Preface

Those interested in television trivia might be forgiven for comparing the 81st General Convention of The Episcopal Church to the infamous last episode of season nine of *Dallas*: perhaps we had awakened to find that the 80th General Convention was a dream – maybe even a nightmare – and in Louisville we awoke to a much more pleasant reality. *

Perhaps... but the 81st General Convention did help to dispel the unpleasant memories of the pandemic, and we recalled that we are not fundamentally a transactional church, where the purpose of convention is just to legislate and pass resolutions. Rather, The Episcopal Church thrives through community, and building community requires interactions and companionship beyond legislation.

This was still a much shorter General Convention than in previous, pre-Covid times, and most participants felt the imbalance between times allotted for legislative work and other communal opportunities typical of General Conventions at their best. The shorter schedule did have some advantages, including uplifting, streamlined worship and the intensity of conversations when time was scarce. Planning and Arrangements will have a Solomonic task as it decides a length for the convention in Phoenix.

Despite its short duration, the 81st General Convention accomplished quite a lot: we revised the definition of *The Book of Common Prayer*; we deepened our commitment to racial reconciliation and truth-telling; we accelerated the inclusion of LGBTQ people in the church, and especially for same sex couples; we threaded needles of gospel witness in areas where we do not have consensus; and we made modest progress on reforming internal disciplinary and canonical processes.

The 81st General Convention also seemed the fruition of a process begun in 2018; there had been no pause in planning and action during the nearly six years of the pre-pandemic, pandemic, and post-pandemic decision-making. So unlike 2022, 2024 felt like the genuine transition year, with a new Presiding Bishop elected, officers of the House of Deputies elected in contested elections, and the retirement of the 26th Secretary and Executive Officer forthcoming. Some people opined that 2024 marked a shift in the direction of the church, but at adjournment on June 29th, what that could mean seemed rather undefined: there was common understanding that the structures and organization of the church needed change, but what those changes will be are for the future.

This *Journal* is, as always, a faithful record of the proceedings of the General Convention. As you read through the minutes and resolutions, I hope you will also glimpse the humanity of those whose lives and ministries lie behind them. I hope you will give thanks for the thousands of volunteers who made all this possible, and for the hard-working (and endlessly creative) people of the General Convention Office who everyday spin flax into gold. I hope you will appreciate the people of the Diocese of Kentucky and the city of Louisville who were our hosts. And I hope you will be inspired to note that most of what is described is the produce of visions and aspirations of Episcopalians discovering

intimations of the Divine amid a world that sometimes seems far-removed from the Beloved Community.

I write this *Preface* in the last days of my tenure as Executive Officer, but I feel little nostalgia and no regret. Since undertaking this ministry in January 2013, I have tried to be an innovator, a responsive and responsible leader for the church, and a guarantor of the extensive embrace of The Episcopal Church. The technological and other changes I introduced have, I trust, assisted the church into the 21st century. The commitment to excellence and accountability of the General Convention Office has, I hope, supported and enhanced the churchwide network of leadership. But the aspect of this ministry that I have held most dear has been the insistence – behind closed doors – that The Episcopal Church is the same there as it is in the open arena: a church of integrity, where voices are not silenced, and where the margins and the center are in constant motion toward one another and into the perfect mix of God’s people.

As a young, gay man wishing to serve God through the church, I was told that I could never be true to myself and hope to have “a place at the table.” I ignored that counsel, and despite many years of life on the outside looking in, I was determined that if I ever found myself at that table, I would always ask “Who is not here,” and then work to bring the outsider in. With God’s help, I have tried to be faithful to that commitment, and hope that in some way my role at the center of the church’s leadership has changed the culture – that no one will ever have to be someone other than who they are if they are to serve God in The Episcopal Church.

On my desk is a slim volume, published in 1951, entitled *The General Convention Offices and Officers*. Even though I served the church as its Historiographer, most of the names are simply entries to me, with my knowledge of these leaders limited to the hagiography of the book. In reading through the history, it’s hard not to recall this passage from Sirach:

Some of them have left behind a name, so that others declare their praise. But of others there is no memory; they have perished as though they had never existed; they have become as though they had never been born, they and their children after them. But these also were people of compassion whose righteous deeds have not been forgotten (Sirach 44:8-10).

Whatever the lasting accomplishments of 81st General Convention may be, I am certain they will be the righteous deeds of compassionate people. So it has always been.

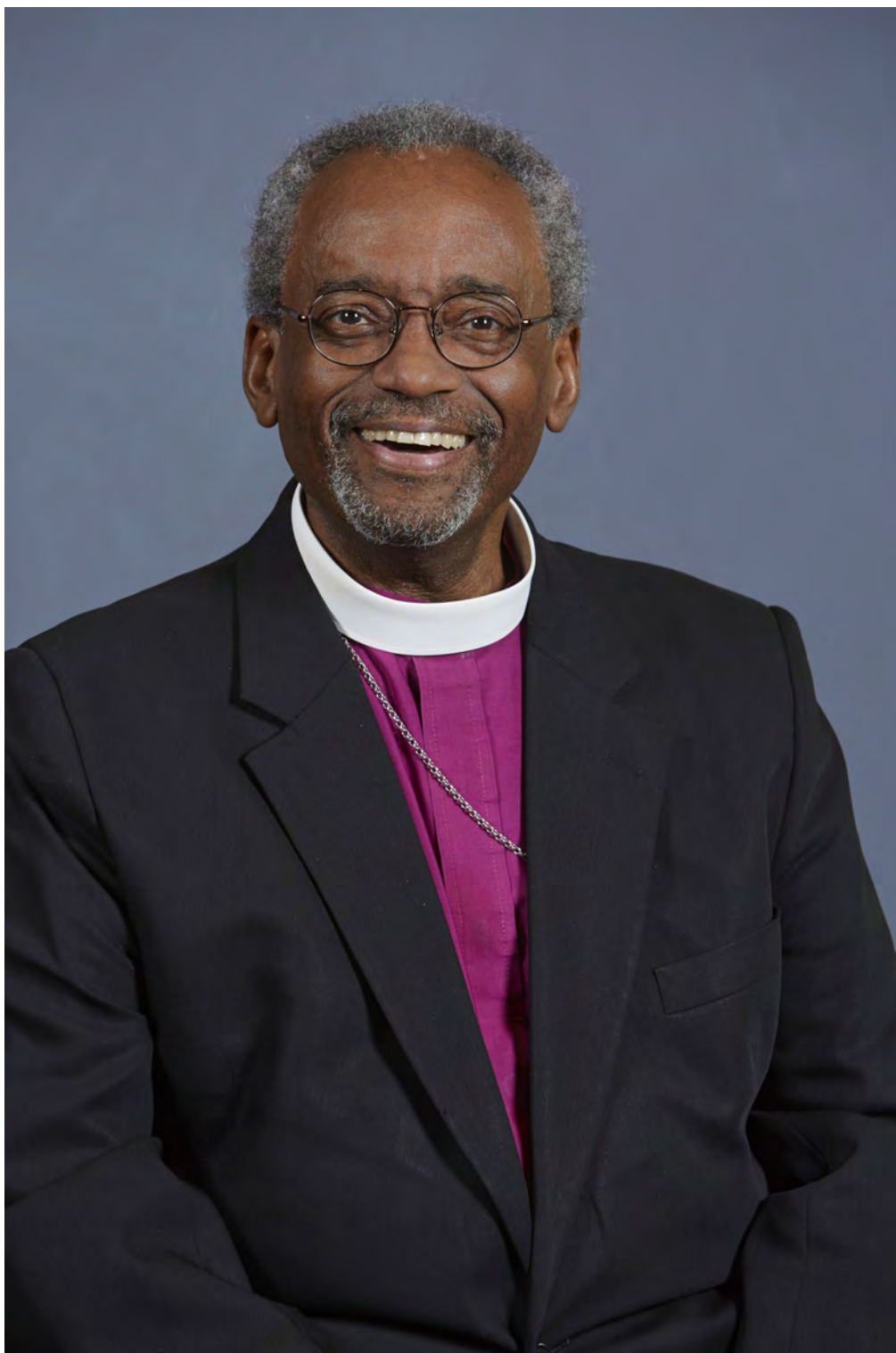

A Narrative for the Proposed Domestic and Foreign Mission Society (DFMS) 2025-2027 Triennial Budget

The Executive Council of the Episcopal Church approved the 2025-2027 Proposed Triennial Budget that will be presented to the General Convention in a resolution for adoption. The Executive Council Joint Budget Committee thanks the members of the Executive Leadership Team and staff, the Executive Council and members of the broader Episcopal Church for their input in this process.

Background

This proposed balanced Budget was developed under the new process as mandated by Resolution 2022 A048 and the related amended Canons and the Rules of Order for both the House of Bishops and House of Deputies that govern this process that was adopted by the 80th General Convention. The new Executive Council Joint Budget Committee was appointed by the Executive Council to draft a proposed balanced Triennial Budget. This new Committee replaced the previous budget committee known as the Program, Budget, and Finance Committee.

As a committee of the Executive Committee, the Joint Budget Committee, which is responsible only to the Executive Council, was charged with developing and drafting a balanced budget that was to be presented to the Executive Council for their review and approval to be introduced as a resolution to the General Convention for final adoption. The goal of the Joint Committee was to present a balanced budget based on the anticipated revenue resources of the DFMS. The Joint Committee started its work in February 2023 culminating in its approval at the Executive Council's January 2024 meeting.

Process

In addition to working closely with and soliciting comments and suggestions from the Executive Leadership Team of the DFMS, the Joint Committee carefully considered the comments of those participating in the several Listening Sessions and those who submitted emails to us with their thoughts and detailed suggestions. It worked to ensure that our process was open and transparent, that we communicated in a timely fashion and made available opportunities for input throughout the Church. Because this is a new process, we sought input often and spent our January 2024 meeting carefully reviewing all the comments submitted.

In addition to openness and transparency, our guiding principle was to support the mission and ministry of the church. We maintained the current structure of the budget based upon the Jesus Movement budget with the three pillars of Care of Creation, Evangelism, and Racial Reconciliation and Justice. We recognized our role as good stewards of our resources, cognizant of our responsibility to ensure that resources are provided for future generations to come. A reality is that because of the timing of the budgeting process, many of the

requests that have come to us, and will come to the General Convention body, must be reconciled following General Convention, so are not reflected in this budget. As such, we agreed as a body to recommend that additional funding requests be submitted as resolutions to the General Convention and, if passed, be considered in the reconciliation process. The adopted balanced Triennial Budget coming out of the General Convention will then be managed and implemented by the Executive Council. The Joint Budget Committee will meet mid- September 2024 to conduct the reconciliation process following General Convention. That budget will be presented to the Executive Council at its November 2024 meeting for consideration and adoption of the adjustments.

Assumptions

It is important to note that in order to balance the budget, cost savings had to be found in each of the functional and programmatic areas. Programs were examined to determine if they could be conducted in a more cost-effective manner, and some were eliminated. We honored the need to continue to provide high quality translation and interpretation services. We recognize that staff are unduly burdened; and sincerely appreciate their willingness to continue to serve under the current circumstances. In the years to come The Episcopal Church will need to closely examine its overall structure. Adjustments will likely need to be made to departmental organization and staffing levels; the use of permanent and consulting staff needs will be assessed. The Joint Budget Committee sees its work as supportive of the Executive Council resolution to provide funding for reviewing the organization of DFMS and implementing changes.

The following reflects a summary of the areas of income and expense where significant adjustments were made ([*] denotes line number in the Proposed Budget):

Income

- 1) The diocesan assessment will remain at the current level of 15% with an anticipated growth in revenue of 2% during the triennium. [Line 3]
- 2) Estimated growth in the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (DFMS) investments would be 7.5% in 2024 and 2025. [Line5a]
- 3) We continue to heed the Investment Committee's recommendation and draw no more than 5% of a five-year rolling average of income derived from trust funds that support the budget.
- 4) Support for the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Justice and Equity is to be derived based on a formula from unrestricted assets and is noted separately. [Line 5b]
- 5) Additional Rental Income is based on an expanded use of the 815 Second Avenue property. This includes rental of the executive suite when not in use. [Line 14]
- 6) The Annual Appeal and other Development Income were increased. [Line 9]
- 7) Please note that our commitment to Episcopal Relief and Development remains strong and there is no income line in the budget. [Line 10]

Expenses

- Reductions in expenses in each of the functional areas: Evangelism, Reconciliation and Justice, Creation Care, Mission Within the Episcopal Church, Presiding Bishop's Budget, Mission Beyond the Episcopal Church, Governance, Finance Legal Operations (HR, IT, Facilities, Purchasing).
- Funding at \$2M is provided for GC resolutions and new PB initiatives. [Line 697]
- 3% COLA and 5% increase in healthcare costs for DFMS employees.
- Staff Restructuring will provide savings during the triennium. [Line 698]
- Interpretation and translation services, essential for our work together, remain a priority area and as such are appropriately reflected in the budget.

Summary of Major Changes to the Budget Evangelism, Reconciliation and Justice, and Creation Care [Lines 35 to 65]

- Evangelism: The three sections of Evangelism include
 - 1) Grants for new church starts and congregational redevelopment programs;
 - 2) Evangelism initiatives including training resources, revivals, grants, curriculum, resources and events; and
 - 3) Staff costs.

This area reduced line 36 by \$192,000 over the triennium, Mission Enterprise Zones and New Church Starts.

- Reconciliation and Justice: There are five sections in this category:
 1. Grants and training resources under Poverty and Social Justice Work;
 2. Racial Justice and Reconciliation that includes Becoming Beloved Community grants and resources, an expansion of Sacred Ground training;
 3. Ethnic Ministries and their work they with Indigenous, Asian, African Descent, and Hispanic/Latino communities in the church;
 4. Historically Black Colleges and Universities;
 5. United Thank Offering; and
 6. LGBTQ+ and Women's Ministries.
 - A grant was received from the Lilly Foundation that allowed for the addition of a staff person (line 100) and an offset in line 88b.
 - Line 89a was reduced to \$20,000 per annum. Program travel in line 74 for Poverty and Justice staff was reduced by \$19,000 over the triennium.
 - Line 86 was reduced by \$37,000; this conference will only be held twice in the triennium.
 - Criminal Justice Ministries was zeroed because the work can better be

done at the local level.

- HBCU grants remain at the same level as the past biennium. The Joint Budget Committee recommends that if additional funding is sought, a resolution be brought to General Convention specifying the use of the additional funds sought and that each institution become and remain current with audited financials for each year of funding.
- Creation Care: This is a developing effort and includes funding for grants, networking, and resources. It is one of the few areas that received an increase in staffing from \$335k to \$388k over the triennium.

Mission Within the Episcopal Church

This area includes Communications in all its forms to support the work of the church, and Formation and Vocation, which funds Episcopal Service Corps and Episcopal Youth Event, formation networks, campus ministries, and Safe Church training. This area funds the cost of church-wide curriculum development priorities of General Convention. The section on Transition Ministries includes the work of the Office for Transition Ministry including Diocesan Transition Ministers and maintains an online database to assist both clergy and congregations in the search process. TEC Block Grants provide unrestricted block grants to dioceses in Indigenous Areas, Latin America (including Cuba) and the Caribbean and enables these dioceses to sustain the presence of the Episcopal Church. Budgets generally cover stipends for clergy, lay ministers, and diocesan staff; insurance and taxes; support for diocesan programs and ministries for adults and youth; and the ability to partner with other agencies in outreach and community development.

- Reduced Line 276 Website Maintenance, Development and Upgrades by \$120k
- Reduced Line 340 anticipating less face-to-face interaction; some costs borne by individual departmental budgets
- Line 357b Reduction of all departmental budgets
- Reduced Line 357a curriculum budget
- Reduced Line 357b to account for online vs. in person training
- Reduced line 359 by \$5k per year in Young Adult and Campus Ministry Grants
- Line 360 reduction in campus ministries consultants. \$90k moved to fund Associate Officer for Campus Ministries
- Line 385 received an increase to accommodate an additional \$75K annually for Indigenous employees' medical insurance to assure parity.

Ministry of the Presiding Bishop

The Presiding Bishop's Ministry includes the areas of:

1. The Presiding Bishop's Office;

Funding in this area has been kept level to provide adequate funding for the new Presiding Bishop to begin their ministry. Modest adjustments were made to entertainment (line 181) and travel (line 183).

2. The House of Bishops

Pastoral Development - Funding for this office includes the addition of the new Title IV officer who is assuming the pastoral care functions of the office (please see the comments on line 194). Furthermore, the cost for Title IV training materials is increased to cover the costs of maintaining current training materials for use at the Churchwide, provincial and diocesan levels necessitated by changing laws and translation services.

3. Armed Forces and Federal Ministries

This is an area that has been underfunded. This category also includes chaplains for Veteran Hospitals and other federal facilities. The chaplains are confronted frequently with mental health issues and often the people dealing with these challenges with those in federal service. Increased funding for this ministry includes:

- Recruiting military chaplains to supplement the 100 military chaplains to serve all our armed forces around the world.
- Funding for the bishop to meet the required visitations of all the military bases and federal facilities that are part of this ministry. This has not been done in the past.
- This ministry also serves Veterans Hospitals and Federal prisons.
- Training and on-going education for our chaplains who often provide not just pastoral care but mental health support for our troops.

4. The General Board of Examining Chaplains. (line 212)

Overall, funding for this area has been modestly reduced. Funding is decreased in this area due to the decrease in those who are being ordained.

Mission Beyond

This area includes: 1) the Anglican Communion; 2) Block Grants within the Anglican Communion; 3) Covenants within the Anglican Communion; 4) International Justice and Peacemaking/United Nations Presence; 5) Refugee Ministry; 6) Missionary Service; 7) Office of Government Relations; 8) Ecumenical, Interfaith, Global Relations; 9) Ecumenical Dues; 10) Grants in the form of contributed services to affiliated organizations.

- Line 466a. This line assumes that Global Episcopal Mission Network (A028) and Global Mission Advocacy program (A016) are not funded.

- Line 415b, New line to reflect emerging priorities within the Anglican Communion with a focus on reconciliation and evangelism and sustainable development initiatives.
- Line 466b. Discernment, training, reentry, travel. Reduced by \$1.2 mill, changing program from providing housing, stipend, and pension to a program that provides only insurance and travel. Focus on a “Volunteers for Mission Program”. Maintains up to \$100,000 annually for the support of “Border Missioners”.
- Line 471 reflects translation costs for many OGR materials, policy documents, educational webinars, and resources.

Mission Governance

This area includes:

1. The General Convention Office (Lines 512 to 539)
 - The General Convention Office provides budgeting for in-person and virtual meetings of Interim Bodies, Executive Council (EC) including the work of committees of EC.
 - The Executive Council will hold two meetings in person and one meeting via Zoom in the upcoming triennium. Other bodies have been encouraged to adopt similar meeting schedules. (Line 514)
 - Translation and Interpretation Services reflect enhanced use of technology to meet our increasing need for these services.(Line 534)
 - Although we have gone “paperless” for General Convention, the software and technology costs are necessary to ensure that we can run General Convention efficiently so funds for maintaining our technology are in the budget. (Line 533)
2. Provincial Coordination (Line 543 to 544)
3. The House of Deputies (Lines 547 to 558)
 - The House of Deputies includes the budget for the President of the House of Deputies.
 - The President of the House of Deputies has budgeted for a 12-person Council of Advice, down from 15, for the upcoming triennium to reduce costs. (Line 548)
4. The Archives of the Episcopal Church. (Lines 561 to 564)

The Archives reflects budget items for maintenance of historical information related to the Episcopal Church for research and legal operations, among others.

Mission Finance Legal Operations

Included in this section are: 1) the Development Office; 2) Controller’s Office;

3) Treasurer's Office; 4) Legal ; 5) Chief Operating Officer; 6) Human Resources; 7) Information Technology; and 8) Facilities Management.

These areas also represent “the cost of doing business” as The Episcopal Church and are generally less negotiable and typically increase with inflation. These areas are budgeted, again, with no increase in the net number of staff employed. They provide support for all areas of mission: Mission Within, Mission Beyond, the Presiding Bishop's office, Racial Equality and Justice, Evangelism, and Care of Creation.

- Facilities management for the Church Center at 815 Second Avenue in New York City (lines 653- 679) include not only costs for building maintenance and upkeep but also requirements to comply with building codes in New York City. Other fees include plumbing, electrical, insurance, security, etc.
- The City of New York has code requirements for buildings, including sidewalk repair and maintenance. The property at 815 Second Avenue will need such sidewalk work in the 2025-2027 triennium, which is reflected in this budget. The COO and building supervisor will get competitive bids for this work.

Summary

The budget presented is balanced and supports the areas of mission and ministry of the Episcopal Church and the dictates of General Convention. It is based on income assumptions observed and calculated from the past and uses sound financial practices. There will be two canonically mandated hearings on the budget. The first is a zoom meeting on May 16th at 4pm (EDST). The second will be at General Convention on June 22nd at 11am, location TBD.

JOINT SESSION

Call to Order

The Secretary called the Joint Session to Order at 2:01 p.m.

Prayers

The Secretary led the Joint Session in prayer.

Presiding Bishop and President of the House of Deputies Presentation to General Convention

The Secretary welcomed the Joint Session to the Diocese of Kentucky for the 81st General Convention and thanked the staff of the General Convention Office and volunteers for their work. The Secretary then announced his planned retirement after the General Convention and was thanked for his years of service with applause.

The Secretary then welcomed the Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry, and the President of the House of Deputies, Julia Ayala Harris, to make remarks.

The President thanked the Diocese of Kentucky for its hospitality. The President noted that there have been challenges in the time since the last General Convention, globally, for her personally, and for The Episcopal Church. The President commended the Presiding Bishop for the grace and courage he showed throughout his own challenges and the church for the leadership, resilience, and care they have shown during this time. The President noted The Episcopal Church is at a crossroads with an uncertain future, but by living into the priorities of accessibility, inclusivity, and safety we can be a church where all are welcome. The President encouraged the Joint Session to engage the business of General Convention, being led by the Holy Spirit, and with respect, trust, and mutual care. The President noted that, by doing so, The Episcopal Church can offer a counter-cultural witness and encouraged the Joint Session by reminding us that the Lord has brought us this far and will bring the church where we need to be.

The Presiding Bishop then greeted the Joint Session and gave a word of thanks to the President for her ministry and for her leadership during his health challenges. The Presiding Bishop also gave thanks to the Secretary, Executive Council, and the staffs of The Episcopal Church and the General Convention Office for their leadership and work. The Presiding Bishop noted that his time in the office will be coming to an end this year and that it has been an honor serving the church in this capacity. The Joint Session responded with applause in thanksgiving for his service. The Presiding Bishop then reflected on the Last Discourse in the book of John, reminding the Joint Session of Jesus' message to the disciples of what they needed to know to face an uncertain future. The Presiding Bishop encouraged the Joint Session to offer radical, selfless service to the world and to transform this world by the power

of love, as instructed by the words of Jesus in the book of John. The Presiding Bishop noted that he felt a sweet spirit in at this General Convention and that he believed the Spirit continues to work within The Episcopal Church. The Presiding Bishop noted many examples of the Spirit at work in The Episcopal Church. The Presiding Bishop stated that he learned about Jesus and the love of Jesus in this church and, because of that, he is not concerned about the future of The Episcopal Church. The Presiding Bishop reminded the Joint Session that, though the road will not be easy, The Episcopal Church is strong and durable and has a future that God has decreed. The Presiding Bishop encouraged the members of the Joint Session to roll up their sleeves and get to work.

The Secretary read the announcements.

The Presiding Bishop gave a blessing to the Joint Session.

Recess

The Joint Session was adjourned at 3:02 p.m.

Day 1**Sunday June 23, 2024****MORNING SESSION**

This being the time and place designated, pursuant to Canon I.1.1.a, for the meeting of the 81st General Convention, the President of the House of Deputies, Julia Ayala Harris of Oklahoma, called the House to order at 11:00 a.m. at the Kentucky International Convention Center, Louisville, Kentucky, in the Diocese of Kentucky.

The President announced that the Bible had been placed in the House and was open to Numbers chapter 27, verses 1-8. The President remarked on the scripture.

Appointment of the Chaplain

The President announced the appointment of the Rev. Lester V. Mackenzie of Los Angeles as the Chaplain of The House of Deputies. Chaplain Mackenzie led the House in opening prayers.

Introduction

The President introduced the Vice President of the House, Deputy Rachel Taber-Hamilton of Olympia, and noted that the Vice President will preside should the President be unable to do so.

Appointments

The President announced the appointment of Deputy Crystal Plummer of Chicago as the deputy who will preside should the President and Vice President be unable to do so; Bryan W. Krislock, Esq. of Olympia as Parliamentarian; Thomas A. Little, Esq. of Vermont as the Vice-Parliamentarian; Michael O. Glass, Esq. of San Joaquin as the Chancellor to the President; the Rev. Wilmot Merchant of South Carolina as the Sergeant-at-Arms; and Rick Stanitis of Northern Michigan as the deputy Sergeant-at-Arms.

Certification of Deputies

The President called on the Secretary for Report #1 for the morning session of the First Legislative Day from the House of Deputies Committee on Credentials. For the Morning Session of the First Legislative Day, there were 408 Clerical Deputies and 405 Lay Deputies certified and seated, bringing the total count of the House to 813 representing 108 Dioceses which were duly recorded and represent prima facie evidence of the Deputies' right to seats in this House. No objections or contest were filed.

Resolved, That the study to be completed by 2027; Funding for the recommendation of a site and for the move to a permanent location be utilized by funds realized by the 2020 sale of land acquired by Executive Council for this purpose in Austin.

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention commend the Presiding Officers, the Acting Chief Operating Officer, the Executive Officer of the General Convention Office, and the Archives Advisory Committee for their identification to Executive Council of a proposed location meeting the requirements for an appropriate and accessible site within the United States, adequate for the present and future needs of the historical records of this Church, as contemplated by Canon 1.5 and described in Keeping Archives, Keeping Faith: Archives Board Report to Executive Council (June 2019); and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention heartily commend the work of the Archives staff for transferring more than 8,000 cubic feet of records, representing over 200 years of Episcopal history, from the Seminary of the Southwest to an interim location in Austin during the pandemic, while also maintaining the digital archive and providing research assistance; and be it further

All persons, prior to being interviewed by the investigator, shall be advised of the confidential nature of the investigation and when such information may be shared during the course of the proceedings.

- The Episcopal Church supports inter- and multi-faith ministries that contribute to our mission to follow Jesus, loving our neighbors as ourselves (Matthew 22:36-40) and demonstrating particular care for those who are marginalized and oppressed (Matthew 25:31-46);
- Episcopalians find common cause and minister with organizations and individuals with whom we have theological differences, without proselytizing or demanding that our ministry partners adhere to the tenets we espouse;
- The over one million incarcerated individuals in this country are among the most marginalized and oppressed members of our society;
- Episcopalians faithfully engage in ministry with incarcerated individuals, seeking to provide support, encouragement, and hope to these persons;
- Among the many members of the incarcerated population as well as those who minister to and with them, are individuals who are LGBTQIA+, a community that also experiences marginalization in this country;
- Following the Way of Jesus, Episcopalians minister to and with all God’s children, with special focus on the support and liberation of those who are oppressed;
- Our canons prohibit the denial of access to any ministry of this Church “because of race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, sex, marital or family status (including

pregnancy and child care plans), sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, disabilities or age” (Canon III.1.2);

and be it further

Resolved, that Episcopalians may not be forced to overtly or tacitly endorse theological statements or practices that conflict with our stated policies and beliefs in order to participate in shared prison ministry programs; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention urge any prison ministry program in which members of The Episcopal Church volunteer hold policies consistent with our spiritual teachings and stated policies, asking such programs to change their policies if they conflict with our nondiscrimination canons; and be it further

The House of Deputies Committee on Social Justice and United States Policy reported its Report #2 on Resolution D017 (Support Regulations on Generative Artificial Intelligence) and moved adoption.

That the 81st General Convention reaffirm the principles of 2022-D020 (Addressing Implications of the Digital Age) and further acknowledge that generative artificial intelligence (AI) is rapidly changing how we relate to information and each other, and raises important ethical considerations regarding its impact on our understanding of truth, trust in institutions, authenticity, and human dignity, and that as a society and as a church we have not fully grappled with the important practical and ethical implications of advances in generative AI; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church, with the help of the Office of Government Relations and the Episcopal Public Policy Network, monitor advances in AI and speak on behalf of the most vulnerable according to the values of The Episcopal Church by supporting policies at the local, state, and national levels of governance, and efforts towards international frameworks to:

- Regulate the use of data to train algorithms, in order to recognize the rights of human creators, increase transparency about the data and methodologies used, diversify sources used for training data, and protect individuals' privacy rights;
- Restrict or regulate, requiring additional transparency, the use of generative AI to influence or interfere with elections and public information campaigns;
 - Urge all political entities, and government officials, in the absence of legislation, to voluntarily commit to refrain from any deceptive use of AI in political campaigns;
- Restrict the use of AI to infringe on civil rights or applications of AI that perpetuate historic and ongoing discrimination and racism;
 - Restrict or ban the use of deepfakes (images, videos, or audio altered to replace one person's likeness with another's) for purposes of fraud, defamation, and sexual exploitation;
- Support workers that have been negatively impacted by the use of generative AI in their industries, through support for policies such as retraining programs and regulations on monitoring in the workplace; and
- Regulate the use of generative AI by militaries, police, and in any other contexts related to the use of force.

And be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church call upon companies, organizations, and individuals working with and developing generative AI to include guardrails and safety measures in their products, set transparent ethical guidelines and policies for their work, and carry out independent and ongoing ethical reviews of their products and their impacts on people, workplaces, our democratic systems, and society as a whole; and that the Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church be tasked with engaging relevant companies in the Church's investment portfolio on these ethical questions.

That the Episcopal Church remember with the gratitude the work of faithful Christian and Episcopalian Frances Perkins, who is called the architect of the New Deal and the conscience of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and as the first woman cabinet member and Secretary of Labor oversaw the

enactment of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 which for the first time banned oppressive child labor in United States federal law, and who is remembered each year in Lesser Feasts and Fasts on May 13th; and be it further,

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church oppose current attempts to weaken child labor laws at the state and federal levels, such as: repealing age verification and parental permission requirements; granting employers immunity from civil liability for workplace injuries, illness, or death; lowering minimum ages for working in hazardous industries, including meatpacking and industrial laundries; creating sub-minimum wages for teenagers; and extending the number of hours children are permitted to work; and be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church recognize that the primary targets of these attempts to weaken child labor laws are our most vulnerable children, including very low-income and migrant children, who are often living apart from their parents; and be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations and Episcopal Public Policy Network support domestic and foreign policies to strengthen and enforce child labor laws in the United States of America and globally and throughout the labor supply chain, including supporting policies to:

- eliminate separate treatment of agricultural workers under federal employment law;
- fully fund enforcement of child labor standards at federal, state, and local levels, and enhance company penalties for violating these rules;
 - eliminate sub-minimum wages for youth;
- eliminate or prohibit two-tiered systems, often labeled as training programs, which fail to protect children from hazardous work, especially in the agricultural sector;
- strengthen wage theft laws and provide resources to enforce them, especially for children;
- provide adequate protection and oversight for unaccompanied minor and refugee children after they are released to their sponsors;
- improve government oversight and transparency regarding the use of child labor in the global supply chain, and the use of diplomatic pressure on foreign governments and regulation of global corporations and their imported products to eliminate the use of oppressive child labor in factories and products;

and be it further

Resolved, That the Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church take this resolution into account in the implementation of its corporate human rights screen and in corporate advocacy via the Church's investment portfolio, with attention to the use of child labor in the global supply chain of companies in which the church is invested.

The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail by a two-thirds majority would be 71 in the lay order and 73 in the clergy order.

- vii. *As requested, provide policy support to Executive Council and the Office of Governmental Relations on environmental and eco-justice matters.*

vii. Collaborate with other commissions, ecumenical partners, invested experts, and public agencies and organizations to create optimal resources and trainings.

viii. Collaborate in seeking of funding sources and grants, and in deployment of funds, that support training for clergy, lay leaders, and faith communities.

ix. Partner with other Church bodies in education and advocacy about social and economic conditions that either strengthen or harm human health and wellness, such as access to housing, healthy food, education, work with dignity, and health services, as well as freedom from violence, stigma, and racism.

x. Oversee the creation and content review of a sustained web presence that provides a gateway through links to robust resources for support and advocacy for human health and wellness.

xi. Direct curriculum on mental health ministry for clergy, postulants, and lay leaders, in consultation with the Standing Commission on Formation and Ministry Development and other Church partners as appropriate.

xii. Coordinate with networks and initiatives related to health and wellness both within and beyond the Episcopal Church, including but not limited to the Assembly of Episcopal Healthcare Chaplains, Allies for Recovery in the Episcopal Church, the Union of Black Episcopalians, the Episcopal Community Service in America, CREDO, St. Francis Ministries, the Interfaith Network on Mental Illness, NAMI's FaithNet, Lutheran Family Services, and varied faith-based wellness programs.

That the Episcopal Church reaffirm and renew our call from March 2007 (in Executive Council Resolution EXC032007.31) to close and commit to never reopening the U.S. military detention facility at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba, or any similar site, twenty-two years after the first of 780 Muslim men and boys were sent there as detainees, recognizing that indefinite military detention without access to a fair trial is deeply unjust, that the military base in Cuba was used for this purpose to avoid legal and constitutional constraints, and that the torture carried out on many of those who are still detained is a moral stain on the United States; we further recognize that there has been no justice for the victims or families of 9/11 due to this torture and the military commission process; we call upon the U.S. government to use all of their diplomatic leverage to transfer immediately the sixteen men who have already been cleared for transfer, and for justice to be served for the five men who have been charged in a way that offers closure for the 9/11 victims' families, and a swift, responsible, and lawful resolution of the cases of the remaining aging and increasingly ill men; and be it further

Resolved, that this Convention commend the work of The Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations for continuing to shine a light on this issue even as prisoners continue to languish without

trial, via their action alerts, public advocacy, and a recent webinar hosted by the Office of Government Relations with Presiding Bishop Curry and the National Religious Campaign Against Torture.

That the Episcopal Church reaffirm and renew our call from March 2007 (in Executive Council Resolution EXCo32007.31) to close and commit to never reopening the U.S. military detention facility at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba, or any similar site, twenty-two years after the first of 780 Muslim men and boys were sent there as detainees, recognizing that indefinite military detention without access to a fair trial is deeply unjust, that the military base in Cuba was used for this purpose to avoid legal and constitutional constraints, and that the torture carried out on many of those who are still detained is a moral stain on the United States; we further recognize that there has been no justice for the victims or families of 9/11 due to this torture and the military commission process; we call upon the U.S. government to use all of their diplomatic leverage to transfer immediately those ~~the sixteen~~ men who have already been cleared for transfer, and for justice to be served for those ~~the five~~ men who have been charged in a way that offers closure for the 9/11 victims' families, and a swift, responsible, and lawful resolution of the cases of the remaining aging and increasingly ill men; and be it further

Resolved, that this Convention commend the work of The Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations for continuing to shine a light on this issue even as prisoners continue to languish without trial, via their action alerts, public advocacy, and a recent webinar hosted by the Office of Government Relations with Presiding Bishop Curry and the National Religious Campaign Against Torture.

And be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church encourage Dioceses and congregations to review their unused land and property as a potential pathway to more affordable housing units; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church encourage congregations to assess the housing needs in their communities, collaborate with local organizations on the issues of homelessness and housing insecurity and advocate for affordable housing.

Resolved, That the Executive Council will approach the waiver and fair share assessment process with an unwavering commitment to a “holy spirit of abundant generosity,” trust, and love. (Mark 4:20) This approach is not just a suggestion but a beacon of hope for fostering healthy relationships between the separate dioceses, provinces, and the wider church. This approach, which includes assisting

struggling dioceses with advice, coaching, and financial support for evangelism, congregational vitality, and stewardship, underscores our deep commitment to the well-being of all dioceses; and be it further *Resolved*, That the very monies and grants being withheld from dioceses who cannot pay assessments are punitive and antithetical to building the “beloved community” and ignore the gifts of all our people, especially those suffering temporary hardships brought about by brutal economic realities. “In ministering to each other, each from the riches that each possesses, we work together for the full coming of God’s kingdom.” Henri Nouwen, *The Spirituality of Fundraising*

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring,

That The Episcopal Church recognize, repent, and atone for the harm it has caused to LGBTQIA+ people through actions, participation and support of homophobic/heterosexist and shaming cultures and systems; and be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church recognize, repent, and atone for the ways that these actions, positions, and for participating in limiting the ability of The Church’s people to fully manifest the love of God and live into their baptismal covenants, sharing their gifts and authentic selves fully with the church and the world; and be it further

Resolved, That, as a result of these actions, a group of the ordained and laity within the church have been dissuaded of their calling and biased in their ordination processes. Some ordained and lay have been forced to remain closeted, and others still were deposed from ministry; and be it further

Resolved, that the 81st General Convention authorize the establishment of a Task Force for Truth-Telling, Reckoning, and Reconciliation for LGBTQIA+ for the purpose of helping the Church engage in truth-telling, confession, and reconciliation regarding discrimination, harassment, violence, and all harmful behaviors against LGBTQIA+ in all their forms including but not limited to those who were deposed from ministry, barred from discernment/ordination processes and excluded from full participation of all ministry of the baptized by those in power within the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That this Task Force be appointed jointly by the President of the House of Deputies and the Presiding Bishop in collaboration and consultation with the Gender Justice Officer, be composed of 12 members - 5 lay people (at least 4 of whom identify as LGBTQIA+), 4 priests or deacons members (at least 3 of whom identify as LGBTQIA+), and 3 bishops members (preferably at least 2 of whom identify as LGBTQIA+). The overall composition of this task force shall include people of color and reflect regional diversity. The overall composition of this task force shall include at least 5 members who have

experienced LGBTQIA+ discrimination, harassment, and or violence and including experts in church jurisprudence and psychology; and be it further

Resolved, This Task Force shall report its progress to the 82nd General Convention on the following tasks:

- To develop a survey on discrimination, harassment, and violence against LGBTQIA+ in all their forms (truth-telling and reckoning) as we understand these sins, including but not limited to spiritual, and emotionally abusive behavior, and oppression based on sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression. This survey should be distributed widely in the Episcopal Church for access by both laity and clergy no later than spring of 2025, said survey being available primarily on-line, and with adaptations made as determined by the task force to enable responses by those members of the general Church who may not have ready and easy access to the internet;
- To conduct a review of survey responses and data regarding discrimination, harassment, and violent behavior that has been experienced by those who identify as LGBTQIA+ and the impact of this treatment on lay and ordained persons, their ministries, and the ministry of The Episcopal Church;
- To create a Truth and Reconciliation process to guide churches, dioceses, provinces, and churchwide as they develop their own paths for reconciliation and restoration; recognizing a one-size-fits-all process will not be helpful given the diversity of our Church, and to plan a service of Lament, Apology and Reconciliation at the 82nd General Convention which serves as a liturgical model to be used across The Episcopal Church and beyond.

And be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention request that Executive Council allocate \$60,000 for the implementation of this resolution.

There are 106 dioceses represented in the lay order and 109 dioceses represented in the clergy order. In a vote by orders, 54 votes are required in the lay order and 55 votes in the clergy order for a motion to prevail on a simple majority. The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail by a two-thirds majority would be 71 in the lay order and 73 in the clergy order.

Resolved, That this General Convention recommend the DFMS No Investment in Certain Weapons Policy as indicated in the DFMS Weapons No Buy List to each institutional investor in The Episcopal Church for adoption as investment policy for that institutional investor and direct that this resolution be shared with all institutional investors in The Episcopal Church.

The president shall have no discretion to decline to pronounce the Sentence or to pronounce a lesser Sentence. Where an Accord provides for the suspension or deposition of a Respondent who is a Bishop, the president shall pronounce Sentence within thirty days after the date on which the Conciliator or the president signs the Accord. Where an Order provides for the suspension or deposition of a Respondent who is a Bishop, the president shall pronounce Sentence not sooner than forty days following the issuance of the Order and not later than sixty days following the issuance of the Order. Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, no Sentence shall be pronounced while an appeal of the matter is pending. However, the president may, while an appeal is pending, place restrictions upon the exercise of the Respondent's ministry, or place the Respondent on Administrative Leave, or continue any such restriction or Administrative Leave as was in effect at the time of the issuance of the Order. Unless otherwise expressly provided in writing in the restriction on ministry or Sentence of suspension, a Bishop under a restriction of Ministry or Sentence of suspension shall not exercise any authority of his or her office and the Standing Committee will serve as the Ecclesiastical Authority. A Sentence of suspension of a Bishop lasting longer than six months shall terminate the pastoral relation between the Bishop and the Diocese unless (i) the Standing Committee by two-thirds vote requests of the

Disciplinary Board for Bishops within thirty days that the relation continue and (ii) the Disciplinary Board for Bishops approves such request, except in the case of a Sentence of suspension for a Bishop Provisional serving as provided by Canon III.13 which shall result in the termination of the agreement with the Diocese. If the pastoral relation has not been terminated, religious services and sacramental ministrations shall be provided for that Diocese as though a vacancy exists. This Section shall not prohibit the application of Canon III.12.11.

Anything in this Title required or permitted to be done by the Respondent's counsel may be done by the Respondent personally.

He urged the House to hold the structures of the church lightly. He advocated for the release of anger and hurt between leaders in the church and invited the House to consider this time between now and when he takes office as a relationship jubilee, so that The Episcopal Church can start fresh for the sake of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Presiding Bishop-elect shared a quote from Thomas Merton's writings in *Conjectures of a Guilty Bystander*:

"In a time of drastic change one can be too preoccupied with what is ending or too obsessed with what seems to be beginning. In either case one loses touch with the present and with its obscure but dynamic possibilities. What really matters is openness, readiness, attention, courage to face risk. You do not need to know precisely what is happening, or exactly where it is all going. What you need is to recognize the possibilities and challenges offered by the present moment, and to embrace them with courage, faith, and hope. In such an event, courage is the authentic form taken by love."

The Presiding Bishop-elect urged the House to look forward with a courageous view of the shared future of The Episcopal Church.

***Resolved*, That, acknowledging the increase of dehumanization of ethnic minorities, migrants and refugees in the midst of record migration across international borders, and that such dehumanization leads to grave and serious mistreatment of these persons, the 81st General Convention, consistent with previous resolutions of the General Conventions of The Episcopal Church, declare itself to be in support of Migration with Dignity for all migrants, including refugees, asylum seekers, displaced persons, and those who cross borders in search of opportunity, including the following human rights within the Migration with Dignity framework:**

- **A universal right of movement, including freedom to leave and return to one’s country of origin, freedom of movement within one’s country of origin or country of settlement.**

- **The right of equality, to include: 1) equal treatment with no discrimination under the law based on color, gender, sexual orientation, language, religion, political affiliation, national origin; and 2) equal opportunity for upward mobility.**
- **Rights to a basic quality of life, including employment rights, housing rights and food rights.**
- **The right to access services such as health care, education and legal representation.**
- **Civil and political rights guaranteeing the right to identity, to use of one’s language, and to freedom of speech and religion;**

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church repeal Article X in its entirety and replace it with the following:

Article X: Of The Book of Common Prayer

Sec. 1. *The Book of Common Prayer is understood to be those liturgical forms and other texts authorized by the General Convention in accordance with this article and the Canons of this Church.*

The Book of Common Prayer in this Church is intended to be communal and devotional prayer enriched by our church's cultural, geographical, and linguistic contexts. The Book of Common Prayer shall contain both public worship and private devotion.

The Book of Common Prayer, as now established or hereafter amended by the General Convention, shall be in use in all the Dioceses of this Church.

Sec. 2. *No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the General Convention approve the same on first reading in one regular meeting of the General Convention and, by resolve so directing, be sent by the Secretary of the General Convention to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention at its next regular meeting, and be adopted on second reading without alteration by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by an affirmative vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Article I, Sec. 5 of this Constitution, except that concurrence in the affirmative by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies.*

Sec. 3. *No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless it has previously been authorized for Trial Use in accordance with this Article and the Canons of this Church.*

Sec. 4. *The General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders as previously set forth in this Article:*

a. Amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms.

b. Authorize for Trial Use such alterations or additions in whole or in part to the established Book of Common Prayer as may be proposed in accord with the Canons of this Church and duly undertaken by and implemented according to the directives of the General Convention.

c. Authorize for use throughout this Church, as provided by Canon, alternative and additional liturgies to supplement those provided in the Book of Common Prayer.

Sec. 5. *Nothing in this Article shall be construed as restricting the authority of the Bishops of this Church to take such order as may be permitted by the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer or by the Canons of the General Convention for the use of special forms of worship.*

And be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention direct the President of the House of Deputies and the Presiding Bishop to appoint a working group of nine members to include the Custodian of The Book of Common Prayer, some members of Committee 12 of the 80th General Convention, some members of a Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, and others as needed to review the Canons relevant to the implementation of this Article and propose revisions to the 81st General Convention. An initial framework is provided as a starting point for this work; and be it further

Resolved, That an allocation of \$30,000 be made to support the work of the working group.

There are 106 dioceses represented in the lay order and 109 dioceses represented in the clergy order. In a vote by orders, 54 votes are required in the lay order and 55 votes in the clergy order for a motion to prevail on a simple majority. The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail by a two-thirds majority would be 71 in the lay order and 73 in the clergy order.

Sec. 6 At the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, the Custodian of the Constitution and Canons, in consultation with the chancellor to the Presiding Bishop, the chancellor to the President of the House of Deputies, and the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Standing Commission on Governance, Structure, Constitution, and Canons, will (a) certify the changes, if any, made in the Canons, including a correction of the references made in any Canon to another, and to report the same, with the proper arrangement thereof, to the Secretary of the General Convention; (b) certify in

Planting and protection of trees to conserve soil, improve biodiversity, and sequester carbon;

Join with other TEC institutions and with other faith communities in these efforts;

And such other efforts to reduce emissions, protect biodiversity, and protect people whose homes, health, and livelihoods may be threatened by unwise resource extraction projects, as may best fit the circumstances.

The Eco-Region Creation Networks link people, projects and properties dedicated to nature-based solutions to slow climate change through preserving and restoring plant communities appropriate to their bioregion; modeling transformative agriculture and food systems; and tackling issues of water quality and supply, and are to include the pilot Episcopal Grasslands Network (which includes the dioceses of Kansas, Western Kansas, Nebraska, Northwest Texas, South Dakota, North Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho and Montana); and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention form a Renewable Energy Network that connects and resources dioceses, faith communities, projects and leaders dedicated to reducing carbon by accelerating renewable energy use, including but not limited to solar energy. This renewable energy network would build on the church’s existing partnership with the Episcopal Renewable Energy Non-profit, established by the Episcopal Diocese of San Joaquin; and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention advance the strategic development of a network devoted to agrarian, food justice and outdoor ministries (welcoming existing Provincial, Good News Gardens, and Episcopal Agrarian Ministry networks) and

Resolved, that the new Eco-Region networks and Renewable Energy networks can be established through a letter to the Presiding Bishop’s office, copied to provincial Presidents, from bishops of three dioceses describing their particular eco-region, current sites, and creation actions planned, and that each network identify a diocese within the network to serve as the administrative center to disburse funds and manage the network; and be it further

Resolved, that each network engage a Creation Justice Fellow and/or Consultant who partners with Episcopal Church Creation Care staff to support the network in the following ways: produce communications that inform and celebrate efforts across the network; collect data about the participating members, projects and properties; plan and implement gatherings; write grant proposals and provide other administrative support as needed; and be it further

Resolved, that every diocese in The Episcopal Church be encouraged to establish a Creation Care Commission, if no such diocesan commission already exists, to work in consultation with the aforementioned networks to pursue locally discerned goals for advancing toward net carbon neutrality by 2030; and be it further,

Resolved, that the Executive Council Budget Committee allocate \$240,000 for this work, such that \$30,000 each year (\$90,000 over the triennium) be assigned to support the three EcoRegion Creation Networks; \$15,000 each year (\$45,000 over the triennium) be assigned to support Good News Gardens/Agrarian and Outdoor Ministry Networks; \$50,000 a year (\$150,000 over the triennium) be assigned to support Renewable Energy Networks and the church's existing partnership with the Episcopal Renewable Energy Non-profit (EREN); and \$60,000 to support two churchwide convenings of the community of networks, to ensure accountability and progress toward net carbon neutrality.

If every Deputy votes, the number of votes for a motion to prevail by a simple majority would be 415. The number of votes for a motion to prevail by a two-thirds majority would be 553.

There are 106 dioceses represented in the lay order and 109 dioceses represented in the clergy order. In a vote by orders, 54 votes are required in the lay order and 55 votes in the clergy order for a motion to prevail on a simple majority. The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail by a two-thirds majority would be 71 in the lay order and 73 in the clergy order.

Among his reasons, it is an economic hardship to the enslavers, it relegates the working class to an inferior status, while inciting pride and contempt for labor in the children of slave-owners, and the responsibility of caring for the enslaved is “a burden grievous to be borne.” “But,” he goes on to write, “it is not often that God permits an evil to exist long, and on a large scale, out of which he does not bring some corresponding good.” The evils, Craik says, fall only upon the white race, while the enslaved receive all the benefits because “a race of barbarians, gradually degraded by many thousand years of ignorance and brutishness to the lowest stage of humanity, has thus been place[d] in intimate contact, and under the constant and authoritative superintendence and government, of the most enlightened and civilized race upon the globe. Humanity, religion, and interest concur to make the cultivated and master race the friends, protectors, and instructors of the inferior race.”*; and be it further,

Resolved, That General Convention acknowledge the role our leadership played in the institution of chattel slavery; and be it further,

Resolved, That the General Convention repent of the ongoing benefits ~~procured unto us by the same~~ and accrued wealth by this church through the enslavement of children of God; and be it further,

Resolved, that because our baptismal promises call us to ongoing repentance, to persevere in resisting evil, and respect the dignity of all people, we must commit to bravely communicating to the church and the world our truths about our history and ourselves. and be it further,

Resolved, That the General Convention urge the Canonical Archivist and Director of the Archives of the Episcopal Church and the Archives Advisory Committee to update the entry for the Rev. James Craik on the website of the Archives of the Episcopal Church to include information about the theology of slavery and white supremacy he espoused as well as a link to the pamphlet he published.

Resolved, That this Convention hereby reaffirm and deepen The Episcopal Church's commitment to advocacy for policy changes to end mass incarceration (Resolution 2015-A011) and defend the rights of disabled persons within the criminal legal system (Resolution 2015-D-32); and The Episcopal Church's

opposition to solitary confinement (Resolution 2018-Do29), private prisons (Resolution 2015-Do67), monetary bail (Resolution 1973-Do97), and the school-to-prison pipeline (Resolution 2015-Do68); and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention of The Episcopal Church further direct the Office of Governmental Relations and urge all Episcopalians, parishes and congregations, and dioceses to advocate for policy efforts consistent with the goal of the abolition of prisons and policing, including reforms aimed at disinvesting from police and reinvesting police budgets in other community needs, such as these specific policies:

- Supporting efforts to close prisons and jails, and policies that release incarcerated people; opposing governmental plans to open new prisons or jails, including plans for facilities for specific populations, such as immigrant detention facilities (see Resolution 2022-Do31)
- Supporting policies for reducing police budgets or disinvesting from policing
- Supporting monetary investment in community needs such as affordable housing, health care, and education, because investment in poverty reduction, health, and education in fact reduces crime and promotes public safety
- Supporting restorative and transformative justice efforts in the criminal legal system that bring about restitution, accountability, and healing for both perpetrators and victims;

And be it further

Resolved, That this Convention of The Episcopal Church further direct the Office of Governmental Relations and urge all Episcopalians, parishes and congregations, and dioceses to oppose reform policies which do not lead toward the abolition of prisons and policing, including:

- Opposing increased investment in police budgets for new hires or police “training” programs, because larger police forces and new training do not shift resources towards other community needs that address the underlying causes of crime.
- Opposing police militarization and NDAA Section 1033, the federal act which provides for selling military supplies to police departments
- Opposing the prosecution and incarceration of police officers for excessive force and civil rights violations, because prosecution of high-profile cases does not change the resources given to other community needs, and reinforces the punitive logic of prisons and policing
- Opposing reforms that offer supposed “alternatives” to prison like electronic monitoring or house arrest, which actually increase the scope of systems of incarceration and criminalization, and increase the number of people under correctional control
- Opposing reforms that aim to build “better” prisons, such as by focusing on specific populations or by replacing old jails and prisons with newer facilities, which requires further investment in the carceral system;

Sec. 1. Each Diocese shall make provision for the affirmation and development of the ministry of all baptized persons, including:

- a. Assistance in understanding that all baptized persons are called to minister in Christ's name, to identify their gifts with the help of the Church and to serve Christ's mission at all times and in all places.
- b. Assistance in understanding that all baptized persons are called to sustain their ministries through commitment to life-long Christian formation.

Sec. 2. No person shall be denied access to the discernment process or to any process for the employment, licensing, calling, or deployment for any ministry, lay or ordained, in this Church because of race, color, ethnic origin, immigration status, national origin, sex, marital or family status (including pregnancy and child care plans), sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, disabilities or age, except as otherwise provided by these Canons. congregational redevelopment, church planting, and evangelism, (4) establish and resource a group, network, or para-church organization that can assist in these efforts, (5) access and make available external resources that already exist for this work; and be it further

Some survived there; we ask that you give your healing grace to all who endured hardship while there and are still struggling with those memories. Lastly, we ask you to help us guard our children against harm in this world. All this we ask in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

And be it further

Resolved, That the use of this prayer be encouraged in liturgies throughout The Episcopal Church; and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention direct the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, in consultation with Indigenous communities in The Episcopal Church, to determine an appropriate date on the Church Calendar as the annual remembrance of these Indigenous children; and be it further

The number of dioceses for a motion requiring a Vote by Orders to prevail by a two-thirds majority would be 70 in the lay order and 72 in the clergy order.

Jesus Christ becomes both the sacrifice and the high priest offering the sacrifice. The first alternative reading from the Letter to the Ephesians (1:3-14) situates the death of Jesus Christ within a larger arc of salvation history. God the Father chose his Son before creation to be for humans the means by which they attain redemption as children of God. This happens through the death of Jesus Christ, which secures the forgiveness of sins. In the reading from Hebrews (4:14-16, 5:5-7), currently an option in the Book of Common Prayer, the image of Jesus Christ as an interceding high priest does not call into question the validity of the Temple sacrifices given by God to the Jewish people to offer as worship. The source of salvation rests in Christ’s obedience to God the Father, which those who follow Christ call upon for their own salvation.”

SCLM Blue Book Report p. 26: In the third note, add the following sentence: “Congregations are encouraged to consider the introductory material and emended Passion according to John available from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as ‘Seasonal Rites for the Three Days,’ which is available for free download with copyright permission for congregational use.”

Those who have previously made a mature public commitment in another Church may be received by the laying on of hands by a Bishop of this Church, rather than confirmed. *This may be a requirement for specific leadership roles as defined by the Constitution and Canons of this Church and its constituent bodies.*

d. Any person who is baptized in this Church as an adult and receives the laying on of hands by the Bishop at Baptism is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed; also,

Any person who is baptized in this Church as an adult and at some time after the Baptism receives the laying on of hands by the Bishop in Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed; also,

Any baptized person who received the laying on of hands at Confirmation (by any Bishop in historic succession) and is received into The Episcopal Church by a Bishop of this Church is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed; and also,

Any baptized person who received the laying on of hands by a Bishop of this Church at Confirmation or Reception is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed.

Sec. 2

that the person is recorded as a ~~member (or adult member)~~ Member of this Church and whether or not such a ~~member~~ Member:

1. is a communicant;
2. is recorded as being in good standing ~~a Communicant in Good Standing~~;
3. has been confirmed or received by a Bishop of this Church or a Bishop in full communion with this Church.

The Coalition shall report to every regular meeting of the General Convention, providing audited financial statements and reports on its ministry and participation in God’s mission.

- The Episcopal Church supports inter- and multi-faith ministries that contribute to our mission to follow Jesus, loving our neighbors as ourselves (Matthew 22:36-40) and demonstrating particular care for those who are marginalized and oppressed (Matthew 25:31-46);
- Episcopalians find common cause and minister with organizations and individuals with whom we have theological differences, without proselytizing or demanding that our ministry partners adhere to the tenets we espouse;
- The over one million incarcerated individuals in this country are among the most marginalized and oppressed members of our society;
- Episcopalians faithfully engage in ministry with incarcerated individuals, seeking to provide support, encouragement, and hope to these persons;
- Among the many members of the incarcerated population as well as those who minister to and with them, are individuals who are LGBTQIA+, a community that also experiences marginalization in this country;
- Following the Way of Jesus, Episcopalians minister to and with all God’s children, with special focus on the support and liberation of those who are oppressed;
- Our canons prohibit the denial of access to any ministry of this Church “because of race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, sex, marital or family status (including pregnancy and child care plans), sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, disabilities or age” (Canon III.1.2);

And be it further

Resolved, That Episcopalians may not be forced to overtly or tacitly endorse theological statements or practices that conflict with our stated policies and beliefs in order to participate in shared prison ministry programs; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention encourage dioceses to develop and share programs for their members to minister with incarcerated individuals, those newly released from prison, and families and loved ones of incarcerated individuals in ways that are consistent with our Church’s current spiritual teachings, principles, and policies.

g. Once approved by the General Convention, Supplemental and Alternative Liturgical Resources may be removed by an act of the General Convention.

h. If at such time as a previously approved Supplemental or Alternative Liturgical Resource authorized by act of General Convention under this canon is to be considered for trial use, said liturgy must be brought to the General Convention to begin the process for trial use approval as defined by the Constitution and Canons of this church.

Sec. 3. Other Books of Common Prayer

a. Any Book of Common Prayer memorialized by the General Convention is authorized for regular use at any service in all dioceses of this Church. The content of any memorialized Book is understood to be the version in use at the time of memorialization.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,

That the Episcopal Church call upon the United States Government to provide, as part of a process for building a negotiated and sustainable peace, significant funds for the long-term rebuilding of Gaza, such as: provision for extended medical and psychological support for the population, especially children, and financial support at a sufficient scale to rebuild homes, hospitals, schools, universities, libraries, factories, farms, and basic infrastructure such as roads and sea/air ports, and water, sewage, and electricity systems, investing equivalent funds to fund the rebuilding of Gaza as would have been spent on security assistance to Israel, all as part of meeting the moral and legal obligations of the United States to the people of Gaza given the U.S. role in providing military weapons and diplomatic cover for Israel's horrifically destructive and indiscriminate war waged upon the people of Gaza and indeed the whole of Gazan society, including the very means of life and irreplaceable cultural equities, in response to the Hamas-led attack and atrocities of October 7, 2023.

That the 81st General Convention declares that there is no military solution to the conflict between Israel and the Palestinian people and calls on Hamas and Israel to abandon violence, initiate and honor a permanent ceasefire, and release all Israeli hostages and Palestinian political prisoners as a means to resolving this 76-year-old conflict, and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention, noting that the International Court of Justice has launched an investigation into charges of genocide by Israel, laments with enormous grief the horrendous toll of civilian deaths and injuries, vast destruction of infrastructure, starvation leading to malnutrition among children resulting in unnecessary deaths and permanent damage to the physical well being of hundreds of thousands, loss of medical services, and no safe havens for a fleeing population in Gaza, affecting especially women and children, thus creating fear, distress and misery that will linger for decades, and therefore be it further

Resolved, That this Convention notes that the conflict can never be reconciled while 4,500,000+ Palestinians remain under occupation in the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, a reality that breeds resentment and rage among Palestinians, especially its young people, which leads to armed resistance while giving illegal Israeli settlers in the West Bank motivation to continue their ethnic cleansing of the Palestinian population by destroying their villages and agricultural life, and be it further

The Secretary shall send a copy of the report to each of the delegates who filed objection to the election process.

b. The report of the Court of Review shall be sent to the Standing Committees of the several Dioceses, with the Certificate of the Secretary of the electing Convention relating to consent to ordain. Likewise, the Presiding Bishop shall include the report in the communication to the Bishops exercising jurisdiction. The 120 day period for Standing Committees and Bishops to consent to the election begins with these communications.

Original Text of Resolution

(A072)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,

That the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church repeal Article X in its entirety and replace it with the following:

Article X: Of The Book of Common Prayer

Sec. 1. *The Book of Common Prayer is understood to be those liturgical forms and other texts authorized by the General Convention in accordance with this article and the Canons of this Church.*

The Book of Common Prayer in this Church is intended to be communal and devotional prayer enriched by our church's cultural, geographical, and linguistic contexts. The Book of Common Prayer shall contain both public worship and private devotion.

The Book of Common Prayer, as now established or hereafter amended by the General Convention, shall be in use in all the Dioceses of this Church.

Sec. 2. *No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the General Convention approve the same on first reading in one regular meeting of the General Convention and, by resolve so directing, be sent by the Secretary of the General Convention to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention at its next regular meeting, and be adopted on second reading without alteration by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by an affirmative vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Art. I, Sec. 5 of this Constitution, except that concurrence in the affirmative by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies.*

Sec. 3. No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless it has previously been authorized for Trial Use in accordance with this Article and the Canons of this Church.

Sec. 4. The General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders as previously set forth in this Article:

a. Amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms.

b. Authorize for Trial Use such alterations or additions in whole or in part to the established Book of Common Prayer as may be proposed in accord with the Canons of this Church and duly undertaken by and implemented according to the directives of the General Convention.

c. Authorize for use throughout this Church, as provided by Canon, alternative and additional liturgies to supplement those provided in the Book of Common Prayer.

Sec. 5. Nothing in this Article shall be construed as restricting the authority of the Bishops of this Church to take such order as may be permitted by the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer or by the Canons of the General Convention for the use of special forms of worship.

And be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention direct the President of the House of Deputies and the Presiding Bishop to appoint a working group of nine members to include the Custodian of The Book of Common Prayer, some members of Committee 12 of the 80th General Convention, some members of a Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, and others as needed to review the Canons relevant to the implementation of this Article and propose revisions to the 81st General Convention. An initial framework is provided as a starting point for this work; and be it further

Resolved, That an allocation of \$30,000 be made to support the work of the working group.

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,

That the General Convention amend Canon III.12 to add a new Section 7 as follows, renumbering subsequent sections:

Sec. 7. Transfer to Churches in Full Communion with this Church

a. A Bishop desiring to become canonically resident within another member church, Province or equivalent jurisdiction of a Church in Full Communion (as identified in Canon I.20) or Church in Communion with this Church (as identified by Canon III.10.2.(a)(3)) shall request a testimonial from the Presiding Bishop, which testimonial, with the advice and consent of a majority of the members of the Advisory Council to the Presiding Bishop, shall be given by the Presiding Bishop to the applicant, and a duplicate thereof may be sent to the Presiding Bishop or Primate of the member church, Province or equivalent jurisdiction to which transfer is proposed. The testimonial may include a portfolio of training, continuing education, and exercise of ministries. The testimonial shall be in the following form or in the form specified by the receiving member church, Province, or equivalent jurisdiction:

I hereby certify that A.B., who has signified to me the desire to be transferred to the Ecclesiastical Authority of _____, is a Bishop of the Episcopal Church in good standing, and has not, so far as I know or believe, been justly liable to evil report, for error in religion or for viciousness of life, for the last three years.

(Date) _____

(Signed) _____

b. If the Presiding Bishop or Primate of the member church, Province or equivalent jurisdiction of the Church in Full Communion or Church in Communion with this Church accepts the testimonial, the canonical residence of the Bishop transferred shall date from such acceptance, and notice of acceptance shall be promptly forwarded by the Presiding Bishop or Primate to the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. Such notification from the receiving Ecclesiastical Authority may be in the following form:

I hereby certify that A.B. has been canonically transferred to my jurisdiction and is a Bishop in good standing.

c. Upon receipt of said acceptance, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church shall notify the Church Pension Fund and the Recorder of Ordinations of the Bishop's departure from the Episcopal Church.

d. This provision shall not be used for Bishops who seek to enter Churches Not in Communion with this Church or for those who seek transfer to another member church or Province of the Anglican Communion while remaining geographically within the boundaries of the Episcopal Church. In such cases the provisions of Canon III.12.7 shall be followed.

(A071)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,

That the 80th General Convention amend Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution to read as follows:

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention amend Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution to read as follows:

Art.V

Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese is formed and erected out of an existing Diocese or out of two or more existing Dioceses or parts of them, ~~it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese out of which it was formed, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese~~ the formation process of the newly formed Diocese, including the adoption of its Constitution and Canons, shall be as set forth in the Canons.

~~Whenever a Diocese is formed out of two or more existing Dioceses, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of that one of the said existing Dioceses to which the greater number of Members of the Clergy shall have belonged prior to the erection of such new Diocese, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese.~~

And be it further

Resolved, That Canon I.10 be amended to read as follows and voted on at the 81st General Convention:
Can.I.10

Sec. 1. Whenever a new Diocese is proposed to be formed within the limits of any Diocese, or by the junction of two or more Dioceses, or parts of two or more Dioceses, the Ecclesiastical Authorities and the Standing Committees of the Dioceses involved in the proposed new diocese shall submit for approval to the Conventions of each Diocese involved a joint agreement of union setting forth their agreements, including the manner of determining the Bishop Diocesan and other Bishops (if any), the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the new Diocese, and such other matters as may be necessary or proper. Upon approval by the Conventions of each of the involved Dioceses, the joint agreement of union shall be submitted for ratification by the General Convention no less than ninety days prior to the first legislative day of the next meeting of the General Convention.

Sec. 2. Promptly after ratification by the General Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the new Diocese, as set forth in the joint agreement of union, shall call the ~~Primary~~ first Convention of the new Diocese, for the purpose of enabling it to organize, and shall fix the time and place of holding the same, such place being within the territorial limits of the new Diocese.

Sec. 3. Whenever one Diocese is about to be divided into two Dioceses, the Convention of such Diocese shall declare which portion or portions thereof ~~are~~ is to be in the new Diocese, and shall make the same known to the General Convention before the ratification of such division.

Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese shall have organized in ~~first Primary~~ first Convention in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and Canons in such case made and provided, and in the manner prescribed in the previous Sections of this Canon, and shall have chosen a name and acceded to the Constitution of the General Convention in accordance with Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution, and shall have laid before the Executive Council certified copies of the Constitution adopted at

its first ~~Primary~~ Convention, and the proceedings preparatory to the formation of the proposed new Diocese, such new Diocese shall thereupon be admitted into union with the General Convention.

Sec. 5. In the event of the erection of an Area Mission into a Diocese of this Church, as provided in Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution, the Convocation of the Area Mission shall be entitled to elect Deputies to the succeeding General Convention, and also to elect a Bishop. The jurisdiction previously assigned to the Bishop in the Area Mission shall be terminated upon the admission of the new Diocese.

Sec. 6. When a Diocese and one or more other Dioceses that were formed either by division therefrom or by erection into a Diocese or a Missionary Diocese formed by division therefrom, shall desire to be reunited into one Diocese, the proposed reunion must be initiated by the approval of the Conventions of the involved Dioceses of a joint agreement of union setting forth their agreements, including the manner of determining the Bishop Diocesan and other Bishops (if any), provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the new Diocese, and such other matters as may be necessary or proper. If the agreement of the Dioceses is made and the consents of their Conventions are given more than three months before the next meeting of the General Convention, the fact of the agreement and consents shall be certified by the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Secretary of the Convention of each involved Diocese to all the Bishops of the Church having jurisdiction and to the Standing Committees of all the Dioceses; and when the consents of a majority of such Bishops and of a majority of the Standing Committees to the proposed reunion shall have been received, the facts shall be similarly certified to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, and thereupon the reunion shall be considered complete. But if the agreement is made and the consents given within three months of the next meeting of the General Convention, the facts shall be certified instead to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, who shall lay them before the two Houses; and the reunion shall be deemed to be complete when it shall have been approved by a majority vote in the House of Bishops, and in the House of Deputies.

Sec. 7. When the union of two or more Dioceses or portions of Dioceses or the reunion of the two or more Dioceses shall have been completed, the facts shall be certified to the Presiding Bishop and to the Secretary of the House of Deputies. Thereupon the Presiding Bishop shall notify the Secretary of the House of Bishops of any alteration in the status or style of the Bishop or Bishops concerned, and the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall strike the name of any Diocese that will cease to exist or is being renamed from the roll of Dioceses in union with the General Convention and, if appropriate, amend the name of the newly united Diocese on the roll of Dioceses in union with the General Convention.

There will be a Custodian of the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church, nominated by the Presiding Officers of the two Houses of the General Convention and confirmed by the Executive Council. A vacancy in the office shall be filled in the same way. The Custodian will hold office for a term beginning twelve months after the adjournment of the previous regular meeting of the General Convention and will remain in office until twelve months after the subsequent regular meeting of the General Convention, or until a successor is confirmed. The first Custodian of the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church will be nominated by the Presiding Officers to be confirmed at the first Executive Council meeting following the adoption of this Canon. It will be the duty of the Custodian to certify that all digital and printed versions of the Constitution and Canons, including any amendment or amendments

adopted at the most recent General Convention, conform to the Constitution and Canons as duly authorized by the General Convention.

Sec. 5. ~~6. The Committee on Constitution and Canons of each House of the General Convention shall, at the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, appoint two of its members~~ At the close of each regular meeting of the General Convention, the Custodian of the Constitution and Canons, in consultation with the chancellor to the Presiding Bishop, the chancellor to the President of the House of Deputies, and the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Standing Commission on Governance, Structure, Constitution, and Canons, will (a) ~~to~~ certify the changes, if any, made in the Canons, including a correction of the references made in any Canon to another, and to report the same, with the proper arrangement thereof, to the Secretary of the General Convention; ~~and (b) to~~ certify in like manner the changes, if any, made in the Constitution, or proposed to be made therein under the provisions of Article XII of the Constitution, and to report the same to the Secretary of the General Convention, who shall publish them in the Journal, ~~and (c) certify in like manner the changes, if any, made to the Joint Rules.~~ The ~~committee~~ Custodian shall also have and exercise the power of renumbering of, and correction of references to, Articles, Sections and Clauses of the Constitution required by the adoption of amendments to the Constitution at a meeting of the General Convention in the same manner as provided with respect to the Canons *and the Joint Rules.*

Sec. 6. ~~7. All Canons enacted during the General Convention of 1943, and thereafter, by the General Convention, and all amendments and repeals of Canons then or thereafter made, unless otherwise expressly ordered by act of the General Convention, shall take effect on the first day of January following the adjournment of the General Convention at which they were enacted or made.~~

No Member of the Clergy of this Church shall be required to admit to the

Sacraments a person so refused or repelled without the written direction of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority. The Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority may in certain circumstances see fit to require the person to be admitted or restored because of the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the member of the Clergy. If it shall appear to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority that there is sufficient cause to justify refusal of the Holy Communion, however, appropriate steps shall be taken to institute such inquiry as may be directed by the Canons of the Diocese; and should no such Canon exist, the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority shall proceed according to such principles of law and equity as will ensure an impartial investigation and judgment, which judgment shall be made in writing within sixty days of the appeal and which shall also specify the steps required for readmission to Holy Communion.

Church Attorney shall mean one or more attorneys selected pursuant to Diocesan Canons to represent the Church in proceedings as provided in this Title. An Investigator engaged by the Church Attorney shall be overseen by the Church Attorney and shall present the findings of the investigation to the Church Attorney in a format(s) required by the Church Attorney. Notwithstanding this Section, an Accord or civil settlement agreement may preclude the disclosure of the identity of an alleged Injured Person, or of an amount paid to settle a claim or to obtain a release of civil liability.

Constitution and Canons

The House of Bishops Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #15 on Resolution D049 (Increase by one the possible number of bishops suffragans in a Diocese) and moved adoption.

Original Text of Resolution

(D049)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,
That Article II of the Constitution is amended as follows:

Article II: Of Bishops

Sec. 4. It shall be lawful for a Diocese, at the request of the Bishop of that Diocese, to elect not more than ~~two~~ Three Bishops Suffragan, without right of succession, and with seat and vote in the House of Bishops. A Bishop Suffragan shall be consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. A Bishop Suffragan shall be eligible for election as Bishop Diocesan or Bishop Coadjutor of a Diocese, or as a Bishop Suffragan in another Diocese.

Canon 4: Of the Types of Supplemental Liturgical Texts

Article X of the Constitution defines what is the Book of Common Prayer and what is eligible for Trial Use as a step towards inclusion in the Book of Common Prayer. Supplemental Liturgical Texts shall mean those texts that are available for use in this church but are not the Common Prayer of this church. In addition to the Book of Common Prayer 1979 and Prayer Book Trial Use, as defined by this church's Constitution, additional supplemental liturgical resources may be set forth by the authority of this Church and used with the permission of the bishop diocesan.

Sec. 1. Authorization and Use of Liturgical Resources Supplemental to the Book of Common Prayer

The General Convention at any one meeting, by a majority of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies, voting by orders may approve supplemental liturgical resources for use by this Church; having first been duly approved by the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music for this sole purpose.

- a.** Each supplemental liturgical material approved by the General Convention will be designated as Supplemental Additional Resources (available for use without permission of the bishop diocesan) or Supplemental Alternative Resources (requiring permission of the bishop diocesan).
- b.** Those Supplemental Additional Resources reviewed and authorized may be used for public worship by the ministers of this church. These include a Book of Occasional Services as a collection of Supplemental Texts in addition to the Book of Common Prayer, which may be authorized for use throughout this Church without permission of the bishop. It may also include propers for the celebration of lesser feasts and fasts, as well as a lectionary for the daily celebration of the Holy Eucharist, which may be authorized for optional use throughout this Church.
- c.** When proposing liturgical resources pursuant to this canon, the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music shall use *The Principles to Guide the Development of Liturgical Texts* and *The Guidelines for Expansive and Inclusive Language* adopted by the General Convention of this Church.
- d.** Before their approval by the General Convention, all liturgies authorized pursuant to this canon shall be translated by the proper authorities into English, Spanish, French, and Haitian Creole, following the principles of dynamic equivalence.
- e.** All supplemental liturgical resources will be made available without copyright using digital means to provide access to the wider church.
- f.** Once approved by the General Convention, supplemental liturgical resources may be removed by an act of convention.
- g.** If at such time as a previously approved supplemental liturgical resource authorized by act of convention under this canon is to be considered for common prayer usage – that is as Trial Use and common worship without the approval of the bishop diocesan – said liturgy must be brought to the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music to begin the process for Trial Use approval as defined by the constitution of this church.
- h.** A Trial Use period must precede the first reading for any material to be amended or added to the Book of Common Prayer.

Sec. 2. Other Books of Common Prayer

- a.** Any Book of Common Prayer memorialized by the General Convention is authorized for regular use at any service in all dioceses of this Church.
- b.** The liturgies from any other Book of Common Prayer that has been authorized previously by the authority in this Church shall be available for use for Sunday worship and for other occasions with the permission of the Ecclesiastical Authority.
- c.** Any liturgies authorized for regular use by any Church in full communion with this Church may be used with the permission of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 3. Use of Other Eucharistic Prayers and Liturgies not authorized by The Episcopal Church

A Eucharistic Prayer that is neither Rite One or Rite Two, may be authorized for seasonal use on Sunday provided it follows *An Order for Celebrating the Holy Eucharist* (Book of Common Prayer 1979 pp.400-405) and that it has been submitted in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority in advance for approval.

Sec. 4 Alternate Psalter

An Alternate Psalter may be authorized by resolution at the General Convention for study and occasional use in the Episcopal Church with the approval of the bishop diocesan.

Sec. 5 Authorized Lectionary

The General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders may amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms.

Committee Substitute

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,

That Canon II.3.6. shall be amended to add sections b, c, and d as follows:

Whenever the General Convention, pursuant to Article X of the Constitution, shall authorize for trial use a proposed revision of the Book of Common Prayer, or of a portion or portions thereof, the enabling Resolution shall specify the period of such trial use, the precise text thereof, and any special terms or conditions under which such trial use shall be carried out including translation.

A trial use period in accordance with Article X, Section 3 of the Constitution must precede the first reading for any alteration or addition to the Book of Common Prayer under Article X, Section 2, except for changes to the Lectionary and Tables and Rubrics and the Psalter as provided for by Article X.4.a.

During the trial use period, the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music will review the proposed alteration or revision using principles adopted by the General Convention of this Church and include its assessments and recommendations in a report to the General Convention.

The calendar of the church, with principal and lesser observances, is part of the Book of Common Prayer and may be revised by following the process for trial use provided for revision of the Book of Common Prayer by the constitution and canons of this church

And be it further

Resolved, That Canon II.4 shall be amended to add a new Canon 4 as follows, renumbering subsequent Canons under Title II:

Canon 4: Of Additional Types of liturgical texts

Sec. 1. Article X of the Constitution defines the Book of Common Prayer and a process of trial use as a step towards inclusion in the Book of Common Prayer. In addition to the Book of Common Prayer and texts authorized for trial use as defined by this church's Constitution and Canons, Supplemental and Alternative Liturgical Resources may be set forth by the authority of this Church.

Sec. 2. Authorization and Use of Supplemental and Alternative Liturgical Resources

a. The General Convention at any one meeting, by a majority of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies, voting by orders, may approve for use by this Church liturgical resources beyond the Book of Common Prayer or trial use.

b. Each liturgical text beyond those provided in the Book of Common Prayer or trial use as approved by the General Convention will be designated as either a Supplemental Liturgical Resource (available for use without permission of the bishop with ecclesiastical authority) or an Alternative Liturgical Resource (requiring permission of the bishop with ecclesiastical authority).

c. Those Supplemental and Alternative Liturgies reviewed and authorized may be used for public worship by the ministers of this church and may include, but are not limited to:

1. A Book of Occasional Services authorized for use as a Supplemental Liturgical Resource.
2. Propers for the celebration of lesser feasts and fasts, as well as a lectionary for the daily celebration of the Holy Eucharist authorized for optional use throughout this Church.
- c. When proposing or reviewing liturgical resources pursuant to this canon, the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music shall use principles adopted by the General Convention of this Church.
- d. Before their approval by the General Convention, all liturgies authorized pursuant to this canon shall be translated by the proper authorities into English, Spanish, French, and Haitian Creole, following the principles of dynamic equivalence.
- e. All Supplemental and Alternative Liturgical Resources and their official translations will be made available in the public domain using digital means to provide access to the wider church.
- f. Once approved by the General Convention, Supplemental and Alternative Liturgical Resources may be removed by an act of the General Convention.
- g. If at such time as a previously approved Supplemental or Alternative Liturgical Resource authorized by act of General Convention under this canon is to be considered for trial use, said liturgy must be brought to the General Convention to begin the process for trial use approval as defined by the Constitution and Canons of this church.

Sec. 3. Other Books of Common Prayer

- a. Any Book of Common Prayer memorialized by the General Convention is authorized for regular use at any service in all dioceses of this Church. The content of any memorialized Book is understood to be the version in use at the time of memorialization.
- b. The liturgies from any other Book of Common Prayer that has been authorized previously by the authority in this Church shall be available for use for Sunday worship and for other occasions with the permission of the bishop with ecclesiastical authority.

Sec. 4. Use of Other Eucharistic Prayers and Liturgies not authorized by The Episcopal Church

A Eucharistic Prayer prepared according to An Order for Celebrating the Holy Eucharist (Book of Common Prayer, 1979 pp.400-405) may be authorized for seasonal use on Sunday provided that it has been submitted to and received advance approval in writing from the bishop with ecclesiastical authority.

Sec. 5. Alternate Psalter

An Alternate Psalter may be authorized by resolution at the General Convention for study and occasional use in the Episcopal Church with the approval of the bishop with ecclesiastical authority.

And be it further

Resolved, that the General Convention direct the President of the House of Deputies and the Presiding Bishop to task the working group charged with the implementation and reviews related to the newly adopted Article X of this church's constitution to review the liturgical texts previously authorized by the General Convention and categorize them prior to the 82nd General Convention as:

- a. Book of Common Prayer
- b. Trial Use
- c. Supplemental Liturgies (for use without permission of the bishop with ecclesiastical authority)
- d. Alternative Liturgies (for use with permission of the bishop with ecclesiastical authority)
- e. Once authorized, but subsequently removed from usage by General Convention.

Sec. 2 LEPs may be formed with denominations:

- a. Who are in a full communion relationship with this church, or*
- b. Whose apostolicity, ordained ministers and sacraments have been formally recognized by action of General Convention, or*
- c. Who are member judicatories of Churches Uniting in Christ (CUIC) or its successor organization(s).*

Sec. 3. LEPs may encompass congregations, chaplaincies, missions, or other ecclesial bodies.;

Sec. 4. LEPs are governed by formal, written agreements between the Ecclesiastical Authority of an Episcopal diocese and the equivalent authorities of other Christian Denominations as qualified in this canon. Such agreements should include provisions for, but are not limited to:

- a. The process for calling ordained leadership*
- b. The terms of ordained leadership, including but not limited to:*
 - 1. Method of paying compensation, insurance, and other benefits.*
 - 2. Process for revocation of license and/or employment;*
 - 3. Handling of Ecclesiastical Discipline*
- c. The parameters of ecclesial function regarding worship, governance, sacraments, etc.*
- d. A time frame and process for regular review of the agreement*

Sec. 5. A LEP may be served by clergy ordained in and in good standing of any denomination who are part of the formal agreement and approved of by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 6. Ordained ministers of denominations who are not in full communion with this church are authorized to exercise ministry only within the LEP, and do not retain any credentials within this Church after leaving its ministry.

But if the Presiding Bishop attains unless attaining the age of seventy-two years before completing that term, the term shall have been completed; in that case the Presiding Bishop shall* must resign the office to the regular meeting of the General Convention which occurs nearest ~~to~~ before the date of attaining such age, with the resignation taking effect when a successor assumes office. At that Convention a successor ~~shall~~ will be elected, and ~~shall~~ will assume office on the first day of the month of November following the close of that 91st day after the adjournment of that General Convention or immediately upon the death, retirement, or disability of the Presiding Bishop; except that when. If the regular meeting of the General Convention at which the Presiding Bishop's successor is expected to be elected is

postponed beyond the date originally set in accordance with ~~Canon I.2.2~~~~Canon I.1.14-c~~, and if as a result of that postponement the Presiding Bishop attains the age of 72 years before a successor can be elected and assume office, then the Presiding Bishop may serve until the successor assumes office, regardless of having attained the age of 72 years, but no later than 90 days after the adjournment of the next meeting of the General Convention.

b. ~~When a Presiding Bishop has been elected by the House of Bishops~~ ~~elects a Presiding Bishop to fill a vacancy, as provided for in~~ under the second paragraph of Article I, Section 3 of the Constitution to fill a vacancy, the Presiding Bishop so elected ~~shall~~ will take office immediately.

The House of Bishops Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #26 on Resolution A003 (Amend Canon III.11.1 regarding Screening of Nominees for Episcopal Elections) and moved the resolution recommending rejection.

Original Text of Resolution

(A003)

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring,

That Canon III.11.1 is hereby amended by adding new subsections c and d and renumbering the remaining subsections as follows:

III.11.1

Sec. 1

a. Discernment of vocation to be a Bishop occurs through a process of election in accordance with the rules prescribed by the Convention of the Diocese and pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of this Church. With respect to the election of a Bishop Suffragan, the Diocese shall establish a nominating process either by Canon or by the adoption of rules and procedure for the election of the Bishop Suffragan at a regular or special Diocesan Convention with sufficient time preceding the election of the Bishop Suffragan.

b. In lieu of electing a Bishop, the Convention of a Diocese may request that an election be made on its behalf by the House of Bishops of the Province of which the Diocese is a part, subject to confirmation by the Provincial Synod, or it may request that an election be made on its behalf by the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church.

1. If either option in Sec. 1.b is chosen, a special Joint Nominating Committee shall be appointed unless the Diocesan Convention has otherwise provided for the nominating process. The Committee shall be composed of three persons from the Diocese, appointed by its Standing Committee, and three members of the electoral body, appointed by the President of that body. The Joint Nominating Committee shall elect its own officers and shall nominate three persons whose names it shall communicate to the Presiding Officer of the electoral body. The Presiding Officer shall communicate the names of the nominees to the electoral body at least three weeks before the election when the

names shall be formally placed in nomination. Opportunity shall be given for nominations from the floor or by petition, in either case with provision for adequate background checks.

2. If either option in Sec. 1.b is chosen, the evidence of the election shall be a certificate signed by the Presiding Officer of the electoral body and by its Secretary, with a testimonial signed by a constitutional majority of the body, in the form required in Canon III.11.3, which shall be sent to the Standing Committee of the Diocese on whose behalf the election was held. The Standing Committee shall thereupon proceed as set forth in Canon III.11.3.

c. Prior to any person's name being placed in nomination for election as a Bishop in a diocese, whether by the nominating body or by petition, floor nomination or in any other way, the diocese shall have:

- 1. conducted a thorough background check of each nominee according to criteria established by the Standing Committee. Such background check to include but not be limited to criminal records, credit checks, reference checks, sex offender registry checks, verification of education, employment and ordination and review of all complaints, charges and allegations while an ordained person;*
- 2. each nominee evaluated by a licensed medical doctor approved by the Standing Committee;*
- 3. each nominee evaluated by a licensed psychologist approved by the Standing Committee, with psychiatric referral if desired or necessary;*
- 4. each nominee evaluated for substance, chemical and alcohol use and abuse and other addictive patterns whether as part of the medical examination, psychological examination or otherwise by professionals approved by the Standing Committee;*

All such background checks and evaluations shall be conducted specifically for the election being conducted and not for any prior election or other process or purpose.

d. Reports of all background checks, medical, psychological and substance, chemical or alcohol use and abuse evaluations shall be initially provided simultaneously to the Standing Committee President of the electing diocese or nominating body under Canon III.11.1.b.1 and to the Presiding Bishop. After the consecration and ordination of the bishop elected President of the Standing Committee or nominating body under Canon III.11.1.b.1 shall promptly deliver to The Archives of The Episcopal Church a copy of all the reports of all background checks, medical, psychological and substance, chemical, and alcohol use and abuse and other addictive patterns evaluations obtained during the process for permanent retention. The President of the Standing Committee or nominating body under Canon III.11.1.b.1 shall destroy all other copies of the reports provided to, or created within, the electing diocese other than one copy for the permanent records of the diocese.

~~e.~~ *e. The Secretary of the body electing a Bishop Diocesan, Bishop Coadjutor, or Bishop Suffragan, shall inform the Presiding Bishop promptly of the name of the person elected. It shall be the duty of the Bishop-elect to notify the Presiding Bishop of acceptance or declination of the election, at the same time as the Bishop-elect notifies the electing Diocese.*

~~f.~~ *f. No Diocese shall elect a Bishop within thirty days before a meeting of the General Convention.*

The House of Bishops Committee on Constitution and Canons presented its Report #28 on Resolution A148 (Amend Canons to Underscore Support for the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice) and moved adoption - House of Bishops Only.

Original Text of Resolution

(A148)

That Canon 1.1.8 is hereby amended by adding new subsection b and renumbering the remaining subsection as follows:

Canon 1.1.8

Sec. 8.

a. The General Convention shall adopt, at each regular meeting, a budget for The Episcopal Church, including for the contingent expenses of the General Convention, the stipend of the Presiding Bishop together with the necessary expenses of that office, the necessary expenses of the President of the House of Deputies including the staff and Advisory Council required to assist in the performance of the duties and matters related to the President's office, and the applicable Church Pension Fund assessments. To defray the expense of this budget, an assessment shall be levied upon the Dioceses of the Church in accordance with a formula which the General Convention shall adopt as part of The Episcopal Church budget. It shall be the duty of each Diocesan Convention to pay its assessment to the Treasurer of the General Convention according to the schedule established by the Executive Council.

b. *The Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice (the "Coalition"), created by the 80th General Convention, shall be funded in part with an annual draw on one-tenth of the Church's unrestricted trusts and endowment funds as determined in the most recent audited financial statements at a percentage rate equal to the draw percentage applied to fund the Church's budget as described in subsection 8.a of this Canon. The estimated funding amount for the Coalition shall be described in The Episcopal Church budget for informational purposes only. The funding for the Coalition shall be provided by the Treasurer after the Executive Council declares the annual draw rate. The Coalition shall report to every regular meeting of the General Convention, providing audited financial statements and reports on its ministry and participation in God's mission.*

And be it further

Resolved, That Canon 1.4.6 be amended to add a new subsection k. to read as follows:

Canon 1.4.6.k

k. *Nothing in this Canon shall alter in any way the Church's obligation to fund the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice as described in Canon 1.1.8. other than the Executive Council's determination of the annual draw from unrestricted trusts and endowment funds.*

Social Justice and United States Policy

The House of Bishops Committee on Social Justice and United States Policy presented its Report #21 on Resolution D021 (Support for Child Labor Protections) and moved concurrence.

Original Text of Resolution

(D021)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring,

That the Episcopal Church remember with the gratitude the work of faithful Christian and Episcopalian Frances Perkins, who is called the architect of the New Deal and the conscience of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and as the first woman cabinet member and Secretary of Labor oversaw the enactment of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 which for the first time banned oppressive child labor in United States federal law, and who is remembered each year in Lesser Feasts and Fasts on May 13th; and be it further,

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church oppose current attempts to weaken child labor laws at the state and federal levels, such as: repealing age verification and parental permission requirements; granting employers immunity from civil liability for workplace injuries, illness, or death; lowering minimum ages for working in hazardous industries, including meatpacking and industrial laundries; creating sub-minimum wages for teenagers; and extending the number of hours children are permitted to work; and be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church recognize that the primary targets of these attempts to weaken child labor laws are our most vulnerable children, including very low-income and migrant children, who are often living apart from their parents; and be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations and Episcopal Public Policy Network support domestic and foreign policies to strengthen and enforce child labor laws in the United States of America and globally and throughout the labor supply chain, including supporting policies to:

- eliminate separate treatment of agricultural workers under federal employment law;
- fully fund enforcement of child labor standards at federal, state, and local levels, and enhance company penalties for violating these rules;
 - eliminate sub-minimum wages for youth;
- eliminate or prohibit two-tiered systems, often labeled as training programs, which fail to protect children from hazardous work, especially in the agricultural sector;
- strengthen wage theft laws and provide resources to enforce them, especially for children;
- provide adequate protection and oversight for unaccompanied minor and refugee children after they are released to their sponsors;
- improve government oversight and transparency regarding the use of child labor in the global supply chain, and the use of diplomatic pressure on foreign governments and regulation of global corporations and their imported products to eliminate the use of oppressive child labor in factories and products;

and be it further

Resolved, That the Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church take this resolution into account in the implementation of its corporate human rights screen and in corporate advocacy via the Church's investment portfolio, with attention to the use of child labor in the global supply chain of companies in which the church is invested.

Original Text of Resolution

(D017)

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 81st General Convention reaffirm the principles of 2022-D020 (Addressing Implications of the Digital Age) and further acknowledge that generative artificial intelligence (AI) is rapidly changing how we relate to information and each other, and raises important ethical considerations regarding its impact on our understanding of truth, trust in institutions, authenticity, and human dignity, and that as a society and as a church we have not fully grappled with the important practical and ethical implications of advances in generative AI; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church, with the help of the Office of Government Relations and the Episcopal Public Policy Network, monitor advances in AI and speak on behalf of the most vulnerable according to the values of The Episcopal Church by supporting policies at the local, state, and national levels of governance, and efforts towards international frameworks to:

- Regulate the use of data to train algorithms, in order to recognize the rights of human creators, increase transparency about the data and methodologies used, diversify sources used for training data, and protect individuals' privacy rights;
- Restrict or regulate, requiring additional transparency, the use of generative AI to influence or interfere with elections and public information campaigns;
- Urge all political entities, and government officials, in the absence of legislation, to voluntarily commit to refrain from any deceptive use of AI in political campaigns;
- Restrict the use of AI to infringe on civil rights or applications of AI that perpetuate historic and ongoing discrimination and racism;
- Restrict or ban the use of deepfakes (images, videos, or audio altered to replace one person's likeness with another's) for purposes of fraud, defamation, and sexual exploitation;
- Support workers that have been negatively impacted by the use of generative AI in their industries, through support for policies such as retraining programs and regulations on monitoring in the workplace; and
- Regulate the use of generative AI by militaries, police, and in any other contexts related to the use of force

And be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church call upon companies, organizations, and individuals working with and developing generative AI to include guardrails and safety measures in their products, set transparent ethical guidelines and policies for their work, and carry out independent and ongoing ethical reviews of their products and their impacts on people, workplaces, our democratic systems, and society as a whole; and that the Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church be tasked with engaging relevant companies in the Church's investment portfolio on these ethical questions.

That the 81st General Convention acknowledge and mourn the prevalence of fatalities due to traffic accidents including pedestrians, cyclists, drivers, and passengers; recognize this as a justice issue due to the disparate impact that our road and transportation systems have on vulnerable populations, including impacts by race, disability status, age, and economic means; and seek for ways ensure that all people, especially children, can travel safely and be safe in their communities; and be it further
Resolved, That The Episcopal Church, with the help of the Office of Government Relations and the Episcopal Public Policy Network, support policies at the local, state, national, and international levels of governance to reduce traffic fatalities and increase transportation safety by:

- Prioritizing pedestrian, driver, and passenger safety in street design through use of traffic calming measures and investment in walkable communities;
- Incentivizing vehicle designs that promote pedestrian safety as well as passenger safety;
- Implementing policies to eliminate, minimize, or mitigate distracted or impaired driving;
- Creating safe ways to share the road with cyclists, pedestrians, and riders of other small vehicles such as scooters, including protected bike lanes and high-visibility sidewalks;
- Investing in expansive and flexible public transit networks, including high speed rail and bus rapid transit.

And be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church call upon car manufacturing and insurance companies to prioritize pedestrian and cyclist safety in vehicle design; and that the Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church be tasked with engaging relevant

companies in the Church's investment portfolio on approaches to reduce traffic fatalities and promote pedestrian and cyclist safety; and be it further

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church encourage congregations to assess both the transportation needs of their members and traffic safety needs of their parking lots and surrounding neighborhood, collaborate with local organizations on traffic safety issues, and advocate at the local level for improvements to reduce traffic fatalities.

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church as a part of the Body of Christ lament the negative impact of rising religious nationalism in the promotion of violence against the personhood and the social, cultural, and historical order of marginalized groups, *adversely affecting social, cultural, and historical contexts*; and be it further

Resolved, That General Convention encourage individuals, congregations, dioceses and other communities within the Church to educate themselves *more thoroughly* about this critical issue and its negative impact on marginalized groups; *that this effort be undertaken in collaboration with the Office of Government Relations, utilizing their established program on de-radicalization to ensure a coordinated and effective response*; and be it further

Resolved, That General Convention urge The Episcopal Church and its mission-related entities, in partnership with inter-religious, ecumenical, and Anglican Communion partners, to combat rising religious nationalism *in partnership with inter-religious, ecumenical, and Anglican Communion partners* by reporting associated incidents of violence and intimidation to the public and to the appropriate authorities.

- Allow for a pathway to citizenship for those with Temporary Protected Status;
- Creating a transparent designation process for choosing countries designated for TPS which allows for all countries similarly situated to be designated;
 - Allow for an expansive use of Temporary Protected Status;
- Allow for those with Temporary Protected Status the ability adjust their status without leaving the United States.

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church also continue to advocate for the use of TPS, recognizing it is currently a policy tool that is available to the executive branch to support vulnerable migrants; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention work with The Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations to continue to advocate for immigration policies that expand Temporary Protected Status, and protect those who qualify for Temporary Protected Status.

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention acknowledge that the right to life is one of the unalienable rights on which the Republic is based; that the right to bear arms is guaranteed by the Constitution; that our unalienable and Constitutional rights are not absolute; and that governments must balance gun ownership and control of violence with the duty to ensure security and public safety; and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention strongly urge federal, state, and local, governments to pass objective, shall-issue licensing laws for sellers, buyers, and users of firearms that require a waiting period, finger printing, background check, mental health evaluation, minimum age of purchaser,

training tailored to the firearm being purchased and include the proper use, maintenance, and safe storage of the firearm and that said license must be renewed periodically; and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention strongly urge the federal government to develop a system of gun registration that links domestically manufactured and imported firearms by serial number to the manufacturer, wholesaler, retailer, original owner, and all subsequent owners and that all of the individuals in this chain of ownership must be licensed as outlined in the previous resolve above; and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention strongly urge the federal government to work with manufacturers to develop nuclear barcode or other taggants and to require the use of these taggants in gunpowder so that the manufacturer and chain of distribution of batches of gunpowder may be traced; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this Resolution be referred to the Executive Council, the Office of Government Relations, the President of the United States, members of the Federal Congress, and all dioceses for appropriate action.

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church recognize the injustice to Tribal groups of the Natives and Indigenous People's lands with regard to their need for clean potable water; and be further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention directs the Office of Government Relationships to advocate for indigenous and native people's rights involving just use and protection of water resources.

That the Episcopal Church reaffirm and renew our call from March 2007 (in Executive Council Resolution EXC032007.31) to close and commit to never reopening the U.S. military detention facility at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba, or any similar site, twenty-two years after the first of 780 Muslim men and boys were sent there as detainees, recognizing that indefinite military detention without access to a fair trial is deeply unjust, that the military base in Cuba was used for this purpose to avoid legal and constitutional constraints, and that the torture carried out on many of those who are still detained is a moral stain on the United States; we further recognize that there has been no justice for the victims or families of 9/11 due to this torture and the military commission process; we call upon the U.S. government to use all of their diplomatic leverage to transfer immediately those ~~the sixteen~~ men who have already been cleared for transfer, and for justice to be served for those ~~the five~~ men who have been charged in a way that offers closure for the 9/11 victims' families, and a swift, responsible, and lawful resolution of the cases of the remaining aging and increasingly ill men; and be it further

Resolved, that this Convention commend the work of The Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations for continuing to shine a light on this issue even as prisoners continue to languish without trial, via their action alerts, public advocacy, and a recent webinar hosted by the Office of Government Relations with Presiding Bishop Curry and the National Religious Campaign Against Torture.

- The Episcopal Church supports inter- and multi-faith ministries that contribute to our mission to follow Jesus, loving our neighbors as ourselves (Matthew 22:36-40) and demonstrating particular care for those who are marginalized and oppressed (Matthew 25:31-46);
- Episcopalians find common cause and minister with organizations and individuals with whom we have theological differences, without proselytizing or demanding that our ministry partners adhere to the tenets we espouse;

- The over one million incarcerated individuals in this country are among the most marginalized and oppressed members of our society;
- Episcopalians faithfully engage in ministry with incarcerated individuals, seeking to provide support, encouragement, and hope to these persons;
- Among the many members of the incarcerated population as well as those who minister to and with them, are individuals who are LGBTQIA+, a community that also experiences marginalization in this country;
- Following the Way of Jesus, Episcopalians minister to and with all God's children, with special focus on the support and liberation of those who are oppressed;
- Our canons prohibit the denial of access to any ministry of this Church "because of race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, sex, marital or family status (including pregnancy and child care plans), sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, disabilities or age" (Canon III.1.2);

and be it further

Resolved, that Episcopalians may not be forced to overtly or tacitly endorse theological statements or practices that conflict with our stated policies and beliefs in order to participate in shared prison ministry programs; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention urge any prison ministry program in which members of The Episcopal Church volunteer hold policies consistent with our spiritual teachings and stated policies, asking such programs to change their policies if they conflict with our nondiscrimination canons; and be it further

Resolved, That, as a result of these actions, a group of the ordained and laity within the church have been dissuaded of their calling and biased in their ordination processes. Some ordained and lay have been forced to remain closeted, and others still were deposed from ministry; *and be it further*

Resolved, that the 81st General Convention authorize the establishment of a Task Force for Truth-Telling, Reckoning, and Reconciliation for LGBTQIA+ for the purpose of helping the Church engage in truth-telling, confession, and reconciliation regarding discrimination, harassment, violence, and all harmful behaviors against LGBTQIA+ in all their forms including but not limited to those who were deposed from ministry, barred from discernment/ordination processes and excluded from full participation of all ministry of the baptized by those in power within the Church; *and be it further*

Resolved, That this Task Force be appointed jointly by the President of the House of Deputies and the Presiding Bishop in collaboration and consultation with the Gender Justice Officer, be composed of 12 members - 5 lay people (at least 4 of whom identify as LGBTQIA+), 4 priests or deacons members (at least 3 of whom identify as LGBTQIA+), and 3 bishops members (preferably at least 2 of whom identify as LGBTQIA+). The overall composition of this task force shall include people of color and reflect regional diversity. The overall composition of this task force shall include at least 5 members who have experienced LGBTQIA+ discrimination, harassment, and or violence and including experts in church jurisprudence and psychology; *and be it further*

Resolved, This Task Force shall report its progress to the 82nd General Convention on the following tasks:

- To develop a survey on discrimination, harassment, and violence against LGBTQIA+ in all their forms (truth-telling and reckoning) as we understand these sins, including but not limited to spiritual, and emotionally abusive behavior, and oppression based on sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression. This survey should be distributed widely in the Episcopal Church for access by both laity and clergy no later than spring of 2025, said survey being available primarily on-line, and with adaptations made as determined by the task force to enable responses by those members of the general Church who may not have ready and easy access to the internet;
- To conduct a review of survey responses and data regarding discrimination, harassment, and violent behavior that has been experienced by those who identify as LGBTQIA+ and the impact of this treatment on lay and ordained persons, their ministries, and the ministry of The Episcopal Church;
- To create a Truth and Reconciliation process to guide churches, dioceses, provinces, and churchwide as they develop their own paths for reconciliation and restoration; recognizing a one-size-fits-all process will not be helpful given the diversity of our Church, and to plan a service of Lament, Apology and Reconciliation at the 82nd General Convention which serves as a liturgical model to be used across The Episcopal Church and beyond.

And be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention request that Executive Council allocate \$60,000 for the implementation of this resolution.

Sec. 3. If the conciliation is successful in reaching agreement among the parties on a suitable resolution of all issues, an Accord will be prepared as provided in Canon IV.14. If conciliation cannot be achieved within a reasonable time, the Conciliator will report such to the Bishop Diocesan, and the matter will be referred back to the Reference Panel. *The Reference Panel shall consider the report to determine whether to: (a) conclude the matter with an appropriate pastoral response pursuant to Canon IV.8; (b)*

refer the matter to the Bishop Diocesan for consideration of proceedings pursuant to Canon IV.9; (c) investigate the matter pursuant to Canon IV.11; or (d) refer the matter directly to the Hearing Panel pursuant to Canon IV.13. The determination shall be approved by a majority vote of the Reference Panel.

Establishment of this Standing Commission will be an important step in acknowledging that care of creation and response to environmental injustices is an integral and ongoing work of God’s people and church.

- i. Support programs that respond to eco-justice concerns, address systemic environmental racism, and work to alleviate environmental burdens on indigenous communities and actively respond to the call for environmental reparations.*

- iii. Expand, support and promote the Creation Care Covenant recognizing that this work seeks to align with the loving, liberating and life giving work of evangelism and beloved community.*
- iv. Provide expertise on programs that respond to the climate crisis and eco-justice including a carbon offset program, efforts for just transition, land based carbon capture initiatives, increase and utilize the capabilities of the Episcopal Asset Map.*
- v. Continue the creation care and ecojustice grants program and ecojustice fellows program to accomplish the above objectives.*
- vi. Develop theological materials and liturgical resources to support church wide creation efforts.*
- v. Recommend strategies to Executive Council and DFMS for the development and support of networks concerning eco-justice and care of creation.*

vii. *As requested, provide policy support to Executive Council and the Office of Governmental Relations on environmental and eco-justice matters.*

And be it further

Resolved, that General Convention approve a budget of \$1, 412, 500 to complete the tasks noted above.

Draw together the insights, best practices, and resources developed by varied Church bodies to address matters of human health and wellness, including work done on ministry in relation to substance use, suicide prevention, trauma and recovery, neurodivergence, developmental disability, challenges in aging, pain, and chronic illness, and to strengthen the response of faith communities in partnership with broad-based and local organizations.*
 - vi. Expand resources and encourage practices of ministry that support mental and physical health, assist faith communities to establish habits and structures of welcome, inclusion, encouragement, empowerment, and advocacy for persons of all ages facing mental, physical, relational, emotional, and spiritual health challenges, and provide helpful aids for healthy living.*
 - vii. Collaborate with other commissions, ecumenical partners, invested experts, and public agencies and organizations to create optimal resources and trainings.*
 - viii. Collaborate in seeking of funding sources and grants, and in deployment of funds, that support training for clergy, lay leaders, and faith communities.*

- ix. Partner with other Church bodies in education and advocacy about social and economic conditions that either strengthen or harm human health and wellness, such as access to housing, healthy food, education, work with dignity, and health services, as well as freedom from violence, stigma, and racism.
- x. Oversee the creation and content review of a sustained web presence that provides a gateway through links to robust resources for support and advocacy for human health and wellness.
- xi. Direct curriculum on mental health ministry for clergy, postulants, and lay leaders, in consultation with the Standing Commission on Formation and Ministry Development and other Church partners as appropriate.
- xii. Coordinate with networks and initiatives related to health and wellness both within and beyond the Episcopal Church, including but not limited to the Assembly of Episcopal Healthcare Chaplains, Allies for Recovery in the Episcopal Church, the Union of Black Episcopalians, the Episcopal Community Service in America, CREDO, St. Francis Ministries, the Interfaith Network on Mental Illness, NAMI's FaithNet, Lutheran Family Services, and varied faith-based wellness programs.

Resolved, That the General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget, and Finance to allocate \$75,000 to fund the work of the Standing Commission for the 2024-2027 triennium.

(A035)

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention of The Episcopal Church (“TEC”) recommit itself to the work of the Church as articulated first at the 70th General Convention in 1991-D113 which called the Church to address racism inside our church, within society, and in our world; and be it further

Resolved, That TEC acknowledge that the times and circumstances demand that the Church better articulate a clear and firm commitment to Dismantling Racism, Racial Healing, and Justice and Reconciliation in a manner similar to how the Church addresses the protection of children and youth (commonly referred to as “Safe Church”); and be it further

Resolved, That the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies, not later than March 1, 2025, jointly appoint a Special Task Force of one bishop, three clergy, three lay persons with experience in the use and development of Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing to create a set of Model Policies for Dismantling Racism, Racial Reconciliation, and Healing that addresses the following:

- **A screening and selection process for all clergy, lay employees, and lay leaders who require training on racial reconciliation according to the Church’s teachings**
- **The articulation of behavioral standards for clergy, lay employees, and lay volunteers considering:**
 - a. **The prohibition of offensive language or actions to people of color**
 - b. **The prohibition of any racially derogatory materials (magazines, cards, videos, films, clothing, etc.) on the Church premises or at Church events**
- **Education and training for all clergy, lay employees, and lay leaders considering:**
 - a. **Training be completed every 3 years.**
 - b. **Specialized training for those who recruit, screen, or select persons to leadership positions**

- c. **Guidelines for delivering anti-racism/reconciliation training to different racial audiences as begun by the Executive Council Committee on Anti-Racism and Reconciliation as supplements to the Framework for Anti-Racism & Reconciliation Training - engaging the Office of Ethnic Ministries to develop Ethnic-oriented Supplements to the Framework for Anti-Racism Training**
 - **Making the current Racial Justice Audit a permanent effort**
 - **Identification of a diocesan Racial Reconciliation Officer who will track and possibly coordinate racial reconciliation efforts across the diocese**
 - **Guidelines for accountability describing consequences when responding to concerns of:**
 - a. **Discriminatory behavior toward people of color**
 - b. **Lack of adherence to existing racial reconciliation resolutions**

And be it further

Resolved, That the creation of these Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing be completed by September 30, 2025; and be it further

Resolved, That the Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing be promulgated after they are approved by the Special Task Force; and be it further

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church Center appoint a point of contact person for dioceses to obtain information about complying with the Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing; and be it further

Resolved, That by the 82nd General Convention, dioceses are urged to create Guidelines for Racial Reconciliation and Healing to conform to the Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing with due regard to applicable local laws on the subject matters of the Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing; and be it further

Resolved, That all dioceses are encouraged to annually confirm, in writing or by email, to a designated office in the Episcopal Church Center, that the diocese's Guidelines conform to the Model Policies for Racial Reconciliation and Healing; and be it further

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention direct the Executive Council Budget Committee to allocate \$50,000 for the work of this Task Force.

(D074)

Resolved, That the 81st General Convention of the Episcopal Church renounce the theology of slavery held by the Rev. James Craik, the unanimously elected 11th President of the House of Deputies as described in General Convention Memorial 2024-M003, summarized here: In his pamphlet, Craik, a Unionist, argues that slavery is, in fact, an evil institution. Among his reasons, it is an economic hardship to the enslavers, it relegates the working class to an inferior status, while inciting pride and contempt for labor in the children of slave-owners, and the responsibility of caring for the enslaved is “a burden grievous to be borne.” “But,” he goes on to write, “it is not often that God permits an evil to exist long, and on a large scale, out of which he does not bring some corresponding good.” The evils, Craik says, fall only upon the white race, while the enslaved receive all the benefits because “a race of barbarians, gradually degraded by many thousand years of ignorance and brutishness to the lowest stage of humanity, has thus been place[d] in intimate contact, and under the constant and authoritative superintendence and government, of the most enlightened and civilized race upon the globe. Humanity, religion, and interest concur to make the cultivated and master race the friends, protectors, and instructors of the inferior race.”; and be it further

Resolved, That General Convention acknowledge the role our leadership played in the institution of chattel slavery; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention repent of the ongoing benefits and accrued wealth by this church through the enslavement of children of God; and be it further

Resolved, That because our baptismal promises call us to ongoing repentance, to persevere in resisting evil, and respect the dignity of all people, we must commit to bravely communicating to the church and the world our truths about our history and ourselves; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention urge the Canonical Archivist and Director of the Archives of the Episcopal Church and the Archives Advisory Committee to update the entry for the Rev. Those who have previously made a mature public commitment in another Church may be received by the laying on of hands by a Bishop of this Church, rather than confirmed. This may be a requirement for specific leadership roles as defined by the Constitution and Canons of this Church and its constituent bodies.

d. Any person who is baptized in this Church as an adult and receives the laying on of hands by the Bishop at Baptism is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed; also,

Any person who is baptized in this Church as an adult and at some time after the Baptism receives the laying on of hands by the Bishop in Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed; also,

Any baptized person who received the laying on of hands at Confirmation (by any Bishop in historic succession) and is received into The Episcopal Church by a Bishop of this Church is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed; and also,

Any baptized person who received the laying on of hands by a Bishop of this Church at Confirmation or Reception is to be considered, for the purpose of this and all other Canons, as both baptized and confirmed.

Sec. 2.

a. All Members of this Church who have received Holy Communion in this Church at least three times during the previous year are considered to be Communicants of this Church.

b. For the purposes of statistical consistency throughout the Church, Communicants sixteen year of age and over are considered to be Adult Communicants.

c. In cases of pastoral sensitivity, with the approval of the Bishop, these requirements may be waived for good cause.

Sec. 3. All Members of this Church who for the previous year have been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God, are to be considered Communicants in Good Standing.

Sec. 4.

a. A Member of this Church shall procure a Letter of Transfer to transfer their membership from the congregation in which their membership is recorded to another Congregation. This Letter of Transfer shall indicate that the person is recorded as a Member of this Church and whether or not such a Member:

1. is a Communicant,
2. is recorded as being a Communicant in Good Standing;
3. has been confirmed or received by a Bishop of this Church or a Bishop in full communion with this Church.

Upon acknowledgment that a Member who has received such a Letter of Transfer has been enrolled in another congregation of this or another Church, the Member of the Clergy in charge or Warden issuing the Letter of Transfer shall remove the name of the person from the parish register.

b. The Member of the Clergy in charge or Warden of the congregation to which such membership is surrendered shall record in the parish register the information contained on the presented Letter of Transfer, and then notify the Member of the Clergy in charge or Warden of the congregation which issued the Letter of Transfer that the person has been duly recorded as a Member of the new congregation.

c. If a Member of this Church, not having such Letter of Transfer, desires to become a Member of a new congregation, that person shall be directed by the Member of the Clergy in charge of the said congregation to procure a Letter of Transfer from the former congregation, although on failure to produce such Letter of Transfer through no fault of the person applying, appropriate entry may be made in the parish register upon the evidence of membership status sufficient in the judgment of the Member of the Clergy in charge or Warden.

d. Any Communicant of any Church in full communion with this Church shall be entitled to the benefit of this section so far as the same can be made applicable.

No communications were offered by the Presiding Bishop.

Special Business of Meeting

Clarification of membership and those eligible to vote was offered by the Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley of the Pastoral Development Committee.

Balloting for the election of the Bishop Suffragan of the Armed Forces and Federal Ministries.

The Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley put the names of The Rev. Jerome Hinson, the Rev. Ann Ritonia and the Very Rev. Michael Sniffen into nomination for the Bishop of the Armed Forces and Federal Ministries on behalf of the Search and Nominating Committee for Bishop Suffragan of AFFM. Meet and greets of the three nominees were held earlier in the meeting on March 8, 2023.

The Rt. Rev. Terry White outlined the process for voting.

Balloting for the Bishop of the Armed Forces and Federal Ministries was conducted.

The results of ballot # 1 was as follows:

A phone call was placed to the nominee by the Presiding Bishop. The Rev. Ann Ritonia accepted the election as the Bishop of the Armed Forces and Federal Ministries. The other candidates were notified. The bishops present signed the testimonials.

It was discovered after all the testimonials were signed that one bishop who should *not* have voted *had* voted. The election was voided and a new ballot was taken.

Balloting for the Bishop Provisional of Navajoland

The Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley put the name of the Rt. Rev. Barry Beisner in nomination on behalf of the Standing Committee of Navajoland for Bishop Provisional of Navajoland. The Presiding Bishop called for a voice vote and the Rt. Rev. Barry Beisner was elected by acclamation.

Suspension of the Rules of Order, Rule V.N.12

The Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe, Parliamentarian, noted that a number of items for consideration on the agenda were not received within the time requirement of the House of Bishops Rules of Order, Rule V.N.12 (30 days in advance). Rowe MOVED to invoke the provision in Rule V.N.12 so that the House could consider these matters. A vote was taken, with over two thirds of the House agreeing take up these items.

Reports of Special Committees

Report from the Committee on Resignations

The Presiding Bishop noted that one resignation will be emailed to the House. That resignation is that of the Rt. Rev. Griselda Delgado del Carpio, Bishop of Cuba.

Status on work with the Sudanese

The Rt. Rev. Martin Field offered an update on the status of the task force with the Sudanese community. The mandate of this committee was to open a dialogue with the South Sudanese who live in this country. (attach the report?)

The Rt. Rev. Prince Singh asked if there are gleanings or learnings that the church can learn from the work of the task force. The Rt. Rev. Martin Field acknowledged that the task force has struggled with this very thing. Listening to their stories is critical in building relationships which can support a mutual learning exchange.

Theology Committee report

The Rt. Rev. Allen Shin offered the report from the Theology Committee on Christian Nationalism. He asked the House to read the report and offered some background to the work of the group. In addition, Bishop Shin asked the House to use the information to not only educate our churches but to also offer a counter narrative to Christian Nationalism.

Theological Education Committee

The Rt. Rev. William Franklin asked the House to consider the issue of a crisis in Theological Education in view of the growth of hybrid and non-residential seminary offerings. The Rt. Rev. Carlye Hughes raised issues around the changes in education and the challenges of these new educational models. Bishops Franklin and Hughes invited the bishops with interest in talking about this and working on this to let them know.

Framing the Bishop Consent process and table discussion

The Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley shared comments around the consent process for a Bishop. Bishop Ousley oversees the work of the church addressed in Title III canon 11. Bishop Ousley noted what it means that bishops are asked to give or withhold consent. Standing Committee are required to state that there is no impediment to ordination.

The Rt. Rev. Kai Ryan asked what percentage of consents are withheld or not sent in by Bishops and Standing Committees. Bishop Ousley noted that there are some that occur. Some Standing Committees do not meet regularly. For the bishops, consents are 50% +1 of the bishops with jurisdiction voting. The same is true for Standing Committees.

The Rt. Rev. E. Mark Stevenson asked about how the objection process works. What is the canonical process for the objection to the election. Bishop Ousley explained the process per the canons. Table discussion ensued.

Courtesy Resolution (Appendix A)

The Presiding Bishop asked the Rt. Rev. Kym Lucas to read the resolution penned by by Peter Eaton on the death of former Presiding Bishop Frank Griswald. The Presiding Bishop closed the resolution by offering a prayer. The Resolution PASSED by acclamation.

Statement of Support for Transgender persons and Transgender children and their families (Appendix B)

The Rt. Rev. Kai Ryan noted that last year this house authored a resolution regarding Transgender persons and Transgender children. Bishop Ryan offered a resolution to reaffirm

Bishop Ryan MOVED and read the resolution to the House. The Motion was SECONDED. Ryan spoke to the resolution. The resolution PASSED.

Presentation and discussion by the Joint Budget Committee for TEC

Vice President of the House the Rt. Rev. Mary Gray-Reeves invited the Rt. Rev. Susan Brown Snook and the Rt. Rev. Jeff Fisher to speak to the house on the work of the Joint Budget Committee. Bishop Brown Snook and Bishop Fisher explained the new budget process of the Joint Budget committee. The Committee is made up of 10 deputies and 3 bishops.

Bishop Brown Snook addressed the revenue side of the budget. She noted the committee anticipates a significant shortfall in income including noting that some dioceses are seeking to pass resolutions to reduce the assessments to TEC. The stock market reduction, the current triennium's budget includes a surplus from pandemic issues which will not reoccur, and the portion of the investment income for racial reckoning will cause a reallocation from other areas of the budget.

Bishop Fisher spoke to the expense side of the budget, and summarized major categories:

Jennifer Reddall made a report on the work of the Standing Commission of Liturgy and Music. episcopalcommonprayer.org is now the official website of resources, including all the approved liturgies along with what categories they were approved. It also has links to other liturgical resources that are not official but helpful.

ACC

The Rt. Rev. Eugene Sutton reported on the meeting of the ACC, which he along with Fr. Ranjit Matthews and Canon Annette Buchanan attended. Bishop Sutton described the structure of the ACC and the principals involved. Bible study, discussion of the 5 marks of mission and engagement across difference were part of the work of the members of the ACC at this meeting. Four main issues were discussed: safeguarding all members of the church, structure and decision making within the Anglican Communion, reparations and restorations, gender identity and sexual orientation.

Executive Session

There was no Executive Session at this meeting.

Reading of the Minutes

The Secretary noted that the minutes of the prior meeting are available on the College for Bishop's website. It was MOVED and APPROVED that the reading of the minutes of the last meeting be dispensed with.

Adjournment

It was MOVED and APPROVED that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting was adjourned at 4:56 PM

Resolution of the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church

The Right Reverend Frank Tracy Griswold III

1937-2023

25th Presiding Bishop 1998-2006

Resolved, that the House of Bishops, gathered at Camp McDowell in the Diocese of Alabama, gives thanks to Almighty God for the life and episcopal ministry of the Right Reverend Frank Tracy Griswold III, who entered into eternal life on March 5, and who so gracefully embodied, with cultured humanity and holiness of life, the qualities of a Catholic bishop in the Anglican tradition, having served this Church faithfully and with distinction as the 25th Presiding Bishop from 1997 to 2006;

and further marks his devoted service as Bishop Coadjutor of Chicago from 1985 to 1987, and Bishop of that diocese from 1987 until his election to the primacy at the 72nd General Convention in Philadelphia;

and further celebrates the depth of theological wisdom and spiritual insight, as well as a generosity of spirit, along with his understanding, following Saint Anthony the Great, that our life and death are with our neighbor, binding us thereby in baptism to the journey of the discernment of truth in communion, all of which he brought to his life and work both as a bishop and as our Primate;

and further recognizes his enduring contribution to the liturgical renewal of the Church, especially his influence on the composition of Eucharistic Prayer B in *The Book of Common Prayer*;

and further recalls his commitment to the unity of the Churches and deeper dialogue with other religions, especially in his role as Anglican Co-Chair of the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission from 1999 to 2003, during which time the ground-breaking report, *Mary: Grace and Hope in Christ* was drafted, and in his championing of the agreement *Called to Common Mission* between The Episcopal Church and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, inaugurated in 2001, which continues to bear important fruit in our own day;

and further values his careful and sacrificial leadership as Primate during a sensitive and unsettled season in our history as a Church, *making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace* (Eph. 4:3);

and further remembers with gratitude his selfless ministry in his pensioned years as a pastor, teacher, spiritual director, retreat leader, and friend to many of us in this House and to others, who, rooted in

the fullness of the human experience, encouraged us, in tracking down the Holy Ghost and in gathering up the fragments, to pray all our days, that we might grow more deeply into the love of, and longing for, God, and so might become prayer itself;

and further extends to his wife, Phoebe, to their daughters, Hannah and Eliza, and their family the assurance of our condolences and our prayers.

Statement of Support for Transgender persons and Transgender children and their families

In light of the baptismal covenant's promises to see Christ in all persons and to strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being, and in response to the rapidly expanding numbers of proposed and enacted legislation by elected officials in forty-one states in the United States (Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, South Carolina, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wyoming), and any other states, countries in which our Episcopal Church ministers, municipalities, and school districts targeting transgender persons and transgender children and their families, seeking to limit access to healthcare, educational opportunities, public accommodations, free speech, and civil rights, we, the Bishops of The Episcopal Church gathered at Camp McDowell, Alabama, in March 2023, reaffirm our March 2022 expression of our love and continued support for all persons who identify as transgender or non-binary and their families. We decry legislative initiatives and governmental actions targeting our transgender siblings and their families. We urge all in our Church in all the countries in which the Episcopal Church is found to create safe spaces and shield all people from harassment based on gender identity, and to join in advocacy to protect them from discriminatory laws.

Special Business of Meeting.**Suspension of the Rules of Order, Rule V.N.12**

The Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe, Parliamentarian, noted that one item for consideration on the agenda was not received within the time requirement of the House of Bishops Rules of Order, Rule V.N.12 (30 days in advance). The Rt. Rev. Susan Haynes MOVED to invoke the provision in Rule V.N.12 so that the House could consider this matter. A vote was taken, with over two thirds of the House agreeing take up this item.

Reports of Special Committees**Report from the Committee on Resignations**

The Vice President announced that there is no report from the Committee on Resignations for the House.

Other Business**Statement from the House of Bishops (Appendix A)***Comments from the House:*

The Rt. Rev. Craig Loya offered a background to the work the writing committee undertook.

The Rt. Rev. Susan Brown Snook spoke on behalf of the original group who crafted the first letter that came to the House.

The Rt. Rev. Bonnie Perry noted the lack of acknowledgement of the pain the people of Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan given the Title IV process involving bishops there.

The Rt. Rev. Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows asked for the word LAMENT be added any time the word acknowledged. Also noted that the committee name is not accurate in paragraph 4. It should be *Standing Commission on Structure, Governance, Constitution and Canons*.

The Rt. Rev. Steven Miller suggested a change from the naming of the Intake Officer to the generic use of the title Intake Officer.

The Rt. Rev. Kai Ryan noted that it would be most helpful to not name additional dioceses in the document, and add *and in particular dioceses in which misconduct by a bishop has been alleged* to the second paragraph.

The Rt. Rev. Jennifer Reddall, asked to change the paragraph referring the matter to the Standing Commission on Structure, Governance, Constitution and Canons to invite the Presiding Bishop Designate(s) in the recent actions to meet with that Commission to share more specific details that would enable them to make more informed recommendations for any necessary changes. She also added the following: *The pain is absolutely real and urgent, both in the dioceses specifically affected by recent cases, and in cases where the recent complaints have recalled prior traumas elsewhere.*

The Rt. Rev. Audrey Scanlan offered gratitude to the committee that brought this letter to us, and questioned the closing statement of commitment.

The Rt. Rev. Terry White questioned the use of the word *alleged*.

The Rt. Rev. Paul-Gordon Chandler noted if we keep the Commitment section of the letter be changed. *...respecting the dignity of every human being. And when a transgression needs to be addressed, it will be with the goal of healing and restoration for all parties as Christ's way of love models for us.*

The Rt. Rev. Charles Bennison stated that he supports the letter but questions the timing of letter insofar as the Title IV process has not been completed.

The Rt. Rev. Mary Glasspool noted that the statement was written to be not a response to one Title IV or another, it is about the system in general.

The Rt. Rev. Matt Gunter noted the letter is part of a larger story of the impression that bishops are not being held accountable.

The Rt. Rev. William Gregg thanked The Rt. Rev. Glasspool asked her to write down her words so that it could be substituted in paragraph 2.

The Rt. Rev. Eugene Sutton noted the time is right to release this statement. Sutton asked that we name the statement *A statement on Episcopal Accountability from the House of Bishops*.

General discussion ended.

The Statement was brought to the floor of the House:

The Rt. Rev. Craig Loya MOVED that the HOB adopt the statement. The motion was SECONDED. Discussion ensued.

The Rt. Rev. Kai Ryan MOVED in the second paragraph last line after The Episcopal Church add *and in any diocese*. The motion was SECONDED. The Motion PASSED.

The Rt. Rev. Ian Douglas MOVED The Rt. Rev. Eugene Sutton's suggestion that we name the statement *A statement on Episcopal Accountability from the House of Bishops*. The motion was SECONDED. Discussion ensued. The Rt. Rev. Ian Douglas spoke to the title change. The Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley noted that the Singh family website regarding Bishop Singh is called Episcopal Accountability. The Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley suggested not changing the title. The Rt. Rev. Jennifer Reddall MOVED an amendment to change the title to *On the Accountability of Bishops*. The motion was SECONDED. The amendment to the amendment PASSED. The MOTION as Amended was discussed. The Rt. Rev. Ian Douglas supported the amendment. The motion PASSED.

The Rt. Rev. Mark Edington MOVED an amendment to paragraph 4. The motion was SECONDED We *are thankful that the Presiding Bishop has called on the Standing Commission on Structure, Governance, Constitution and Canons to review the Title IV disciplinary process, listen to the concerns and hopes of the church, identify what has worked and what needs improvement, and make recommendations to the next General Convention*. The amendment PASSED.

The Rt. Rev. Gerry Wolf MOVED an amendment to paragraph 5 *We are called to be wholesome examples to the flock*. The motion was SECONDED. No discussion. The motion PASSED.

The Rt. Rev. Matthew Heyd MOVED to add a new paragraph between paragraphs 2 and 3 *The pain in our Church is absolutely real and urgent, both in the dioceses specifically affected by recent cases, and in cases where the recent complaints have recalled prior traumas elsewhere*. SECONDED.

The Rt. Rev. Steve Lane MOVED the previous question on the amendment and the main motion. The motion FAILED.

The House again took up the amendment moved by the Rt. Rev. Matthew Heyd. There was no further discussion. The motion PASSED.

The Statement was ADOPTED.

Executive Session

There was no Executive Session at this meeting.

Reading of the Minutes

The Secretary noted that the minutes of the prior meeting are available on the College for Bishop's website. It was MOVED and APPROVED that the reading of the minutes of the last meeting be dispensed with.

Adjournment

The business meeting was called to order at 3:07 by the Rt. Rev. Wendell Gibbs, Michigan (resigned). The Rev. Ricardo Bailey opened the meeting with prayer.

The Secretary read the roll of the meeting. The secretary announced that the original attendance consisted of 123 bishops and 1 bishop elect. The number still present more than constituted a quorum. Communications from the Chair

The Chair welcomed the Rt. Rev. Sally French to the meeting as she had pressing business and could not attend the prior days of the gathering of the House of Bishops.

Special Business of Meeting

Constituting Group for the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice. The Rt. Rev. Ian Douglas, the Rt. Rev. Kym Lucas and the Rt. Rev. Sam Rodman addressed the bishops as they serve on the Constituting Group for the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice called into being by resolution A125 of the 2022 General Convention (Appendix A).

They reported that the Constituting Group has been hard at work and they anticipate inaugurating and kicking off the Coalition in 2024. The Constituting Group shared information on where they are with various related groups and agencies across The Episcopal Church (Appendix B).

The Rt. Rev. Jeff Fisher inquired regarding the thoughts on how monies would be spent. Bishop Douglas stated that there are “no strings attached” – the Coalition decides how to spend the money it is given.

Update on Armed Forces and Federal Ministries.

The Rt. Rev. Ann Ritonia shared that currently there are 104 active chaplains (94 Armed Forces, 7 Veterans Administration, 3 Federal Prisons) with 11 in process and 4 coming from other denominations. Bishop Ritonia noted that Baptists pastors in this work number over 2,000. Given their stance on LGBTQ+ this is especially hard on the LGBTQ+ community in the military.

Bishop Ritonia shared that the requirement to enter the military is that the applicant must be under 42. The Navy is currently waving this, and you can join under 57. For Federal Ministries the maximum age is 37. The Veterans Administration requires 4 quarters of CPE for its chaplains.

The Rt. Rev. Michael Hunn talked about a process that was created to bring a chaplain from another denomination into the Episcopal Church. The Diocese of the Rio Grande handles the Anglican formation in conjunction with Bishop Ritonía. The Diocese of the Rio Grande takes responsibility of the Commission on Ministry and Standing Committee for these candidates.

Bishop Ritonía noted that ACNA is actively recruiting Baptist pastors who are chaplains, or those who are coming out of Baptist seminaries.

Update on the situation in the diocese of Cuba.

The Rt. Rev. Rafael Morales Maldonado reported that the Diocese of Cuba is going through a process. The Bishop has done 18 pastoral visits in the last year.

The people of Cuba have a great spirit and a strong faith but they need help. There are currently 23 priests and 6 in process for ordination to the priesthood. The diocese has various lay people who are in charge of congregations. There are 14 people studying for the diaconate.

The Diocese of Cuba needs more financial assistance from The Episcopal Church.

A125 A Resolution Extending and Furthering the Beloved Community

Resolved, that the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church affirms that striving to become the Beloved Community of Jesus is central to our baptismal vocation in God's mission, and every Episcopalian is called to a lifelong vocation of racial justice and equity and the dismantling of white supremacy; and be it further

Resolved, that the 80th General Convention establish the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice as a voluntary association of Episcopal dioceses, parishes, organizations, and individuals dedicated to the work of becoming the Beloved Community; and be it further

Resolved, that the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice be charged with facilitating, coordinating, encouraging, supporting, and networking efforts of Episcopal dioceses, parishes, organizations, and individuals for racial justice and equity, and the dismantling of white supremacy, in collaboration with the work of the Executive Council and staff of the Episcopal Church Center; and be it further

Resolved, that the Presiding Bishop and President of the House of Deputies appoint a Constituting Group for the development, implementation, and creation of the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice, whose work includes determining and proposing all necessary organizational, canonical, legal, and other actions necessary to constitute formally and oversee said Coalition; and be it further

Resolved, that once the Coalition is constituted, it shall be funded with an annual draw on one-tenth of the trusts and endowment funds available for general use in the Episcopal Church's budget, the income of which is currently found on Line 5 of the Episcopal Church budget; and be it further

Resolved, that the draw percentage applied to fund the Coalition be the same percentage as that applied to fund the Episcopal Church's budget; and be it further

Resolved, that to support the development of the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equality and Justice, the Constituting Group be funded during the biennial 2023-2024 at the level of \$200,000 a year.

Appendix B

Constituting Group for the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice Update to the House of Bishops March 2024

In 2022, The Presiding Officers' Working Group on Truth-Telling, Reckoning, and Healing was established and charged with developing a plan and pathway for a process of truth and reconciliation regarding The Episcopal Church's complicity in racism and white supremacy. The Working Group presented multiple resolutions to the 80th General Convention, including "A125: Extending and Furthering the Beloved Community."

Resolution A125 underscored the imperative for Episcopalians to embrace racial justice and equity, and actively dismantle white supremacy, as core elements of our baptismal calling. The resolution established the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice (Coalition) as a voluntary network of dioceses, parishes, organizations, and individuals dedicated to facilitating, coordinating, encouraging, supporting, and networking The Episcopal Church's work in racial justice and equity and the dismantling of white supremacy. To support this work, the resolution committed annual income from a tithe of the financial holdings of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and asked the Presiding Officers of The Episcopal Church to appoint a board to take all organizational and legal actions necessary to constitute and oversee said Coalition. This "Constituting Group" Chaired by Ryan Kusumoto, Lay Deputy from the Diocese of Hawaii, and comprised of a majority of lay and clergy people of color has been working actively since early 2023 to advance the development of the Coalition. <https://www.episcopalnewsservice.org/2023/02/07/episcopal-church-leaders-begin-work-on-creating-coalition-for-racial-equity-and-justice/>

- the legal documents, including bylaws and a certificate of incorporation, necessary to constitute the Coalition as an independent non-profit within The Episcopal Church,

- plans for an inaugural church-wide gathering of all Episcopalians dedicated to dismantling racism and white supremacy in late 2024 or early 2025

As called for in Resolution A125, income from 10% of the unrestricted endowment of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, totaling \$2,315,000 for the triennium 2025-2027, has been allocated, in part, for the work of the Coalition.

Members of the Coalition, including Bishops Kym Lucas, Sam Rodman, and Ian Douglas, and Chaplain Lina Howell, will update the House of Bishops in both Self-Select and Business Sessions at the Spring 2024 Meeting. All bishops are encouraged to attend these sessions to learn how your diocese can more effectively work for racial justice and equity and the dismantling of white supremacy through participation in the Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice.
