of which report the Presiding Bishop, within fifteen days, shall cause to be sent to the Bishop Diocesan, the Chancellor, the Standing Committee and the Secretary of the Convention of the electing Diocese. The Secretary shall send a copy of the report to each of the delegates who filed objection to the election process.

Canon III.11.9(c)

Missionary Bishops

- (1) The election of a person to be a Bishop in a Missionary Diocese shall be held in accordance with the procedures set forth in the Constitution and Canons of this Church.
- (2) The Convention of a Missionary Diocese may, in lieu of electing a Bishop, request that such election be made on its behalf by the Synod of the Province, or the House of Bishops of the Province subject to confirmation of the Provincial Council, or the Regional Council of Churches in communion with this Church of which the Diocese is a member. A Certificate of the Election, signed by the presiding officer and the Secretary of the Synod or Provincial House of Bishops, or Regional Council, and a testimonial in the form required in Canon III.11signed by a constitutional majority of the Synod, Provincial House of Bishops or Regional Council, shall be transmitted by its presiding officer to the Standing Committee of the Missionary Diocese on whose behalf such election was made. The Standing Committee shall thereupon proceed as set forth in Canon III.11, the above Certification of Election and Testimonial serving in lieu of evidence of election and testimonial therein required.

(3 2) The Convention of a Missionary Diocese may, in lieu of electing a Bishop, request that such election may be made on its behalf by the House of Bishops. Such choice shall be subject to confirmation by a majority of the Standing Committees of the several Dioceses. The medical certificate as required in Canon III.11 shall also be required of Missionary Bishops-elect.

(i) When the House of Bishops is to elect a Bishop for a Missionary Diocese within a given Province, the President of the Province may convene the Synod of the Province prior to the meeting of the House of Bishops at which a Bishop for such Missionary Diocese is to be elected. The Synod of the Province may thereupon nominate not exceeding three persons to the House of Bishops for that office. It shall be the duty of the President of the Province to transmit such nominations, if any be made, to the Presiding Officer of the House of Bishops, communicate the same to the Bishops, along with other nominations that have been made, in accordance with the Rules of Order of the House. Each Province containing a Missionary Diocese shall, by Ordinance, provide the manner of convening the Synod and making such nomination.

Canon IV

All references in Title IV to "Provincial Court of Review" shall be amended to read "Court of Review". Canon IV.5.4 [Ed Note: Delete existing Section 4 and replace it with new text in italics.]

- Sec. 4. There shall be a Court of Review for the church with jurisdiction to receive and determine appeals from Hearing Panels of Dioceses as provided in Canon IV.15 and to determine venue issues as provided in Canon IV.19.5.
- (a) The Court of Review shall consist of: (i) one Bishop; two Priests or one Priest and one Deacon; and two lay persons; and (ii) two Bishops, four Priests or Deacons of whom at least three shall be priests, and four lay persons to serve as alternates as hereinafter provided. Each Priest or Deacon, whether a member or alternate, shall be canonically resident in a Diocese different from any other Priest or Deacon, and each lay person, whether a member or alternate, shall reside in a Diocese different from any other lay person. The Priests, Deacons and lay persons shall be members of the Disciplinary Boards of their respective Dioceses.
- (b) The members and alternates of the Court of Review shall be appointed annually by the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies. The Court of Review shall select a president from among its members.
- (c) The persons appointed to the Court of Review shall continue to serve until their respective successors have been appointed, except in case of death, resignation or declination to serve.
- (d) No member of the Court of Review may serve in any matter originating from the Diocese in which such member serves on the Disciplinary Board. In such event, the alternate shall serve.
- (e) In the event that any member of the Court of Review is excused pursuant to the provisions of Canon IV.5.3(c), or, upon objection made by either party to the appeal is deemed by the other members of the Court of Review to be disqualified, such member's alternate shall serve.
- (f) In the event of any Court of Review member's death, resignation or declination to serve, or disability rendering the member unable to act or is ineligible to serve under Canons IV.5.4(d) or (e), and in the further event that there is no alternate available to serve, the president of the Court of Review shall declare a vacancy on the Court of Review. Notices of resignation or declination to serve shall be communicated in writing to the president of the Court of Review.
- (g) Vacancies on the Court of Review shall be filled by appointment by the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies from persons qualified as provided in Canon IV.5.4(a).
- (h) The Court of Review shall appoint a clerk who may be a member of the Court, who shall be custodian of all records and files of the Court of Review and who shall provide administrative services as needed for the functioning of the Court.
- (i) The rules of procedure for appeals to the Court of Review are as provided in Canon IV.15, but the Court of Review may adopt, alter or rescind supplemental rules of procedure not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Church.

Canon IV.15.1

Sec. 1. In the event that proceedings before the Hearing Panel are unreasonably delayed or suspended, and are not resumed within sixty days following a written request for resumption of proceedings from the Church Attorney or the Respondent, the Church Attorney or the Respondent may file a written request with the Provincial—Court of Review for an order directing the Hearing Panel to resume the proceedings. The Court of Review shall consider the request as follows:

- (a) The person filing the request shall provide copies of the request to the presidents of the Hearing Panel and of the Disciplinary Board. The request shall include a statement of the status of the proceedings and the reason, if known, for the delay or suspension of proceedings, and a description of all actions taken by the person filing the request or by any other person to resolve any impediment to the proceedings or other cause for the delay.
- (b) Within fifteen days of receipt of the copy of the request, the president of the Hearing Panel shall file a response to the request with the Provincial—Court of Review, with a copy to the Church Attorney, the Respondent and the president of the Board.
- (c) The Provincial—Court of Review shall convene, either personally or telephonically by online or telephone conference, to consider the request and the response, if any, from the Hearing Panel. The Court shall then either issue an order directing resumption of the proceedings or an order declining to direct resumption with an explanation of the reasons therefor. The order issued by the Provincial Court of Review shall be binding upon the Hearing Panel.
- (d) In the event a Hearing Panel, having been ordered to resume proceedings, either refuses to do so or is unable to do so, the Church Attorney or the Respondent may request that the Provincial Court of Review order the transfer of the proceedings to a Hearing Panel of another Diocese within the same Province, including an order to the Board of the originating Diocese to transmit the complete record of the proceedings to the successor Hearing Panel.

Canon IV.15.2

Sec. 2. Within forty days after issuance of an Order by a Hearing Panel, the Respondent or the Church Attorney may appeal to the Provincial-Court of Review, by serving written notice of the appeal upon the Bishop Diocesan, with copies copy of the notice to the presidents of the Hearing Panel and the Province. The notice of appeal shall be signed by the Respondent's counsel or the Church Attorney and shall include a copy of the Order from which the appeal is taken and shall state the grounds of the appeal.

Canon IV.15.3

Sec. 3. Any Order from a Hearing Panel finding that a Respondent did not commit an Offense involving a question of the Doctrine, Faith or Worship of the Church may be appealed by the Bishop Diocesan upon the written request of at least two Bishops Diocesan of other Dioceses within the Province who are not members of the Provincial-Court of Review. Such an appeal shall be taken on the question of the Church's Doctrine, Faith and Worship only, and may not seek to reverse the finding of the Hearing Panel of noncommission of other Offenses. An appeal under this section may be taken by service of a notice of appeal by the Bishop Diocesan upon the Respondent, the Church Attorney and the presidents-of the Hearing Panel and the Province-within forty days after the Order of the Hearing Panel is received by the Bishop Diocesan.

Canon IV.15.4

Sec. 4. If an appeal is taken from a Hearing Panel of a Diocese which is non-provincial, the appeal shall be taken before the Provincial Court of Review geographically closest to that Diocese.

Canon IV.19.5(c)

If objection is made by the Bishop Diocesan of the Diocese of canonical residence as provided in Canon IV.19.5(b), the Bishop Diocesan of the Diocese of canonical residence and the Bishop Diocesan of the Intake Officer's Diocese shall promptly agree as to which Diocese will assume jurisdiction over

the matter and conduct proceedings. If the two Bishops cannot promptly agree, the disagreement will be Resolved as follows:

- (1) If they are in the same Province, either may promptly request the president of the Provincial Court of Review to decide which Diocese shall conduct the proceedings. If they are in different Provinces, e-Either may promptly request the president of the Disciplinary Board for Bishops to decide which Diocese shall conduct the proceedings.
- (2) The requesting Bishop shall provide a copy of the request to the other Bishop. A reply to the request may be made by the non-requesting Bishop within fifteen days of service of the request.
- (3) The president shall have the discretion to hear from the Bishops Diocesan or the Church Attorneys for the respective Dioceses, either personally or telephonically by online or telephone conference, concerning the request and any reply. The president shall have the discretion to request additional submissions from the Bishops Diocesan or the Church Attorneys.
- (4) The president shall decide which Diocese shall conduct the proceedings within thirty days of service of the request.

Canon IV.19.19

Sec. 19. No Chancellor or Vice Chancellor of a Diocese shall serve as Church Attorney in that Diocese. No Chancellor or Vice Chancellor of any Province shall serve as Church Attorney in any Diocese of that Province or any provincial proceeding. Neither the Presiding Bishop's Chancellor nor the Chancellor to the President of the House of Deputies shall serve as Church Attorney in any proceeding. The Church Attorney in any proceeding shall not be from the same law firm as any Chancellor or Vice Chancellor otherwise disqualified under this section.

Canon IV.19.23(b)

(b) The necessary costs and expenses of the Provincial Court of Review shall be the expense of the Province General Convention.

Canon V.4.1(c-d)

- (c) The term of any Member of the Clergy specified to be filled by virtue of a provincial or diocesan canonical residence shall become vacant upon the change of canonical residence to another diocese or to a diocese in a different province, as the case may be.
- (d) The term of any Lay Person specified to be filled by virtue of a provincial or-diocesan residence shall become vacant upon the change of residence to another diocese-or to a diocese in a different province, as the case may be.

House of Bishops Rule of Order XXVII

There shall be an Advisory Committee, composed of Bishops who are the Presidents or Vice-Presidents of each Province, which will act as advisory council to the Presiding Bishop between meetings of the House of Bishops. The Committee shall elect its own officers. The Presiding Bishop shall be authorized to appoint an Advisory Council for consultation and advice in the performance of the duties of the office. The Committee shall elect its own officers.

House of Deputies Rule of Order IV 9

The size of all Committees, unless otherwise noted, shall be at the discretion of the President; Provided, that, when the number of members equals or exceeds the number of Provinces, there shall normally be at least one member from each Province. The President shall be a member, ex officio, of all Committees. The Presiding Officers are encouraged to continue to appoint persons from International Dioceses to the committees and commissions of this church.

House of Deputies Rule of Order 22(b) [Ed Note: Delete paragraph 22(b)(3) and renumber.] House of Deputies Rule of Order 62 b(ii)

(ii) up to 18—24 (not more than two youth from each Province)—who are duly authorized representatives known as The Official Youth Presence shall have seat and voice in a designated section on the floor of the House.

Joint Rules of Order of the House of Bishops and House of Deputies

10. (a) There shall be a Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance, consisting of 27 persons being members of the General Convention (one nine Bishops, and two eighteen members of the House of Deputies, either Lay or Clerical, from each Province), who shall be appointed not later than the fifteenth day of December following each regular Meeting of the General Convention, the Bishops to be appointed by the Presiding Bishop, the Deputies by the President of the House of Deputies.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That a Task Force consisting of three bishops, three clergy persons, and six lay persons representing the geographic diversity of the Church, including persons who have been involved in the creation of churchwide networks through social media and other electronic communications, be appointed by the presiding officers to study the potential effects of eliminating provincial structures in The Episcopal Church; and be it further

Resolved, That the Task Force study issues and potential effects of eliminating Provinces, including consideration of what structures might replace Provinces to facilitate or create networks to support mission and ministry; how such networks might be formed, function, funded, connected to other networks, and be constituted; how geographic diversity in elections, appointments, and other churchwide roles might be accomplished; and what effect the elimination of Provinces would have on overall costs; and be it further

Resolved, That the Task Force shall collaborate with the Standing Commission on Constitution and Canons in order to create recommendations to the 79th General Convention.

Motion carried Substitute resolution adopted

(Communicated to the House of Bishops in HD Message #263)

The House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure presented its Report #50 on Resolution A118 (Amend Canons I.1, I.6.5, I.9.11, and V.1; and Joint Rule of Order V.15) and moved adoption with amendment.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A118)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon I.1 be amended to read as follows:

(a) At the time and place appointed for the meeting of the General Convention, the President of the House of Deputies, or, if absent, the Vice-President of the House, or, if there be neither, a presiding officer pro tempore appointed by the members of the House of Deputies on the Joint Committee of Arrangements for the General Convention, shall call to order the members present. The Secretary of the House of Deputies, or, if absent, a Secretary pro tempore appointed by the presiding officer, shall record the names of those whose testimonials, in due form, shall have been presented, which record shall be prima facie evidence that the persons whose names are therein recorded are entitled to seats. In the event that testimonials are presented by or on behalf of persons from jurisdictions which have not previously been represented in a General Convention, then the Secretary, or one appointed instead as provided herein, shall proceed as provided in Clause (c). If there be a quorum present, the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall so certify, and the House shall proceed to organize by the election, by ballot, of a Secretary of the House of Deputies, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to such election. Nominees for Secretary of the House of Deputies must be confirmed communicants in good standing or clergy of The Episcopal Church. Upon such election, the presiding officer shall declare the House organized. If there be a vacancy in the office of President or Vice-President, the vacancy or vacancies shall then be filled by election, by ballot, the term of any

officer so elected to continue until the adjournment of the General Convention. As soon as such vacancies are filled, the President shall appoint a committee to wait upon the House of Bishops and inform it of the organization of the House of Deputies, and of its readiness to proceed to business.

- (b) There shall be a President and a Vice-President of the House of Deputies, who shall perform the duties normally appropriate to their respective offices or specified in these Canons. They shall be elected not later than the seventh day of each regular meeting of the General Convention in the manner herein set forth. The House of Deputies shall elect from its membership, by a majority of separate ballots, a President and a Vice-President, who shall be of different orders. Such officers shall take office at the adjournment of the regular meeting at which they are elected, and shall continue in office until the adjournment of the following regular meeting of the General Convention. They shall be and remain ex officio members of the House during their term of office. No person elected President or Vice-President shall be eligible for more than three consecutive full terms in each respective office. In case of resignation, death, absence, or inability, of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of the office until the adjournment of the next meeting of the General Convention. In case of resignation, death, absence, or inability of the Vice-President, the President shall appoint a Deputy of the opposite order, upon the advice and consent of the lay persons, presbyters and deacons of the Executive Council, who shall serve until the adjournment of the next meeting of the General Convention. The President shall be authorized to appoint an Advisory Council for consultation and advice in the performance of the duties of the office. The President may also appoint a Chancellor to the President, a confirmed adult communicant of the Church in good standing who is learned in both ecclesiastical and secular law, to serve so long as the President may desire, as counselor in matters relating to the discharge of the responsibilities of that office.
- (c) In order to aid the Secretary of the House of Deputies in preparing the record specified in Clause (a), it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese to forward to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, as soon as may be practicable, a copy of the latest Journal of the Diocesan Convention, together with a certified copy of the testimonials of members aforesaid, and a duplicate copy of such testimonials. Where testimonials are received for persons from jurisdictions which have not previously been represented in General Convention, the Secretary shall ascertain that the applicable provisions of Article V, Section 1, of the Constitution have been complied with prior to such persons being permitted to take their seats in the House.
- (d) The Secretary of the House of Deputies shall keep full minutes of the proceedings of the House; record them, with all reports, in a book provided for that purpose; preserve the Journals and Records of the House; deliver them to the Registrar, as hereinafter provided; and perform such other duties as may be directed by the House. The Secretary shall appoint a First Assistant Secretary of the House of Deputies and may, with the approval of the House, appoint other Assistant Secretaries, and the Secretary , and Assistant Secretaries of the House of Deputies and the First Assistant Secretary shall continue in office until the organization of the next General Convention, and until their successors be chosen.
- (e) It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the House of Deputies General Convention, whenever any alteration of the Book of Common Prayer or of the Constitution is proposed, or any other subject submitted to the consideration of the several Diocesan Conventions, to give notice thereof to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Church in every Diocese, as well as to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, and written evidence that the foregoing requirement has been complied with shall be presented by the Secretary of the General Convention to the General Convention at its next session. All such notices shall be sent by certified or registered mail, with the local Secretary's certificates to be returned. The Secretary of the General Convention shall notify all diocesan Secretaries that it is their duty to make known such proposed alterations of the Book of Common Prayer, and of the Constitution, and such other subjects, to the Conventions of their respective

Dioceses at their next meeting, and to certify to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention that such action has been taken.

- (f) The Secretary of the House of Deputies and the Treasurer of the General Convention shall be entitled to seats upon the floor of the House of Deputies, and, with the consent of the President, they may speak on the subjects of their respective offices.
- (g) At the meetings of the House of Deputies the Rules of Order fo the previous meeting shall be in force until they are amended or repealed by the House.
- (h) In case of the resignation, death or total disability of the President and Vice-President during the recess of the General Convention, the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall perform such *ad interim* duties as may appertain to the office of President until the next meeting of the General Convention or until such disability is removed.
- (i) If, during recess, a vacancy shall occur in the office of Secretary of the House of Deputies, the duties thereof shall devolve upon the First Assistant Secretary, or, if there be none such, upon a Secretary pro tempore appointed by the President of the House of Deputies, or if the office of President be also vacant, then by the Vice-President, and if both offices be vacant, then by the members from the House of Deputies of the Joint Committee on Planning and Arrangements for the next General Convention, appointed by the preceding General Convention.
- (j) At every regular meeting of the General Convention, the Secretary of the House of Deputies elected by the House of Deputies shall, by concurrent action of the two Houses of the General Convention, also be made the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall have responsibility for assembling and printing of the Journal of the General Convention, and for other matters specifically referred to the Secretary by General Convention or its officers to the Secretary of the General Convention. If a vacancy shall occur in the office of Secretary of the General Convention, the duties thereof shall devolve upon a Secretary pro tempore jointly appointed by the President of the House Deputies, or if the office of President be vacant, then by the Vice President, and the Presiding Bishop. The term of the Secretary pro tempore shall extend until the election of a Secretary of the General Convention at the next regular General Convention.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon I.6.5 be amended as follows:

(a) It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Convention of every jurisdiction to forward to the Secretary of the of the House of Deputies General Convention, immediately upon publication, two copies of the Journals of the Convention of the jurisdiction, together with Episcopal charges, statements, and such other records in paper or electronic format as may show the state of the Church in that jurisdiction, and two copies to the Archives of the Church in a common format as prescribed by the Archivist of the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon I.9.11 be amended as follows:

Sec. 11. Each Provincial Synod shall keep minutes, journals or other records of its meetings, and shall transmit one copy of the records to the Secretary of the House of Deputies General Convention, and one copy to the Archives of The Episcopal Church. The Synod shall also transmit copies of any unpublished inactive records to the Archives.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canons V.1.2 and V.1.5 be amended as follows:

Sec. 2. Whenever a Canon is amended, enacted, or repealed in different respects by two or more independent enactments at the same General Convention, including the enactment of an entire Title, the separate enactments shall be considered as one enactment containing all of the amendments or enactments, whether or not repealed, to the extent that the change made in separate amendments or enactments, are not in conflict with each other. The two members of the Committee on Canons from each House of General Convention appointed pursuant to Canon V.1.5(a) shall make the determination whether or not there is a conflict and certify the text of the single enactment to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Sec. 5 (a) The Committee on Canons of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint two of its members to certify the changes, if any, made in the Canons, including a correction of the references made in any Canon to another, and to report the same, with the proper arrangement thereof, to the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal.

(b) The Committee on Constitution of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint a similar committee of two of its members to certify in like manner the changes, if any, made in the Constitution, or proposed to be made therein under the provisions of Article XII of the Constitution, and to report the same to the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal. The committee shall also have and exercise the power of renumbering of, and correction of references to, Articles, Sections and Clauses of the Constitution required by the adoption of amendments to the Constitution at a meeting of the General Convention in the same manner as provided with respect to the Canons in the foregoing Sections 4 and 5(a) of this Canon.; and be it further

Resolved, That Joint Rule of Order V.15, be amended to read as follows:

15. The Secretary of the House of Deputies General Convention, being the Secretary of the General Convention, shall, with the cooperation of the Secretary of the House of Bishops, and of such Bishops as may be appointed by the Presiding Officer of the House of Bishops, prepare a summary of the actions of the General Convention of particular interest to the Congregations of the Church, and make the same available to the Congregations, through the Ministers-in-charge thereof, and to the Lay Deputies; such summary to be sent to the Clergy along with the Pastoral Letter put forth by the House of Bishops, and to be made available to all Deputies on the last day of the Convention, along with such Pastoral Letter, if feasible to do so, or within thirty days thereafter.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon I.1.1 be amended to read as follows:

- (a) At the time and place appointed for the meeting of the General Convention, the President of the House of Deputies, or, if absent, the Vice-President of the House, or, if there be neither, a presiding officer pro tempore appointed by the members of the House of Deputies on the Joint Committee of Arrangements for the General Convention, shall call to order the members present. The Secretary of the House of Deputies, or, if absent, a Secretary pro tempore appointed by the presiding officer, shall record the names of those whose testimonials, in due form, shall have been presented, which record shall be prima facie evidence that the persons whose names are therein recorded are entitled to seats. In the event that testimonials are presented by or on behalf of persons from jurisdictions which have not previously been represented in a General Convention, then the Secretary, or one appointed instead as provided herein, shall proceed as provided in Clause (c). If there be a quorum present, the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall so certify, and the House shall proceed to organize by the election, by ballot, of a Secretary of the House of Deputies, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to such election. Nominees for Secretary of the House of Deputies must be confirmed communicants in good standing or clergy of The Episcopal Church. Upon such election, the presiding officer shall declare the House organized. If there be a vacancy in the office of President or Vice-President, the vacancy or vacancies shall then be filled by election, by ballot, the term of any officer so elected to continue until the adjournment of the General Convention. As soon as such vacancies are filled, the President shall appoint a committee to wait upon the House of Bishops and inform it of the organization of the House of Deputies, and of its readiness to proceed to business.
- (b) There shall be a President and a Vice-President of the House of Deputies, who shall perform the duties normally appropriate to their respective offices or specified in these Canons. They shall be elected not later than the seventh day of each regular meeting of the General Convention in the

manner herein set forth. The House of Deputies shall elect from its membership, by a majority of separate ballots, a President and a Vice-President, who shall be of different orders. Such officers shall take office at the adjournment of the regular meeting at which they are elected, and shall continue in office until the adjournment of the following regular meeting of the General Convention. They shall be and remain ex officio members of the House during their term of office. No person elected President or Vice-President shall be eligible for more than three consecutive full terms in each respective office. In case of resignation, death, absence, or inability, of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of the office until the adjournment of the next meeting of the General Convention. In case of resignation, death, absence, or inability of the Vice-President, the President shall appoint a Deputy of the opposite order, upon the advice and consent of the lay persons, presbyters and deacons of the Executive Council, who shall serve until the adjournment of the next meeting of the General Convention. The President shall be authorized to appoint an Advisory Council for consultation and advice in the performance of the duties of the office. The President may also appoint a Chancellor to the President, a confirmed adult communicant of the Church in good standing who is learned in both ecclesiastical and secular law, to serve so long as the President may desire, as counselor in matters relating to the discharge of the responsibilities of that office.

- (c) In order to aid the Secretary of the House of Deputies in preparing the record specified in Clause (a), it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese to forward to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, as soon as may be practicable, a copy of the latest Journal of the Diocesan Convention, together with a certified copy of the testimonials of members aforesaid, and a duplicate copy of such testimonials. Where testimonials are received for persons from jurisdictions which have not previously been represented in General Convention, the Secretary shall ascertain that the applicable provisions of Article V, Section 1, of the Constitution have been complied with prior to such persons being permitted to take their seats in the House.
- (d) The Secretary of the House of Deputies shall keep full minutes of the proceedings of the House; record them, with all reports, in a book provided for that purpose; preserve the Journals and Records of the House; deliver them to the Registrar, as hereinafter provided; and perform such other duties as may be directed by the House. With the approval of the House, Tt-he Secretary shall appoint a First Assistant Secretary of the House of Deputies and may, with the approval of the House, appoint other Assistant Secretaries. and the First Assistant Secretary shall continue in office until the organization of the next General Convention, and until their successors be chosen. The other Assistant Secretaries shall continue in office until the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were appointed.
- (e) It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the House of Deputies General Convention, whenever any alteration of the Book of Common Prayer or of the Constitution is proposed, or any other subject submitted to the consideration of the several Diocesan Conventions, to give notice thereof to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Church in every Diocese, as well as to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, and written evidence that the foregoing requirement has been complied with shall be presented by the Secretary of the General Convention to the General Convention at its next session. All such notices shall be sent by certified or registered mail, with the local Secretary's certificates to be returned. The Secretary of the General Convention shall notify all diocesan Secretaries that it is their duty to make known such proposed alterations of the Book of Common Prayer, and of the Constitution, and such other subjects, to the Conventions of their respective Dioceses at their next meeting, and to certify to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention that such action has been taken.
- (f) The Secretary of the House of Deputies and the Treasurer of the General Convention shall be entitled to seats upon the floor of the House of Deputies, and, with the consent of the President, they may speak on the subjects of their respective offices.

(g) At the meetings of the House of Deputies the Rules of [sic] Orders fo [sic] the previous meeting shall be in force until they are amended or repealed by the House.

- (h) In case of the resignation, death or total disability of the President and Vice-President during the recess of the General Convention, the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall perform such *ad interim* duties as may appertain to the office of President until the next meeting of the General Convention or until such disability is removed.
- (i) If, during recess, a vacancy shall occur in the office of Secretary of the House of Deputies, the duties thereof shall devolve upon the First Assistant Secretary, or, if there be none such, upon a Secretary pro tempore appointed by the President of the House of Deputies, or if the office of President be also vacant, then by the Vice-President, and if both offices be vacant, then by the members from the House of Deputies of the Joint Committee on Planning and Arrangements for the next General Convention, appointed by the preceding General Convention.
- (j) At every regular meeting of the General Convention, the Secretary of the House of Deputies elected by the House of Deputies shall, by concurrent action of the two Houses of the General Convention, also be made the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall have responsibility for assembling and printing of the Journal of the General Convention, and for other matters specifically referred to the Secretary by General Convention or its officers to the Secretary of the General Convention. If a vacancy shall occur in the office of Secretary of the General Convention, the duties thereof shall devolve upon a Secretary pro tempore jointly appointed by the President of the House Deputies, or if the office of President be vacant, then by the Vice President, and the Presiding Bishop. The term of the Secretary pro tempore shall extend until the election of a Secretary of the General Convention at the next regular General Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon I.6.5 be amended as follows:

(a) It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Convention of every jurisdiction to forward to the Secretary of the of the House of Deputies General Convention, immediately upon publication, two copies of the Journals of the Convention of the jurisdiction, together with episcopal charges, statements, and such other records in paper or electronic format as may show the state of the Church in that jurisdiction, and two copies to the Archives of the Church in a common format as prescribed by the Archivist of the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon I.9.11 be amended as follows:

Each Provincial Synod shall keep minutes, journals or other records of its meetings, and shall transmit one copy of the records to the Secretary of the House of Deputies General Convention, and one copy to the Archives of The Episcopal Church. The Synod shall also transmit copies of any unpublished inactive records to the Archives.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canons V.1.2 and V.1.5 be amended as follows:

Sec. 2. Whenever a Canon is amended, enacted, or repealed in different respects by two or more independent enactments at the same General Convention, including the enactment of an entire Title, the separate enactments shall be considered as one enactment containing all of the amendments or enactments, whether or not repealed, to the extent that the change made in separate amendments or enactments, are not in conflict with each other. The two members of the Committee on Canons from each House of General Convention appointed pursuant to Canon V.1.5(a) shall make the determination whether or not there is a conflict and certify the text of the single enactment to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Sec. 5 (a) The Committee on Canons of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint two of its members to certify the changes, if any, made in the Canons, including a correction of the references made in any Canon to another, and to report the same, with the proper arrangement thereof, to the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal.

(b) The Committee on Constitution of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint a similar committee of two of its members to certify in like manner the changes, if any, made in the Constitution, or proposed to be made therein under the provisions of Article XII of the Constitution, and to report the same to the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal. The committee shall also have and exercise the power of renumbering of, and correction of references to, Articles, Sections and Clauses of the Constitution required by the adoption of amendments to the Constitution at a meeting of the General Convention in the same manner as provided with respect to the Canons in the foregoing Sections 4 and 5(a) of this Canon.; and be it further

Resolved, That Joint Rule of Order V.15, be amended to read as follows:

15. The Secretary of the House of Deputies General Convention, being the Secretary of the General Convention, shall, with the cooperation of the Secretary of the House of Bishops, and of such Bishops as may be appointed by the Presiding Officer of the House of Bishops, prepare a summary of the actions of the General Convention of particular interest to the Congregations of the Church, and make the same available to the Congregations, through the Ministers-in-charge thereof, and to the Lay Deputies; such summary to be sent to the Clergy along with the Pastoral Letter put forth by the House of Bishops, and to be made available to all Deputies on the last day of the Convention, along with such Pastoral Letter, if feasible to do so, or within thirty days thereafter.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church amend Canon III.15.1-3 and delete Canons III.15.4-5 as follows:

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Board of Examining Chaplains, consisting of four Bishops, six Priests with pastoral cures or in specialized ministries, six members of accredited Seminary faculties or of other educational institutions, and six Lay Persons. and eight other members. The members of the Board shall be elected to six-year terms by the House of Bishops and confirmed by the House of Deputies from nominees presented by the existing Board and the Presiding Bishop, one-half of the members in each of the foregoing categories being elected and confirmed at each regular meeting of the General Convention for a term of two Convention periods not to exceed two General Conventions, except that for the first election following the approval of this canon, one half of the members shall be elected for a three-year term and one half for a six-year term. They shall take office at the adjournment of the meeting of the General Convention at which their elections are confirmed of their election, and shall serve until the earlier of the end of their term or the adjournment of the second regular meeting of General Convention thereafter. No member shall serve more than 12 years consecutively. Additionally, the Presiding Bishop, in consultation with the Chair of the Board, may

appoint up to four other members for a term. The House of Bishops, at any special meeting that may be held prior to the next meeting of the General Convention, shall fill for the unexpired portion of the term any vacancy that may have arisen in the interim. The Board shall elect its own Chair and Secretary, and shall have the power to constitute committees necessary for the carrying on of to carry out its work.

- Sec. 2. (a) The General Board of Examining Chaplains, with professional assistance, shall prepare at least annually a General Ordination Examination covering the subject matter set forth in Canon III.8.5 (g); and shall conduct, administer, and evaluate it in respect to those Candidates for Holy Orders who have been identified to the Board by their several Bishops.
- (b) Whenever a Candidate has not demonstrated proficiency in any one or more of the canonical areas covered by the General Ordination Examination, The General Board of Examining Chaplains shall recommend to the Commission on Ministry, and through the Commission to the Board of Examining Chaplains, if one exists, of the Diocese to which the Candidate belongs, how the proficiencies might be attained. promptly report to each Candidate, to the Candidate's Bishop, and to the dean or other official of the educational program at which the Candidate is studying, the results of the General Ordination Examination, the examinations themselves, and the proficiency or lack of proficiency noted, along with the reasons for any lack of proficiency. The Bishop shall transmit these reports to the Standing Committee and to the Commission on Ministry.
- Sec. 3. The General Board of Examining Chaplains may prepare, in each Convention period, guidelines based upon the subjects contained in Canon III.8.4(e), which guidelines shall be available to all persons concerned shall make a report concerning its work to each regular meeting of the General Convention.

Sec. 4. The General Board of Examining Chaplains shall promptly report, in writing, to the Candidate, to the Candidate's Bishop and to the Dean of the Seminary the Candidate is attending, the results of all examinations held by them, together with the examinations themselves, whether satisfactory or unsatisfactory, making separate reports upon each person examined. The Bishop shall transmit these reports to the Standing Committee and to the Commission. Notwithstanding the results of the examinations, in no case shall the Standing Committee recommend a Candidate for Ordination under Canon III.8 until the Standing Committee has received from the Commission on Ministry a certificate to the effect that the Candidate has demonstrated a proficiency in all subjects required by Canon III. 8.5(g) and (h).

The House of Deputies Committee on Formation and Education for Ministry presented its Report #47 on Resolution A135 (Amend Canon IV.13 Procedural Matters and Discovery) and moved adoption with amendment.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A135)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon IV.13 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. If—When the Conference Panel decides to refer a matter is referred—to the Hearing Panel, the president of the Conference Panel shall within three days of that decision promptly notify the president of the Disciplinary Board and the Church Attorney of the referral.

- Sec. 2. Upon—Within 10 days of receipt of a referral for Hearing Panel proceedings, the Church Attorney shall review all information acquired as of the time of such referral and, if necessary, shall revise or update the statement of the alleged Offense and shall provide the same to the Hearing Panel. provide to the Hearing Panel the statement of the alleged Offense(s), updated as needed. No other material from any prior proceedings under Title IV shall be provided to the Hearing Panel. Upon receipt of the Church Attorney's communication, 7the Hearing Panel shall within seven days issue a notice to the Respondent, to the Respondent's Advisor, to Respondent's counsel, if any, and to the Church Attorney.
 - (a) The notice shall describe the nature and purpose of the proceeding, contain a copy of the written statement prepared by the Church Attorney, disclose the names of all persons to whom the notice is sent, advise the Respondent that a written response to the notice must be filed by the Respondent with the Hearing Panel within thirty days of the mailing date of the notice and advise the Respondent that failure to attend or participate in a scheduled or noticed hearing may result in a finding of default of the provisions of Canon IV.19.6.
 - (b) A copy of the notice shall be sent to the Complainant and to the Complainant's Advisor.
 - (c) Unless additional time is approved for good cause by the Hearing Panel, the Respondent shall within 30 days of the mailing date of the notice file with the Hearing Panel and deliver to the Church Attorney a written response signed by the Respondent within thirty days of the mailing date of the notice. The president of the Hearing Panel shall forward a copy of the response to the Church Attorney.

Sec. 3. In all proceedings before the Hearing Panel, the Church Attorney shall appear on behalf of the Diocese, which shall then be considered the party on one side and the Respondent the party on the other. Each Complainant shall be entitled to be present throughout and observe the Hearing and each may be accompanied by another person of his or her own choosing in addition to his or her Advisor.

- Sec. 4. All proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be public, provided, however, that the Hearing Panel may close any part of the proceedings at its discretion to protect the privacy of any person. A record of the hearing shall be made by such means as to enable the creation of a written transcript of the hearing.

Documents and tangible items identified in the mandatory disclosures that are in the possession of a party shall be produced upon request. The Hearing Panel may, upon request of a party or Injured Person, enter an order limiting production of documents or tangible items of a sensitive nature.

- (b) A party claiming that any communication is privileged must provide a log containing the date of the communication, a list of all persons party to the communication, and a short description of the communication. Disputes over the scope of the privilege may be raised with the Hearing Panel.

- (d) The Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel may each take two depositions without prior permission of the Hearing Panel.
- (e) No other discovery shall be allowed at any point during the pendency of a matter under this Title except with permission of the Hearing Panel upon a showing of extraordinary circumstances.

The House of Deputies Committee on Church Pension Fund presented its Report #2 on HB Message #119 on Resolution A181 (Study of Costs of Employee Benefits for Clergy and Lay Employees in Province IX) and moved concurrence.

Motion carried The House concurred

(Communicated to the House of Bishops in HD Message #278)

Final Text of Resolution:

(A181)

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention instruct the Church Pension Group to conduct a study of compensation and costs and fees for all employee benefits, e.g., retirement, health care, short-term and long-term disability, etc. for clergy and lay employees in the dioceses of Province IX, the Diocese of Haiti, The Episcopal Church in Cuba, and Covenant Partners, to provide to the CPF Trustees information and guidance on alternative programs and strategies, such as employee contribution plans, that will improve clergy and lay pension plans in these areas, to discuss their

findings with diocesan leaders, and to report their findings back to the 79th General Convention. The purpose of this study would be to provide appropriate information and costs about employee benefit coverages to diocesan leaders, and to provide the Church information on the current state of employee benefits in those areas.

End of Consent Calendar

Program, Budget and Finance

The House of Deputies Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance presented its Report #1 on Resolution A197 (Adopt the Budget of The Episcopal Church) and moved adoption with amendment.

Original Text of Resolution:

(A197)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention adopt the 2016-2018 Budget for the Episcopal Church as presented by the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance.

- 1.0 The Budget for the Episcopal Church for the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018, which shall be a unified budget including Canonical, Corporate, and Program (mission) portions, is adopted at a total of \$ 122,189,125.
 - 1.1 The Canonical portion, providing for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop and the expenses of that office, the expenses of the President of the House of Deputies, and Church Pension Fund assessments is adopted at a total of \$22,584,693.
 - 1.2 The Corporate portion, providing for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices, is adopted at a total of \$35,236,451.
 - 1.3 The Program (mission) portion, providing for support for the mission and ministry (restricted and unrestricted) of the Church, is adopted at a total of \$64,367,981.
- 2.0 The funding policy for the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018 is adopted based on a single Asking of the dioceses. After a \$150,000 exemption from total income, a single Asking shall be applied at flat rates of 18%, 16.5% and 15%, respectively in years 2016, 2017 and 2018 of the balance of income to the diocese, reported in the diocesan financial statements for the year two years prior to the year to which the pledge is applied [e.g., 2016 Askings are to be based on 2014 actual income figures]. "Income" includes (1) all congregational giving to the diocese, (2) all unrestricted investment and endowment income to the diocese which covers costs in the operating budget, and (4) other earnings from investments or enterprises. It is intended that income shall include revenues that fund normal operating and program expenses of the dioceses. It is not intended to include pass-through income that is used for expenses for programming that are simply administered by the dioceses, or that would not be otherwise funded by contributions from parishes or out of investment income.
 - 2.1 We rejoice with dioceses that have moved toward, and those that have given at and above 19% during 2013-2015. Such giving creates a strong financial basis for vital mission and witness of the Episcopal Church. We encourage all our dioceses to adopt the Asking to the mission priorities which we have embraced in this 78th General Convention.
 - 2.2 For the budgetary period income from diocesan commitments, totaling \$46,653,753 is anticipated.
 - 2.3 For the budgetary period 2016-2018, payment by the dioceses of the Askings shall be made in twelve equal monthly payments.
 - 2.4 All additional income, other than from the Askings of the dioceses, totaling \$46,653,753, is projected.

2.5 A General Ordination fee is hereby authorized, which fees are expected to cover the expenses and administration of examinations for Holy Orders. A candidate for Holy Orders eligible for examination and so certified by the diocesan bishop shall not be disqualified for examination because the fee has not been paid.

- 2.6 General Convention registration and exhibitors fees are hereby authorized, which fees shall be added to the funding from dioceses and applied to the expenses of the 2018 General Convention, and for no other purpose.
- 3.0 In the exercise of their respective authorities, the Executive Council of the General Convention and the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance shall be subject to the following policies:
 - 3.1 Each year, the Executive Council, with the advice of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, shall adjust the budget to the assured income of the Executive Council so as to carry out the Budget for the Episcopal Church for that year on a balanced budget basis.
 - 3.2 The fiscal year shall begin January 1.
 - 3.3 If in any year the total anticipated income for budget support is less than the amount required to support the budget approved by the General Convention, the Canonical portion of the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas.
 - 3.4 Undesignated bequests and legacies received during the budgetary period shall be set aside in the general endowment fund of which only the income shall be used for the general purposes of the Society.
 - 3.5 Designated bequests and legacies received during the budgetary period shall be set aside in specific funds of which only the income shall be used for the purposes so designated.
 - 3.6 Each interim body, Committee, Commission, Agency and Board (CCAB), or Task Force proposing to the General Convention any resolution with funding implications shall present to the Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance a detailed budget in support of its plan(s), including cost estimates from contractors and suppliers for all goods and services, by no later than six months before the opening day of the General Convention.
 - 3.7 An annual report of the actual income and expenditures of the DFMS, relating the expenditures to the Church's priorities, shall be posted on the DFMS website when it is released.
 - 3.8 An annual report of the trust fund balances with accompanying narratives shall be posted on the DFMS website when it is released.

Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention adopt the 2016-2018 Budget for the Episcopal Church as presented by the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance.

- 1.0 The Budget for the Episcopal Church for the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018, which shall be a unified budget including Canonical, Corporate, and Program (mission) portions, is adopted at a total of \$ 122,189,125. \$122,234,125.
 - 1.1 The Canonical portion, providing for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop and the expenses of that office, the expenses of the President of the House of Deputies, and Church Pension Fund assessments is adopted at a total of \$22,584,693.
 - 1.2 The Corporate portion, providing for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices, is adopted at a total of \$35,236,451.
 - 1.3 The Program (mission) portion, providing for support for the mission and ministry (restricted and unrestricted) of the Church, is adopted at a total of \$64,367,981. \$64,412,981.
- 2.0 The funding policy for the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018 is adopted based on a single Asking of the dioceses. After a \$150,000 exemption from total income, a single Asking shall be applied at flat rates of 18%, 16.5% and 15%, respectively in years 2016, 2017 and 2018 of the balance

of income to the diocese, reported in the diocesan financial statements for the year two years prior to the year to which the pledge is applied [e.g., 2016 Askings are to be based on 2014 actual income figures]. "Income" includes (1) all congregational giving to the diocese, (2) all unrestricted investment and endowment income to the diocese, (3) restricted investment and endowment income to the diocese which covers costs in the operating budget, and (4) other earnings from investments or enterprises. It is intended that income shall include revenues that fund normal operating and program expenses of the dioceses. It is not intended to include pass-through income that is used for expenses for programming that are simply administered by the dioceses, or that would not be otherwise funded by contributions from parishes or out of investment income.

- 2.1 We rejoice with dioceses that have moved toward, and those that have given at and above 19% during 2013-2015. Such giving creates a strong financial basis for vital mission and witness of the Episcopal Church. We encourage all our dioceses to adopt the Asking to the mission priorities which we have embraced in this 78th General Convention.
- 2.2 For the budgetary period income from diocesan commitments, totaling \$46,653,753 \$75,606,206 is anticipated.
- 2.3 For the budgetary period 2016-2018, payment by the dioceses of the Askings shall be made in twelve equal monthly payments.
- 2.4 All additional income, other than from the Askings of the dioceses, totaling \$46,653,753, is projected.
- 2.5 A General Ordination fee is hereby authorized, which fees are expected to cover the expenses and administration of examinations for Holy Orders. A candidate for Holy Orders eligible for examination and so certified by the diocesan bishop shall not be disqualified for examination because the fee has not been paid.
- 2.6 General Convention registration and exhibitors fees are hereby authorized, which fees shall be added to the funding from dioceses and applied to the expenses of the 2018 General Convention, and for no other purpose.
- 3.0 In the exercise of their respective authorities, the Executive Council of the General Convention and the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance shall be subject to the following policies:
 - 3.1 Each year, the Executive Council, with the advice of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, shall adjust the budget to the assured income of the Executive Council so as to carry out the Budget for the Episcopal Church for that year on a balanced budget basis.
 - 3.2 The fiscal year shall begin January 1.
 - 3.3 If in any year the total anticipated income for budget support is less than the amount required to support the budget approved by the General Convention, the Canonical portion of the Budget for the Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas.
 - 3.4 Undesignated bequests and legacies received during the budgetary period shall be set aside in the general endowment fund of which only the income shall be used for the general purposes of the Society.
 - 3.5 Designated bequests and legacies received during the budgetary period shall be set aside in specific funds of which only the income shall be used for the purposes so designated.
 - 3.6 Each interim body, Committee, Commission, Agency and Board (CCAB), or Task Force proposing to the General Convention any resolution with funding implications shall present to the Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance a detailed budget in support of its plan(s), including cost estimates from contractors and suppliers for all goods and services, by no later than six months before the opening day of the General Convention.
 - 3.7 An annual report of the actual income and expenditures of the DFMS, relating the expenditures to the Church's priorities, shall be posted on the DFMS website when it is released.

3.8 An annual report of the trust fund balances with accompanying narratives shall be posted on the DFMS website when it is released.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Article I, Section 1 of the Constitution is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Convention of this Church, consisting of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies, which Houses shall sit and deliberate separately, unless a Joint Session is provided for by the Canons or the Presiding Officers shall together call for a Joint Session which is approved by a majority vote in the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies; and in all deliberations freedom of debate shall be allowed. Either House may originate and propose legislation, and all acts of the Convention shall be adopted and be authenticated by both Houses.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, Amend Article I Section 1 of the Constitution:

There shall be a General Convention of this Church consisting of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies, which Houses will sit, debate, and vote separately, unless otherwise provided for by this Constitution or the Canons. The Houses by majority vote of each House may call for the Houses to sit, debate, and vote, or any combination thereof, together. The General Convention may by Canon establish procedures for such sessions. In all deliberations freedom of debate shall be allowed. Either House may originate and propose legislation, and all acts of the Convention shall be adopted and be authenticated by both Houses.

Point of Order

Deputy Ambos of New Jersey stated that the Rules call for amendments to the Constitution or Canons be marked with the appropriate strikethroughs for removals or italics for additions. The Committee Substitute did not have the changes marked appropriately, and Deputy Ambos stated that he had submitted an amendment with the appropriate markings. The President considered this a technical change, rather than an amendment, and asked if there was an objection from the House. Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention adopt a unicameral model of governance as outlined in amendments to Article I, Sections 1-6 of the Constitution as proposed in TREC's final Report; and be it further

Resolved, That the bishops of The Episcopal Church create, nurture, and develop a culture of collaboration that results in: new structures, partnerships, and practices on the interpersonal, group, and organizational levels; measurable, tangible outcomes of performance; standards of accountability, reporting and mutual ministry reviews at all levels (bishops, clergy, diocesan bodies); frank discussion on the number and size of our dioceses and whether change is needed; and reportage on their progress to each succeeding General Convention; and be it further

Resolved, That a task force on the episcopacy be appointed by the Presiding Officers composed of four bishops, four clergy, and four lay persons. The Task Force will explore the practice of and particular gifts, life experience, expertise, and social diversity required by the episcopacy, recommending to General Convention 2018 a new process for discernment, formation, search, and election of bishops in The Episcopal Church, and that \$100,000 be appropriated in the next triennial budget for this purpose; and be it further

Resolved, That within each bishop-search process, a mandatory time of discernment with the Standing Committees of the diocese in transition occur with the Standing Committees and bishops of adjoining dioceses; and be it further

Resolved, That the diocesan assessment percentage be lowered while making it canonically mandatory (with means for pastoral exception) for each diocese to meet that assessment.

B. Make Constitutional Changes to Achieve a Unicameral Legislative Body

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Article I, Sections 1-6 of the Constitution be stricken in their entirety and replaced with the following:

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Convention of this Church, consisting of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies, which Houses shall sit and deliberate separately; and in all deliberations freedom of debate shall be allowed. Either House may originate and propose legislation, and all acts of the Convention shall be adopted and be authenticated by both Houses.

Sec. 2. Each Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, every Assistant Bishop, and every Bishop who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity, or who, under an election to an office created by the General Convention, or for reasons of mission strategy determined by action of the General Convention or the House of Bishops, has resigned a jurisdiction, shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Bishops who have resigned their jurisdiction or positions, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Sec. 3. At the General Convention next before the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, it shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops of this Church to be the Presiding Bishop of the Church by a vote of a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, except that whenever two-thirds of the House of Bishops are present a majority vote shall suffice, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies. The term and tenure of office and duties and particulars of the election not inconsistent with the preceding provisions shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention.

Sec. 4. The Church in each Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention, each area Mission established as provided by Article VI, and the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, shall be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four ordained

persons, Presbyters or Deacons, canonically resident in the Diocese and not more than four Lay Persons, confirmed adult communicants of this Church, in good standing in the Diocese but not necessarily domiciled in the Diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two Deputies in each order. Each Diocese, and the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen. To constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, the Clerical order shall be represented by at least one Deputy in each of a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation, and the Lay order shall likewise be represented by at least one Deputy in each of a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation.

Sec. 5. The vote on all questions which come before the House of Deputies shall be governed by the following provisions, supplemented by such procedural provisions as the House of Deputies may adopt in its Rules of Order: Unless a greater vote on any question is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution or unless a vote by orders on a question is required, the affirmative vote of a majority of all of the Deputies present and voting shall suffice to carry any question. A vote by orders on any question shall be taken if required for that question by this Constitution or by the Canons or if the Clerical or Lay representation from three or more separate Dioceses shall so request at the time of the call for the vote on that question. In all cases of a vote by orders, the vote of each order, Clerical and Lay, shall be counted separately, each order in each Diocese shall have one vote, and a vote in the affirmative by an order in a Diocese shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the Deputies present in that order in that Diocese. To carry in the affirmative any question being voted on by orders requires concurrence in the affirmative by both orders and, unless a greater vote is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution, concurrence in the affirmative by an order requires the affirmative vote in that order by a majority of the Dioceses present in that order.

Sec. 6. In either House any number less than a quorum may adjourn from day to day. Neither House, without the consent of the other, shall adjourn for more than three days, or to any place other than that in which the Convention shall be sitting.

The Episcopal Church Constitution, ARTICLE I

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Convention of this Church in which all members shall meet together as one body. Each of the three orders—Bishop, Clerical, and Lay—may meet and deliberate separately except as the constitution, canon, or rule of order may otherwise provide. On any matter requiring a vote, any order may choose to deliberate and/or vote separately. In all deliberations, freedom of debate shall be allowed, subject to such rules of order as may be adopted to assure fairness.

Sec. 2. Each Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, and every Suffragan Bishop shall have a seat and a vote in the General Convention and any matter acted upon separately by the Order of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops and Deputies entitled to vote shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of General Convention business.

Sec. 3. At the General Convention next before the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, the General Convention shall elect one of the Bishops of this Church having jurisdiction as the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The Presiding Bishop of the Church shall serve as a co-chair of General Convention. Candidates for the Presiding Bishop shall be elected by the General Convention, by concurrent vote of each order. The affirmative vote of a majority of the deputies of each order shall be required for the election of a Presiding Bishop. The term and tenure of office and duties and particulars of the election not inconsistent with the preceding provisions shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention. If the Presiding Bishop of the Church shall resign the office as such, or if by reason of infirmity shall become unable to serve, or in case of death, the Bishop who, according to the Rules of the Order of Bishops, becomes its Presiding Officer, shall (unless the date of the next General Convention is within three months) immediately call a special meeting of the Convocation of Bishops to elect a member thereof to be the Presiding Bishop. The certificate of election on the part of the Convocation of

Bishops shall be sent by the Presiding Officer to the Standing Committees of the several dioceses, and if a majority of the Standing Committees of the dioceses shall concur in the election, the Bishop elected shall become the Presiding Bishop of the Church.

Sec. 4. In addition, the Church in each diocese that has been admitted to union with the General Convention, each area Mission established as provided by Article VI, and the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, shall be entitled to representation in the General Convention by three ordained persons, priests, or deacons ("Clergy") canonically resident in the diocese, and not more than three lay persons, confirmed adult communicants of this Church, in good standing in the diocese but not necessarily domiciled in the diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two deputies in each order. Each diocese, and the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, shall prescribe the manner in which its deputies shall be chosen. To constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, the Clerical order shall be represented by at least one deputy in each of a majority of the dioceses entitled to representation, and the Lay order shall likewise be represented by at least one deputy in each of a majority of the dioceses entitled to representation.

Sec. 5. The vote on all questions that come before the General Convention shall be governed by the following provisions, supplemented by such procedural provisions as the General Convention may adopt in its Rules of Order: Unless a greater vote on any question is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution, voting by orders shall not be required, and the affirmative vote of a majority of all Deputies present and voting shall suffice to carry any question.

When voting by orders is required, unless a greater vote on any question is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution, the affirmative vote of a majority of all Deputies of each order (clergy, lay, and Bishops) present and voting shall suffice to carry any question. A vote by orders on any question shall be taken if required for that question by this Constitution or by the Canons or if clerical, lay, or Bishop representation from three or more separate dioceses shall so request at the time of the call for the vote on that question. In voting by orders, the vote of each order shall be counted separately, each order in each diocese shall have one vote, and a vote in the affirmative by an order in a diocese shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the Deputies present in that order in that diocese. To carry in the affirmative any question being voted on by orders requires concurrence in the affirmative by all orders and, unless a greater vote is required by this Constitution or by the Canons in cases not specifically dealt with by this Constitution, concurrence in the affirmative by an order requires the affirmative vote in that order by a majority of the dioceses present in that order.

Sec. 6. At the General Convention, a majority vote of those Deputies present, even though less than a quorum, may adjourn from day to day.

Committee Substitute:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring the 78th General Convention charge the Standing Committee on the Structure of the Church to explore unicameral models of church governance including the polities and the legislative processes. The task force will seek input from bodies beyond The Episcopal Church including but not exclusive to the Anglican Church of Canada and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The task force will make recommendations to the 79th General Convention.

The Chair of the House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure explained that references to either "Standing Committee" or "task force" should be changed to "Standing Commissions."

Point of Order

Deputy Funston of Kansas inquired about the existence of the Standing Commission on Structure following the passing of Resolution Aoo6. The Chair of the House of Deputies Committee on Governance and Structure explained that one of the remaining Standing Commissions was the Standing Commission on Structure, Governance, Constitution and Canons.

An inquiry was made regarding whether the editorial changes made were actually approved by the House. The President called for objections from the House. None were made.

Resolved, That this Convention support public policies, laws, and programs designed to increase access to healthy food for all people, including support and development for farmers' markets, policies permitting use of the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits at farmers' markets, and the development of policies and agreements that encourage the siting of full-service grocery stores in low-income neighborhoods and communities; and be it further

Original Text of Resolution:

(A042)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the following sites be considered for the 80th General Convention: Anaheim, California (Diocese of Los Angeles), Baltimore, Maryland (Diocese of Maryland), Louisville, Kentucky (Diocese of Kentucky), Minneapolis, Minnesota (Diocese of Minnesota), and St. Louis, Missouri (Diocese of Missouri).

Deputy Wood of New York moved to end debate on the resolution.

Motion carried Debate terminated

A vote was taken on the resolution.

Environmental Stewardship and Care of Creation

The House of Deputies Committee on Environmental Stewardship and Care of Creation presented its Report #5 on HB Message #106 on Resolution Ao30 (Create Task Force on Climate Change) and moved concurrence.

Motion carried The House concurred

(Communicated to the House of Bishops in HD Message #306)

Final Text of Resolution:

(A030)

Resolved, That the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society is directed to implement a program to develop parish and diocesan resources designed to support local ecologically responsible stewardship of church-related properties and buildings. The program shall be implemented in cooperation with an Advisory Council on the Stewardship of Creation composed of one person from each province by April 1, 2016. Each province member of the Advisory Council shall convene, in their respective provinces, Regional Consultive Groups ("RCG's") on the Stewardship of Creation. Each RCG shall be comprised of no fewer than five experts in areas of environmental sustainability appropriate to the demographic, ecological, cultural and geographic specifics of each region. These should include, but not be limited to, consultants in food and water security, property development, alternative energy, and engineering. Each RCG will also include theologians, educators and liturgists to provide resources in education and formation. These RCGs shall:

- 1. Compile and develop theological and formational material for teaching the theology of stewardship of creation;
- 2. Create networks designed to share ideas and information for practical application among the regions, such as sustainable development and green conversions of church-related properties,

including without limitation, energy audits, solar conversions and other alternative energy, community gardens, and development of fallow property;

3. Be available for consultation to the Dioceses and Parishes.

The Advisory Council on the Stewardship of Creation shall create a structure for allocation of money to fund RCG initiatives at Parish and Diocesan levels within a year of the 78th General Convention, and serve as the granting body; and be it further

Resolved, That \$700,000 be allocated for this purpose, which includes the \$500,000 already allocated to the Fifth Mark of Mission, so that \$100,000 will be available for the support of the RCGs themselves, and \$600,000 be available to provide direct grants to Dioceses and Parishes in the implementation of these programs and support of measurable pilot projects. Of the \$100,000 funding the RCGs, \$40,500 is to be allocated for the Task Force meetings. Recognizing that this is new work, and a newly formed taskforce, they shall convene in person for their initial meeting, and thereafter determine their needs for future meetings, with funding available for them to meet once yearly. The remaining \$59,500 is to be used for regional meetings of the RCGs according to regional needs; and be it further

Resolved, That the Advisory Council shall report back to the 79th General Convention on the progress and ongoing results at the local and provincial levels.

Constitution and Canons

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #7 on HB Message #83 on Resolution A124 (Amend Title IV.2: Definitions: Advisor, Agreements, Church Attorney, Investigator, Procedural Officer, and Respondent) and moved concurrence.

Deputy Johnson of Minnesota moved to amend the resolution.

Proposed Amendment:

To restore the following:

Agreements regarding terms of discipline shall in all cases be incorporated into an Accord and shall not constitute a separate instrument under this Title IV, but shall be and become an Accord and reported accordingly under Canon IV.14.12.

Deputy King of Western New York moved to end debate on the amendment.

Motion carried Debate terminated

An electronic vote was taken on the amendment.

Motion defeated Amendment defeated

Point of Order

Deputy Garner of Alabama expressed concern over the number of deputies who appeared to not take part in the vote on the amendment. He inquired whether it would be appropriate to call for the vote again and to allow deputies more time to vote. The Parliamentarian stated that the deputy could make a motion to retake the vote. Deputy Garner declined to make the motion.

An electronic vote was taken on the resolution.

Final Text of Resolution:

(A124)

Resolved, That Canon IV.2, definitions of "Advisor," "Church Attorney," "Investigator," "Procedural Officer," and "Respondent" are hereby amended to read as follows:

Accord shall mean a written resolution, which is negotiated and agreed among the parties resulting from an agreement for discipline under Canon IV.9, conciliation under Canon IV.10 or a Conference Panel proceeding under Canon IV.12. All Accords shall meet the requirements of Canon IV.14.

Administrative Leave shall mean a restriction on ministry in which the exercise of the Respondent's ministry is suspended in its entirety during the period of the Administrative Leave and may include suspension from any ecclesiastical and related secular office.

Advisor shall mean a person familiar with the provisions and objectives of this Title who is designated to support, assist, consult with, advise and, where expressly so authorized under this Title, speak for a Complainant or Respondent in any matter of discipline under this Title, as provided in Canon IV.19.10.

Church Attorney shall mean one or more attorneys selected pursuant to Diocesan Canons to represent the Church in proceedings as provided in this Title. The Diocesan Canons may provide a process for the removal of a Church Attorney for cause. A Church Attorney shall perform all functions on behalf of the Church necessary to advance proceedings under this Title and shall have the following powers, in addition to the powers and duties otherwise provided in this Title: (a) to receive and review the Intake Officer's report; (b) to conduct investigations and oversee the Investigator and, in connection with such investigations; to have access to the personnel, books and records of the Diocese and its constituent parts; and to receive and review the reports of the Investigator; (c) to determine, in the exercise of the Church Attorney's discretion, whether the reported information, if true, would be grounds for discipline; and (d) to exercise discretion consistent with this Title and the interests of the Church by declining to advance proceedings or by referring any matter back to the Intake Officer or the Bishop Diocesan for pastoral response in lieu of disciplinary action. In representing the Church, a Church Attorney may consult with the Conference Panel the President of the Disciplinary Board at any time after the matter has been referred out of the Reference Panel, and, when the prosecution of the case may impact the mission, life, or ministry of the Church, with the Bishop Diocesan.

Clear and Convincing shall mean proof sufficient to convince ordinarily prudent people that there is a high probability that what is claimed actually happened. More than a preponderance of the evidence is required but not proof beyond a reasonable doubt.

Community shall mean that part of the Church in which a Member of the Clergy performs his or her ministry, such as a Diocese, Parish, Mission, school, seminary, hospital, camp or any similar institution.

Complainant shall mean (a) any person or persons from whom the Intake Officer receives information concerning an alleged Offense and who, upon consent of that person(s), is designated a Complainant by the Intake Officer or (b) any Injured Person designated by the Bishop who, in the Bishop Diocesan's discretion, should be afforded the status of a Complainant; provided, however, that any Injured Person so designated may decline such designation.

Conciliator shall mean a person appointed to seek the resolution of a matter under Canon IV.10 Conduct Unbecoming a Member of the Clergy shall mean any disorder or neglect that prejudices the reputation, good order and discipline of the Church, or any conduct of a nature to bring material discredit upon the Church or the Holy Orders conferred by the Church.

Conference Panel shall mean a panel of one or more members of the Disciplinary Board selected by the president of the board, unless some other manner of selection is provided by Diocesan Canon, to serve as the body before which an informal conference is held as provided in Canon IV.12,

provided, however that no such member of the Conference Panel may serve as a member of the Hearing Panel in the same case. The president of the Disciplinary Board shall be ineligible to serve on the Conference Panel. If the Conference Panel consists of more than one member, it shall include both clergy and lay members.

Disciplinary Board shall mean the body provided for in Canon IV.5.1.

Discipline of the Church shall be found in the Constitution, the Canons and the Rubrics and the Ordinal of the Book of Common Prayer.

Doctrine shall mean the basic and essential teachings of the Church and is to be found in the Canon of Holy Scripture as understood in the Apostles and Nicene Creeds and in the sacramental rites, the Ordinal and Catechism of the Book of Common Prayer.

Hearing Panel shall mean a panel of three or more members of the Disciplinary Board and shall include both clergy and lay members selected by the president of the Board, unless some other manner of selection is provided by Diocesan Canon, to serve as the body before which a hearing is held as provided in Canon IV.13, provided, however, that no such member of the Hearing Panel may serve as a member of the Conference Panel in the same case. The president of the Disciplinary Board shall be ineligible to serve on the Hearing Panel.

Injured Person shall mean a person, group or Community who has been, is or may be affected by an Offense.

Intake Officer shall mean one or more persons designated by the Bishop Diocesan after consultation with the Disciplinary Board, unless otherwise selected pursuant to diocesan canons, to whom information regarding Offenses is reported.

Investigator shall mean a person having (a) sufficient knowledge, skill, experience and training to conduct investigations under this Title and (b) familiarity with the provisions and objectives of this Title. Investigators shall be appointed by the Bishop Diocesan in consultation with the president of the Disciplinary Board. The Investigator acts under the direction of the Reference Panel until a referral is made pursuant to Canon IV.11.3; after such referral, the Investigator shall be overseen by and report to the Church Attorney.

Member of the Clergy shall mean Bishops, Priests and Deacons of the Church.

Offense shall mean any act or omission for which a Member of the Clergy may be held accountable under Canons IV.3 or IV.4.

Order shall mean a written decision of a Conference Panel or a Hearing panel which is issued with or without the Respondent's consent. All orders shall meet the requirements of Canon IV.14.

Pastoral Direction shall mean a written direction given by a Bishop to a Member of the Clergy which meets the requirements of Canon IV.7.

Pastoral Relationship shall mean any relationship between a Member of the Clergy and any person to whom the Member of the Clergy provides or has provided counseling, pastoral care, spiritual direction or spiritual guidance, or from whom such member of the Clergy has received information within the Rite of Reconciliation of a Penitent.

Privileged Communication shall mean any communication or disclosure made in confidence and with an expectation of privacy (a) within the Rite of Reconciliation of a Penitent; (b) between a client and the client's attorney; (c) between a Respondent and an Advisor or a Complainant and an Advisor; (d) between persons in a relationship in which communications are protected by secular law or Diocesan Canons; or (e) between and among a Conciliator and participants in a conciliation under Canon IV.10.

Procedural Officer shall mean a person learned in the law, experienced in litigation and having familiarity with the provisions and objectives of this Title. No Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor of a Diocese shall serve as Procedural Officer in the same Diocese. Every Diocese shall have a Procedural Officer, who shall be appointed for a term of not less than one year by the Bishop Diocesan in

consultation with the President of the Disciplinary Board to aid in the prompt and proper disposition of procedural motions and challenges in Title IV proceedings.

Provincial Court of Review shall mean a court organized and existing as provided in Canon IV.5.4 to serve as the body which performs the duties prescribed in Canon IV.15.

Reference Panel shall mean a panel composed of the Intake Officer, the Bishop Diocesan and the president of the Disciplinary Board to serve as the body which performs the duties prescribed in Canons IV.6 and IV.11.

Respondent shall mean any Member of the Clergy (a) who is the subject of or a matter referred for conciliation or to the Conference Panel or to the Hearing Panel; (b) whose ministry has been restricted; (c) who has been placed on Administrative Leave; (d) who is the subject of an investigation and is asked by an investigator or by the Bishop Diocesan to provide information or to make a statement; or—(e) who agreed with the Bishop Diocesan regarding terms of discipline pursuant to Canon IV.9; or (f) any Member of the Clergy who requests a review pursuant to Canon IV. 19.31.

Sentence shall mean the pronouncement of discipline of a Member of the Clergy pursuant to an Accord or Order in the form of (a) admonition, in which the conduct of such Member of the Clergy is publicly and formally censured or reprimanded, or (b) suspension, in which such Member of the Clergy is required to refrain temporarily from the exercise of the gifts of ministry conferred by ordination, or (c) deposition, in which such Member of the Clergy is deprived of the right to exercise the gifts and spiritual authority of God's word and sacraments conferred at ordination.

Sexual Abuse shall mean any Sexual Behavior at the request of, acquiesced to or by a person eighteen years of age or older and a person under eighteen years of age, in high school or legally incompetent.

Sexual Behavior shall mean any physical contact, bodily movement, speech, communication or other activity sexual in nature or that is intended to arouse or gratify erotic interest or sexual desires.

Sexual Misconduct shall mean (a) Sexual Abuse or (b) Sexual Behavior at the request of, acquiesced to or by a Member of the Clergy with an employee, volunteer, student or counselee of that Member of the Clergy or in the same congregation as the Member of the Clergy, or a person with whom the Member of the Clergy has a Pastoral Relationship.

Resolved, That the plan for revision take into consideration the use of current technologies which provide access to a broad range of liturgical resources; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to consider a budget allocation of \$30,000 for the implementation of this resolution.

The House of Deputies Committee on Prayer Book, Liturgy and Music presented its Report #21 on HB Message #134 on Resolution Ao67 (Revise Book of Common Prayer for Revised Common Lectionary [second reading]) and moved concurrence.

The President reminded the House that the Constitution requires a Vote by Orders on amendments to the Book of Common Prayer.

The House of Deputies Committee on Formation and Education for Ministry presented its Report #36 on Resolution Do54 (Countering Violence against Women) and moved to refer the resolution to a CCAB.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Do54)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the General Convention deeply regret the lack of progress in stemming the global pandemic of violence against women, in spite of the call of the 76th Convention #2009-D096 for bishops, clergy, and lay leadership to educate themselves on the problem; and be it further

Resolved, That a task force be appointed to prepare and distribute educational materials electronically, in the next triennium, encouraging Episcopal clergy and congregations to speak out, according to the 4th Mark of Mission, to transform the unjust silence of society in the face of this widespread practice of violence; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to consider a budget allocation of \$30,000.00 (\$10,000 per year) for the implementation of this resolution.

Point of Order

Deputy Anderson of Michigan requested that deputies speaking about specific instances of violence and assault give warning prior to speaking.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Do₃₁)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the following sections of Canon IV.2 be amended to read as follows:

Hearing Panel shall mean a panel of three or more not less than five members of the Disciplinary Board—and shall include both clergy and lay members, a majority of whom shall be Members of the Clergy, selected by the president of the Board, by lot or by other random means unless some other manner of selection is provided by Diocesan Canon, to serve as the body before which a hearing is held as provided in Canon IV.13, provided, however, that no such member of the Hearing Panel may serve as a member of the Conference Panel in the same case. The president of the Disciplinary Board shall be ineligible to serve on the Hearing Panel.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.3.1 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. A Member of the Clergy shall be subject to proceedings under this Title for:

- (a) knowingly violating or attempting to violate, directly or through the acts of another person, the Constitution or Canons of the Church or of any Diocese; or
- (b) failing without good cause to cooperate with any investigation or proceeding conducted under authority of this Title; or

(c)intentionally and maliciously bringing a false accusation or knowingly providing false testimony or false evidence in any investigation or proceeding under this Title.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.3.3 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. In order for any conduct or condition to be the subject of the provisions of this Title, the Offense complained of must violate applicable provisions of Canon IV.3 or IV.4 and must be material and substantial or and of clear and weighty importance to the ministry of the Church.

And be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.5.1 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. Each Diocese shall, by Canon, create a court to be known as the Disciplinary Board as described in this Canon. Each such Board shall consist of not fewer than seven nine persons to be selected by the convention of the Diocese as determined by Diocesan Canon. The membership of each such Board shall include lay persons and Priests or Deacons, and the majority of the Board members shall be Priests or Deacons, but by no more than one. Within sixty days following each Diocesan

convention, the Board shall convene to elect a president for the following year, unless another method for selection of the president is provided by Diocesan Canon.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.6.3 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Information concerning Offenses may shall be submitted to the Intake Officer in any manner and in any form writing, with a certification signed by the Informant that the Informant believes that the reported information is true.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.7.7 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. Any Pastoral Direction, restriction on ministry or Administrative Leave under this Canon shall be effective upon service of the writing setting it forth on the subject Member of the Clergy as provided in Canon IV.19.20. No Rector or other tenured Member of the Clergy shall be denied his or her compensation and benefits by virtue of the imposition of a restriction on ministry or placement on Administrative Leave.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.12.6 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6. The Complainant may shall attend the conference but may not be required to do so. The Complainant's Advisor may also attend the conference regardless of whether the Complainant attends.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.13.4 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. All proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be public, provided, however, that the Hearing Panel may close any part of the proceedings at its discretion to protect the privacy of any person. No proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be closed to the Respondent, Respondent's Advisor, Respondent's Counsel, or to the Church Attorney. A record of the hearing shall be made by such means as to enable the creation of a verbatim written transcript of the hearing; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.13.6 be amended as follows:

Sec. 6. In all proceedings of the Hearing Panel the testimony of witnesses shall be taken orally and personally or by such other means as provided by order of the Hearing Panel. All testimony shall be given under oath or solemn affirmation and be subject to cross- examination. The Hearing Panel shall determine the credibility, reliability and weight to be given to all testimony and other evidence. The proceedings shall be conducted as follows:

- (a) The president shall regulate the course of the hearing so as to promote full disclosure of relevant facts.
- (b) The president:
 - (1) may exclude evidence that is irrelevant, immaterial or unduly repetitious;
 - (2) shall exclude privileged evidence;
 - (3) may receive documentary evidence in the form of a copy or excerpt if the copy or excerpt contains all pertinent portions of the original document;
 - (4) may take official notice of any facts that could be judicially noticed, including records of other proceedings—and of technical or scientific facts within the Hearing Panel's specialized knowledge;
 - (5) may not exclude evidence solely because it is hearsay; and
 - (6) shall afford to the Church Attorney and to the Respondent reasonable opportunity to present evidence, argue and respond to argument, conduct cross-examination and submit rebuttal evidence; and
 - (7) may,at the discretion of the Hearing Panel, give persons other than the Church Attorney and the Respondent Testimony. [sic] opportunity to present oral or written statements at the hearing.
- (c) Nothing in this section shall preclude the exercise of discretion by the president in taking measures appropriate to preserve the integrity of the hearing; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.14.7 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. Prior to the issuance of an Order by a Conference Panel or a Hearing Panel, the issuing Panel shall afford the Bishop Diocesan, the Respondent and the Complainant each with an opportunity to be heard on the proposed terms of the Order.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.15.2 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Within forty days after issuance of an Order by a Hearing Panel, the Respondent or the Church Attorney may appeal to the Provincial Court of Review, by serving written notice of the appeal upon the Bishop Diocesan, with copies of the notice to the presidents of the Hearing Panel and the Province. The notice of appeal shall be signed by the Respondent's counsel or the Church Attorney and shall include a copy of the Order from which the appeal is taken and shall state the grounds of the appeal.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.15.7 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the Hearing Panel to produce the record on appeal, consisting of a transcript of the proceedings before the Hearing Panel together with documentary and tangible evidence received by the Hearing Panel. The record shall be printed or otherwise reproduced as authorized by the president of the Provincial Court of Review. Within thirty days after receiving the record on appeal from the Hearing Panel, the party appealing-Respondent shall serve two copies of the record on appeal, the notice of appeal and the appealing party's-Respondent's brief, if any, upon the opposite party-Church Attorney and shall deliver five copies to the president of the Provincial Court of Review. Within thirty days after receiving a copy of the record on appeal, the party opposing the appeal Church Attorney shall serve the brief in opposition, if any, upon the appealing party Respondent, with five copies to the president of the Provincial Court of Review. Any reply brief of the appealing party-Respondent shall be served likewise within fifteen days following service of the brief in opposition.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.15.12 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 12. If, after a notice of appeal has been filed, the appealing party-Respondent fails to pursue the appeal as provided in this Canon, the Provincial Court of Review may dismiss the appeal.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.15.15 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 15. Upon determination of the appeal, the president of the Provincial Court of Review shall give notice of the determination in writing to the appealing party, the party in opposition and to the Bishop Diocesan, the Respondent and Church Attorney. The appeal record shall be certified by the clerk of the Provincial Court of Review and the president, and shall be delivered to the Bishop Diocesan along with a copy of the record on appeal from the Hearing Panel.; and be it further Resolved, That Canon IV.19.16 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 16. There shall be a presumption that the Respondent did not commit the Offense. It shall be the burden of the Church Attorney to establish an Offense by any Respondent. The standard of proof required for a Hearing Panel to find an Offense by a Respondent shall be that of clear and convincing evidence.; and be it further

Resolved, That Canon IV.19.17 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 17. In all matters under this Title, it shall be the burden of the Church through the Church Attorney to establish an Offense by any Respondent Involuntary Statements.

- (a) No person proceeding under the authority of this Title may interrogate, or request a statement from, a Respondent or a person suspected of an Offense without first informing that person of the nature of the accusation and advising that person that no statement need be made regarding the Offense of which the Respondent is accused or suspected and that any statement so made may be used in evidence against that person in a proceeding under this Title.
- (b) No Respondent or person suspected of an Offense may be compelled to make any statement or admission or to testify against himself or herself in any proceedings under this Title.

(c) No statement obtained from any person in violation of this Canon, or through the use of coercion, undue influence or improper inducement may be received in evidence against that person in a Trial under this Title.

Such agencies shall be made known to the House of Bishops. The Suffragan-BishopSuffragan so elected shall be ordained and consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention.—The Suffragan Bishop shall be eligible for election as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop of a Diocese.

The House of Deputies Special Legislative Committee on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse presented its Report #4 on HB Message #166 on Resolution A158 (Task Force to Review and Revise Policy on Substance Abuse, Addiction, and Recovery) and moved concurrence.

Motion carried The House concurred

(Communicated to the House of Bishops in HD Message #362)

Final Text of Resolution:

(A158)

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention acknowledge The Episcopal Church's long-standing tolerance for the use of alcohol which, in some cases, has contributed to its misuse, and has undermined a climate of wholeness and holiness for all; that our Church culture too often avoids hard conversations about alcohol use, and the role of forgiveness and compassion in healing and recovery; and that The Episcopal Church now commits to create a new normal in our relationship with alcohol. We aspire to be a place in which conversations about alcohol, substance misuse, or addiction are not simply about treatment but about renewal, justice, wholeness, and healing. We affirm that Recovery Ministries of The Episcopal Church has long been and continues to be a valuable resource for this work; and be it further

Resolved, That the 78th Convention adopt the following policy on alcohol and other substance misuse and encourage dioceses, congregations, seminaries, schools, young adult ministries, and affiliated institutions to update their policies on the use of alcohol and other substances with the potential for misuse. These policies should consider the following:

- 1. The Church must provide a safe and welcoming environment for all people, including people in recovery.
- 2. All applicable federal, state and local laws should be obeyed, including those governing the serving of alcoholic beverages to minors.
- 3. Some dioceses and congregations may decide not to serve alcohol at events or gatherings. Others may decide to permit a limited use of alcoholic beverages at church-sponsored events. Both can be appropriate if approached mindfully.

4. When alcohol is served, it must be monitored and those showing signs of intoxication must not be served. Whenever alcohol is served, the rector, vicar, or priest-in-charge must appoint an adult to oversee its serving. That adult must not drink alcoholic beverages during the time of his or her execution of his or her responsibilities. If hard liquor is served, a certified server is required.

- 5. Serving alcoholic beverages at congregational events where minors are present is strongly discouraged. If minors are present, alcohol must be served at a separate station that is monitored at all times to prevent underage drinking.
- 6. Alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages must be clearly labeled as such. Food prepared with alcohol does not need to be labeled provided the alcohol is completely evaporated by the cooking process; however, it is recommended that even in this case the use of alcohol in cooking be noted on a label.
- 7. Whenever alcohol is served, appealing non-alcoholic alternatives must always be offered with equal prominence and accessibility.
- 8. The serving of alcoholic beverages at church events should not be publicized as an attraction of the event, e.g. "wine and cheese reception," "cocktail party," and "beer and wine tasting."
- 9. Ministries inside or outside of congregations will make certain that alcohol consumption is not the focus of the ministry and that drinking alcohol is not an exclusively normative activity.
- 10. Food must be served when alcohol is present.
- 11. The groups or organizations sponsoring the activity or event at which alcoholic beverages are served must have permission from the clergy or the vestry. Such groups or organizations must also assume responsibility for those persons who might become intoxicated and must provide alternative transportation for anyone whose capacity to drive may be impaired. Consulting with liability insurance carriers is advised.
- 12. Recognizing the effects of alcohol as a mood-altering drug, alcoholic beverages shall not be served when the business of the Church is being conducted.
- 13. Clergy shall consecrate an appropriate amount of wine when celebrating the Eucharist and perform ablutions in a way that does not foster or model misuse.
- 14. We encourage clergy to acknowledge the efficacy of receiving the sacrament in one kind and consider providing non-alcoholic wine.; and be it further

Resolved, That, mindful of the emerging legalization of other addictive substances and the increasing rise of addiction, the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church provide for the ready availability, implementation, and continuing development of this policy church-wide, in consultation and coordination with Recovery Ministries of The Episcopal Church.

- 3. Practice of pastoral ministry We will adopt and promote, through education and training, standards for the practice of pastoral ministry by clergy and other church personnel.
- 4. Suitability for ministry We will have and implement policies and procedures to assess the suitability of persons for ordination as clergy or appointment to positions of responsibility in the church, including checking their background.
- 5. Culture of safety We will promote a culture of safety in parishes and church organizations by education and training to help clergy, other church personnel, and participants prevent the occurrence of abuse;" and be it further

Resolved, That the Executive Council collect current data from all member dioceses regarding their "safe church" policies and practices, including identification of reasons for not implementing the recommended policies and practices; and publish that information to The Episcopal Church through its most widely accessible media; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church support the efforts of civil society groups and regional bodies, especially the work of our sister Anglican province La Iglesia de la Region Central de America (IARCA), the Diocese of Honduras, and human rights organizations, which seek to address the root causes of violence and engage in advocacy and dialogue with their governments to serve the needs of and create safe spaces for internally displaced persons and refugees; and be it further

Resolved, That in solidarity with IARCA's work to push for accountability by the governments of their region, The Episcopal Church advocate for the United States government to play a positive role, to strengthen legal institutions through financial support, and to encourage the governments of Central America and Mexico to acknowledge and uphold the legal rights of the displaced, asylum seekers, and victims of crimes perpetrated by armed groups and/or state actors; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church acknowledge the regional nature of this migration and call for a robust, holistic, regional humanitarian response from the United States government and its allies that addresses the root causes of violence (including the deportation policies of the US government, arms trafficking, and drug consumption in the United States), in the region; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church affirm the universal right to seek asylum; and be it further Resolved, That The Episcopal Church advocate for increased access to and funding for legal orientation programs and legal representation for Central American refugees and asylum seekers and that congregations engage in community efforts to provide pro bono legal services to refugees and asylum seekers in need of representation; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church call for an immediate end to the inhumane practice of detention of women who arrive in the United States with minor children ("family detention") as a response to this refugee crisis; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church call for the immediate release of detained asylum seekers (particularly those who are LGBT, indigenous persons unable to communicate in English or Spanish, and persons who have disabilities or life-threatening illnesses).

Final Text of Resolution:

(A145)

Resolved, That Canon IV.19.6 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6. In any proceeding under this Title in which the Respondent fails to appear before the Conference Panel as required by Canon IV.12.4, or to appear before the Hearing Panel as required by Canon IV.13.2(a), or to timely file in a timely manner with the Hearing Panel the written response required by Canon IV.13.2(c), such Panel may, in its discretion, proceed in the absence of the Respondent and may accept as true the matters described in the notice issued to the Respondent pursuant to Canons IV.12.3 or IV.13.2. In proceedings under this section, such panels may consider the materials described in Canon IV.12.1, and any other types of evidence whose use is permitted in proceedings conducted before such Panels. The failure of a Respondent to appear, or to fail to file a written response, as described in this Section shall not, in itself, provide the basis for a finding that any Offense has been committed, other than any Offense specifically arising from such failure to appear, or failure to file.

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #29 on HB Message #222 on Resolution Do55 (Amend Canons V.1, V.2, V.3, and V.4) and moved concurrence.

Final Text of Resolution:

(Do55)

Resolved, That Canons V.1, V.2, V.3 and V.4 be amended to read as follows:

CANON 1: Of Enactment, Amendment, and Repeal

Sec. 1. No new Canon shall be enacted, or existing Canon be amended or repealed, except by concurrent Resolution of the two Houses of the General Convention. Such Resolution may be introduced first in either House, and shall be referred in each House to the Committee on Constitution and Canons thereof, for consideration, report, and recommendation, before adoption by the House; P provided, that in either House the foregoing requirement of reference may be dispensed with by a three-fourths vote of the members present.

Sec. 2. Whenever a Canon is amended, enacted, or repealed in different respects by two or more independent enactments at the same General Convention, including the enactment of an entire Title, the separate enactments shall be considered as one enactment containing all of the amendments or enactments, whether or not repealed, to the extent that the change made in separate amendments or enactments, are not in conflict with each other. The two members of the Committee on Constitution and Canons from each House of General Convention appointed pursuant to Canon V.1.5 (a) shall make the determination whether or not there is a conflict and certify the text of the single enactment to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Sec. 3. Whenever a Canon which repealed another Canon, or part thereof, shall itself be repealed, such previous Canon or part thereof shall not thereby be revived or reenacted, without express words to that effect.

Sec. 4. If a Canon or Section of a Canon or Clause of a Section of a Canon is to be amended or added, the enactment shall be in substantially one of the following forms: "That Canon . . . (Canon, Section or Clause designated as provided in Canon V.2.3 2) . . . be is hereby amended to read as follows: (here insert the new reading)"; or "That Canon . . . (Canon or Section designated as provided in Canon V.2.3 2) . . . be is hereby amended by adding a Section (or Clause) reading as follows: (here insert the text of the new Section or Clause)." If amendments are to be made at one meeting of the General Convention to more than one-half of the Canons in a single Title of the Canons, the enactment may be in the following form: "That Title . . . of the Canons be is hereby amended to read as follows: (here insert the new reading of all Canons in the Title whether or not the individual Canon is amended)." In the event of insertion of a new Canon, or a new Section or Clause in a Canon, or of the repeal of an existing Canon, or of a Section or Clause, the numbering of the Canons, or of a division of a Canon, which follow shall be changed accordingly without the necessity of enacting an amendment or amendments to that effect.

Sec. 5 (a) The Committee on Constitution and Canons of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint two of its members (a) to certify the changes, if any, made in the Canons, including a correction of the references made in any Canon to another, and to report the same, with the proper arrangement thereof, to the Secretary, who shall publish them in the Journal. (b) The Committee on Constitution of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint a similar committee of two of its members of the General Convention; and (b) to certify in like manner the changes, if any, made in the Constitution, or proposed to be made therein under the provisions of Article XII of the Constitution, and to report the same to the Secretary of the

General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal. The committee shall also have and exercise the power of renumbering of, and correction of references to, Articles, Sections and Clauses of the Constitution required by the adoption of amendments to the Constitution at a meeting of the General Convention in the same manner as provided with respect to the Canons-in the foregoing Sections 4 and 5(a) of this Canon.

Sec. 6. All Canons enacted during the General Convention of 1943, and thereafter, and all amendments and repeals of Canons then or thereafter made, unless otherwise expressly ordered, shall take effect on the first day of January following the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were enacted or made.

CANON 2: Of Terminology Used in These Canons

Sec. 1. Whenever the term "Diocese" is used without qualification in these Canons, it shall be understood to refer both to "Dioceses" and to "Missionary Dioceses," as these terms are used in the Constitution, and also, whenever applicable, to the "Convocation of the American Episcopal Churches in Europe."

Sec. 2. Whenever in these Canons a reference is made to a Canon or a Section of a Canon or a Clause of a Section of a Canon, the word "Canon" shall be set out, followed in order by the numerical or alphabetical designation of the Title, the Canon, the Section and the Clause, in each case separated by a period.

CANON 3: Of a Quorum

Sec. 1. Except where the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention provide to the contrary, a quorum of any body of the General Convention consisting of several members, the whole having been duly cited to meet, shall be a majority of said members; and a majority of the quorum so convened shall be competent to act.

CANON 4: Of Vacancies on Canonical Bodies

Sec. 1 (a) Except where the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention provide to the contrary, the term of a member in any body of the General Convention consisting of several members shall become vacant as follows:

- (1) upon absence from two regularly scheduled meetings of the body between successive regular meetings of the General Convention unless excused by the body;
- (2) upon Inhibition, any restriction on exercise of ministry, placement on Administrative Leave, Admonition, Suspension, or Deposition of a Member of the Clergy then serving on the body;
- (3) upon the renunciation of the pronouncement of the release and removal from the ordained ministry of this Church by of a Member of the Clergy;
- (4) upon the certification to the Presiding Bishop by the Disciplinary Board for Bishops as to the abandonment of the this Church by a Bishop pursuant to Canon IV.16;
- (5) upon the certification by the Standing Committee as to the abandonment of the this Church by a Priest or Deacon pursuant to Canon IV.16; or
- (6) for cause deemed sufficient by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the body.
- (b) The term of any member specified to be filled by a Priest or Deacon shall become vacant upon that member's ordination to the episcopacy.
- (c) The term of any Member of the Clergy specified to be filled by virtue of a provincial or diocesan canonical residence shall become vacant upon the change of canonical residence to another diocese or to a diocese in a different province, as the case may be.
- (d) The term of any Lay Person specified to be filled by virtue of a provincial or diocesan residence shall become vacant upon the change of residence to another diocese or to a diocese in a different province, as the case may be.
- Sec. 2 (a) The position of a lay member becomes vacant upon loss of status as a communicant in good standing.

(b) The position of any member specified to be filled by a $\frac{1}{2}$ Lay $\frac{1}{2}$ Person shall become vacant upon that member's ordination.

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #30 on HB Message #220 on Resolution B010 (Amend Constitution of the General Convention (2012) Canon III. 9.3(d)) and moved concurrence.

Resolved, Canon III.9.3(d) is hereby amended to read as follows:

- (d) Chaplains.
- (1) A Priest may be given ecclesiastical endorsement for service as a Chaplain in the Armed Services Forces of the United States of America or as a Chaplain for the Veterans' Administration, or in any Federal Correctional Institution, or any other Federal Ministries including the Department of Veterans' Affairs, and the Federal Bureau of Prisons, by a the Office of the Bishop Suffragan for the Armed Forces elected pursuant to Article II.7 of the Constitution, subject to the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority Bishop of the Diocese in which the Priest is canonically resident.
- (2) Any Priest serving as a Chaplain on in an active duty, Reserve or National Guard capacity with the Armed—Services Forces or employed as a Chaplain in the Department of Veterans' Affairs or the Federal Bureau of Prisons shall retain the Priest's canonical residence and shall be subject to the ecclesiastical supervision authority of the Bishop of the Diocese of in which the Priest is canonically resident, even though the Priest's work as a Chaplain shall be subject to the general ecclesiastical supervision of the Office of the Bishop Suffragan for the Armed Forces, or such other Bishop as the Presiding Bishop may designate elected pursuant to Article II.7 of the Constitution; provided, however, that in the event of a vacancy the charge thereof shall devolve upon the Presiding Bishop, with the power of appointing some other Bishop as the substitute in charge until the vacancy is filled by the House of Bishops.
- (3) Any Priest serving as a Chaplain on a military installation, or at a Veterans'Administration facility or Federal Correctional Institution Department of Veterans' Affairs Medical Center, or Federal Bureaus of Prisons Correctional Institution shall not be subject to Canons III.9.3.(e)(1) or III.9.4.(a). When serving other than on a military installation, or at a Veterans' Administration facility, or Federal Correctional Institution Department of Veterans' Affairs Medical Center or Federal Bureau of Prisons Correctional Institution, a Chaplain shall be subject to these Sections.

The House of Deputies Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #31 on HB Message #221 on Resolution A146 (Amend Canon IV.19.14(b) and (c) Impartiality) and moved concurrence.

(b) The Church Attorney or A any member of any Panel provided for in this Title shall disqualify himself or herself in any proceeding in which the member's such person's impartiality may

reasonably be questioned. The member person shall also disqualify himself or herself when the member person, the member's person's spouse, any person within the third degree of relationship to either of them, or the spouse of such person, (1) is the Respondent, Complainant or an Injured Person, (2) is likely to be a witness in the proceeding, (3) has a personal bias or prejudice concerning the Respondent, Complainant or any Injured Person, (4) has personal knowledge of disputed evidentiary facts concerning the proceeding, (5) has a personal financial interest in the outcome of the proceeding or in the Respondent, Complainant, any Injured Person or any other interest that could be substantially affected by the outcome or (6) is a member of the same congregation or otherwise has a close personal or professional relationship with the Respondent, the Complainant, any Injured Person or any witness in the matter.

(c) The Church Attorney or A any member of any Panel provided for in this Title who has not disqualified himself or herself as provided in this section may be subject to challenge by the Church Attorney or the Respondent on grounds described in this section. The Complainant or the Complainant's Advisor may inform the Church Attorney of any such grounds. The challenge shall be investigated by the remaining members of the Panel who shall determine whether the challenged member of the Panel person should be disqualified and replaced according to the procedures of this Title for filling vacancies.

(Communicated to the House of Bishops in HD Message #376)

Final Text of Resolution:

(C035)

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention recognize Deaconess Anna Ellison Butler Alexander as a Saint of The Episcopal Church through adding her to the calendar in Holy Women, Holy Men (or Lesser Feasts and Fasts if Holy Women, Holy Men is not approved for use) with the following proposed text and propers:

Deaconess Anna Ellison Butler Alexander

Suggested Date of Commemoration: September 24

The only Black deaconess in the Episcopal Church, teacher and minister in southern Georgia. Anna Ellison Butler Alexander (1865-1947) was born to recently emancipated slaves on Butler Plantation in MacIntosh County, Georgia. She was the first African- American set aside as a deaconess in the Episcopal Church in 1907. She founded Good Shepherd Church in rural Glynn County's Pennick

community where she taught children to read—by tradition, from the Book of Common Prayer and the Bible—in a one-room schoolhouse. The school was later expanded to two rooms with a loft where Anna lived. She ministered in Pennick for 53 years, leaving a legacy of love and devotion still felt in Glynn County. Deaconess Alexander served in difficult times, however. The diocese segregated her congregations in 1907 and African-American congregations were not invited to another diocesan convention until 1947. Similarly, it was only in the 1950s that a woman set aside as a deaconess was recognized as being in deacon's orders. However, her witness— wearing the distinctive dress of a deaconess, traveling by foot from Brunswick through Darien to Pennick, showing care and love for all whom she met—represents the best in Christian witness.

A Collect for Deaconess Alexander

O God, you called Anna Alexander as a deaconess in your Church, and sent her as teacher and evangelist to the people of Georgia: Grant us the humility to go wherever you send, and the wisdom to teach the word of Christ to whomever we meet, that all may come to the enlightenment which you intend for your people; through Jesus Christ, our Teacher and Savior. Amen.

Motion carried Rules suspended

Continuation of Debate on Resolution Do13

The conference committee presented its report on HB Message #264 on Resolution Do13 (Budget Process for The Episcopal Church) and moved adoption with amendment.

Conference Committee Amendment:

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Title I, Canon I, Section 8, be stricken in entirety and replaced to read as follows:

Sec. 8. The budget proposed for adoption by General Convention shall include a canonical portion which shall provide for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop together with the necessary expenses of that office, the stipend of the President of the House of Deputies together with the necessary expenses of that office, the staff and Advisory Councils required to assist in the performance of the duties and matters related to the Presiding Bishop's office and the President of the House of Deputies office, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments, and also the corporate requirements for the administrative support of the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society offices. The budget shall also include such amounts for the expenses as may be determined by General Convention.

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 78th General Convention recognize the continuing evolution of the roles of the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the life and work of The Episcopal Church is in a time of substantial transition and that the structures of the Church continue to evolve, and be it further Resolved, That this General Convention recognize there are increased demands on the time and energy of the President of the House of Deputies, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the President of the House of Deputies, among other current responsibilities, serves as the Vice-President of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, as the Vice-Chair of the Executive Council, and makes and participates in numerous appointments to positions in The Episcopal Church, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that at the present time, the House of Deputies is of the view that only persons who are retired or who have substantial economic resources are financially able to serve as President of the House of Deputies, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the House of Deputies considers it important that the House of Deputies be able to choose a President without regard to the financial circumstances of the candidates for the President of the House of Deputies, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the House of Deputies has affirmed that the desirability of compensation for the President of the House of Deputies is a fairness issue, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention determine that it is important for The Episcopal Church to explore fully and openly the issues of leadership, including compensation for the President of the House of Deputies, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention recognize that the House of Bishops understands and appreciates the cogency of, and fairness issues inherent in, the position of the House of Deputies, and be it further

Resolved, That this General Convention direct that the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies jointly appoint a task force to consider these issues of leadership and compensation and that this task force report its recommendations to the 79th General Convention, including such canonical or other steps needed to implement the recommendations of the task force.; and be it further

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 4, Sections 6-8, be stricken in their entirety and replaced to read as follows:

- Sec. 6. (a) The Executive Council shall submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance the proposed Budget for The Episcopal Church for the ensuing budgetary period, which budgetary period shall be equal to the interval between regular meetings of the General Convention. The proposed Budget shall be submitted not less than four months before the ensuing General Convention is convened.
- (b) Revenue to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church shall be generated primarily by a single assessment of the Dioceses of the Church based on a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of its Budget process. If in any year the total anticipated income for Budget support is less than the amount required to support the Budget approved by the General Convention, the canonical portion of the Budget for The Episcopal Church shall have funding priority over any other budget areas subject to any decreases necessary to maintain a balanced Budget.
- (c) After the preparation of the Budget, the Treasurer shall, at least four months before the sessions of the General Convention, transmit to the Bishop of each Diocese and to the President of each Province a statement of the existing and the proposed assessment necessary to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church. The Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance shall also submit to the General Convention, with the Budget, a plan for the assessments of the respective Dioceses of the sum needed to execute the Budget.
- (d) There shall be joint sessions of the two Houses for the presentation of the Budget for The Episcopal Church; and thereafter consideration shall be given and appropriate action taken thereon by the General Convention.
- (e) Upon the adoption by the General Convention of a Budget for The Episcopal Church and the planned assessments for the budgetary period, the Council shall formally advise each Diocese of its share of the total assessments to support the Budget for The Episcopal Church.
- (f) Full payment of the diocesan assessment shall be required of all Dioceses effective January 1, 2019.
- (g) <u>Effective January 1, 2016</u> Council shall have the power to grant waivers from the full <u>required</u> annual assessments of Dioceses within the limit established by the General Convention. Any diocese may appeal to Executive Council for a waiver of the <u>required</u> assessment, in full or in part, on the basis of financial

hardship, a stated plan for working toward full payment, or other reasons as agreed with the Executive Council. Effective January 1, 2019, failure to make full payment or to receive a waiver shall render the diocese ineligible to receive grants or loans from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society unless approved by Executive Council.

- (h) The Council shall have the power to expend all sums of money covered by the Budget and estimated Budgets approved by the General Convention, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention, including but not limited to the priority declaration set forth in Section 6(c) of this Canon. It shall also have power to undertake such other work provided for in the Budget approved by the General Convention, or other work under the jurisdiction of the Council, the need for which may have arisen after the action of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council its income will warrant.
- (i) In respect of the Budget for The Episcopal Church, the Executive Council shall have the power to consider and vote to make such adjustments therein, or additions thereto, as it shall deem to be necessary or expedient, and which, in its judgment, available funds and anticipated income will warrant subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the General Convention. It shall also have power to approve other initiatives proposed by the Chair or otherwise considered by Council, in consultation with the Chair of the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance, between meetings of the General Convention, as in the judgment of the Council are prudent and which the Church revenues will be adequate to support.
- (j) Each Diocese shall annually report to the Executive Council such financial and other information pertaining to the state of the Church in the Diocese as may be required in a form authorized by Executive Council.
- (k) Each Diocese shall report annually to the Executive Council the name and address of each new congregation, and of each congregation closed or removed by reason of any of the following: dissolution of the congregation;
 - 1. removal of the congregation to another Diocese due to cession or retrocession of geographic territory in which the congregation is located, pursuant to Articles V.6 or VI.2 of the Constitution;
 - 2. removal of the congregation to a new physical location or address, identifying both the location or address from which the congregation has removed, and the successor location or address; and
 - 3. merger of the congregation into one or more other congregations, in which case, the Diocese shall include in its report the names of all congregations involved in the merger, and the physical location and address at which the merged congregations shall be located.
- Sec. 7 (a) Every Missionary Bishop or, in case of a vacancy, the Bishop in charge of the jurisdiction, receiving aid from the General Convention Budget, shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of work performed, of money received from all sources and disbursed for all purposes, and of the state of the Church in the jurisdiction at the date of such report, all in such form as the Council may prescribe.
- (b) <u>The Ecclesiastical Authority of Ee</u>very <u>Bishop of a Diocese</u> receiving aid from the General Convention Budget shall report at the close of each fiscal year to the Council, giving account of the work in the diocese supported in whole or in part by that aid.
- Sec. 8. The Council, as soon as practicable after the close of each fiscal year, shall cause to be prepared and publish a full report of the work of the Executive Council, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the General Convention Office to the Church. Such report shall contain an itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements and a statement of all trust funds and other property of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and of all other trust funds and property in its possession or under its oversight responsibility. The report shall include a detailed schedule of the salaries paid to all officers and principal employees of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and the Executive Council.

The President asked Deputy Johnson of Minnesota, Chair of the conference committee, to identify the bishops who took part in the conference committee. Deputy Johnson stated that the Bishop of Florida, the Bishop of Colorado, and the Bishop of Northwestern Pennsylvania and Bethlehem were the members of the conference committee representing the House of Bishops.

Deputy Payne-Carter of Western New York moved to end debate on the resolution.

Motion carried Debate terminated

Motion carried Resolution adopted with amendment

The President thanked the members of the conference committee. The House expressed its thanks with applause.

Deputy Johnson of Minnesota requested to be excused from the floor to be present in the House of Bishops for the debate on Resolution Do13. The President excused the members of the conference committee.

Formation and Education for Ministry

The House of Deputies Committee on Formation and Education for Ministry presented its Report #49 on Resolution Bo20 (Amend Canon I.2) and moved adoption.

Original Text of Resolution:

(Bo20)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That Canon I.2 is hereby amended to add new sections 9 and 10 to read as follows:

Sec. 9. Reconciliation of Disagreements Affecting the Pastoral Relation between the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council and/or the House of Bishops

When the pastoral relationship between the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council and/or the House of Bishops is imperiled by disagreement or dissension, and the issues are deemed serious by the Presiding Bishop or two-thirds majority of all the members of the Executive Council or a two-thirds majority of all members of the House of Bishops, any party may petition the Secretary of the House of Bishops, in writing, to intervene and assist the parties in their efforts to resolve the disagreement or dissension. The written notice shall include sufficient information to inform the Secretary and the parties involved of the nature, causes, and specifics of the disagreements or dissension imperiling the pastoral relationship. The Secretary shall initiate such proceedings as are deemed appropriate under the circumstances to attempt to reconcile the parties, which may include the appointment of a consultant or licensed mediator. The parties to the disagreement, following the recommendations of the Secretary, shall labor in good faith toward that reconciliation. If such proceedings lead to reconciliation, said reconciliation shall contain definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council or the House of Bishops.

Sec 10. Dissolution of the Pastoral Relation with the Presiding Bishop

(a) If for any urgent reason the Presiding Bishop or two-thirds majority of all the members of the Executive Council or a two-thirds majority of all members of the House of Bishops, based on a vote in a duly-called meeting, desires a dissolution of the pastoral relationship with the Presiding Bishop, and the parties cannot agree, any party may give notice in writing to the Secretary of the House of Bishops with

a copy available to the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council or House of Bishops. Such notice shall include sufficient information to inform the Secretary and all parties involved of the nature, causes, and specifics requiring the dissolution of the pastoral relationship. If the parties have participated in mediation or consultation processes, a separate report from the mediator or consultant will be submitted to Secretary with copies available to the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council or the House of Bishops.

- (b) Within thirty days of receipt of the written notice, the Secretary of the House of Bishops may initiate further mediation and reconciliation Processes.
- (c) If the differences between the parties are not resolved after completion of mediation or other reconciliation efforts or actions prescribed by the Secretary, the matter shall proceed as follows:
 - (1) The Secretary shall convene a committee of one Presbyter and one Lay Person appointed by the President of the House of Deputies, neither of which shall be a member of the Executive Council, and one Bishop appointed by the Secretary. The committee may conduct such inquiries and interviews as it deems necessary.
 - (2) The Secretary shall give written notice to the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council or the House of Bishops that the committee will recommend a resolution of the matter to the House of Bishops, and that either party has the right within fifteen days to request in writing an opportunity to confer with the committee before the committee proposes a resolution for consideration of and approval by a two thirds majority vote of the House of Bishops. The Secretary's written notification shall inform the parties involved of the nature, causes, and specifics of the unresolved disagreements or dissension imperiling the pastoral relationship.
 - (3) If a timely request is made, the Secretary shall immediately notify the committee. The committee shall set a date for the conference, which shall be held within fifteen days of the committee's receipt of the notification.
 - (4) At the conference, each party shall be entitled to attend, be represented, and present its position fully.
 - (5) Within fifteen days after the conference or after the expiration of the time to request in writing an opportunity to confer with the committee if no conference is requested, the committee shall provide its recommended resolution to the House of Bishops, the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council. The committee's recommended resolution of the matter shall become effective upon a two-thirds majority vote of the Bishops present and eligible to vote, at the next regular or special meeting of the House of Bishops. If a two-thirds majority of those Bishops is not obtained, the committee shall provide another recommended resolution to the Secretary for transmission and vote at the same meeting, as was the initial recommended resolution.
 - (6) If the recommended resolution is that the pastoral relationship be continued, the recommended resolution shall contain definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council or the House of Bishops.
 - (7) If the relationship is to be dissolved, the dissolution shall have the effect of terminating the Presiding Bishop's term and jurisdiction, as if the Presiding Bishop had resigned.
 - (i) The Secretary of the House of Bishops shall record the dissolution.
 - (ii) The judgment may include terms and conditions including financial settlements.
 - (8) In either event, the Vice President of the House of Bishops shall offer appropriate supportive services to the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Council or the House of Bishops.

Deputy King of Western New York moved to end debate on the resolution.

Motion carried Debate terminated

An electronic vote was taken on the resolution.

Motion defeated Resolution rejected

(Communicated to the House of Bishops in HD Message #381)

(a) A Priest desiring to become canonically resident within a Diocese or equivalent jurisdiction of a Church in Full Communion (as identified in Canon I.20) or Church in Communion with This Church (as identified by Canon III.10.2.[3]) [sic] shall request a testimonial from the Ecclesiastical Authority of the

(b) If the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or equivalent jurisdiction of the Church in Fall [sic]
Communion or Church in Communion with This Church accepts the testimonial, the canonical residence
of the Priest transferred shall date from such acceptance, and notice of acceptance shall be promptly
forwarded by the Priest to the Ecclesiastical Authority in the sending Diocese. Such notification from
the receiving Ecclesiastical Authority may be in the following form:
I hereby certify that A.B. has been canonically transferred to my jurisdiction and is a Priest in good
standing.
(Date) (Signed)
Upon receipt of said acceptance, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the sending Diocese shall notify the
Church Pension Fund and the Recorder of Ordinations of the priest's departure from the Episcopal
Church.
(c) This provision shall not be used for Priests who seek to enter Churches Not in Communion with This
Church or for those who seek transfer to another Province of the Anglican Communion while remaining
geographically within the boundaries of the Episcopal Church. In such cases the provisions of Canon III.
6.8 shall be followed.

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention condemn the ruling, and its enforcement, of the Dominican Republic's constitutional court on September 23, 2013, which ruled ineligible for citizenship any children born of Haitian migrants in the Dominican Republic and ordered authorities to audit all of the nation's birth records back to June 1929 to determine who no longer qualifies for citizenship, thereby making such persons effectively stateless with an estimated hundreds of thousands of persons being made stateless retroactively and ineligible to obtain a birth certificate, attend school, work, drive, open bank accounts, receive state health insurance and pensions, get baptized, or get married; and be it further

Resolved, That the Convention advocate to the Government of the Dominican Republic that they faithfully comply with Law No. 169-14, in order to complete the revalidation of birth certificates and delivery of identity documents to all the people of Haitian descent born in the Dominican Republic who have been affected by ruling No. 168-13 of the Constitutional Court, and that under no circumstances will any person born in the Dominican Republic be arbitrarily expelled from his/her country or placed in centros de acogida (reception centers) or "refugio" (refuge) against their will; and be it further

Resolved, That all Episcopalians pray for Dominicans of Haitian descent and all other stateless persons in the world that they may find homes where they are welcomed and afforded legitimate residential, educational, work status, and legal documentation of their personhood for themselves and their children; and be it further

Resolved, That the Convention affirm its support of The Episcopal Church in the Dominican Republic and its Bishop Julio Cesar Holguín Khoury and the Diocese of Haiti and its Bishop Jean Zache Duracin in their efforts to provide advocacy and other succor to those affected by the Dominican Republic's constitutional court ruling; and be it further

Resolved, That the Convention direct the Office of Government Relations to communicate to the United States government, to the United Nations, and to our ecumenical and interreligious partners to protest this human rights issue with the Dominican Republic on behalf of Dominicans of Haitian descent and others similarly affected by this issue.
